The recommendations were adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 2, relative to Michael Klein, No. 329 East Thirteenth street, an applicant for Interpreter, and transmitting letters certifying to the good character of the applicant. After consideration of the matter, the Secretary was directed to remove the disqualification appearing against Mr. Klein's name on the eligible list.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 2, recommending that the name of Sydney R. Reid, No. 289 Fulton street, Brooklyn, an applicant for second grade Clerk, Board of Water Supply, be removed from the eligible list until such time as he might come forward to explain certain statements in his application. The recommendation was adopted.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 2, relative to Martin J. Cooke, No. 504 West Fifty-seventh street, an applicant for Clerk, Board of Water Supply. After consideration of the matter the Secretary was directed to summon the applicant to appear before the Commission at a meeting to be held on February 9 to show cause why his name should not be removed from the list under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII., for unsatisfactory character.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 2, relative to James A. Rooney, Jr., No. 210 Franklin avenue, Brooklyn, an applicant for Clerk, Board of Water Supply. After considering the report, the Commission directed that Rooney be called upon to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list under paragraph 14 of Rule VII., for unsatisfactory character.

Reports were presented from the Chief Examiner relative to James D. Moran, No. 10 Pearson street, Long Island City, and John W. Caveney, No. 77 Randall street, Corona, L. I., candidates for promotion to Assistant Foreman in the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Queens, who had been disqualified by the Chief Examiner for communicating. After consideration of the matter, the Commission directed that the candidates be called upon to show cause why their papers should not be rejected under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

A report was presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated February 2, relative to Mrs. Katie M. Fenner, No. 983 Amsterdam avenue, a candidate for Police Matron, who had given as the date of her birth in the application March 28, 1873, but in the medical sheet March 28, 1874. It appeared that the candidate had submitted a baptismal certificate which gave the date of birth as March 28, 1872, and that she had been marked "not qualified" pending the necessary correction in her papers. The Secretary was directed to permit the candidate to correct the date of birth given in her papers to conform with the certificate furnished and, upon such correction, to remove the disqualification appearing against her on the eligible list.

A report was presented from Mr. Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated February 2, relative to the case of Mr. John J. McGuire, a candidate in the examination for Pilot, Fire Department, held on October 21, 1909. It appeared from the report that Mr. McGuire had been ineligible for examination on October 21, 1909, owing to the fact that at that time his United States Government license for Pilot on boats of 300 tons did not include all the waters of New York Harbor; that the Fire Department officials had stated that Mr. McGuire's license was not sufficient to qualify a person as Pilot on the fire boats, and for that reason he had been held to be ineligible for examination in accordance with Rule XV., paragraph 5, since he was lacking in the preliminary qualifications for the position, fixed by law. After consideration of the matter, the Commission ruled that the kind of license subsequently obtained by the candidate was immaterial since at the time of the examination he had been ineligible.

The President, Hon. John C. McGuire, presided.

On the recommendation of the President, the Committee on Transfers, the following transfers were approved:

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated February 5, 1910, relative to the case of John W. Armstrong, a candidate for Morgue Keeper, and stating that in his opinion it furnished sufficient grounds for the exercise of the authority conferred upon him by Rule IX., paragraph 3. Accompanying the communication was a report of Examiner Leonhard F. Fuld, dated February 5, 1910, stating that in his investigation of the experience of John W. Armstrong he had discovered that Armstrong had been dismissed from the service of Bellevue Hospital on May 4, 1901, which fact he had not mentioned in his application. S., be and he hereby is excepted from examination, to be employed from time to time as his services may be required in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; provided, that his total compensation during the year 1910 shall not exceed seven hundred and fifty dollars.

The Secretary stated that the provisional appointment of David Berger, Interpreter (Hebrew, Polish and Yiddish) in the City Magistrates' Court, Second Division, and of Louis M. Lucia, Interpreter (Italian) in the Municipal Court, Brooklyn, Third District, had not been terminated, for the reason that proper certification could not be made from the newly established eligible list. 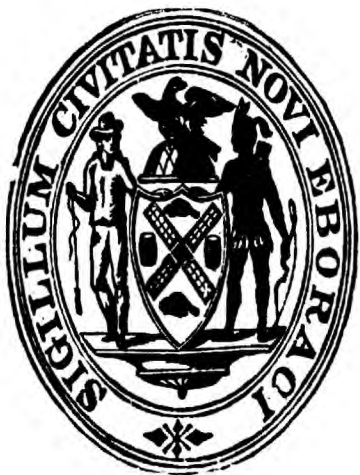

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
