(1) O-768 The Secretary presented the following application of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company for approval of terminal station under Sixth Avenue near West 33rd Street:

Public Service Commission for the First District, 154 Nassau Street, City:

DEAR SIRS—I hand you herewith plan, being Serial No. 3200-A, entitled “Hudson & Manhattan R. R. Co. 33rd Street Terminal,” dated September 9, 1908, Revised October 2, 1908. This plan now embodies, as we understand it, the suggestions recently made by your Chief Engineer.

We are willing to agree that in case the City shall at any time hereafter build a subway under Broadway, with a station in Broadway at 33rd Street, such part of the wall and stairway indicated in green and designated on the map “Stairway No. 3 and Curtain Wall,” may be removed, so that a continuous connection may be made between the platform of our station at that point and the platform of such subway station in Broadway; but said stairway, if removed, shall be located in some other convenient place by the Engineers of the City and be used jointly by this company and the City.

We are also willing to agree that such part of the northerly end of our station platform as is indicated on said plan in red and designated “Station Platform and passage to stairways Nos. 1 and 2,” may be removed at any time hereafter that the City shall require the use of 33rd Street at this point for subway purposes.

We are also willing to agree that those portions of stairways Nos. 1 and 2 indicated on said plan in yellow (such yellow portions representing surface area occupied by said stairways) may be removed at any time hereafter that the existing elevated stairways at these points shall be removed, or that the position of such stairways may be changed to some other location to be fixed by the City at any time hereafter that the City shall determine such relocation of such stairways to be necessary or desirable; it being understood, however, that if the City should require the discontinuance of all or any of such stairways, the rental to be paid by this Company therefor shall cease from the date of such discontinuance.

You will observe that there are three stairways, passageways and connections between our station platform and the street surface at 33rd Street. For each one of such stairways, passageways and connections we are willing to pay the City Five hundred dollars (\$500.) per annum, or a total of Fifteen hundred dollars (\$1500.) per annum for the three, this being the same rate established by the former Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the stairways, passageways and connections between our station platforms at 14th, 23rd and 28th Streets and the street surface. It is our purpose to obtain, if possible, additional stairways through private property.

We also submit herewith plan Serial No. 3200, dated September 3, 1908 entitled “Hudson & Manhattan R. R. Co.—New York & N. J. Railroad—Sixth Avenue—Plan and Profile 22nd Street to 33rd Street,” showing the grade line of the tunnels under Sixth Avenue from 22nd Street to 33rd Street.

We respectfully request your approval of said plans.

The following order was thereupon moved and duly seconded:

ORDER (No. 768).

Whereas, The Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company in accordance with the certificate, dated February 22, 1905, granted to the New York & Jersey Railroad Company by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the City of New York, which certificate has since been amended by certain certificates dated April 12, 1906, and February 28, 1907, respectively, has made application for the approval of a terminal station under Sixth Avenue and at or near West 33rd Street, in the Borough of Manhattan, in accordance with the plan hereinafter referred to, which plan is in substitution of a plan approved by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners on the 22nd day of May, 1906;

Now, Therefore, be it

Resolved, That the plan dated September 9, 1908, revised October 2, 1908, entitled “Hudson & Manhattan R. R. Co. 33rd Street Terminal, Serial No. 3200-A” be and the same hereby is approved, but only upon the following conditions, and this approval shall not be deemed to take effect unless and until the said railroad company shall accept the provisions hereof in writing with the consent of the surety upon its bond in proper form duly attached thereto. The conditions upon which the said plan is approved are as follows:

(1) If at any time hereafter the Commission or any Board or official acting for the City of New York or otherwise shall construct or cause to be constructed a rapid transit railroad under Broadway, in the Borough of Manhattan, with a station in Broadway at or near West 33rd Street, the wall together with the stairway connected therewith, all of which are indicated on the plan hereby approved in green and marked “Stairway No. 3 and Curtain Wall,” may be removed so that a continuous connection may be made between the platform of the Terminal hereby approved and the platform of such rapid transit railroad station in Broadway; but such stairway if and when removed shall be located at some other point and shall be used jointly by the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company or its assigns and The City or its assigns.

(2) If at any time hereafter it is desired by the City of New York to use the portion of West 33rd Street at or near the intersection of Sixth Avenue for a rapid transit railroad, portion of the railroad of the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company extending under Sixth Avenue north of the south building line of West 33rd Street and the passage under West 33rd Street, all of which are indicated in red on the said plan hereby approved and entitled “Station Platform & Passageway to Stairways Nos. 1 & 2” together with the stairways indicated on the plan hereby approved in yellow and marked “Stairway No. 1” and “Stairway No. 2” may be removed.

(3) If at any time in the future and irrespective of the use of the said 33rd Street for other rapid transit purposes the stairways indicated in yellow on the plan hereby approved and marked “Stairway No. 1” and “Stairway No. 2” shall in the judgment of the Commission constitute an interference with traffic at those points, the Commission may order them removed and in that case the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company or its successors or assigns will promptly remove them and restore the street to its original condition at its own expense.

(4) Any and all such removals except the removals provided for in the paragraph hereof designated “(3)” shall be made by and at the expense of The City, but the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall be en-

titied to no compensation for the parts so removed, and the rental payable by it to The City shall not be affected except in case where the exit upon the surface of the street is removed, and in that case the annual rental payable for such exit shall cease.

(5) If at any time hereafter the said "Stairway No. 3 and Curtain Wall" shall be removed and another stairway erected to be used in common for the purposes of the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company, or its successors and assigns, and a railroad constructed by or under the auspices of The City, the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay for it the same rental as for the exit that may be removed.

(6) For the exits upon the surface of the street as shown upon the plans hereby approved, being three in number, the Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, shall pay to The City of New York the sum or rental of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500) per annum for each exit, subject to readjustment at the time and in the manner specified in the said certificate of February 22, 1905, as amended.

(7) The term "rapid transit railroad" as used herein shall be deemed to include any method of underground transportation.

(8) The said terminal shall be constructed upon the lines and grades as shown in the blue-print dated September 3, 1908, entitled "Hudson & Manhattan Railroad Company, New York & Jersey Railroad, Sixth Avenue, Plan and Profile, 22nd Street to 33rd Street, Serial No. 3200."

(2) HEARING ORDER (No. 769). O-769

On motion made and duly seconded, a Hearing Order (No. 769) was adopted, directing a hearing on October 13, 1908, at 2:30 o'clock p.m., in the matter of the application of the Union Railway Company and Frederick W. Whitridge, its Receiver, for approval of the construction of a street surface railway on 230th Street, Borough of The Bronx, under Section 53 of the Public Service Commissions Law.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Department of Health held September 30, 1908, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That section 95 of the Sanitary Code, relating to the melting and rendering of fat, tallow and lard and the bringing of same into The City of New York, be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 95. No fat, tallow or lard shall be melted or rendered, except when fresh from the places of slaughter in The City of New York, and in a condition free from sourness and taint and all other causes of offense at the time of rendering, and all melting and rendering must be in steam-tight vessels, and the gases and odors therefrom must be destroyed by combustion or other means equally effective, and according to the best and most improved means and processes; and everything preceding, following and in connection with such melting and rendering, and the premises where the same shall be conducted, must be free from all offensive odor and other cause of detriment to the public health. No fat, lard or tallow shall be brought into The City of New York to be rendered or melted, and none shall be rendered or melted that has come from any place outside of The City of New York, without a permit from the Board of Health. The business of melting or rendering fat, tallow or lard shall not be carried on or conducted in The City of New York without a permit from the Board of Health.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President of Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the path, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a surety or surety company duly authorized by law in act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
