Bureau of Elections.

Whereas, By section 1 of chapter 621 of the Laws of 1874, it is recited as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Board of Police on or before the fifteenth day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-four, to divide the Seventeenth and Twentieth Assembly Districts in the City and County of New York,

into election districts so as each election district shall contain as near as practicable two hundred and fifty votes, the registration for the year eighteen hundred and seventy-two being taken as the basis on which such division shall be made, * * * and no election district shall be in part within two congressional districts, * * * therefore

Resolved, That the division of the Seventeenth and Twentieth Assembly Districts into election districts, and the boundaries of said election districts, shall be as follows:

SEVENTEENTH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT.

(Part of Twenty-second Ward.)

The Seventeenth Assembly District shall be divided into thirty-two election districts, the extent and limits of which said election districts shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-third street, and Seventh avenue.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Seventh avenue, West Forty-second street, and Eighth avenue.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Eighth avenue, West Forty-second street, and Ninth avenue.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-first street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-first street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-second street, and Hudson or North river.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-second street, Tenth avenue, West Forty-third street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-third street, Tenth avenue, West Forty-fourth street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-second street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-fourth street, and Tenth avenue.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-second street, Eighth avenue, West Forty-fourth street, and Ninth avenue.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-second street, Seventh avenue, West Forty-third street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-fourth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fourth street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-sixth street, Seventh avenue, West Forty-fifth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fourth street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-fifth street, and Hudson or North river.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fifth street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-sixth street, and Hudson or North river.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fourth street, Eighth avenue, West Forty-seventh street, and Ninth avenue.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fifth street, Seventh avenue, West Forty-sixth street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-seventh street, and Eighth avenue.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-sixth street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-seventh street, and Hudson or North river.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-seventh street, Ninth avenue, West Forty-eighth street, Tenth avenue, West Forty-ninth street, and Hudson or North river.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-eighth street, Ninth avenue, West Fiftieth street, Hudson or North river, West Forty-ninth street, and Tenth avenue.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-seventh street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-eighth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-eighth street, Sixth avenue, West Forty-ninth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-ninth street, Sixth avenue, West Fifty-first street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-first street, Sixth avenue, West Fifty-second street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fiftieth street, Eighth avenue, West Fifty-second street, and Ninth avenue.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fiftieth street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-first street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying

within West Fifty-first street, Eleventh avenue, West Fifty-second street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-third street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-second street, Sixth avenue, West Fifty-fourth street, Seventh avenue, West Fifty-third street, and Eighth avenue.

The Twenty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-third street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-fourth street, Tenth avenue, West Fifty-fifth street, and Hudson or North river.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-second street, Eighth avenue, West Fifty-fourth street, and Ninth avenue.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-fourth street, Eighth avenue, West Fifty-fifth street, and Tenth avenue.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-third street, Seventh avenue, West Fifty-fourth street, Sixth avenue, West Fifty-fifth street, and Eighth avenue.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-seventh street, Eighth avenue, West Fiftieth street, and Ninth avenue.

The Thirty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-first street, Ninth avenue, West Fifty-second street, and Eleventh avenue.

TWENTIETH ASSEMBLY DISTRICT.

(Part of Nineteenth Ward.)

The Twentieth Assembly District shall be divided into forty-three election districts, the extent and limits of which said election districts shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fortieth street, Fifth avenue, West Forty-fifth street, and Sixth avenue.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fortieth street, Lexington avenue, East Forty-fourth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fortieth street, East river, East Forty-first street, and Third avenue.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-first street, East river, East Forty-third street, and Second avenue.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-first street, Second avenue, East Forty-fourth street, and Third avenue.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fortieth street, Third avenue, East Forty-fourth street, and Lexington avenue.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-fourth street, Third avenue, East Forty-sixth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-third street, East river, East Forty-fifth street, Third avenue, East Forty-fourth street, and Second avenue.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-fifth street, East river, East Forty-sixth street, and Third avenue.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-seventh street, Fifth avenue, West Fiftieth street, and Sixth avenue.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-sixth street, Third avenue, East Forty-eighth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-eighth street, Third avenue, East Fiftieth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-sixth street, East river, East Forty-seventh street, and Second avenue.

The Fourteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-seventh street, East river, East Forty-eighth street, and Third avenue.

The Fifteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-eighth street, East river, East Forty-ninth street, and Third avenue.

The Sixteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-ninth street, East river, East Fiftieth street, and Third avenue.

The Seventeenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fiftieth street, East Fiftieth street, Third avenue, East Fifty-second street, West Fifty-second street, and Sixth avenue.

The Eighteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fiftieth street, East river, East Fifty-second street, and Second avenue.

The Nineteenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-second street, East river, East Fifty-third street, and Second avenue.

The Twentieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-third street, First avenue, East Fifty-fourth street, East river, East Fifty-fifth street, and Second avenue.

The Twenty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-second street, Second avenue, East Fifty-fourth street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-second street, Third avenue, East Fifty-fourth street, and Fourth avenue.

The Twenty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-fourth street, Second avenue, East Fifty-sixth street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-second street, East Fifty-second street, Fourth avenue, East Fifty-fourth street, West Fifty-fourth street, and Sixth avenue.

The Twenty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Fifty-fourth street, East Fifty-fourth street, Fourth avenue, East Fifty-ninth street, West Fifty-ninth street, and Sixth avenue.

The Twenty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-sixth street, Second avenue, East Fifty-eighth street, and Third avenue.

The Twenty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-sixth street, First avenue, East Fifty-seventh street, East river, East Fifty-eighth street, and Second avenue.

The Thirtieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-eighth street, East river, East Fifty-ninth street, and Second avenue, including Blackwell's Island.

The Thirty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-ninth street, Third avenue, East Sixty-first street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixtieth street, East river, East Sixty-first street, and Third avenue.

The Thirty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixty-first street, Third avenue, East Sixty-fourth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirty-fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixty-first street, Second avenue, East Sixty-fifth street, and Third avenue.

The Thirty-fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixty-first street, East river, East Sixty-fifth street, and Second avenue.

The Thirty-sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixty-fifth street, East river, East Seventieth street, and Third avenue.

The Thirty-seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Sixty-fourth street, Third avenue, East Seventieth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirty-eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Forty-sixth street, Second avenue, East Forty-seventh street, and Third avenue.

The Thirty-ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West Forty-fifth street, Fifth avenue, West Forty-seventh street, and Sixth avenue.

The Fortieth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fiftieth street, Second avenue, East Fifty-second street, and Third avenue.

The Forty-first Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-fourth street, Third avenue, East Fifty-sixth street, and Fourth avenue.

The Forty-second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-eighth street, Second avenue, East Sixtieth street, and Third avenue.

The Forty-third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Fifty-ninth street, East river, East Sixtieth street, and Second avenue.

Whereas, The Board of Police is required by section 1 of chapter 621 of the Laws of 1874, "on or before the 15th day of August, 1874," to "divide the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards of said City" (of New York), "formed out of the territory lately annexed to the City of New York, into election districts, so that each of such districts shall contain, as near as practicable, two hundred and fifty voters, the number of votes cast in the several election districts in said territory at the general election, held for the year one thousand eight hundred and seventy-two, being taken as the basis on which such division shall be made;" therefore,

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Fifty-second street, Third avenue, One Hundred and Forty-sixth street, and Harlem river.

The Fifth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Third avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-second street, and Harlem river.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Westchester avenue, Bronx river, East river, or Long Island Sound, Bunday Creek, One Hundred and Forty-ninth street, and Third avenue.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Sixty-first street, Third avenue, Cliff street, Union avenue, Westchester avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, and Railroad avenue.

The Eighth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, Third avenue, Spring place, George street, Union avenue, Home street, Westchester avenue, Union avenue, Cliff street, Third avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-first street, and Railroad avenue.

The Ninth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, Boston avenue, northerly line of said ward, Bronx river, Westchester avenue, Home street, Union avenue, George street, Spring place, Third avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, and Railroad avenue.

The Tenth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the northerly line of said ward, Boston avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-eighth street, and Railroad avenue.

The Eleventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the northerly line of said ward, Railroad avenue, One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, Harlem river, and Central avenue.

The Twelfth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying between the northerly line of said ward, Central avenue, and Harlem river.

TWENTY-FOURTH WARD OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York shall be divided into seven election districts, the extent and limits of which said election districts shall be as follows:

The First Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Morris street, Locust avenue, Boston Post-road, Westchester avenue, Bronx river, southerly line of said ward and Fordham avenue.

The Second Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Fordham and Pelham avenue, Bronx river, Westchester avenue, Boston Post-road, Locust avenue, Morris street, Fordham avenue, and Kingsbridge road.

The Third Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Kingsbridge road, Fordham avenue, southerly line of said ward, and Mill Brook.

The Fourth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within road to Berrian's Landing, Kingsbridge road, Mill Brook, southerly line of said ward, and Harlem river.

The Sixth Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the Monumental line, dividing Wm. C. Wetmore's and the late James R. Whiting's land, Tibbet's brook, Williams Bridge avenue, Boston avenue, Varian's road, Godwin's road, South Broadway, Harlem river, Spuyten Duyvel creek, and Hudson river.

The Seventh Election District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within the northerly line of said ward, Bronx river, Boston avenue, Williams Bridge avenue, Tibbet's brook, Monumental line, dividing Wm. C. Wetmore's and the late James R. Whiting's land, and Hudson river.

Whereas, By section 1 of chapter 621 of the Laws of 1874, it is provided that the "Board of Police may, on or before the 15th day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and

seventy-four, and in each second year thereafter, divide such election districts, and such only as, by the registration of voters of the two preceding years, shall be found to have had an average registration of more than four hundred voters; therefore,

Resolved, That the following named election districts, in the Assembly Districts, named as follows:

Eleventh Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District.

Thirteenth Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District.

—having for two years last past had an average registration of more than four hundred voters, it is hereby ordered that the same shall be divided, and that the boundaries and numerical designation of said election districts shall be as follows:

The Eleventh Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Tenth street, Avenue A, East Eleventh street, and First avenue.

The Thirteenth Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Eleventh street, Avenue B, East Twelfth street, and Avenue A.

The Sixteenth Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Ninth street, Avenue A, East Tenth street, and First avenue.

The Seventeenth Election District of the Fourteenth Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within Seventh street, Avenue B, East Eleventh street, and Avenue A.

The Twentieth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Ninth street, East river, East One Hundred and Tenth street, and Fifth avenue.

The Thirtieth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, East river, East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and Second avenue, including Randall's Island.

The Thirty-fourth Election District of the

Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within West One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Madison avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, West One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and Eighth avenue.

The Thirty-eighth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Seventy-fifth street, East river, East Seventy-seventh street, and Third avenue.

The Thirty-ninth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East Eighty-third street, Second avenue, East Eighty-sixth street, and Third avenue.

The Fortieth Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Tenth street, East river, East One Hundred and Eleventh street, and Third avenue, including Ward's Island.

The Forty-first Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Nineteenth street, Second avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-second street, and Third avenue.

The Forty-second Election District of the Twenty-first Assembly District shall contain all that part of the city bounded by and lying within East One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, Third avenue, East One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, and Madison avenue.

Resolved, That the Chief of the Bureau of Elections be directed to procure seven hundred Maps of each of the Assembly Districts affected by the foregoing resolutions, and the same number each of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, of Snyder & Black, provided they will furnish said maps at the same rate as their recent bid for Congressional District Maps.

A list of Inspectors and Poll Clerks was presented from the Tammany Hall Committee, whereupon Commissioner Voorhis moved that the list be received, and the Chief of the Bureau of Elections be directed to ascertain the character and qualifications of the persons recommended.

Commissioner Disbecker moved to amend, by adding, "That from this date the lists of names for Inspectors be open to public inspection."

Which was accepted, and the resolution adopted as amended.

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the five weeks ending August 1, 1874.

An opinion was received from the Assistant Counsel to the Corporation, to the effect that the powers conferred upon the Department of Public Works by chapter 566, Laws of 1871, to make blind drains, are not conferred on this Department with reference to the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Comptroller of the City of New York be, and he hereby is, requested to issue, under the provisions of chapter 645 of the Laws of 1874, to an amount not exceeding the

sum of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) of the public fund or stock, to be denominated the "City Parks Improvement Fund," for the improvement and regulation of the several parks, squares and public places, which by law now are, or may hereafter be, under the control and management of the Department of Public Parks.

William Dent Beall was appointed temporarily as writing clerk, and his pay fixed at \$3 per day.

The action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in reducing the amount heretofore appropriated for the use of the Department, and in enacting that all salaries of the "President, clerks, officers, and employees, other than foremen of laborers," should be paid out of the fund appropriated for the maintenance and government of parks and places, was submitted to the Counsel to the Corporation, for his opinion as to whether said Board had not exceeded its authority by such action.

Advertisements were directed to be published for 245 tons of coal.

Mary F. Hyatt, resigned the position of Ladies' Maid, in charge of Union Square Cottage, and Mrs. Joanna Decker was appointed in her place, and her pay fixed at \$10 50 per week.

Leave of absence for one week, with pay, was granted to Halsted Hermans, Rodman, and F. Griffenburgh, Draughtsman.

All the iron railing formerly around Union square, and such other old material and sheep as are not required on the parks, were ordered to be sold by public auction.

The President was authorized to employ a force, in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, of ten laborers, two teams, and one messenger only, to be under the direction of a general foreman.

Offices with storage ground were hired for the use of the Department, in Fordham, at \$30 per month.

A plan was adopted and filed, showing the lines of curb and other surface constructions of Eighth avenue, adjacent to Central Park.

All general foremen and foremen were informed that whenever they may be suspended that such suspension is made without pay.

Proposals for 245 tons of coal and 1,000 lineal feet of dressed base course stone for Eighth avenue wall were publicly opened.

Thirty-five thousand dollar bonds of the late town of Kingsbridge were sent to the Finance Department.

Leave of absence for one week was granted to Morris E. Sterne, Clerk, and S. B. Smith, First Assistant Division Engineer.

True W. Rollins declined to accept the award of the granite-work of a portion of the Art Museum, and said work was ordered to be re-vertised.

Two horse-drinking-troughs were ordered for Five Points Park.

The bid of Theodore F. Tone, for 245 tons of coal, was accepted.

A plan was adopted for a carriage entrance to the Central Park, at the corner of Eighth avenue and One Hundred and Tenth street.

Mr. H. B. Dodworth presented to the Department a piece of the "Charter Oak."

The proposal of the Bigelow Blue Stone Company, for furnishing 1,000 feet of base course stone for eighth avenue wall, was accepted.

The proposal of Kohler & Perkins, for furnishing 5,000 cubic yards of screened gravel, was accepted.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending August 1, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 2,051, as follows:

2 public buildings, 877 tenement houses, 173 private dwellings, 121 other dwellings, 48 manufactories and workshops, 31 stores and warehouses, 79 stables, 1 smoke-house, 32 slaughter-houses, 13 fat-rendering establishments, 3 breweries, 1 gut-cleaning establishment, 9 public sewers and drains, 69 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 2 dumping-grounds, 84 yards, courts, and areas, 52 cellars and basements, 49 water-pipes and drains, 230 privies and water-closets, 112 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 10 dangerous stairways, 19 cisterns and cesspools, 23 other

nuisances, together with 10 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 881.

During the past week 78 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 51 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 41 houses, 41 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

In addition to the regular work performed, the Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 143 miles of street-gutters in the following Wards: Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first, and Twenty-second. They have disinfected 272 privies and water-closets, 44 yards, courts, and areas, and 24 cellars and basements. Washington, Fulton, Catharine, and Spring street Markets were also disinfected.

Seven cases of small-pox were removed to the Hospital, and 2 dead bodies to the Morgue, by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits were granted consignees of 75 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

194 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported during the week ending August 1, 1874:

Typhoid fever, 9; scarlet fever, 32; measles, 9; diphtheria, 44; small-pox, 15; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 2.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food during the week ending July 30, 1874:

Calves, 1 carcass; lambs, 1 carcass; beef, 292 pounds; mutton, 35 pounds; pork, 250 pounds; poultry, 62 pounds; and fish, 765 pounds.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 1, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 751 burial permits for city deaths, 39 for bodies in transitu, and 33 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 751 deaths, 152 marriages, 580 births, 33 still-births, 39 applications for transit permits, and 50 returns from Coroners. There were 27 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage, and 16 of death were issued from this Bureau. 4 cases of death were referred to Coroners.

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to regulate permits for street-stands, sheds, cases, signs, stairways, hoistways, and deliveries," approved February 24, 1866.

The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 5 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

§ 5. Every grantee of a privilege under this ordinance for a show-case, signs, stairways, or hoistways, shall pay a sum of one dollar for each, and grantees of all other privileges the sum of one dollar, towards the expense of executing this ordinance, to be accounted for among other fees of the Mayor's office. It is hereby understood and expressed that for the receiving and delivering of goods no fee shall be charged. And the Corporation Attorney shall not hereafter institute suits for alleged obstructions occasioned by the receipt or delivery of merchandise in the ordinary course of business; * * *

* * * but no person shall deposit any article or articles upon any street or sidewalk in this city in such manner as to obstruct the free use thereof by the public. The aggregate sum for any one permit containing all or any portion of the privileges expressed in this section shall not exceed the sum of three dollars, and all may be granted for that fee; but in no case is permission to be given to use the street beyond the stoop line.

SEC. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
