CIVIL SERVICE MATTERS.

Appointments.

On recommendation of Commissioner Shaw, the following appointments were made, to take effect upon assignment to duty by the Chief Engineer:

Frank Wessells, Jr., No. 201 Union avenue, Peekskill, N. Y., Clerk (first grade); salary, \$30 per month; Chief Engineer's number, 2634 (Civil Service Rule XII, paragraph 7).

Henry M. Speight, No. 9 Foster avenue, Brooklyn, New York, Clerk (first grade); salary, \$300 per annum; Chief Engineer's number, 2655.

William Bernstein, No. 600 Gates avenue, Brooklyn, N. Y., Clerk (first grade); salary, \$300 per annum; Chief Engineer's number, 2641 (to take effect July 22, 1908).

John J. Sullivan, No. 1718 Second avenue, New York City, Clerk (first grade); salary, \$300 per annum; Chief Engineer's number, 2641 (to take effect July 27, 1908).

Warren C. Quick, High Falls, N. Y., Janitor; salary, \$30 per month; Chief Engineer's number, 2652 (Civil Service Rule XII, paragraph 7) (to take effect August 1, 1908).

2640, July 21, 1908, was received from the Chief Engineer, recommending the employment of Milton W. Davenport, No. 42 Camp street, New Britain, Conn., as Bacteriologist, under the provisions of Rule XII, paragraph 6 of the Civil Service Regulations, at a compensation not to exceed \$300 per month, and, on motion, this matter was laid over.

On recommendation of the Chief Engineer, in his communication 2646, July 23, 1908, the Secretary was directed to sign a requisition upon the Municipal Civil Service Commission for a list from which to appoint one Mechanical Draughtsman, with compensation at the rate of \$1,200 per annum.

Chief Engineer's communication 2643, July 23, 1908, recommended that the Secretary be authorized to sign a requisition upon the Municipal Civil Service Commission for a list from which to appoint two Assistant Engineer-Designers, at \$2,100 per annum, and, on motion, this matter was laid over to the next meeting of the Board.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated July 17, 1908, approving the appointment of Edward A. Helmboldt, Clerk. Said communication also granted request of this Board for permission to continue the employment of the temporary Patrolmen on Aqueduct for a period of twenty days, pending the permanent appointment of men to take their places.

On recommendation of Commissioner Shaw, the appointment of James J. Irving, Laborer, made June 16, 1908, was rescinded, as said Irving cannot accept employment at the present time on account of illness (Chief Engineer's communication 2653).

On recommendation of the Chief Engineer in his communication 2654, July 27, 1908, the Secretary was directed to write the Municipal Civil Service Commission to extend its authorization of the employment of the following experts for another year, and at the compensation indicated after each name:

Charles W. Leavitt, Jr., Expert Landscape Engineer, from July 31, 1908, at a compensation not to exceed \$3,000.

Horace Ropes, Expert on Railroad Relocation, from May 9, 1908, at a compensation not to exceed \$2,500.

Promotions.

On motion, the increase of salary of Joseph E. Savage, Examiner of Claims, recommended by Commissioner Shaw, was laid over until the preparation of the schedules of the present salaries of employees and the plan of organization. On this motion Commissioner Shaw voted in the negative.

Leave of Absence.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, approving the leaves of absence heretofore granted to Charles B. Magan, Clerk, and Thomas J. Long, Topographical Draughtsman.

COMMUNICATIONS FROM THE CHIEF ENGINEER.

Weekly Report.

150, July 20, 1908, was filed.

Investigations.

2632, July 21, 1908, which was laid over at the last meeting of the Board, was taken up, and, on motion, authority was granted the Chief Engineer to experiment with stovepipe wells along the conduit lines of the Ridgewood system and in the Borough of Queens, the estimated cost of said work being \$4,000.

Agreement 56.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the recommendation of the Chief Engineer, in his communication 2645, July 27, 1908, the time for the completion of work under Agreement 56, with the Madison Building Company, dated September 9, 1907, for the construction of Section Office 5, near Cold Spring, in the town of Philipstown, Putnam County, New York, is hereby extended to August 1, 1908.

Contract 1.

2647, July 23, 1908, reported in regard to an accident on July 19, 1908, to hole No. 21 in the Hudson River at Storm King, and transmitted copy of report of Division Engineer Swift and blue prints Accession N. H. 401 and 402.

On motion, said communication 2647 and enclosures were referred to the Examiner of Real Estate and Damages to procure the statements in regard to the accident.

Real Estate, Possession, Ashokan Reservoir.

2648, July 27, 1908, in reference to acquiring possession of the real estate in Sections 10 to 14, inclusive, Reservoir Department, was referred to Commissioner Bessel.

Contract 1.

2649, July 25, 1908, in reference to the obstruction of the Hudson River due to the boring of hole No. 23 at Storm King, transmitted copy of letter to F. L. Belknap of the Phoenix Construction Company, copy of letter to the Local Inspectors, United States Steamboat Service, and copy of letter to the various steamboat companies.

On motion, said communication 2649 and copies of letters were filed.

Real Estate, State Lands.

2654, July 27, 1908, in reference to the reported activity on the part of the Forest, Fish and Game Commission in the purchase of land within the limits of the proposed Catskill Park, was referred to Commissioner Chadwick.

Contract 14.

2656, July 27, 1908, reported that there had been transmitted to the Auditor the sum of \$1,040, received as deposits on specifications and drawings of this contract, for the construction of the Wallkill Pressure Tunnel, and that receipt of said sum had been acknowledged by the Auditor.

Contract 6.

2657, July 27, 1908, reported that there had been transmitted to the Auditor the sum of \$90, received as deposits on specifications and drawings of this contract, for the construction of a field office building for Division and Section Engineers, Esopus Division, in the Town of Marbletown, Ulster County, New York, and that receipt of said sum had been acknowledged by the Auditor.

Contract 12.

2658, July 27, 1908, reported that there had been transmitted to the Auditor the sum of \$620, received as deposits on specifications and drawings of this contract, for the construction of the Rondout Pressure Tunnel and one-half of Bonticon Grade Tunnel, and that receipt of said sum had been acknowledged by the Auditor.

Leases.

2659, July 27, 1908, recommended that a lease be entered into with S. R. Waldron for two rooms, respectively 27 feet by 65 feet and 14 feet by 27 feet, known as Halcyon Hall, comprising the entire second floor of the two-story building on the east side of Deer Park avenue, between George street and James street, about 500 feet south of the Long Island Railroad, Babylon, Long Island, and the one-story building, about 35 feet by 100 feet, and an adjoining lot of the same size, situated in the rear of said two-story building, for a period of one year from August 1, 1908, at a rental of \$90 per quarter.

On motion, this matter was referred to Commissioner Shaw, with power to take such action in behalf of the Board as he might deem advisable.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supply, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supply, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to its revocation or consideration of any amount, it be accompanied by a certified check, drawn on one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 426 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be included in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application thereto at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
