APRIL 18, 1877.

The Board of Education held a regular session at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, on Wednesday, April 18, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—William Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Cohen, Dowd, Halstead, Hazeltine, Place, Traud, Vanderpoel, Vermilye, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, and Wilkins—17.

Absent—Commissioners Kane, Kelly, Schell, and Wheeler—4.

The minutes of the preceding session were amended and approved.

The President laid before the Board a communication from Commissioner Kane, notifying the Board that he had tendered his resignation to the Mayor.

Commissioner Walker offered a resolution, as follows :

Whereas, The Board has to-day been advised of the resignation from its membership of Commissioner John Grenville Kane, which has been necessitated by his continued ill-health.

Resolved, That the members of the Board of Education desire to express and to place upon its minutes their testimony to the earnestness, diligence, and discretion manifested by Commissioner Kane in all his labors in connection with this Board; and further, to record an expression of sincere regret that the severance of our official relations is due to so sad a cause. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.
