Whereas, The Superintendent of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Borough of Queens, issued orders to one John Muer, Jr., decorator, to decorate the Town Hall, Jamaica, and the County Building, same place; and

Whereas, Said decorations were in honor of the Long Island Subway celebration, which was of general interest to the people of Jamaica, and inasmuch as every building was decorated, particularly along Fulton street, be it

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 2, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), to provide means for the erection of an administration building, men's and women's cell buildings, mess hall, central heating plant, shops and a bath building for the new penitentiary on Rikers Island, under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter to an amount not exceeding two million two hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$2,250,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Provided, however, that upon the receipt of vouchers showing the payment of moneys upon the said draft to the extent of five hundred dollars, the Comptroller may draw his warrant to the order of the Corporation Counsel for the sum of five hundred dollars in part disbursement of the advance of fifteen hundred dollars.

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 18, 1908, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), for the purpose of providing means to pay the necessary expenses connected with the construction of the bridge over the East River, between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens, known as the Blackwells Island Bridge (No. 4), and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."
