BOARD OF EDUCATION.

MAY 13, 1874.

A special session of the Board of Education was held at the hall of the Board, on Wednesday, the 13th, at 4 o'clock.

Present—Wm. H. Neilson, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Brown, Dowd, Farr, Halsted, Jenkins, Kelly, Klamroth, Lewis, Man, Mathewson, Townsend, West and Wetmore—16.

Absent—Commissioners Hoe, Patterson, Seligman, Traud and Vermilye—5.

The minutes of the stated session of May 6 were amended and approved.

The President announced the object of the meeting to be the consideration of the communication from Hon. A. H. Green, Comptroller, relative to a revision of estimates for 1874, and the reports of standing and special committees.

The President laid before the Board a communication from Hon. A. H. Green, Comptroller, relative to estimates for 1874.

Referred to the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board a copy of the law relative to compulsory education, as follows:

CHAPTER 421.

AN ACT to secure to children the benefits of elementary education, passed May 11, 1874, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. All parents and those who have the care of children, shall instruct them, or cause them to be instructed, in spelling, reading, writing, English grammar, geography and arithmetic. And every parent, guardian or other person having control and charge of any child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, shall cause such child to attend some public or private day school at least fourteen weeks in each year, eight weeks at least of which attendance shall be consecutive, or to be instructed regularly at home at least fourteen weeks in each year in spelling, reading, writing, English, grammar, geography and arithmetic, unless the physical or mental condition of the child is such as to render such attendance or instruction inexpedient or impracticable.

Sec. 2. No child under the age of fourteen years shall be employed by any person to labor in any business whatever during the school hours of any school day of the school term of the public school in the school district or the city where such child is, unless such child shall have attended some public or private day school where instruction was given by a teacher qualified to instruct in spelling, reading, writing, geography, English grammar, and arithmetic, or shall have been regularly instructed at home in said branches by some person qualified to instruct in the same, at least fourteen weeks of the fifty-two weeks next preceding any and every year in which such child shall be employed; and shall, at the time of such employment, deliver to the employer a certificate in writing, signed by the teacher or a school trustee of the district or of a school, certifying to such attendance or instruction; and any person who shall employ any child contrary to the provisions of this section shall, for each offense, forfeit and pay a penalty of fifty dollars to the treasurer or chief fiscal officer of the city, or supervisor of the town, in which such offense shall occur; the said sum or penalty, when so paid, shall be added to the public school money of the school district in which the offense occurred.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of the trustee or trustees of every school district, or public school, or union school, in every town and city, in the months of September and of February of each year, to examine into the situation of the children employed in all manufacturing establishments in such school district; and, in case any town or city is not divided into school districts, it shall, for the purposes of the examination provided for in this section, be divided by the school authorities thereof into districts; and the said trustees notified of their respective districts on or before the first day of January of each year; and the said trustee or trustees shall ascertain whether all the provisions of this act are duly observed, and report all violations thereof to the treasurer or chief fiscal officer of said city, or supervisor of said town. On such examination, the proprietor, superintendent or manager of said establishment shall, on demand, exhibit to said examining trustee a correct list of all children between the ages of eight and fourteen years employed in said establishment with the said certificates of attendance on school or of instruction.

Sec. 4. Every parent, guardian or other person having control and charge of any child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, who has been temporarily discharged from employment in any business, in order to be afforded an opportunity to receive instruction or schooling, shall send such child to some public or private school, or shall cause such child to be regularly instructed as aforesaid at home for the period for which such child may have been so discharged, to the extent of at least fourteen weeks in all in each year, unless the physical or mental condition of the child is such as to render such an attendance or instruction inexpedient or impracticable.

Sec. 5. The trustee or trustees of any school district or public school, or the president of any Union school, or in case there is no such officer, then such officer as the Board of Education of said city or town may designate, is hereby authorized and empowered to see that sections one, two, three, four and five of this act are enforced, and to report in writing all violations thereof to the treasurer or chief fiscal officer of his city, or to the supervisor of his town; any person who shall violate any provision of sections one, three and four of this act shall, on written notice of such violation from one of the school officers above named, forfeit for the first offense, and pay to the treasurer or chief fiscal officer of the city, or to the supervisor of the town in which he resides, or such offense has occurred, the sum of one dollar, and after such first offense shall, for each succeeding offense in the same year, forfeit and pay to the treasurer of said city or supervisor of said town the sum of five dollars for each and every week, not exceeding thirteen weeks in any one year, during which he, after written notice from said school officer, shall have failed to comply with any of said provisions; the said penalties, when paid, to be added to the public school money of said school district in which the offense occurred.

Sec. 6. In every case arising under this act where the parent, guardian or other person having the control of any child between the said ages of eight and fifteen years, is unable to provide such child for said fourteen weeks with the text-books required to be furnished to enable such child to attend school for said period, and shall so state in writing to the said trustee, the said trustee shall provide said text-books for said fourteen weeks, at the public school, for the use of such child, and the expense of the same shall be paid by the treasurer of said city, or supervisor of said town, on the certificate of the said trustee, specifying the items furnished for the use of such child.

Sec. 7. In case any person having the control of any child, between the ages of eight and fourteen years, is unable to induce said child to attend school for the said fourteen weeks in each year, and shall so state in writing to said trustee, the said child shall, from and after the date of delivery to said trustee of said statement in writing, be deemed and dealt with as an habitual truant, and said person shall be relieved of all penalties incurred for said year after said date, under sections one, four and five of this act, as to such child.

Sec. 8. The Board of Education or public instruction, by whatever name it may be called in each city, and the trustees of the school districts and union school in each town by an affirmative vote of a majority of said trustees, at a meeting or meetings to be called for this purpose, on ten days' notice in writing to each trustee, said notice to be given by the town clerk, are for each of their respective cities and towns hereby authorized and empowered and directed, on or before the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-five, to make all needful provisions, arrangements, rules and regulations concerning habitual truants, and children between said ages of eight and fourteen years of age who may be found wandering about the streets or public places of such city or town during the school hours of the school-day of the term of the public school of said city or town, having no lawful occupation or business, and growing up in ignorance; and said provisions, arrangements, rules and regulations shall be such as shall, in their judgment, be most conducive to the welfare of such children, and to the good order of such city or town; and shall provide suitable places for the discipline and instruction and confinement, where necessary, of such children, and may require the aid of the police of cities and constables of towns to enforce their said rules and regulations; provided, however, that such provisions, arrangements, rules and regulations shall not go into effect as laws for said several cities and towns, until they shall have been approved, in writing, by a Justice of the Supreme Court for the judicial district in which said city or town is situated; and when so approved he shall file the same with the clerk of the said city or town, who shall print the same, and furnish ten copies thereof to each trustee of each school district or public or union school of said city or town. The said trustee shall keep one copy thereof posted in a conspicuous place in or upon each schoolhouse in his charge during the school terms each year. In like manner, the same in each city or town may be amended or revised annually in the month of December.

Sec. 9. Justices of the Peace, Civil Justices and Police Justices shall have jurisdiction within their respective towns and cities of all offences and of all actions for penalties or fines described in this act, or that may be described in said provisions, arrangements, rules and regulations authorized by section 8 of this act. All actions for fines and penalties under this act shall be brought in the name of the treasurer or chief fiscal officer of the city or supervisor of the town, to whom the same is payable, but shall be brought by and under the direction of the said trustee or trustees, or said officer designated by the Board of Education.

Sec. 10. Two weeks' attendance at a half-time or evening school shall, for all purposes of this act, be counted as one week at a day school.

Sec. 11. This act shall take effect on the first day of January, eighteen hundred and seventy-five.

Bureau of Street Cleaning requested to remove the dirt accumulated on Piers at 25th, 37th and 38th streets, E. R., and 46th, 47th and 57th streets, N. R., reported as being in a filthy condition; and the Superintendents of Docks for the districts directed to report if the work is not done within a reasonable time.

Commissioner of Public Works respectfully requested to inform the Board of the reason or cause for refusing to permit to be received at the Corporation Yard at Gansevoort street, N. R., a lot of sand recently removed off bulkhead, between West 11th street and Pier 54, and to transmit a copy of the rules and regulations promulgated for the government of the Corporation Yards.

Thos. Bracher informed that certain models, &c., for a stone pier and a coffer-dam, submitted to the Department at its organization, will be returned on presentation of evidence of ownership.

The Police Justice for the District respectfully informed consequent upon the gravity of the offence committed by certain parties, on or about 25th of March last, by throwing night soil from a canal boat into the slip foot of 95th street, E. R., as reported by the Board of Commissioners of Pilots, that the Commissioners of Docks trust the extreme penalty of the law will be imposed.

Board of Commissioners of Pilots informed that such action, in the matter of the filling in of slips at Stanton and Markets streets, E. R., caused by the dumping boards located thereat, will be taken, as may be within the jurisdiction of the Department.

Engineer-in-Chief authorized to receive sample of "Black Diamond" steel from Park, Bros. & Co., for the purpose of testing its fitness for manufacturing tools for the uses of the Department.

Commissioner of Public Works respectfully informed that the cutting through or opening of any bulkhead on the water front of the City will not be allowed unless a permit therefor shall have been first applied for and obtained from this Department, complaint having been made of a recent attempt to insert a sewer pipe in bulkhead adjoining easterly half of Pier 23, E. R.

Erie Railway Co. respectfully informed that the renewal of the lease for the ferry franchise for the Pavia ferry is under the control of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and is to be disposed of at auction, public notice of which will be duly given.

Counsel to the Corporation respectfully requested to advise as to the action necessary to be taken by this Department to protect the interest of the Corporation in the water front and wharf property of the newly annexed 23d and 24th wards, as well as to enable the Commissioners to discharge the duties imposed upon them by the law, they having been unable to obtain from the proper authorities of the County, or towns composing said wards, any reliable information in regard thereto.

N. Y. PENITENTIARY, B. I.

Wm. Laimbeer, Esq., President.

In reply to the resolution of your Hon. Board, dated April 17, 1874, directing me to send to you all information in relation to the materials for a sail boat, now in the basement of my dwelling, and lately removed from carpenter shop thereto, by whom the labor has been done, by whom the materials have been furnished, and by whose order the boat is being built, and also how many tables or other pieces of furniture or woodwork that were made on the Island, I have sent to New York, and where I have sent the same.

I would most respectfully state that there is no material for a sail boat lately removed from carpenter shop to the basement of my house, neither has there been since I occupied the house, but there is a keel of a boat, together with some few timbers, at the rear entrance to my house, which I removed from carpenter shop several weeks since, which I presume is the boat to which your resolution refers; if not I know no other. The labor, which does not exceed four or five days work, was performed by a prisoner named Brady. The material was furnished by myself, from my own means; the boat was being built by my directions, and I may also state that I intended the boat for my own official and private use, at a time when after the all-right bell has rung in evening, and the ferry boat has conveyed all keepers, whose night it may be home, to the foot of 61st street. I could return the keepers and prisoners of said ferry boat immediately to prison, and if I had any private business of my own to

attend to in New York, or any of my family wished to go to church or lecture, or to spend an evening with their relatives, or they wish us, or to call a physician, as I was obliged to do at 10 P.M., Sunday evening, 12th inst., I could take the boat myself, go over, leave her at the dock, attend to what matters I required, and return without being compelled to have the keeper and prisoners waiting at boat house. If by accident, in the meantime, the boat was stolen, it would be principally my loss. This would obviate the possibility of the escape of a prisoner from ferry boat after the keepers were discharged at 61st street. What little time I have to attend to my private business matters is only after the all-right bell has rung in the evening.

My duties often call me to Ward's and Randall's Islands. I cannot make use of the steamboat, as their time of stopping is too short for me to perform my official duties, and in the event of the abolishment of the ferryboats, which your honorable Board, I understand, intend to do, and substitute a steam launch in their places, it would greatly embarrass me in the performance of my duties already referred to, on said island.

The reason why the boat was not completed, and work thereon was suspended, is, that more necessary and hurried jobs had to be done and I only calculated to devote the time of prisoners to it when they had nothing more urgent to do, and work thereon will be continued if proper leisure should offer, unless your honorable Board should desire otherwise, which, however, I hope not, and will please take into consideration the practical use of the same on the islands.

Whilst I virtually bear all the expense out of my own means, except the labor and this outlay, I make as an offset for the use I make of the boat for myself and family.

As for sending tables, pieces of furniture, or woodwork, or any articles made on this island, to New York—or, I may say any other place—I positively and most emphatically deny, except when I sent the stand to the office of your honorable Board.

In connection with this report, I beg leave to say that every act of mine since I have been warden of this penitentiary has been done openly and in full view of each and every member of your honorable Board at all times whenever your honorable Board felt disposed to visit this institution, and whatever work has been done by me, or instructions given by me, whether for this penitentiary or any other department, have been by the same order and practice as was followed previous to my taking charge, and in performing my duties in a general way, when I have had no special instructions to the contrary, I have allowed myself to be governed by the custom established and practiced before I entered upon my duties here.

I should be only too happy to receive to my department as many visits as your honorable Board could possibly make, either collectively or individually, and gladly receive your kind advice and instructions, and you will always find me to respond promptly and cordially to any enquiries emanating from your honorable Board.

But I may be pardoned if I say that I exceedingly regret that your enquiries should be made in the form of your late resolutions, as evil disposed persons construe such enquiries as endeavoring to conceal my acts from you, if not from worse motives, much to the injury of my reputation, which is to me sacred, and causes much distressed feeling to myself and to those that are dear to me.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 5th day of May, 1874, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That section 65 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 65. That no offal or butcher's refuse shall be conveyed through any street or avenue of the City of New York between the hours of ten o'clock A. M. and ten o'clock P. M., and that no offal, fat or refuse shall at any time be brought into the city or conveyed over any ferry except in accordance with the terms of a written permit first obtained therefor from this Department, nor shall any such substance be conveyed through any street or avenue unless the same be in tight boxes, barrels or vessels, and covered over so that no odor therefrom shall escape.

Resolved, That section 98 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 98. That no lime, ashes, coal, dry sand, hair, feathers, or other substance that is in a similar manner liable to be blown by the wind, shall be sieved or agitated, or exposed, nor shall any mat, carpet, or cloth, be shaken or beaten, nor any cloth, yarn, garment, or material, or substance, be scoured, cleaned, or hung, nor any business be conducted over, or any rags, damaged merchandise, wet, broken, or leaking casks, barrels or boxes, or broken bales of merchandise or goods be placed, kept or exposed for sale in any street or public place, or where it, or particles therefrom, or set in motion thereby, will pass into any such street or public place, or into any occupied premises. That neither any usual nor any reasonable precaution shall be omitted by any person to prevent fragments or other substances from falling, to the peril of life, or dust and light material flying into any street, place or building, from any building or erection, while the same is being altered, repaired, or demolished, or otherwise.

Resolved, That section 112 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 112. That no pile or deposit of manure, offal, dirt or garbage, nor any accumulation of any offensive or noxious substance, shall be made within the built-up portions of the City of New York, or upon any open space inclosed within any portions thereof, or upon the piers, docks, or bulkheads adjacent thereto, or upon any open grounds near (or upon any vessel or scow other than those to be speedily, and according to the duty of any person, removed, lying at) any such pier, wharf, or bulkhead, except according to a resolution of this Board specially authorizing the same, and a permit obtained from this Department, and according to its regulations. And no person shall contribute to the making of any such accumulations. Nor shall any straw, hay, or other substance which has been used as bedding for animals, be placed or dried upon any street or sidewalk, or roof of any building, nor shall any straw, hay, or other substance, or the contents of any mattress or bed be deposited or burnt; nor shall accumulation thereof be made within two hundred feet of any street, without a permit from this Board.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT,
NEW YORK, April 29, 1874.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH of the Health Department of the City of New York, held at its office on the 28th day of April, 1874, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law on the Health Department, the following additional section to the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and the same is hereby adopted and declared to form a portion of the Sanitary Code:

Section 183. That no person shall place or deposit garbage, rubbish, or liquid substance of any kind in any box, barrel, tub, cart, wagon or any receptacle whatever used for the reception, the holding or the transportation of ashes; nor shall any one put ashes in or upon garbage rubbish or liquid substances, or in any way place together, mix, or have in the same receptacle ashes and garbage in the City of New York.

Resolved, That section 55 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 55. That no cattle, swine, pigs or calves shall be driven through the streets or avenues of the City of New York, or any of them, except between the hours of eight in the evening and two hours after sunrise of the next morning; nor shall any sheep be there driven except between the hours of eight o'clock in the evening and twelve o'clock, noon, of the next day; nor shall more than twenty cattle, or more than one hundred and fifty hogs, or more than two hundred and fifty sheep or lambs be driven together; and they shall be so driven only through the following streets, that is to say: Forty-fifth street, from First to Second avenue; Sixtieth street, from Eighth to Tenth avenue; the transverse road through the Central Park at Seventy-ninth street; Ninety-second street, from Third avenue to Astoria ferry; Ninety-fourth street, from Third to Fifth avenue; One Hundred and Tenth street, from Second to Eighth avenue; One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, from Eighth avenue to Manhattan street; First and Second avenues, in their entire lengths north of Fortieth street; Third avenue, between Ninety-second street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Fifth avenue, between Seventy-ninth street and One Hundred and Tenth street; Eighth avenue, from Sixtieth street to McComb's Dam Road; McComb's Dam Road, in its entire length; Tenth avenue, from Fortieth street to Sixtieth street; Harlem lane, from the intersection of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street and Eighth avenue to the intersection of One Hundred and Tenth street and Sixth avenue; Eleventh avenue, from Forty-second street to Forty-ninth street; Fortieth and Forty-first streets, from the Hudson river to Tenth avenue; and Forty-fifth, Forty-sixth, Forty-seventh, Forty-eighth and Forty-ninth street, between Hudson river and Eleventh avenue.

After the first day of June, 1874, no cattle, sheep, swine, pigs, or calves shall be driven across the city between the 10th and 2d avenues, south of 70th street.

It shall not be lawful to drive cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves through any street or avenue south of Fortieth street, nor to slaughter any cattle, sheep, pigs, swine, or calves south of said street; nor shall any such cattle, sheep, swine, pigs, or calves be allowed to pass upon or across any sidewalk, or to remain in the streets or avenues, except when being driven in accordance with his Sanitary Code.

Cattle arriving in the City of New York by cars or boats may be driven in accordance with this Code from the place of unloading, being north of Thirty-ninth st., to any existing cattle yard, through the streets and avenues designated, without limit as to number, provided they are accompanied by one attendant, if composed of twenty or any less number of head; by two attendants for more than twenty and less than fifty head; by three attendants for more than fifty and less than one hundred head; and by one attendant for every additional forty head above one hundred.

Such cattle and sheep as shall arrive within the Twenty-second and Thirtieth Police Precinct, as established by the Board of Police, by conveyances that, according to time-tables, should have arrived in season to be driven in conformity to this Code, but the actual arrival of which cattle or sheep has been delayed, without the wrongful act of the owners of the same (or of their agents), may be driven upon the routes herein before designated, when they shall arrive, to any established yards above Fortieth street, upon obtaining a written permit for driving the same (out of the hours fixed by this Code, but otherwise in conformity thereto), at the police station-houses in said precincts respectively, under such regulations as the police authorities may provide.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

The pine wood must be of the best quality, and not less than three (3) feet six (6) inches long. The proposal must state the price per cord of one hundred and twenty-eight cubic feet, solid measure, for both oak and pine wood, and also the price per cut for sawing and splitting per load, the quantity of oak wood to be split only as required by the Committee on Supplies. The wood will be inspected and measured under the supervision of the Inspector of Fuel of the Board of Education, and must be delivered at the schools as follows:—Two-thirds of the quantity required from the 15th of July to the 15th of September, and the remainder as required by the Committee on Supplies: said wood, both oak and pine, must be delivered sawed, and, when required, split, and must be piled in the yards, cellars, vaults or bins of the school buildings, as may be designated by the proper authority.

The contracts for supplying said coal and wood to be binding until the first day of June, 1875. Two sureties for the faithful performance of the contract will be required, and each proposal must be accompanied by the signatures and residences of the proposed sureties. No compensation will be allowed for delivering said coal and wood at any of the schools, nor putting and piling the same in the yards, cellars, vaults or bins of said schools.
