#### Street Cleaning.

Resolved, That the minutes of July 17 be amended so as to include in recommendation No. 4, of the Committee on Street Cleaning, the names of William S. O'Brien Deputy Superintendent of Boats, and Dennis Ryer, Deputy Superintendent of Stables, removed.

Commissioner Disbecker, from the Committee on Street Cleaning, reported as follows:

1st. Recommending that the offices of Deputy Superintendent of Stables and Deputy Superintendent of Boats be abolished.

2d. Recommending that Jonathan Gaddis be detailed as Night Watchman, at a compensation of \$2 per night of actual service.

3d. Recommending that the Stanton street stables be lighted with gas, to avoid danger from fires.

4th. Recommending that the resignation of Michael Martin, Foreman Eighteenth Ward, be accepted.

5th. Recommending that Andrew J. Birdsall be appointed Inspector of Dumps, to date from 21st inst.

6th. Recommending that a shed be constructed adjoining the Stanton street stables for storing feed and housing carts.

On motion, the above report was received, and the various recommendations adopted.

#### Bureau of Elections.

Commissioner Voorhis offered the following, which was adopted:

Whereas, It is made the duty of the Board of Police, by sections 13 and 15 of chapter 675, of the Laws of 1872 (the Election Act), annually, in the months of August and September, to select four persons to serve as Inspectors of Election, and two persons to serve as Poll Clerks, in each election district in the city of New York; and

Whereas, The duties devolved upon the persons so selected are of the utmost importance and responsibility, requiring great care and discretion in making such selections, with a view especially to the integrity and fitness of the parties so selected; therefore

Resolved, That lists will be received and are hereby invited by the Board of Police until the 15th of August, of the names, age, residences, occupation and political faith on State issues, of proper persons for the positions above named, to the end that the Board may institute the necessary inquiries as to the character and qualifications of the persons so submitted.

Resolved, That intelligent and upright citizens who have heretofore declined the important duty of acting as Inspectors or Poll Clerks are requested to signify their willingness to serve, thus exempting themselves from jury duty, while aiding in preserving the purity of the elective franchise.

Resolved, That when a full list of Inspectors and Poll Clerks is made up for one or more Assembly Districts, the same shall be published in the CITY RECORD, and public scrutiny and objections thereto, if any exist, invited before a final selection and appointment is made.

The Chief of the Bureau of Elections submitted a schedule showing the proposed election districts for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards; also proposed rearrangement of election districts in the Seventeenth and Twentieth Assembly districts, rendered necessary by the act of 1873, making new Congressional districts; also proposed subdivision of election districts in the Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, and Twenty-first Assembly districts; all in pursuance of chapter 621 of the Laws of 1874; whereupon, it was

Resolved, That the same be laid over for examination by this Board, and be open to public inspection in the Bureau of Elections, until the 4th day of August next, when final action will be taken thereon.

## LAWS OF THE STATE RELATING TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

## Chapter 645.

AN ACT to make further provisions for the payment of further expenses of the local government of the City of New York.

Passed June 25, 1874; three-fifths being present.

*The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:*

**SECTION 1.** The Comptroller of the City of New York in the name and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, is hereby authorized and directed to create and issue hereafter, and at such times and in such amounts, and in such manner as shall be required by the Department of Public Parks, for the improvement and regulation of the several parks, squares and public places which by law now are or may hereafter be under the control and management of the Department of Public Parks, a public fund or stock to be denominated the City Parks Improvement Fund, to an amount not exceeding the sum of two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. Such sum hereby authorized is in addition to any and all amounts heretofore authorized by law to be created and issued for the aforesaid purposes, and such stock or fund shall be redeemable within thirty years from the date thereof. The moneys realized from said stock shall be applied only to the construction and improvement of said parks, squares, and public places.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHARITY HOSPITAL, NEW YORK, July 12th, 1874.

Hon. WM. LAIMBEER:

SIR—In accordance with the instructions of your Board, I have this day made a careful personal examination of Wm. M. Tweed. I find such a condition and such indications as lead me to anticipate an apoplectic seizure as a very possible occurrence. To a patient in private practice I should, under the circumstances, recommend, in addition to necessary medication, more of out-door exercise than Mr. Tweed now gets, and a change of sleeping quarters. How far these changes can be made in the present instance it is of course for your Board, not myself, to determine. If, however, the necessity of the case will permit of Mr. Tweed's assignment to some other duties than those now entailed upon him, and the removal of his bed to a better atmosphere than that of the hospital, it will, in my opinion, be a proper sanitary measure.

The enlargement of the orderlies' rooms would not, I think, accomplish any good purpose. Their having been placed in the hospital at all was an injustice to the patients, which their enlargement would only increase; and they secure for the orderlies occupying them concealment from sight, and,

since they are open at the top, no difference of atmosphere.
