BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

BUREAU OF BUILDINGS.

Amendments to the Plumbing and Drainage rules and regulations of the Bureau of Buildings for the Borough of Manhattan, published as required by paragraph 1 of section 141 of the Building Code.

Paragraph 11 is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Once in each year every employee or Master Plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York, shall register his name and address in the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the borough in which his place of business

Paragraph III is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof these words: "A plumber proposing to do work in a borough other than that in which he is registered shall present his certificate at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in that borough before commencing work, so that the fact of his having been properly registered may be recorded.'

Section 79. Substitute the following:

Section 79. A fresh-air inlet must be connected with the house drain just inside of the house-trap; where under ground, it will be of extra heavy cast iron. It must extend to the outer air and finish with a return bend at least one foot above the grade and ten feet away from any window or cold air box. When this arrangement is not possible, the fresh-air inlet must open into the side of a box not less than eighteen inches square, placed below the sidewalk at the curb. The bottom of the box must be eighteen inches below the under side of the fresh-air inlet pipe. The flagstone laid in hydraulic cement. The box must be covered by a flagstone fitted with removable metal grating, leaded into the stone, having openings equal in area to the area of the fresh-air inlet, and not less than one-half inch in their least dimenfive inch and six inch drains it must not be less than four inches in diameter; for ter, the same took effect as if he had approved it. seven inch and eight inch drains no' less than six inches in diameter; and for larger drains not less than eight inches in diameter, the removable portion of grate to be at least eight by twelve inches in area. An automatic device approved by the Superintendent of Buildings may be used, when set in a manner satisfactory to the said Superintendent.'

Section 97. Substitute the following:

"Section 97. No form of trap will be permitted to be used unless it has been approved by the Bureau of Buildings, and no masons' cesspool, bell, pot, bottle or D-trap will be permitted, nor any form of trap that is not self-cleaning nor has interior chamber or mechanism, nor any trap, except earthenware ones, that depend upon interior partitions for a seal."

Section 119. Substitute the following: "Section 119. In lodging houses the water closet and urinal apartments must have a window opening to the outer air; if three stories or less in height, they may have such window opening on a ventilating shaft not less than ten square feet in

Section 131. Substitute the following:

"Section 131. In lodging houses there must be one water closet on each floor and where there are more than fifteen persons on any floor there must be an additional water closet on that floor for every fifteen additional persons or fraction

Change the number of section 134 to section 133 and substitute the following: "Section 133. Water closets and urinals must be flushed from separate cisterns on each floor, the water from which is used for no other purpose; where flushom-eters are used, they must be supplied from separate tanks provided for that purpose. and in no case are connections to be made direct with the water service pipe. AN ORDINANCE for the removal of ice, snow and other material from sidewalks and gutters in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1—The owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house or other building or vacant lot, fronting on any street or avenue that is flagged shall keep the sidewalk and gutter free from snow, ice, dirt or other material, and in case of said snow, ice, dirt or other material being deposited upon said sidewalk or in said gutter, the same shall be removed within four (4) hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the other materials are deposited thereupon or therein, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in above period of four hours.

In default of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house, or other building or vacant lots, fronting on any street or avenue, the sidewalk of which is flagged in front of said premises, complying with the above ordinance, it shall then be the duty of the President of the Borough, and he is hereby authorized, to cause said snow, ice, dirt or other material to be removed from the said sidewalk and gutter, the expense of said work to be charged to any available fund for the maintenance of cleaning of highways. He shall then certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property, with the description of said property as assessed on the last preceding assessment roll, and the name or names of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees. occupant or occupants of the property where possible to obtain the same. The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with \$10 penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount of expense incurred by the President of the Borough shall be the covered to the City Chamberlain to be described to the "Special Fund Postor turned over to the City Chamberlain, to be deposited to the "Special Fund, Restoring and Repaving" and credited to the Borough of Richmond.

Sec. 2-All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the

provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3—This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

TRANSACTIONS OF DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES FOR WEEK Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, Harlem River, ENDING JANUARY 30, 1902.

Permits granted, work to be done under supervision of Engineer-in-Chief: A. E. Outerbridge & Co., to enlarge office on Perry Street Pier, No. 47, North river, in accordance with plans submitted.

Brown & Fleming, to dredge under dumping boards foot of West Fifty-fifth street and north of East One Hundred and Twelfth street.

New York Edison Company, to place are light at East Twenty-ninth Street Pier.

Degnon-McLean Contracting Company, to place engine and derrick on bulkhead between Fortieth and Forty-first streets, East river, consent of owner to be first obtained. New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to dredge ferry slips at its Harlem river freight yard.

Alexander M. White, to repair bulkhead foot of Twenty-fourth street, Brooklyn. United States Projectile Company, to construct pier foot of Fifty-third street, Brooklyn, in accordance with plans submitted.

Jamieson & Bond, to construct pier foot of Academy avenue, Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by Engineer-in-Chief, the pier to remain during the pleasure of the Commis-

Permission was granted Requa & Duell to occupy berth for steamer "Armitage Brearley" on north side of Canal Street Pier, south, North river, at rental of \$5 per

The Department of Taxes and Assessments, in response to inquiry, was notified that the bulkhead between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North River, is not city property, but that the land under water in front of the bulkhead is owned by between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, North river, and between Ninety-fourth the city.

The Corporation Counsel was requested to advise the Board as to the ownership of the bulkhead at the foot of Degraw street, Brooklyn, John Lindley, attorney for Harriet S. Ward, having notified the Department that he will not permit John F. Walsh to enter into possession of the premises.

The Harlem Transfer Company was notified that the Commissioner of Docks will lease, assign and farm let unto said company all and singular the bulkhead platform foot of Park avenue, formerly called Railroad avenue, in the Borough of The Bronx, for a term of ten years from March 1, 1902, at an annual rental of \$450, payable quarterly in advance; the offer to be of no force or effect unless accepted within five days and unless the same shall have been first approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution in writing.

Any and all permits heretofore granted for sheds on Pike Slip Pier, west, No. 31, East River, were revoked; and permission was granted the Old Colony Steamboat Company to erect a shed on said pier in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief; provided, however, that said company shall file an agreement that it will at all times keep and maintain the shed and every part thereof in good and sufficient repair and condition, and that if by reason of total or partial destruction through fire, floating ice, collision or the action of the elements, said shed shall require to be rebuilt, the same shall be so rebuilt by and at the expense of said company and in such manner as shall be approved by the Commissioner of Docks; and in case said company shall neglect or refuse to make the repairs thereto for the space of ten days after notice so to do shall have been given by the Commissioner of Docks, said Commissioner may make such repairs and the expense thereof shall be paid by said company; the shed to revert to and become the property of the city in good order and condition at the expiration or sooner termination of the lease of the pier, free from all incumbrances of every kind whatsoever.

The permit granted E. F. McGirr to load manure on float at the West Thirtieth Street Pier was revoked and the Dock Master directed to collect rental for the period during which the pier was occupied at the rate of \$3 per day; and permission was granted said McGirr to load manure on scows at the West Nineteenth Street Pier at a rental of \$5 per day, the privilege to continue at the pleasure of the Com-

The permit granted Timothy McLaughlin to occupy boathouse at foot of Willow avenue, Bronx Kills, was at his request revoked to take effect February 1, 1902; and permission was granted Andrew Woods to maintain the boathouse thereat during the pleasure of the Commissioner, at a rental of \$75 per annum payable monthly in ad-

vance, commencing February 1, 1902. Horgan & Slattery were requested to transmit to this Departme, all plans, specifications and forms of contracts prepared by them as Consulting Architects for the proposed recreation structures, and to discontinue all further work thereon until otherwise notified.

An application of the New York Edison Company to place a supporting pole at the East Tenth Street Pier was denied.

The specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for

repairing the tug pier were approved and ordered printed. The Engineer-in-Chief reported the completion of the East Fifth Street Pier under contract No. 716, January 22, 1902; and the Hazlewood Ice Company was notified that its lease of a portion of the pier would commence on that date.

The Department of Highways was requested to repair the pavement east of Old Slip Pier, west, East river, as recommended by Engineer in Chief.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief:

To order additional dredging in the half slip adjoining the south side of the West Thirty-fifth Street Pier. To order dredging in the half slips adjoining the West Fifty-ninth Street Pier, as

requested by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company. To replace mooring post on Market Slip Pier, east, No. 30, East river.

To replace mooring pile at bulkhead foot of Cherry street, East river, as requested by Lawrence, Son & Gerrish. To replace mooring post foot of One Hundred and Thirty minth street, Harlem

To repair the bulkhead foot of West Avenue, Stanton creek, Borough of Queens, as requested by the Joseph McGee Foundry Company.

To remove the tracks and wires from the pier foot of Broadway, Astoria, Borough of Queens, and to report the cost of the work for collection from William E. Lutjens, said Lutjens having failed to remove the tracks and wires, as ordered December 20, 1901.

The owners were directed to repair the bulkhead and sea wall at the foot of Grand View avenue, and southerly thereof, at Mariner's Harbor, Borough of Richmond, on recommendation of Engineer-in-Chief.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to submit lists of persons eligible for appointment as Divers and Roundsmen.

The action of the Board of Docks in accepting the resignation of Patrick F. Flynn, Laborer, was rescinded, as said Flynn is still employed in the Department.

The following communications were filed:

From the Corporation Counsel: 1. Advising that the Commissioner of Docks cannot grant leases of wharf property unless the same shall have been first approved by resolution in writing by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

2. Advising that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should by resolution in writing, authorize contracts, agreements, deeds, conveyances and leases before advertising when such steps entail an expense upon the city, and that after such instruments have been prepared and advertised and the terms agreed upon or determined, they should be resubmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

3. Advising that no materials nor supplies can be purchased by the Department without first having the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen, requesting information relative to the setting aside of wharf property for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning and the erection of dumping boards thereon. Information fur-

From the Attorney General, stating that he will name a date for a conference with the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Docks relative to applications for grants of land under water.

From James D. Leary, transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of time granted him to May 1, 1902, for the completion of the crib bulkheads, between One under contract No. 710.

The following communications were laid over for consideration:
