MY DEAR MR. WHITNEY—As I notified you verbally a hearing was held in Albany last week before the Public Service Commission of the Second District on the subject of testing electric meters. On the evening before the hearing a meeting of operating companies was held under the auspices of this Association and it was decided, as the

matter was one of very great importance, to suggest to the Commission that a committee be appointed to represent the companies, that this committee should investigate the question thoroughly, obtain data, and either submit a very full report with their recommendations or appear informally before the Commission. Of course, this committee represents only the companies operating in the Second District, but as at least two companies, the Westchester Lighting Company and the Queens Borough Gas and Electric Company are under the jurisdiction of both Commissions, it is very desirable that a uniform method of carrying out this provision of the law should be enforced throughout the entire State.

The committee are to hold their first meeting in Albany next Monday, and as they will have their investigations under way as speedily as possible, it occurred to me that your Commission might be willing to await their report before issuing any order on this subject.

Of course the situation in Manhattan and in Brooklyn is considerably different from anywhere else in the State, but within the jurisdiction of your Commission are quite a number of smaller companies operating under exactly the same conditions as the companies in the Second District. The committee will endeavor to devise some method which will comply with both the wording and the spirit of the law, but at the same time will not be a hardship on the companies or too great an expense to the State. It is a very difficult proposition and one which undoubtedly will require very careful investigation and study, but I think the committee appointed represents nearly every class of operating companies, and should be able to devise some method which would be acceptable both to the companies themselves and the Commissions and the public. I know that an earnest effort will be made to arrive at some satisfactory solution of the question with as little delay as possible.

Public Service Commission of the First District:

GENTLEMEN—Since writing to your Honorable Board on August 14, calling to your attention the necessity of providing for additional elevated extensions of the rapid transit system along Jerome avenue, Westchester avenue and White Plains avenue, the question of providing elevated railroad extensions in the Borough of The Bronx in the section south of One Hundred and Sixty-first street and east of Willis and Third avenues, has been brought to my notice by a committee of property owners and citizens living in the section of our borough. After much thought and consideration devoted to the subject, I have caused to be prepared a sketch, herewith enclosed, which embodies my views, and which I submit for the consideration of your Honorable Board: my object being to suggest extensions, which will promote direct access to elevated and subway lines without the payment of an additional fare, relieve congestion at certain overcrowded stations, and provide rapid transit railroad facilities for a section notably without such accommodations except by trolley and inadequate steam road.

The plan proposed may not be free from financial difficulties because of the expense involved in the river crossings; but it should be considered in view of the relief which will be afforded the overtaxed portion of the present line between the Harlem river and Third avenue at One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and because justice demands that the wants of the residents of a thickly populated section of the Borough covering about a thousand acres in extent, entirely without rapid transit railroad accommodations, should be heeded and relieved.

I transmit with this letter a sketch showing the lines of plan proposed, also copy of 'North Side News' of September 1, 1907, where the plan is discussed at some length.

A permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way for the construction, maintenance and operation in perpetuity of the Rapid Transit Railroad in accordance with the routes adopted by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners by resolution adopted on the 25th day of May, 1905, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York on the 14th day of July, 1905, and approved by the Mayor of The City of New York on the 28th day of July, 1905, and consented to by an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Judicial Department, made and entered on or about the 12th day of March, 1907, which railroad is further described in the contract for the construction thereof, made by The City of New York, acting by the said Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, and Bradley Contracting Company, dated June 27, 1907, and also temporary rights or easements for the purposes of construction of said railroad, the subway or subways for said railroad to be constructed substantially as shown in said contract and upon these maps or plans, the same being marked 'Public Service Commission for the First District, Chief Engineers' office, Route No. 9-0-4, drawing No. 1, August 13, 1907, George S. Rice, Chief Engineer,' as follows:

As respects all of said parcels of property, consisting of said lots and plot, hereinafter described—the extreme top of said subway or structure is to be not less than 11.8 feet below the present grade of Centre street at its intersection with Broome street, and the base of the rails of said railroad is to be not less than 29 feet below the present grade of Centre street at its intersection with Broome street.

Parcels of land on either side of and adjacent to said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way hereinabove described, and within limits distant not more than 10 feet therefrom on either side, said parcels of land, however, being wholly within said lots and plot, No. 4, No. 1, No. 31 and No. 32, No. 39, No. 40, No. 41, No. 43 and X, and also the land over and above said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way, and over and above said adjacent parcels of land next hereinabove described, with the right to tear down all buildings or any part thereof erected over and above said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way, or over and above said adjacent parcels of land, said adjacent parcels of land subject to such temporary rights or easements, being shown on these maps or plans in yellow.

The said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way include the right to construct and permanently and perpetually maintain said subway or structure, and to construct and permanently and perpetually maintain and operate a railroad through said subway so to be constructed, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 4 of the Laws of 1891 and its amendments, and the provisions for the operation of said railroad lawfully made pursuant thereto.

The said temporary rights or easements continue until December 1, 1909, and include the right to enter upon and occupy, for the purpose of the construction of said railroad, said adjacent parcels of land and said land over and above said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way, and over and above said adjacent parcels of land, hereinabove described."

Adopted and approved by the Commission on the 9th day of September, 1907.

Now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the said maps or plans, so made and prepared, and the said memoranda be and the same are hereby approved and adopted; that a certificate of said approval and adoption and of the approval and adoption of said memoranda, to be written upon said maps or plans, and signed by this Commission, and by a majority of the Commissioners, and that one thereof, including said memorandum, shall be filed in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, there to remain as a public record; and it is further

Resolved, That the other two of said maps and plans and memoranda be forthwith transmitted to the counsel to the corporation with a copy of this resolution, and that he be and is hereby directed to take legal proceedings to acquire for The City of New York the said permanent and perpetual underground right, easement and right of way, and said temporary rights or easements aforesaid.

The meeting here resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole.
