Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board on the 29th of July, 1875, and approved by the Mayor on the 7th of August, 1875, authorizing and directing the Commissioner of Public Works to complete the storage reservoirs in Putnam County, etc., etc., be and the same is hereby amended so

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed, under chapter 477, section 1, Laws of 1875, to complete the storage reservoirs, and their appurtenances, now under construction in Putnam County, and to secure the right to draw water from the natural lakes in Putnam and Westchester Counties, to assist in maintaining a full supply of pure and wholesome water for the City of New York, and to make such excavations, dams, and flumes as he may deem necessary or expedient in drawing water from and protecting said lakes; and also to make such surveys and examinations as he may deem necessary to make intelligible reports to the Mayor and Common Council of the City of New York, in reference to procuring a never-failing supply of pure and wholesome water for the City of New York; and the action heretofore taken by the Commissioner of Public Works to secure a supply of water from the natural lakes in Putnam and Westchester Counties is hereby ratified, approved, and concurred in.
