The certificates of 552 births, 51 still-births, 200 marriages and 771 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, Jane 28, 1884. This shows a decrease of 22 births, to still-births and 36 marriages, and an increase of 137 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was an increase of 12 births and 55 deaths, a decrease of 9 still-births and the same number of marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria decreased 1; whooping cough, 5; cancer, 7; phthiss pulmonalis, 13; pneumonia, 7; aneurism, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 9; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; premature and preternatural births, 2; suicide, 2; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 5; croup, 7; erysipelas, 4; typhus fever, 2; crebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 3; duarrhocal diseases, 8; inanition, 2; theumatism and gout, 2; bronchits, 1; maramus, tables mesenterica and serrolua, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 6; gastritis, enteritis and peritontis, 21; Bright's disease and nephrits, 17; drowning, 8. The number of deaths from measles, typhoid fever, alcoholism, apoplexy, cyanosis and atelectasis, and surgical operations was the same in the two successi ve weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 134 were in institutions, 476 in tenement-houses, 138 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 16 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 124 on the first, 198 on the second, 161 on the third, 92 on the fourth, 35 on the fifth, 5 on the sixth; 771 were stated to be residents of New York City and 0 non-resident; 62 were stated to be single, 149 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 491 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 771; still-births, 51; bodies in transitu, 552. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 106 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 552 births, 200 marriages, 51 still-births; 771 deaths, 13 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated; 85 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 5 transcripts of the birth record, 3 of marriage, and 39 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 28, 1884, was 71.9 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.994, the mean humidity was 59, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,333 and the total amount of rain-fall was 4.74 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 728 deaths and still-births, or 88.56 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries : Bayside (Jewish), 25; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 308; City pauper burial ground (andenonunational), 100; Greenwood (andenominational), 35; Lutheran (andenominational), 110; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 24; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 12; Union (Methodist Protestant), 7; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Machelah, L. The importance of this branch of the Department's service has already practically demonstrated itself on several occasions, notably at the recent fire in the St. George Flats, where the methods thus taught were unquestionably the means of saving a human life, which, owing to the fact that the longest extension ladder was too short, would otherwise have been sacrificed. Upwards of two hundred and fifty (250) officers and men now in service have thus far become members of the Life

Saving Corps of the Department, and are now assigned mainly to the various Hook and Ladder Companies of the Department, in readiness to practically apply what they have learned. It is also proposed to locate in this building duplicate telegraph machinery and apparatus for the reception and transmission of alarms, to be kept for use in case of any accident or injury hap-pening to the apparatus in the Headquarters building. Attention is again invited to the numerous and important charitable and educational institutions, enumerated in the first part of this letter, located in the immediate vicinity of the proposed site, the immates of which would be peculiarly helpless in the case of fire or panic.
