DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

New York, September 26, 1907.

The following communications were received, action being taken thereon as noted, to wit:

From the Corporation Counsel (74284)—Transmitting, approved as to form, agreement to be executed by the Roessler & Hasslacher Chemical Company, respecting the erection of a building upon premises between Thirty-ninth and Fortieth streets, South Brooklyn. Filed; agreement sent to the company for execution.

From the Comptroller (74216)—Stating that the matter of the Dowd Lumber Company's default on Contract No. 1,058, Class 3, for furnishing lumber, has been referred to the Corporation Counsel, to take such action as will best protect the interests of the City. Filed.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—
1 (74261). Stating it cannot authorize the transfer of John McHugh from the position of Dock Builder to that of Ship Carpenter, for the reason that McHugh has failed to pass the required examination for the latter position. Filed.

2 (74289). Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment to the position of Oiler. Peter A. Cuniff appointed to the position with compensation at the rate of \$95 per month, while employed.

From the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity (74181)—Stating that the shipping hydrants at the foot of Canal and Perry streets, North River, are being obstructed by ice barges, scows, etc., and asking that the obstructions be removed so that tugboats may obtain their supply of water thereat. Answered that conditions at the points in question do not warrant the removal of the boats, but that if the tugboats will use an extra length of hose the necessary supply of water can be readily obtained.

From Lanigan Brothers (74220)—Requesting permission to cross the bulkhead line at Seventy-sixth and Seventy-seventh streets, East River, for the purpose of unloading sand. Denied.

From P. T. Gordon (74217)—Suggesting that the City inaugurate a system of transfers so that passengers from the Thirty-ninth street ferryboats may change to the Staten Island ferryboats for the one fare, and vice versa. Answered that under existing conditions the suggestion is not feasible.

From Thomas Cook & Son, agents for the Dominion Atlantic Railway (74211)—Requesting the Department to allow the shed which has been erected on the pier, foot of East Twentieth street, East River, and used in connection with the landings made by the "Prince Arthur," to remain there until next season. Denied.

From Edgar P. Holdridge (74209, 74210)—Offering for sale the 116 feet of bulkhead rights along easterly side of Tompkins street, between Houston and East Third streets, East River, as well as the upland and waterfront comprised in the southerly half of the block between One Hundred and Eighteenth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, Harlem River. Filed.

From Christopher Nally (74237)—Requesting to be transferred from the position of Dock Laborer to that of Blacksmith's Helper. Filed.

From Carpenters of the Department (74239)—Stating that the prevailing rates of wages for carpenters is \$5 per day, and asking that their wages be fixed at that rate. Filed.

Peekskill Water Supply.

Y., of January 11, 1908, showing that the proposition to increase the water supply of Peekskill, pursuant to section 6 of chapter 733 of the Laws of 1907 by acquiring certain land and erecting certain works and issuing bonds to an amount not exceeding \$160,000 for the purpose, had been submitted to the taxpayers of said municipality on January 7, 1908, and had been defeated by a vote of 274 to 51.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

From January 12 to January 18, inclusive, fifty-two operations were performed at Bellevue Hospital; six at Gouverneur Hospital; thirteen at Harlem Hospital, and nine at Fordham Hospital, at all of which the Attending Surgeons or their Assistants were present.

It is recommended that Harlem Hospital be equipped with a system of electric clocks, similar to that in use in Gouverneur Hospital, which has proved so advantageous to the institution and which results in uniformity of time in all parts of the hospital. Estimates have been obtained, and the lowest estimate to install a system, including the regulating clock, twenty-three secondary clocks, all battery and wiring, etc., is by the Standard Electric Time Company for \$720. It is recommended that this expenditure be authorized.

Authorization is requested to have Mr. D. Barta, a civil and landscape engineer, prepare plans and specifications for the layout of grounds, with shrubs, trees, etc., at the several hospitals. Mr. Barta has submitted a proposition to do this work for the new Bellevue Hospital for \$75, and for the new Harlem and Fordham Hospitals for \$50 each. It is requested that authority be granted to incur this expenditure.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the recommendation to install an electric clock system in Harlem Hospital be approved, and that the estimate of the Standard Electric Time Company for \$720 be accepted.

On motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That the recommendation to have Mr. Barta prepare plans and specifications for laying out the grounds at Harlem and Fordham Hospitals with shrubs, trees, etc., at a cost of \$50 for each institution, be approved.

Reports of Committees.

Dr. Brannan reported upon lengthening the windows of pavilions A and B of the new Bellevue Hospital, saying that he had conferred with Mr. Robbins upon the subject and they had agreed to recommend the changes suggested.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That these changes be approved by the Board.

Mr. Tierney reported on the matter of quarters for the General Drug Department in the new Bellevue Hospital, recommending that these be eliminated from the plans of the new hospital, and, on motion, duly seconded, the recommendation was adopted by the Board.

The provisions of the law do not apply.

Is the uncovered area of lot sufficient in accordance with the requirements of section 10 of the Building Code?

That the uncovered area of lot is in excess of the area required by section 10 of the Building Code.

On motion, denied.

Appeal No. 2 of 1908, new building No. 4068 of 1907, south side of Eighty-eighth street, 125 feet east of First avenue, Brooklyn, Ward W. Clafin, appellant.

That the width of the house with the bay windows exceeds the percentage of the lot allowed and as prescribed by the amendment to section 143 of the Building Code relative to frame buildings erected in the Thirtieth Ward.

Namely: That no building shall occupy more than eighty (80) per cent. in width of the lot on which said building is erected.

That the rules, laws or said ordinances of the Code do not apply.

Note—Permit No. 4068, granted December 17, 1907, to erect building without bay windows.

Amendment made January 2, 1908, to build bay windows denied.

First floor plan of prints shows first and original arrangement.

Second floor plan of prints shows bay windows as desired by amendment.

1. The erection of bay windows on sides of residential frame buildings.

2. Does the face of said bay window constitute the main body of the building?

3. Cannot said bay windows be termed or applied as ornamental projections?

4. Was not the eighty (80) per cent. law intended and meant to apply to and restrict erection of frame dwellings in rows whose main bodies would cover more width than law allows, and not to affect construction of projections, roof rafters, eaves and ornamental overhangs?

To hereafter intelligently execute his plans where bay windows are essential and desirable features in design and construction and to be able to advise future clients as to width of lot required to meet approval of the law as prescribed by the Code.

That the depreciation of a house whose ornamental features are eliminated by the technical interpretation of the law is apparent and the appellant's reason for a favorable decision is to remedy this injustice.

That the Superintendent's decision will affect numerous builders whose desires are to better and not depreciate buildings within the territory in which this law is effective, and will cause to be erected a cheaper and plainer dwelling, not architecturally desirable.

The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of The City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
