Plan No. 918, for five four-story tenements, four 19 feet by 52 feet, and one 24 feet by 52 feet, on lots of the same width respectively and 83 feet deep, on the east side of First avenue, beginning on the southeast corner of One Hundred and Third street, each house to be occupied by eight families.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 26, 1881:

March 26, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,661, as follows, viz.: 5 public buildings, 598 tenement-houses, 130 private dwellings, 83 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 37 stables, 12 slaughter-houses, 1 mill, 45 lodging-houses, I lard-rendering establishment, I sausage factory, I smoke-house, 2 gasmains, 24 sunken and vacant lots, 87 yards, courts, and areas, 132 cellars and basements, 265 wastepipes and drains, 185 privies and water-closets, 14 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 4 cisterns, and 7 other nuisances.

The total number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 569.

During the past week 209 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 54 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from

the Health Officer of the Port.

187 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

During the past week 1,068 pounds of veal was seized, condemned, and sent to the Rendering

Company.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 107 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 101 houses, 101 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc. 30 cases of contagious diseases were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 569 births, 46 still-births, 190 marriages, and 713 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, March 26, 1881; this shows an increase of 85- births, 9 still-births, and 39 deaths, and a decrease of 10 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 19 births, and an increase of 5 still-births, 69 marriages and 170 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 2; scarlatina, 6; croup, 4; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 9; pneumonia, 11; aneurism, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; apoplexy, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and preternatural births, 1; surgical operations, 3; suicides, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 5; diphtheria, 7; whooping cough, 4; erysipelas, 2; typhus fever, 3; typhoid fever, 3; cerebrospinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 15; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoal diseases, 7; inanition, 6; cancer, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; heart diseases, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 1; convulsions, 5; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 1; and drowning, 3. The number of deaths from all diseases of the brain and nervous system, and Bright's disease and nephritis, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 142 were in institutions, 385 in tenement-houses, 172 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 116 on the first, 185 on the second, 149 on the third, 75 on the fourth, 29 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 709 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. were stated to be single, married, widowed, and the condition of was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 713; still-births, 46; bodies in transitu, 23. Of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 67 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 569 births, 190 marriages, 46 still-births, 713 deaths, 23 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 56 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending March 26, 1881, was 375 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.482, the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,938, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.04 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 665 deaths and still-births, or 87.60 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 19; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 276; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 71; Greenwood (undenominational), 60; Lutheran, (undenominational), 98; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 22; Evergreen (undenominational), 56; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 7; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 7.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending March 19, 1881, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 17; Second, 2; Third, 5; Fourth, 11; Fifth, 15; Sixth, 21; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 19; Ninth, 30; Tenth, 28; Eleventh, 28; Twelfth, 48; Thirteenth, 14; Fourteenth, 19; Fifteenth, 16; Sixteenth, 20; Seventeenth, 50; Eighteenth, 33; Nineteenth, 119; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 37; Twenty-second, 56; Twenty-third, 15; Twenty-fourth, 2.

The actual mortality for the week ending March 19, 1881, was 670; this is 143 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 121.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.87 per 1,000 persons living, the population, according to the United States Census of 1880, being 1,200.577

SIR—There were 713 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 26, 1881, which is an increase of 39, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 170 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending March 19, 1881, was 670, which is 121.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.87 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,206,577.

If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and co' letted upon any tax levies in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of th s act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents quired by law to be calculated thereon.
