COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

No. 2360.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, December 3, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—In the action of Pennsylvania Steel Company vs. The City of New York, it became necessary to employ Clarence L. Hudson and Henry W. Hodge, consulting engineers, as experts for the City.

The action was brought to recover the sum of \$183,464.41, with interest from the 26th day of September, 1908, which the Pennsylvania Steel Company alleged was the balance due under the contract made the 20th day of November, 1903, between The City of New York and the Pennsylvania Steel Company, for the construction of the steel superstructure of the Blackwell's Island Bridge over the East River between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Queens.

I have agreed with each of these experts that \$3,000 is a reasonable compensation for their services and they have each rendered a bill for that amount.

These bills would be payable from the appropriation for contingencies. The amount expended by this department for contingencies during 1911 was \$95,300, but in the budget for 1912, the appropriation was limited to \$83,000. There was on November 15, 1912, a balance in the appropriation for contingencies for 1912 amounting to \$22,500. The disbursements paid from the 1911 appropriation after November 15 of that year amounted to \$32,800. It is apparent, therefore, that there will be a deficiency in this appropriation for 1912 of about \$10,000.

Under these circumstances, it does not seem wise to certify these bills for payment from the appropriation, and I am obliged to ask for an issue of special revenue bonds to meet this expense.

The services rendered by these two experts were of great importance and covered a period of about six months, from March 28, 1912, to October 17, 1912, and, in addition, they both testified upon the trial of the action for The City of New York. The services rendered by the experts, in detail, are as follows: They personally checked all computations which had been made by a corps of engineers over a period of seven or eight months in an endeavor to find out the capacity of the bridge and whether or not it had been built according to the contract. It was necessary also to compare all the invoices of steel which were forwarded from the Steel Company to the City, and necessary to check up the dead load distribution. It was also necessary to prepare stress sheets for live loads in continuous stretches and live loads in discontinuous stretches. They had to prepare reports and drawings showing the members of the bridge that were over-stressed if loaded according to the contract, and showing all stresses which exceeded those specified by the contract. It was necessary also to prepare testimony for the trial of the action and to testify upon the trial in reference to all of the above facts, as well as the size and dimensions of all members of the bridge that were in question.

I, therefore, ask that your Honorable Board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds amounting to \$6,000 to pay these two bills. Yours respectfully,

Therefore, I respectfully submit the following resolution for the action of your honorable Board, in order that the foregoing inconvenience may be obviated:

"Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses contingent to the District Attorney's Office, New York County, the District Attorney may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding two thousand dollars. The District Attorney may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as may by him be deemed necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the District Attorney's Office, New York County, but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers certified by the District Attorney covering the expenditure of money paid thereon.

Hon. HENRY H. CURRAN, Chairman, Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Sir—I have received your communication under date of December 3, 1912, asking an answer before the end of this week to a request for advice made in a previous communication upon the question of whether The City of New York has the power to acquire real estate outside of the City limits as a site for the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School.

The courts of this State have never passed upon the precise point presented by this inquiry, and in view of the general uncertain condition of the authorities upon the subject, I am of the opinion that the City should not undertake to acquire the land in question without first procuring express legislative authority therefor.

The general rule is that a municipal corporation cannot purchase and hold real estate beyond its territorial limits unless the power is conferred by the Legislature.

Many judicial decisions elsewhere, however, establish the rule that from a general authority to hold and own land necessary or convenient for the corporate uses, legislative authority to own and hold such lands outside the territorial limits of the City, for certain municipal or private purposes as distinguished from a purpose which requires the exercise of governmental powers, may be implied. But even if this rule should be adopted in this State, yet the purpose of the acquisition of the particular land in question might be held to be purely governmental, and in that event the purchase might not be justified.

I advise you, therefore, that the proposed purchase should not be made without express legislative authority. The obtaining of such authority will remove all difficulty as well as the danger of any possible litigation which might ensue if the City should attempt to exercise the power otherwise. This pier is leased to the Hamburg-American Line, the lease to that company providing that the City is responsible for all repairs to the substructure of the pier and that the company is responsible for all repairs needed to the superstructure of the pier and to the shed on the pier.

A letter has been received from the Hamburg-American Line to the effect that it is agreeable to said company to have the necessary repairs made to the superstructure of the pier by the force of this Department, and stating that it would reimburse this Department for the expense involved.

It is impracticable to have this work done while the company is in occupation of the premises and the only feasible method is to have the repairs made by the force of this Department.

I respectfully request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Aldermen authorizing that repairs to the substructure and to the superstructure of the pier at the foot of West 25th street, North River, be made by the force of this Department by day's labor and otherwise than by contract, at a cost not to exceed in any event \$10,000. Dear Sir—This department has provision for the purchase of an automobile truck, to be used on maintenance and repairs to the Brooklyn distribution system, an allowance of \$2,000 having been made for this purpose.

Difficulty has been experienced in the past in promptly shutting off water in case of breaks in mains, and where such breaks have been on large pipes, damage to property and danger to life have resulted. The necessity for prompt action in connection with any accident affecting the distribution system, which furnishes the water supply for fire protection as well as domestic use, is so evident that no extended argument need be given.

Heretofore, when the purchase of an automobile was necessary, the reasons which made it impracticable to carry out such purchase by contract, after competitive bidding, have been submitted to the Board of Aldermen, and it is, I believe, a recognized fact that specifications cannot be prepared for this class of supplies without the department definitely specifying some particular style or make of machine, or perhaps infringing upon some patent rights. Dear Sir—At the meeting of the Board of Aldermen on October 29, 1912, a resolution was adopted recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the issue of revenue bonds in the sum of \$32,500, to provide for the purchase of water in the Borough of Queens.

In my communication to you, dated October 8, 1912, which was later forwarded to the Board of Aldermen, I explained that \$65,000 would be necessary to pay for the water to be served to the City by two of the private water companies for the remainder of the year. Attached to my communication was a schedule showing the actual quantity of water delivered during the previous months and the estimated quantity required for the remainder of the year. The two private water companies which are now delivering the water for use in the Borough of Queens are under contract authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 471 of the Charter, and each of these companies is required to deliver a specified minimum or maximum supply of water daily. The \$32,500 additional funds will only be sufficient for the payment of the bills for water furnished during the months of September and October.

The City cannot escape its responsibilities under the agreements entered into with the two private water companies nor, under these agreements, can it compel the companies to deliver water when there is an uncertainty as to whether they will receive payment for the water delivered within the time specified in their contract. The department has no balances or unencumbered funds which could be transferred to make up this deficit. It will be seen, therefore, that the department will require the full amount originally requested.

The estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person making the estimate, they or it will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his sureties for its faithful performance, and that if he shall omit or refuse to execute the same, they or it will pay to The City of New York any difference between the sum to which he would be entitled upon its completion and that which The City of New York may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract shall be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested.

515. The consent mentioned in the last section shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in The City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in the proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities, as bail, surety or otherwise, and that he has offered himself as a surety in good faith, and with an intention to execute the bond required by law; and like affidavit as to sufficiency shall be required of an officer of any company so consenting.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Dear Sir—This association submits to you herewith copies of a proposed ordinance repealing sections 514 and 515 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Contracts for Supplies and Work for the City," and respectfully requests that the same be introduced in the Board of Aldermen for its enactment.

On February 11, 1910, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appointed a committee of engineers to report on the standardization of contracts and specifications for highway work, which committee was to hold hearings to contractors and others interested.

At one of these hearings representatives from this association requested that the contract requirement that proposals for work be accompanied by the consent of two householders or freeholders or of a surety company should be eliminated.

As a result of these hearings Mr. Nelson P. Lewis, Chairman of the Committee of Engineers, on May 28, 1910, addressed a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment recommending that the Board of Estimate recommend to the Board of Aldermen the repeal of sections 514 and 515 of the ordinance by which authority this requirement is inserted in the contract. The intent of these ordinances is not realized in their practical operation, since they require that the persons giving their consent to act as sureties on the proposal offer themselves in good faith and with the intention of executing the bond required for the completion of the contract. As a matter of fact, these preliminary bondsmen are almost without exception of a character known as "straw bondsmen" and are substituted upon the execution of the contract by a surety company acceptable to the Comptroller.

We beg to call your attention to a recent decision rendered by the Appellate Division, in City of New York vs. Seely-Taylor and Empire State Surety Company, in which the City sued the contractors on the bond which had accompanied their bid. Subsequently the contractor discovered an error in his proposal and he refused to execute the contract, whereupon the City proceeded to recover the difference between the Seely Company bid and that of the contractor to whom the contract was subsequently let. In affirming the dismissal of the complaint the Court held that:

"Section 349 of the Revised Ordinances of The City of New York, in so far as it relates to the payment of damages for the refusal of a principal to enter into a contract awarded, is inconsistent with section 420 of the Charter, and void."

The opinion says that having complied with section 420 of the Charter the contractor could not be subjected to any damage other than that provided in that section and that the City could not recover damages under both the ordinances and charter. Quoting from the opinion:

"One cannot recover both. The recovery of one precludes the recovery of the other. To permit a recovery of actual damage where liquidated damages have been provided for is to nullify the statute or destroy a contract with reference thereto."

"The power on the part of the City to pass an ordinance is derived from its Charter, and an ordinance in so far as inconsistent with the Charter is void. Section 420 of the Charter provides that damages shall be paid by a bidder whose bid has been accepted for refusing to enter into a contract. Any attempt on the part of the City by an ordinance to impose any greater damage is ineffectual and cannot be enforced."

AN ORDINANCE in relation to bicycle races and other contests of skill, speed or endurance in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter, in any bicycle race, or other contest of skill, speed or endurance held within the limits of The City of New York, wherein one or more persons shall be a contestant or contestants, it shall be unlawful for any contestant to continue in any such race or contest for a longer time than three hours during any twenty-four hours. Further, no such race or other contest shall be held excepting between the hours of 7 o'clock a. m., and 11 o'clock p. m.

Sec. 2. It shall be the duty of the Health Commissioner to assign to the place in which any such race or other contest is to be held an inspector, or inspectors, for the purpose of the better enforcement of such statutes bearing upon the question of the unlawful use of drugs, which, in such event, may be employed for the continuation or success of such undertaking. A report of such inspector or inspectors shall be filed in and made part of the record of the Health Department.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the Police Commissioner to assign to the place in which any such race or other contest is to be held an officer or officers for the purpose of properly computing the time of each contestant while engaged in any such race or other contest. A report of such officer or officers shall be filed in and made a part of the record of the Police Department.

Sec. 4. The proprietor, occupant or lessee of the place where such race or other contest takes place, consenting to, allowing or permitting any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession or by competent testimony, shall be fined in the sum of one hundred dollars for each offence, and in default of the payment of such fine shall be committed to the City Prison until the same be paid; but such imprisonment shall not exceed thirty days. The manager or superintendent of such race or other contest consenting to, allowing or permitting any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall likewise be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and subject to the fine and conditions herein imposed.

Sec. 5. All ordinances or parts of ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated into The City of New York, inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

MESSAGES FROM THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following communication from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 2129.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, December 10, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return disapproved the items in your resolution in reduction and amendment of the Budget for 1913 which are set forth in the schedule hereto annexed. Many, if not most of them, are of existing positions which were in the Budget of 1912, or were created and filled during the current year. The present Budget by changes of designation or terminology or classification made them appear as new positions, and thereby misled your honorable body. It is due to the member of your Finance Committee who had the matter in charge for me to say that he by close scrutiny picked out all of these positions and requested me to withhold my approval of your resolution eliminating the appropriations therefor.

After most careful consideration I have determined not to disapprove of your cut of \$229,790.34 in the Budget of the Board of Education. You made a similar cut last year and that board had no trouble in getting through the year without discharging any Teacher. The trouble is that the Board of Education has persistently refused to furnish the Board of Estimate and your honorable body with data which is essential to the consideration of its Budget. We were all compelled, for instance, to act thereon without any information of the amount of accruals of salaries in that board for several years past. We now know that last year there was a large balance at the end of the year in the Board of Education funds made up of such accruals. It was several hundred thousand dollars, at least. Presumably there is such a balance existing this year. The Board of Education has refused to furnish us with the figures showing such accruals, and the total amount thereof. They say they have not a sufficient staff to keep such a record. I am not willing to accede to this, nor are my associates in the Board of Estimate, as I understand them, nor are you. The number of resignations and deaths of Teachers each year is very large. Those who resign or die are succeeded by new Teachers who are paid smaller salaries than were paid to those whom they succeed, as the salaries of Teachers increase year by year by a certain established increment. From this source there is a very large saving in the salaries each year. It is the duty of the Board of Education to inform the Board of Estimate and your honorable body of this amount each year when it puts in its Budget estimates, and it is now time that we insist that it do so. The action of your honorable body in making this cut brings the whole matter to a head, and will enable us in the coming year to require them to furnish us with this necessary information. I fully approve of the action of your Board in this matter. If it be a fact that the reduction which you have made will make it impossible for the Board of Education to pay all of the salaries of Teachers, they can come before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and your honorable body during the year and prove it. In order to prove it they will have to show how much these salary accruals which I have mentioned amount to, so as to enable us to judge whether there is a shortage in their Budget or not. If there be such a shortage, it can be made up during the year, but it must be made to appear. The Board of Estimate and your honorable body desire to be generous to the Board of Education, but it is time that we make it known that we shall no longer make appropriations for that board in the dark. We have a right to demand that they keep proper accounts and furnish us with necessary data. I see no trouble whatever in keeping an account of these salary accruals. As a Teacher resigns or dies and is succeeded by a new Teacher who is to be paid a smaller salary, there can be no trouble in immediately figuring out the amount of saving in salary, and

entering it in an account to be kept for that purpose. The auditor of the Board of Education should be instructed by the Board to do this. That it will take a great staff of new clerks to do this I am not able to perceive or believe. The Board of Estimate also made a cut in the tentative Budget of the Board of Education as reported by its committee. We had to act in the dark in doing so. We found ourselves in the same case as your honorable body was in making your cut.

I felt inclined to veto your action in striking out certain salaries of employees of the Public Library. But on examining the matter I found that your position in that matter was not unreasonable, to say the least. The Budget shows that employees who have heretofore been paid out of the Library's own funds in whole or in part are this year put in the Budget, to be paid entirely by the City. Before that is done (and I do not say it should not be done) it is due to your honorable body that you have full knowledge of it, and have the reason for it. Where your action is fairly debatable, it is not for the Mayor to set his judgment up against yours. In this same spirit I have concluded not to veto your action with regard to the Playgrounds Commission. It seems to me that the members of that commission might well be expected to do some things for which they seek to create paid positions. But that can all be considered next year.

It seems to me plain that your honorable body should have a representative on the Committee which makes up the tentative Budget each year, the Chairman of your Finance Committee, for instance. If that were the case there would be greater harmony between the Board of Estimate and your honorable body in the making up of the Budget, and many misunderstandings would be avoided. BUDGET FOR 1913.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this, the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, the total amount appropriated being one hundred and ninety-three million and forty-seven thousand two hundred and forty-six dollars (\$193,047,246.00), divided as follows:

First—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business, to meet the debt charges of said City for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, and to meet a direct state tax levied upon the City for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, one hundred and eighty-four million five hundred and twelve thousand five hundred and eighty-four dollars and fourteen cents (\$184,512,584.14).

Second—The amount estimated to be the deficiency on January 1, 1912, in the product of taxes theretofore levied, deemed to be uncollectible and not otherwise provided for, as required by chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, being section 248 of the Greater New York Charter, two million three hundred thousand dollars (\$2,300,000).

Third—The amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen, six million two hundred and thirty-four thousand six hundred and sixty-one dollars and eighty-six cents (\$6,234,661.86).

Resolved, That this, the Budget of The City of New York, as hereby made in pursuance of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, shall be administered under the following terms and conditions:

First—

- (a) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Regular Employees."
- (b) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Salaries, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Salaries, Temporary Employees."
- (c) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Regular Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Regular Employees."
- (d) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Wages, Temporary Employees," to any other appropriation or schedule than "Wages, Temporary Employees."
- (e) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations classified as "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," or "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers," to any appropriation other than the one classified as "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles with Drivers," or "Transportation," "Hire of Horses and Vehicles without Drivers."
- (f) That no transfers shall be made from appropriations or schedules of "Fees and Commissions" to any other appropriation or schedule than "Fees and Commissions."
- (g) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification other than "Personal Service" to any appropriation classified as "Personal Service," except in cases where the title of appropriation specifically provides for transfers herein forbidden.
- (h) That no transfers shall be made from any of the appropriations made herein under any classification where the title of the appropriation prohibits such transfer, although otherwise the transfer might be proper under the budget resolutions in the budget for 1913.

Second—That no change shall be made by any Board or head of an Office, Bureau or Department in the City or County Governments in the schedules of "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," herein contained, except when authorized thereto by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no requests for changes shall be considered except as follows:

- (a) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Salaries, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any month to more than one-twelfth of the total amount herein appropriated for "Salaries, Regular Employees."
- (b) In the case of schedules or appropriations of "Wages, Regular Employees," where the proposed change will not increase the amounts expendable in any week to more than the pro rata of the number of working days in such week to the total number of working days provided for such schedule line for the whole year.

Third—That in case of modifications of schedules or transfers within appropriations classified as "Personal Service," where one of the appropriations is a Tax Levy Part appropriation, the full amount of cash necessary to pay the total salaries or wages of the incumbents transferred for the balance of the year 1913 shall be transferred to the appropriation to which the incumbents are transferred.

Fourth—

- (a) That the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall prepare their several payrolls for audit by the Department of Finance in accordance with the items of the aforesaid schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees"; "Fees and Commissions," or in case these items have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the items of the schedules as changed, and that no payroll shall be passed by the Department of Finance unless the incumbents and the rate of individual compensation agree with such schedule lines as originally adopted or as hereafter modified by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.
- (b) That each and every payroll shall be accompanied by a recapitulation showing the exact amount expended to and including said payroll for every item appearing on the schedules supporting any of the appropriations against which all or any part of the moneys involved in said payrolls is to be charged, and that this recapitulation shall contain the full schedule supporting any such appropriations, or in case these schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the full schedules as changed.
- (c) That each payroll of any Department, in addition to any other departmental number, shall be numbered during the year serially, beginning with number one for each specific account, and such payroll shall bear a certificate signed by a person cognizant of the fact, stating that the recapitulation attached thereto is the correct recapitulation for the payroll bearing said number.
- (d) That in all instances where changes in schedule items have been made by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, all sums which have been expended against such schedule items as are changed shall be apportioned against the new lines in the same ratio as the new totals of the schedule items bear to the old totals.
- (e) That on all payrolls against schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees," and "Wages, Regular Employees," there shall be set forth the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules, or in case the items on such schedules have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the monthly or weekly pro rata expenditures against such schedules as changed.
- (f) That there shall be affixed to all payrolls a certificate made by the person preparing such payroll to the effect that there is a time record on file in said Board, Office, Bureau or Department, certified by the person or persons having knowledge of the facts, showing the character of service and the exact time of employment of such person or persons, except heads of departments, and excepting bureau and division heads relieved by the head of their department from the duty of keeping such record on said payrolls, and that the distribution or division of the time of such person or persons as shown on such payrolls is in accordance with such time record.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under any classification other than "Personal Service," "Supplies" or "Materials" is supported by a schedule, all expenditures against such appropriation shall be made in accordance with such schedule, and no voucher shall be passed by the Department of Finance for a sum exceeding the amount shown in said schedule, except when such schedule shall have been changed by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the heads of the several Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City and County Governments shall transmit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month,

or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing, firstly, the aggregate liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have been transmitted to the Department of Finance, and, secondly, all additional liabilities incurred against such schedules for which vouchers have not as yet been transmitted.

—Be it further

Resolved, That wherever an appropriation under the classification of "Supplies" or "Materials" is supported by a schedule, such schedule shall be conclusive as to the amount allowed for each function or subdivision, and the heads of departments shall submit to the Department of Finance on the first day of each month, or as soon thereafter as possible, a statement showing the amount of "Supplies" or "Materials" consumed the previous month chargeable against each supporting schedule line of the appropriation for "Supplies" or "Materials," which monthly amount, in the aggregate, shall not exceed the amount specified in the schedule, unless modified by twelve (12) votes of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

—Be it further

Resolved, That all appropriations under a classification other than "Personal Service," to any Board, Office, Bureau or Department of the City or County Governments, made in this Budget, be made under the following conditions:

First—That, in so far as practicable, all contracts and open market orders for purchases to be charged against such appropriation shall be based upon specifications which are definite and certain as to character and quality, and which conform with standard specifications for the various classes of supplies, materials, fuel and forage already approved or hereafter to be approved by this Board.

Second—That, in so far as such standard specifications may be established by this Board, the Comptroller at the time of certifying to the sufficiency of appropriations out of which such contracts are to be paid shall also certify that the specifications for such supplies or materials, fuel or forage or other articles for which standard specifications have been prescribed, are in conformance with such standard specifications.

Third—That all open market orders issued by any Department for supplies and materials, for which standard specifications shall have been prescribed, shall contain a description of the goods ordered, conforming with such standard specifications.

Fourth—That the Comptroller shall, in auditing claims for goods delivered on open market orders, determine, through inspection or otherwise, whether the goods delivered conform to such standard specifications.

—Be it further

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with section 56 of the Greater New York Charter:

First—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification, "Personal Service," and entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments for the number of incumbents shown in said schedules, except that in all cases where a position or grade of position has previously been established for an unlimited number of incumbents, or for a number of incumbents greater than the number shown in said schedule, nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to reduce the number of incumbents previously authorized.

Second—That the positions and grades of positions appearing in the schedules under the classification "Personal Service," and entitled "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen be established in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments.

Third—Nothing in this resolution contained shall be deemed to nullify or abolish any position or grade of position in the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments which has been previously established, but which does not appear in the schedules entitled "Salaries, Regular Employees"; "Salaries, Temporary Employees"; "Wages, Regular Employees"; "Wages, Temporary Employees," and "Fees and Commissions," supporting the appropriations made to the different Boards, Offices, Bureaus and Departments of the City or County Governments in the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and thirteen.

Resolved, That the several Boards, Departments, Offices and Bureaus of the City and County Governments are hereby directed to keep records dating from January 1, 1913, showing the cost price per unit, the number of units purchased and the total cost of all articles, equipment, supplies and materials purchased in 1913 and charged against appropriations made in this Budget; and such Boards, Departments, Offices and Bureaus are directed to submit to the Comptroller at the first of each month a statement of purchases made the preceding month, and also a statement of all articles of equipment, supplies and materials consumed in the preceding month.

Resolved, That the appropriation made herein of two hundred eleven thousand eight hundred sixty-six dollars and sixty-six cents (\$211,866.66) for four hundred and fifty-four additional Patrolmen be made with the proviso that it shall not become available for expenditure, and no additional Patrolmen shall be appointed thereunder until such time as this Board shall ascertain by inquiry the present and proposed distribution of the police force and the reasons therefor, and shall reach a conclusion based upon fact as to the exact number of additional Patrolmen which should be provided by the use of such appropriation in whole or in part for such purpose; and that this Board may make available for use all or any part of said appropriation when and as in its judgment it may deem wise.

Resolved, That nothing in the foregoing resolutions shall be construed as nullifying the resolutions preceding the so-called "cost data appropriation" for the Bureau of Highways, the Bureau of Sewers and the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Department of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

Fixed Charges and Contributions.
Care of Dependents in Private Institutions.
Conditions Governing Payments to Charitable Institutions.
Preamble.

All appropriations made in this budget to charitable institutions are hereby declared to be subject to the following regulations:

1. The accounts and records of all such institutions shall be kept so as to show their receipts and expenditures pertaining to all institutional activities, and a record shall be maintained in which their expenses shall be recorded under the following classifications:

- A. Expenses incurred in the operation of institution as follows:
 - a. Food stuffs.
 - b. Clothing.
 - c. Linen and bedding.
 - d. Fuel.
 - e. Magazines and newspapers.
 - f. Education (Instruction and Educational Supplies).
 - g. Other supplies.
 - h. Salaries and wages.
 - i. Professional services.
 - j. Light.
 - k. Forage and care of animals.
 - l. Telephone.
 - m. Printing, stationery and advertising.
 - n. Postage and telegrams.
 - o. Hospital and sanitarium charges.
 - p. Funerals.
 - q. Recreation expense.
 - r. Miscellaneous expenses.
 - s. Expense for boarded-out children.
- B. Expenses incurred in the maintenance of plant and equipment, as follows:
 - a. Repairs and renewals of plant and fixed equipment.
 - b. Repairs and renewals of furniture and movable equipment.
 - c. Interest on bonds and mortgages on corporate real estate, used exclusively for the charitable purposes of the institution, taxes and water rates, if any, thereon, fire insurance premiums on buildings on such real estate, together with their contents.

In all other respects such accounts and records shall be in the form required by the Comptroller of The City of New York, and as far as practicable such accounts shall be kept on an income and expense basis.

2. All payments made to charitable institutions in pursuance of the said appropriations shall be used by such institutions only for expenses incurred by the institution for the care, support, maintenance and education of inmates duly committed by the courts or the Commissioner of Charities or accepted by said Commissioner as public charges,

but they shall not include any expense for improvements or additions to plant or equipment, except as stated, or any payments on account of principal of mortgages. Expenses for education shall be taken to mean expenses incurred in providing suitable education for properly committed or accepted inmates, and shall include the salaries of instructors and expenses incurred for supplies for use in instruction.

3. All institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York and their books of record and account, so far as they relate to institutional activities, shall be open at reasonable times to the visitation, inspection and examination of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Department of Finance and the Department of Public Charities by their duly authorized Commissioners, officers or inspectors, excepting, however, that the accounts pertaining to the activities of any religious order which may be in charge of any such institution shall be segregated from the other accounts and shall not be subject to this regulation.

4. All such institutions shall prepare and file with the Department of Finance as of a date to be fixed by said department, a report of the condition of the institution and its operations during the previous fiscal year upon forms prescribed and furnished for the purpose under the provisions of these regulations by the Department of Finance.

5. Upon its appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interest to withhold payments out of any appropriation made to any charitable institution, he may, in his discretion, withhold the same, immediately giving written notice thereof to such institution and of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to cease further payments. Upon the determination of said board that such payments shall terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment from any such appropriations shall thereupon end.

6. The names and ages of inmates with a statement of the period for which payment is claimed must be placed on all bills rendered by such institutions for their care, support and maintenance prior to the presentation of such account for payment to the Department of Finance. The certificate of the Commissioner of Public Charities under regulation two hereof must also be attached to such bills. Except in emergency cases the Commissioner of Public Charities shall not accept as proper charges persons capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in the public hospitals. No case shall be regarded as an emergency case unless there shall have been made a certificate to that effect by a properly authorized and informed representative of the institution by which such case was received.

7. The City shall not be liable for any claim by any charitable institution which shall be in excess of the amount apportioned to such institution in this budget; notwithstanding the acceptance of the Commissioner of Public Charities or any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for various classes of inmates thereof.

8. No money shall be paid to any institution which
pays any salary to,
gives any consideration for services (financial or otherwise) by,
has any business dealing with, or
secures goods or merchandise (directly or indirectly) from
any officers or trustee or member of its board of managers, or where any such person otherwise receives any pecuniary profit from the operation of such institution.

9. Child-caring institutions not sending their inmates to the public schools, and not sharing in the corporate school fund, and not receiving teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institution for five (5) hours daily for a period equal to the public school year, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day for five (5) school days in the week, for each child of five years of age and over receiving such instruction, except that for abnormal or atypical children a special rate in excess of this amount may be made by the Comptroller. Institutions receiving a per capita allowance for the education of their inmates shall be under the general supervision of the Board of Education, as required by the general conditions relating to institutions receiving corporate school money, provided in Section 1154 of the Charter of The City of New York.

10. No dependent child under 16 years of age shall be accepted as a proper charge upon the City, and no money shall be paid for the care, support, maintenance or education of such child unless it shall have been lawfully committed to a suitable private charitable institution having its own plant and equipment for the proper protection and care of children and being under the supervision of the State Board of Charities and which has been placed in this budget by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

11. The Department of Health shall maintain in all child-caring institutions receiving funds by appropriation from The City of New York for each inmate accepted as a public charge under the rules of the State Board of Charities, and as herein provided, a complete physical and health record in which shall be recorded the name, age, sex, height and weight, time of admission, general physical condition, including the presence or absence of defects in eyesight, breathing, teeth, or any organic defect, in a manner to conform as nearly as practicable with the records maintained by the Department of Health for children in the public schools in The City of New York. It shall also record the dietary actually employed in such institutions for the feeding of its inmates. Such statistics and records shall be made and revised by the Board of Health once in each six months.

12. Each institution shall give to the Comptroller on forms prescribed by him notice of the reception or discharge of any person for whose care City or County funds are to be received within twenty-four hours after his arrival at or discharge from the institution.

13. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specifically provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows: Provided that where the Comptroller finds, after proper investigation, that any per capita rate hereinafter stated is too high, he is hereby authorized, on the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to reduce such per capita rate for any or all institutions.

Resolutions for Cost Data Budget for the Bureaus of Street Cleaning, Sewers and Highways.

Resolved, That the following terms and conditions shall govern the administration of the cost data budget and supporting schedules for the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President, Borough of Richmond, for the year 1913. (1) The nature of all expenditures shall fall within the scope of the work classifications specified in the supporting schedules. (2) The total cost allowances shown therein for any quarter shall not be exceeded within that quarter. (3) The total allowance for capital investment shall not be exceeded during the year. At the end of each quarter of the year there shall be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a detailed statement of all the operations of the above mentioned bureaus and the cost thereof, together with a reconciliation schedule showing the relation between total costs of work and total expenditures, in such form as may be prescribed by the Board. At the same time requests for modifications of the remaining schedules may be presented for consideration and action of the Board. The Board shall be notified in advance of the commencement and cessation for all regular work covered by the supporting schedules. The quantity of any item of work performed in a given quarter shall not exceed or underrun by more than 10 per cent. the quantity specified for that item in the supporting schedules, without advance notification to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Be it further Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter: That the positions and grades of positions and rates of compensation therefor appearing in the following schedules be established respectively in the Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Sewers and Bureau of Street Cleaning, Office of the President of the Borough of Richmond, for the number of incumbents specified therein.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.			
Majority Report of Committee on Finance—No. 2129.			
<p>The undersigned, members of the Committee on Finance, submit herewith to the Board a resolution contemplating certain reductions in the proposed budget for 1913. These changes are the result of careful investigation of the needs of the various Departments of the City government, as compared with the generous allowances heretofore made in the bureaus and divisions affected. It will be observed by a scrutiny of the accompanying resolution that there appears to be a marked tendency toward increasing the number of City employees along professional lines, notwithstanding the fact that the salary lists show that the City now supports an enormous number of this character of workers. It seems to be a matter of habit that as soon as one of these professional men is comfortably and firmly seated he commences to yearn for from one to ten assistants, and results prove that he is apparently able to make his wants of this nature respected, and there is an immediate effort to provide him with the desired companionship on the part of his lay superior. Of the \$583,524.84 proposed reduction covered by our resolution, \$184,500 is for new aides of this kind. It was authoritatively stated prior to the transmittal of the proposed budget to the Board of Aldermen that positively no increases of salary would be allowed; of thirty instances given in the resolution in violation of this statement, covering increases amounting to \$13,770, more than two-thirds is devoted to the professional element.</p>			

An unsolicited \$10,000 has been allotted to the appropriation for the Health Department for the purpose of compiling a card index system of the status of the 30,000 children in private institutions, cared for principally by private funds, which institutions are now fully equipped with medical staffs who cover this entire subject.

Our old friend, the Municipal Reference Library, again looms up with its \$20,000. At the time during the present year when this proposition was disallowed by the Board of Aldermen it was understood that this proposed innovation, which was then rightfully regarded as surplusage, was strongly pressed by some of those unofficial springs of action which so earnestly advocate appropriations, and when they are secured are first to mount the breach of City service for sizable emoluments. We again recommend that this be disallowed.

When the budget for 1912 came before the Board of Aldermen last year the Board pared from the addition to the General School Fund for Special Branches in Day Elementary Schools for the payment of Teachers in Sewing, Cooking and Music the sum of \$153,000, leaving the appropriation at \$500,000, and this has been entirely sufficient. It was claimed then that what the students needed was better grounding in the elementary studies and less interruption for fads and fancies, which it appears to your Committee is absolutely a common sense view. To our surprise we now find that the proposed allowance for this purpose for 1913 is \$725,000, with the expressed intention of making a large extension to the system in upper classes where the minds of the pupils should be allowed to concentrate on their rapidly increasing number of book studies. Your Committee believes this to be a most serious mistake, and consequently recommends that the amount be the same as allowed last year.

The Board of Aldermen in its consideration of the Budget for 1912 rejected an appropriation for \$220,000 for what was termed standardization of salaries. This question has received much study since that time and this proposed bureau now comes before us in a concrete form for about \$75,000, and is presented in such a way that if the results are secured, which are confidently predicted, it will render a service in connection with the Budget making that will benefit the City to an extent largely beyond its cost.

A similar force is allowed for in the Special School Fund to clear up the question of educational finances to the satisfaction of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. As there appears to be a decided difference of opinion among the members of the Board of Education as to the acceptance and use of this supplementary efficiency and accounting force, your Committee makes no recommendation in relation thereto.

Your Committee has acted faithfully and conscientiously in behalf of the taxpayers of the city in its recommendations for reductions, and bespeaks your favorable action thereon.

Minority Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 2129.
The undersigned, members of the Committee on Finance, to which was referred on November 12, 1912, the Budget for 1913, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 31, 1912, respectfully

REPORT:

The Committee has given careful consideration to the suggestions and arguments presented by citizens and taxpayers. Three public hearings have been held at which the Budget, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was considered intensively, department by department, and ample opportunity was presented for all interested to be heard at length. Heads of departments were summoned before the Committee to answer in respect to recommendations for reductions in their respective departmental appropriations, and all such recommendations were thoroughly threshed out before the Committee in public. Numerous suggestions have also been received in the mail, and all of these have been considered by the Committee.

The Budget as finally adopted for the year 1912 amounted to \$181,090,256.51. The amount of the 1913 Budget, as adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, is \$193,047,246, revealing an increase over the 1912 Budget of \$11,946,989.49.

This is not, however, the proposed actual increase of 1913 expense over that of 1912. Since the first of the year departments have received replenishments of their budgetary appropriations in the shape of special revenue bond issues, and the amount of these replenishments must be added to the 1912 Budget figure to obtain a true statement of the City's running expenses of 1912. Up to November 1 this supplementary budget amounted to almost a million and a half of dollars, and the actual increase of 1913 over 1912 is thus brought down to exactly \$10,567,977.77, as of November 1, 1912. When the further replenishments of November and December are

subtracted, the increase will be found to come approximately to a round ten millions of dollars, an addition of nearly six per cent. The burden of the taxpayers has become so onerous that such an increment challenges the closest inspection.

In analyzing this increase, the feature that stands out above all others is the handicap of "mandatories." With the greatest efforts towards economy, the burden of legislative enactment and growth of population nevertheless compel mandatory increases in the City's annual outlay that account for almost all of these \$10,000,000. The leeway left for optional enlargement of the City's activities is so small as to be negligible, and the City is this year practically foreclosed from this field of endeavor.

The following table of component parts of the \$10,000,000 increase supplies the skeleton of the analysis:

Of the increase items, the debt service carries, in addition to its automatic increases, the first fruit of the City's new subway transit system now under construction, in the shape of several hundred thousand dollars' worth of interest on new subway bonds. Next year will show a similar enlargement of subway interest charges and so will each following year until the system is completed and the additional impost of interest becomes fixed and practically stationary through the fifty years to come until the bonds mature. The Sinking Fund installment increase goes hand in hand with that of the interest. Here is an unavoidable and mandatory increase, caused by the need of an increased and distributed population for better means of transit. The Catskill water supply project continues to add its own advance guard of debt service burden. Outside of the swelling of the debt service by these two great developments the balance of the automatic increase comes from debts of the City incurred in years gone by and long forgotten, but now presented for payment to another generation and an administration remotely removed from those which created the debt.

The alarming rapidity of the mushroom growth of the State tax in the last two or three years is shown by the fact that the 1913 tax is almost double the amount for 1912. This is a purely legislative matter, under which the City government is completely helpless.

The third of the great increases is that of almost \$2,000,000 in the Department of Education, and practically all of it is poured into the expenditure for salaries of the 17,000 teachers in the public schools of a city of 5,000,000 inhabitants, and a public school attendance of over 700,000 children. The equal pay bill, with its automatic annual increases in many grades, continues to play its part here along with the increase of population.

The debt service, State tax and education increases referred to above, make up \$9,000,000 of the \$10,000,000. The other increases are relatively small, except those of the Department of Charities, the most of which is caused by the opening, in the near future, of the new Seaview Hospital in Staten Island; the Health Department, a large part of which provides for extending the work of the Bureau of Child Hygiene to cover parochial schools, it being considered just that these New York City children should have the benefit of this work as well as those that go to the public schools; the Fire Department, which must equip and man 42 new fire houses to be opened in the coming year; the Police Department, which is in severe need of more money for the care of its station houses, and also has received money for the addition of patrolmen to the force.

The increased amounts for the other departments listed above are due primarily to the increased population, and the figures given here are in every case a step or two in the rear of this population increase. An overwhelming percentage of department increases in the last three years is found in the 22 great departments under the jurisdiction of the Mayor. The Committee recommends that further reorganization work be undertaken in these departments in the interest of efficiency, so that whatever portion of their increases is not due to the growth of population may be carefully studied, and, if necessary, readjusted.

The departments that show a decreased budget deserve notice. In the cases of the Departments of Bridges, Docks and Ferries, Correction and Parks, and particularly in the case of the Borough Presidents, there has been accomplished a greater return for the City's money with less expense. The Borough Presidents of Manhattan and Brooklyn have made substantial reductions and in the case of the Borough Presidency of Manhattan the transfer of \$71,000 worth of employees from the corporate stock payroll to the budgetary payroll, where they properly belong, shows that his real reduction is \$177,000, instead of \$106,000.

The items of the \$10,000,000 increase not specifically dwelt upon fall into classes that are equally mandatory with those just mentioned, or else are potential money savers in the certainty of their accomplishing economies in the future through better handling of various fields of municipal expense.

One item which occasioned serious doubt in the minds of the Committee, but which was finally allowed to stand, deserves passing mention. This is the allowance of \$211,866.66 for the addition, during the year 1913, of 45 Patrolmen to the Police Department. The real addition will total 500 men, through the withdrawal of the 46 Patrolmen now detailed to the work of the Permanent Census Board. The Police Commissioner has asked for these 500 additional Patrolmen on the ground that the proportion of Policemen to population in this city is less than that of certain European cities, and in his opinion The City of New York is therefore underpoliced. Assuming this statement to be accurate, it is not clear that any conclusion is to be drawn therefrom, as every large city presents an entirely different policing problem. Where one Patrolman to 600 citizens might be a scant allowance for London, New York might be amply policed with one Patrolman to every 500 citizens. It appears also that within the last year and a half 1,100 Policemen have been turned out on patrol duty from desks and details. One hundred and fifty more Patrolmen were granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment last spring. Although, from these two causes alone, 1,250 additional Patrolmen have thus become available within a year and a half, the introduction of the fixed post system has practically obliterated this promise of a fuller patrol through the nailing down of over 1,300 Policemen to these fixed posts. One of these Policemen stands guard through the winter in the middle of the viaduct next to the Polo Grounds, which is neither a residence nor a manufacturing centre. Over 60 per cent. of the fixed posts are in the Borough of Manhattan. Because the merit of this fixed post system is still in doubt, and because a regiment of isolated Policemen doing that work could, if released from it, patrol miles and miles of territory now uncovered, and because it does not seem proven that New York City needs more police in proportion to its population, and because, furthermore, investigation of the Police Department by this Board has shown the lack of efficiency in the system of investigating the character of the men who would be added to the force under the appropriation during the year 1913, it seemed doubtful to your Committee whether the appropriation should be

allowed. It has been brought to the Committee's attention, however, that parts of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx, particularly, are almost denuded of Patrolmen through the drain caused by the fixed post system, and it seems imperative, for the protection of the residents in those and other Boroughs, that the gap should be filled as soon as possible. The condition governing the outlay of this appropriation for additional Patrolmen places in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the power of insisting upon what may be considered the wisest system of distribution of Patrolmen before a penny is put to use. With this safeguard it seemed to your Committee that justice to the residents in the outlying parts of the City requires that we refrain from cutting this item out of the Budget, and the Committee recommends its allowance.

Your Committee thus presents its analysis of the 1913 budgetary increase, in order to emphasize its conclusion that this Budget has been boiled down to such a minimum by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that no place is left for budgetary pruning by the Board of Aldermen this year, without danger of an injurious crippling of the governmental work of the City. Your Committee recommends finally that the Budget for 1913, as submitted to the Board of Aldermen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, be adopted and approved as submitted without any reduction whatsoever.

Alderman Curran offered the following communication from the Corporation Counsel:

No. 2370.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, December 6, 1912.

Hon. HENRY H. CURRAN, Chairman, Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In your communication to me under date of December 3, 1912, you request my opinion, in writing, as to

"Whether the date from which the 20 days for the consideration of the Budget by the Board of Aldermen ran from the day of receipt of the Budget by the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or from the date of the special meeting of the Board of Aldermen called by the Mayor to consider the Budget, as provided under section 226 of the Charter."

The answer to your question is dependent upon the construction of the following provisions of section 226 of the Charter relating to the Budget, viz.:

"After such Budget is made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, it shall be submitted by said Board within five days to the Board of Aldermen, whereupon a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen shall be called by the Mayor to consider such Budget, and the same shall simultaneously be published in the CITY RECORD. The consideration of such Budget by the Board of Aldermen shall continue from day to day until final action is taken thereon, but such consideration shall not continue beyond twenty days, and in the event of said Board of Aldermen taking no action thereon within such period of time, the said Budget shall be deemed to be finally adopted as submitted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

It will be observed that it is provided that a special meeting of the Board of Aldermen shall be called by the Mayor to consider the Budget, and that the consideration thereof by the Board of Aldermen shall not continue beyond twenty days. Without giving in extenso the reasons for the conclusion reached by me, I am of opinion that the limitation of twenty days begins upon the day of the special meeting of the Board of Aldermen called by the Mayor to consider the Budget.

Your attention is called to an opinion of this Department, under date of November 14, 1898, to P. J. Scully, Esq., City Clerk, wherein a similar conclusion was reached in interpreting the provisions of the original Greater New York Charter relating to this question. Respectfully yours,



TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES hereunder to be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
