

In each department where there are positions in the Non-Competitive Class there shall be a Board of Examiners for such positions composed of three officers or employees of the department who shall be designated by the appointing officer therein subject to confirmation. pointing officer therein, subject to confirmation by the Commission. In each institution where there are positions in the Non-Competitive Class there shall be an institutional examiner for such positions who shall be designated by the ap-pointing officer of the department, subject to confirmation by the Commission. Members of the Board of Examiners and the institutional examiners mentioned herein shall, so far as practicable, be persons holding positions in the

Competitive Class.

3. A vacancy in any position in the said class, the incumbent of which is employed at an institution at a compensation not exceeding the limit, if any, set in the Classification for such position, may be filled by the appointment of any person who upon nomination by the ap-pointing officer and upon proper non-competitive examination shall be certified by the institutional examiner to be qualified to perform the duties of such position. Inc. (hereinafter called the Company. COMPANY, INC. (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and

agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows: Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to maintain and operate a stage or omnibus route for public use in the Borough of Queens in The City of New York, upon the following

1. Beginning in Central Avenue at its intersec tion with City Line at or near McNeil Avenue, thence along Central Avenue to South Street, thence along South Street to Rue de St. Felix Street: all in the for-mer Village of Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens.

Beginning in the former Village of Far Rockaway, at the intersection of Central Rockaway, at the intersection of Central Avenue and Cornaga Avenue, thence along Cornaga Avenue to Sea View Avenue, thence along Sea View Avenue to Atlan-tic Avenue, thence along Atlantic Avenue and the Boulevard to Washington Avenue, thence along Washington Avenue to Fifth Avenue, in the section known as Rockaway Park in the Borough of Queens.

They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experi ence and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. If any vehicle which may be so submitted for approval shall not conform with the requirements herein or should any such vehicle for any reason be considered by the Board or its authorized representatives unfit for public use, then the Board or its authorized representatives may refuse such approval, in which case the Company shall not operate such vehicle. If after a vehicle shall have been so approved, defects develop which in the opinion of the Board or its authorized representatives render it unsuitable for public service, then the Board or its authorized representatives may require the with-
