Resolved, That the Corn Exchange Bank (Bronx Borough Branch) be made the depository for collections in the Borough of The Bronx.

The Comptroller having seconded the motion to adopt the above, the same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Chamberlain.

The Chamberlain offered the following:

Resolved, That the minimum rate of interest on deposits be fixed at two per cent. (2%), and that the Chamberlain be empowered wherever he may do so in his best judgment to enter into contract for such higher rate of interest as may be obtained.

The Comptroller having seconded the motion to adopt the above, the same was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, the Comptroller and the Chamberlain.

We have communicated with the different basket makers and informed them of the ordinance, which goes into effect in this City, as follows:

"Section 384A is hereby annulled, rescinded and repealed, as of this date, and in lieu thereof, to take effect, however, on September 1, 1911, insert the following:

"Section 384A. No person, firm or corporation shall sell, offer for sale, or give away any weights, scales, beams, measures of any kind, or the tools, appliances or accessories connected with any and all instruments or mechanical devices for weighing or measuring, intended to be used for the purchase or sale of any commodity or article of merchandise, or for public weighing, within The City of New York, until a type or types of the said weights, scales, beams, measures of every kind, or the tools, appliances or accessories connected with any and all instruments or mechanical devices for measurement or public weighing, with specifications as to construction, shall have been submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures. The Commissioner shall, when said types are approved, designate a serial number, which serial number shall be used in identifying the type approved. A record of the serial numbers and to whom furnished shall be kept in the office of the Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures.

"Any person, firm or corporation who sells, offers for sale, or gives away within The City of New York any weights, scales, beams, measures of any kind, or the tools, appliances or accessories connected with any and all instruments or mechanical devices for weighing or measuring, intended to be used for the purchase or sale of any commodity or article of merchandise, or for public weighing within The City of New York, that do not comply with the specifications and type submitted and approved by the Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, as provided in this section, shall be liable to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each and every such offense.

"Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

"Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately."

This ordinance will result, upon its enforcement, in the discontinuance of the use of baskets which are known in this Bureau as "near" one-quart, "near" two-quarts, "near" three-quarts, "near" pecks, which are sold on the markets as baskets, but if the ignorant or the non-discoverer asks for one, two or four quarts, or a peck, these baskets are what he usually receives.

These orders were issued as a result of what the Bureau found it could do in relation to strawberries and small fruits. It is found on investigation that most of these fruits are now sold in this City to conform to standards, allowing for the tolerances thereon directed by the State Legislature.

Branch Stations Opened.

Mechanical Divisions of this Bureau have been opened at 22 DeKalb ave., Borough of Brooklyn, and at 48 Jackson ave., Long Island City. These additional stations will serve to protect the residents of these Boroughs in their purchases, and serve the dealers in that they will have a place, without coming across to the Borough of Manhattan, to verify their purchases and also their scales used in the purchase and sale of different commodities.

Ordinances Amended.

The ordinances have been amended in a manner which will protect the public in their purchase of scales and measures from manufacturers.

The law as changed, which is to go into effect on September 1, will bring about a discontinuance of the use of inspectors in scale factories, and their time will be wholly devoted to the protection of the purchasing public in the form of systematized inspection.

Peddlers.

The problem of keeping peddlers from using doctored scales, weights and falsified measures is one which continually gives the Bureau great concern. It was found that on account of the transitory character of the push-cart business, effective inspection could only be made by squads of inspectors working in all the peddler sections simultaneously. For this work an automobile was hired to convey the inspectors quickly from Borough to Borough.

These raids, made at various hours of the day and night and on Sunday mornings at Catherine Market, resulted in the confiscation and destruction of many fraudulent scales and measures. In consequence of this continual raiding, the peddlers have come to a realization that it is safer and cheaper to use correct scales and give honest measure, as this Bureau has been successful in convicting

and imprisoning many of these dishonest dealers. On the whole, I am pleased to report that the peddler situation, which has been the bane of the Department work, has been almost entirely corrected, but five complaints having been made by citizens against the peddlers this last quarter. Inspectors are now stationed at the places where peddlers congregate, and constantly patrol these sections, especially at night, and we feel that this system largely contributed to the correction of this great wrong, from which people in medium circumstances and the very poor of the City so long suffered.

Coal Re-Weighing.

Special attention was centered on the re-weighing of coal, and during the winter 405 vehicles of different capacities were re-weighed.

The Department has purchased a motorcycle, which will be used in a great measure in following coal wagons, especially in the suburban parts of the City, where it was found very difficult to keep up with fast or quickly driven wagons.

Fish Peddlers.

There are upwards of a thousand fish peddlers selling their fish out of baskets in the streets of the City. Owing to the fact that these peddlers are distributed through a vast area, it was found that they could not be reached during the day, so the scheme of raiding at 4 a. m. and corralling all of these peddlers at the markets where they made their purchases resulted in the confiscation of a large number of scales. Where it was found that a scale was so manipulated as to show deliberate intent to cheat, arrests were made, and this Bureau has been successful in bringing about a conviction in all these cases.

The result of this system of work has brought about a complete correction for the time being, and by continual supervision this condition can be maintained.

Retail Dealers in Butter.

Selling wooden dishes at butter prices—the old time custom of weighing in the wooden butter dish with each draft of butter—has been changed to a new system, that of selling net weight. This correction was mainly brought about by the women inspectors in this Bureau.

There have been a large number of violations placed against grocers and delicatessen stores because of this practice, but the general condition is that most of the dealers have discontinued weighing in the butter dish.

Recommendations.

The sale of coal in small quantities, such as dealt in by the detail cellar dealer, is, in my opinion, one which needs correction. It is almost impossible to obtain the names of the owners of these different cellar vendors, and I would suggest that an ordinance be enacted which will compel each dealer to be licensed, upon the payment of a nominal fee.

All scales owned by the City in use in the various departments should be made public scales, at which various commodities could be weighed free of cost.

An ordinance which would compel the manufacturers or dealers in food-stuffs to brand on the container the net weight or measure of the contents thereof would eliminate from the City's markets the many indeterminate and arbitrary measures, known as large and small bottles, packages, bags, numbers 10, 5, 3 and so on, all of which mean nothing to the buyer as he has no means of knowing what quantity he is actually receiving, but which mean much to the packer, by reason of the false impression created in the use of these "near" standard measures.

AMENDMENT TO THE PLUMBING RULES and Regulations of the Bureau of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, made under provisions of section 141 of the Building Code.

CHAPTER XV.

WATER SUPPLY.

Section 159.—House service pipe must connect to the street mains by means of taps supplied by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Section 160.—A stop and waste cock must be placed under the sidewalk at the curb, and also a separate stop or valve upon the service pipe just inside the front wall.

Section 161.—The diameters of street service pipes must not be less than one inch for dwellings, one and one-half inches for tenements or apartment houses, and two inches for hotels, factories and other miscellaneous buildings.

Section 162.—That all rising lines have a stop cock or valve at the foot of each line and a separate stop cock or valve on the branches from riser for each fixture, if isolated, or each group of fixtures, such as bath rooms, kitchens, etc., located so as to be accessible at all times.

Section 163.—Diameters of branches to any fixture must not be less than one-half inch. For flush valves not less than one inch.

Section 164.—Where hot water supply pipes are installed, the distance between the hot and cold risers and branches must not be less than twelve inches, and a method of circulation provided that will insure the prompt delivery of hot water at the faucet when required.

Section 165.—All risers and branches, where possible, must be exposed and properly fastened.

Proposed Amendments to the Rules and Regulations for Plumbing and Drainage.

WATER SUPPLY.

HOUSE SERVICE PIPE MUST CONNECT to the street mains by means of taps supplied by the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

A stop and waste cock must be placed under the sidewalk at the curb, and also a separate stop or valve upon the service pipe just inside the front wall.

The diameters of street service pipes must not be less than one inch for dwellings, one and one-half inches for tenements or apartment houses, and two inches for hotels, factories and other miscellaneous buildings.

That all rising lines have a stop cock or valve at the foot of each line and a separate stop cock or valve on the branches from riser for each fixture, if isolated, or each group of fixtures, such as bath rooms, kitchens, etc., located so as to be accessible at all times.

Diameters of branches to any fixture must not be less than one-half inch. For flushometer valves not less than one inch for urinals and one and one-quarter inches for waterclosets.

Where hot water supply pipes are installed, the distance between the hot and cold risers and branches must not be less than twelve inches, and a method of circulation provided that will insure the prompt delivery of hot water at the faucet when required.

All risers and branches, where possible, must be exposed and properly fastened.

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen of the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the De-

partment of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.
