Appeal 28 of 1906, New Building, 1906, premises south side of Halsey street, about 100 feet from corner of Bedford avenue, Brooklyn; Axel S. Hedman, architect and appellant.

That, according to Building Code, the building must be fireproof, the area being greater than that allowed for non-fireproof buildings.

Section 32 of the Building Code gives the Board of Examiners power to modify this section in relation to buildings three stories high or less.

To allow partitions and a non-fireproof roof, consisting of wood beams supported

on yellow pine trussed girders.

The building will be only one story high. If fireproof, the cost too great, as it is only a temporary structure.

The Chairman presented and read a communication from the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, relative to renewal of lease of offices occupied by the Board; whereupon, on motion,



The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or

bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
