*Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held
December 24, 1878.*

Resolved, That a warrant be drawn in favor of the Chamberlain, for deposit in the City Treasury, to credit of "Refunding Assessments paid in error," and payable from moneys received on account of the same.

count of "Assessment Fund," for one hundred and forty-six dollars (\$146), being the amount erroneously overpaid by John Riley, on Map No. 9637, Block 1133, in the matter of Riverside Park Opening, and refunded by order of Supreme Court, entered October 16, 1878.

The bill of William Kennelly, for appraisal of premises Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, 49 Leonard street, and northeast corner of Eighty-fifth street and Third avenue, amounting to seventy-five dollars, was received ; whereupon the following resolution, submitted by the Comptroller, was, on motion, adopted, viz. :

Resolved, That the bill of William Kennelly, for \$75, appraisement of premises Nos. 9 and 11 Franklin street, 49 Leonard street, and northeast corner of Eighty-fifth street and Third avenue, be ordered paid.

The application of George F. Codington for return of amount overpaid on account of street vault, corner of Desbrosses and Washington streets, was received; whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That the sum of three dollars (\$3) be returned to George F. Codington, being the excess paid by him on September 18, 1878, for a vault permit at premises on the southeast corner of Desbrosses and Washington streets.

"Whereas, The necessity of a reception hospital has been apparent since the destruction of that at Bellevue Hospital by fire, and is of pressing importance : and

“Whereas, The designation of the site of the present dock pound, at the foot of East Sixteenth street, by the Dock Commissioners, if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall consent thereto, makes available a place which can be immediately used for this purpose : therefore

“Resolved, That the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be asked to this transfer and to this use.”

Whereupon the Comptroller submitted the following resolution, which, on motion, was adopted.

Resolved, That the consent of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is hereby given to the transfer of the premises now occupied by the present dog pound, at the foot of East Sixteenth street,

A communication from the Board of Commissioners of Docks, in relation to change and alteration of Pier (new) 27, North river, so as to allow said pier to be built of a width of 160 feet instead of 80 feet, measured and an action referred to the Comptroller.

A communication was received from Messrs. Kuhn, Loeb & Co., offering the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund one hundred thousand dollars New York City Tax Relief Seven per cent. Bonds of 1890, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller to answer.

The petition of Edward M. Tyler, to be refunded such portion of deposits, made in advance, for Croton water, as shall be proper from proofs in the case, for non-use of water, was received, and, on motion, referred to the Comptroller.

The Comptroller submitted the following resolution of the Common Council, approved by the Mayor December 11, 1878, viz.:

"Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Francis B. Spinola and his associates, subject to such terms, limitations, restrictions, and conditions as may be fixed by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to lay mains and pipes within the lines of the streets, avenues, and public places in this city, with such connections as may be necessary, for the purpose of supplying steam under 'The Holly Combination System,' to the city and its inhabitants, for heating, cooking, and all other domestic purposes, as well as for any and all uses for which steam can be employed."

Francis B. Spinola, on behalf of himself and associates, in consideration of the permission granted by the said resolution, submitted an offer as the terms and conditions upon which such mains and pipes, with the necessary connections, may be laid.

D. F. Bishop, President of the Holly Steam Combination Co., of Lockport, N. Y., William L. Church, expert in steam engineering, and Dr. S. Sillsbee, appeared before the Commissioners and were heard in relation to the application of steam, as proposed by Mr. Spinola and associates; when, on motion, it was

Resolved, That the resolution be referred to a Committee of this Board, to examine and report at the next meeting.

The Chairman appointed the Comptroller and Chamberlain as such Committee.

On motion, adjourned to Saturday, 28th inst., at 12 o'clock M.
