

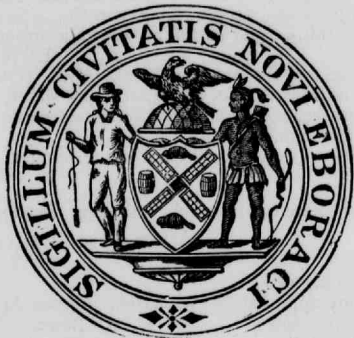

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, May 2, 1879.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen :

I return, without my approval, a resolution protesting against the passage of the bill permitting the elevated railroad companies to extend their tracks in streets in this city which are not now used by them.

I do not think that the elevated railroads should be permitted to extend their tracks in the streets in the lower portion of the city, if at all, without the payment of just compensation to property owners who will be injured thereby, and I concur in the belief that no bill of the kind described in the resolution should become a law.

I cannot, however, give my approval to the language of the preamble which describes the acts of the companies done under authority of law, and sanctioned by the decision of the Court of Appeals, as infamous, arbitrary, and usurpation of public franchises.

A resolution remonstrating against any legislation which would result in injury to private property without just compensation, or in granting valuable franchises without remuneration to the city would meet with my hearty approval.

Whereas, The elevated railroad companies, not satisfied with destroying in the most arbitrary and infamous manner, millions of dollars' worth of the property of our citizens, and usurping franchises of the public worth many millions more, are now engaged in a scheme to add to the destruction and usurpation by securing, through the Legislature of this State, the right to enter upon and use any other of the streets, avenues and public places of this city, with their tracks, without any compensation being provided for the private property thus to be destroyed, or even the permission of the local authorities, who are charged with the care of the franchises thus to be usurped; and

Whereas, While all are willing to admit that the advantages and benefits of rapid transit are many and great, yet they are secured to the many by sacrificing the rights and property of the few, without the slightest compensation being made for the damage inflicted; in other words, private property has been taken and damaged without compensating the injured property-owners or the city, in clear violation of the constitutional rights of both, and as this system is fraught with outrage and wrong, care should be taken in any future extension of the privileges now enjoyed by both rapid transit companies, to see that private rights and rights of property should be protected, and where injury or damage is inflicted, that ample compensation be provided; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Common Council, the representative of the people of the city, hereby protests in the most urgent, yet respectful, manner against the passage of any bill by the Legislature of this State, granting to either or both of the elevated railway companies the right to use or occupy any street, avenue, or place not laid down in their present grants from the city, confirmed September 6, 1875, without making ample provision for the payment to injured property owners of the amount of the damage so inflicted, and without the consent of the corporate authorities, before using or taking possession of any other of the streets, avenues, or places of this city; and be it further

Resolved, That the Clerk of this Board be and he is hereby instructed to transmit to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the Assembly a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolution, for presentation to the Legislature of this State, as a protest of the Corporation of the City of New York against the passage of the bill in question, granting the use of any of the streets of this city to either or both the elevated railroad companies unless provision is made in said bill to compensate owners of property for all damage sustained, and that the consent of the local authorities to use such streets be first obtained.

Resolved, That respectful application be and is hereby made to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to set apart and appropriate to the use and possession of the Police Department the said lots of land, 50x94 feet, situate on the west side of Elizabeth street, 100 feet south of Canal street, and for a site and location of a station-house and prison for the contemplated new Sixth Precinct.

Whereas, A very reprehensible and dangerous practice prevails in many portions of the city, particularly in the most densely populated neighborhoods, of placing earthen pots, wooden boxes, etc., containing shrubs, vines and flowers on the window sills of buildings in such a careless and unprotected manner that they not unfrequently fall to the sidewalk, and quite recently one of our citizens was killed by being struck upon the head by a flower-pot in falling from a window; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Committee on Law Department be and is hereby instructed to prepare and present to this Board an ordinance which will, by its provisions, prevent a continuance of the practice above alluded to and render the occurrence of accidents from that cause impossible.

Whereas, We have no fresh water river and but one aqueduct on which to rely, which if accident should happen to or attrition destroy in any part, the city would be reduced to dire extremity as all the water on hand in the reservoirs in the city would last about one week at the present rate of consumption; and

Whereas, It is incomprehensible why the distributing reservoir on Murray Hill should at this time or in the near future be removed at least until our supply of water is placed beyond a question. If, as the Commissioner of Public Works says, the aqueduct is in danger, he should not at the same time diminish storage facilities by removing the said reservoir on Murray Hill, which was constructed to hold about 24,000,000 gallons, which would be one gallon per day for nearly one month for the inhabitants of this city. It is apparent then that the necessity of this reservoir still exists, and it should not be removed; and

Whereas, An act has been introduced in the State Legislature requiring the said reservoir on Murray Hill to be removed 90 days after the passage of said bill, which act has been introduced without the consent of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty, in whom the title has been and is vested, the memory of man runneth not to the contrary, without the consent of the Sinking Fund Commissioners, to whom the proceeds of all real estate are pledged for payment of the city debt, and without petition from any citizen; therefore be it

Resolved, That we, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, remonstrate, and hereby utter our solemn protest against the passage of said act for the removal of the reservoir now located on Murray Hill.

Resolved, That relief from water famine in the city lies in increased facilities for its introduction into our storage reservoirs, to fill them to their full capacity, thereby giving the necessary pressure for any locality, and to avoid all waste in the upper dams or big pipes between Ninety-second and One Hundred and Thirty-third streets.

Resolved, That the Committee on Public Works be and they are hereby instructed to make the necessary personal examination and report on or before the 20th day of May, 1879, what, in their judgment, is necessary to increase the supply of water, whether it be a new aqueduct, or whether, in their judgment, the present aqueduct is sufficient with the proper security against waste.

Resolved, That a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions be engrossed and forwarded to the President of the Senate and the Speaker of the Assembly.

M., or after 9 o'clock P. M., of each day, nor within a distance of five hundred feet of any school house, or house for public worship, during school hours or hours of public worship, nor within a like distance of any dwelling house, or other premises, when requested or directed by any householder not to do so, under a penalty of ten dollars for each offense. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and side shows, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music or organized musical society engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, that shall comply with the laws of this State relating to parades in the City of New York."

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances or resolutions inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
