UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1852, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows :

PHOTOGRAPH GALLERES shall be charged an annual rate of Irom five to twenty dollars, in the discretion of the Commissioner of Public Works.
PRINTING OFFICES, when not metered, shall be charged at such rates as may be determined by the Commis-sioner of Public Works.
SODA, MINERAL WATER and ROOT BEER FOUNTAINS shall be charged five dollars per annum each.
STEAM ENGINES, where not metered, shall be charged by the horse-power, as follows : For each horse-power up to and not exceeding ten, the sum of ten dollars per annum; for each exceeding ten, and not over fifteen, the sum of seven dollars and fifty cents each and for each horse-power over fifteen, the sum of five dollars.
WATER-CLOSETS AND URINALS.-TO each building on a lot one water-closet having sewer connection is allowed without charge; each additional water-closet or urinal will be charged as hereinafter stated. All closets connected in any manner with sever shall be charged two dollars for each seat per annum, whether in a building or on any other portion of the premises. Urinals shall be charged two dollars per annum each.
WATER-CLOSETS RATES.-For hoppers of any form, when water is supplied direct from the Croton supply, through any form of the so-called single or double valves, hopper-cocks, stop-cocks, self-closing cocks, or any valve or cock of any description attached to the closet, each, per year, twenty dollars.
For any pan closet, or any of the forms of valve, planger, or other water-closet not before mentioned, sup-plied with water as above described, per year, ten dollars

dollars dollars For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from the ordinary style of cistern filled with ball-cock, and overflow pipe that communicates with the pipe to the water-closet, so that overflow will run into the hopper or water-closet, when ball-cock is defective, or from which an unlimited amount of water can be drawn by holding up the handle, per year, each, five dollars.

For any form of hopper or water-closet, supplied from any of the forms of waste-preventing cisterns, that are approved by the Eugineer of the Croton Aque-duct, which are so constructed that not more than three gallons of water can be drawn at each lift of the handle, or depression of the seat, if such cisterns are provided with an overflow pipe, such overflow pipe must not connect with the water-closet, but be car-ried like a safe-waste, as provided by the Board of Health regulations, per year, two dollars. Under the provisions of section 352, Consolidated Act rf882, water-meters, of approved pattern, shall be here-after placed on the pipes supplying all stores, workshops, houses, stables, and in all places where water is furnished for husiness consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of r682, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and

Under the law all charges for water supplied througn meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore civen to all householders that in all turther applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of water or occu-pants of buildings, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by trenants or occu-pants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings. Mouse-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become wacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year. The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works.
