Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 25, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,648, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 593 tenement-houses, 100 private dwellings, 82 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 23 stores and warehouses, 34 stables, 24 slaughterhouses, 4 lodging-houses, 1 ash and garbage dump, 1 packing house, 1 meat boiling establishment, 1 refinery, 24 sunken and vacant lots, 106 yards, courts, and areas, 135 cellars and basements, 185 waste-pipes and drains, 253 privies and water-closets, 40 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 9 dangerous stairways, 4 smoky chimneys, 5 cesspools, 9 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 573.

During the past week 224 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 108 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

232 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 174 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and iumigated 149 houses, 149 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

30 cases of contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 458 births, 48 still-births, 232 marriages, and 699 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 25, 1881; this shows a decrease of 5 births and an increase of 1 still-birth, 12 marriages, and 62 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 61 births, and 339 deaths, and an increase of 6 still-births and 62 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 13; diphtheria, 11; erysipelas, 2; typhus fever, 4; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; inanition, 4; bronchitis, 4; pneumonia, 14; heart diseases, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 10; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; premature and preternatural births, 4; drowning, 7; while the deaths from measles increased 2; scarlatina 7; croup, 1; whooping cough, 5; malarial fevers, 6; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhœal diseases, 59; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 13; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 9; direct effect of solar heat, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; gastritis, enteritis, and pertonitis, 13; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; and suicide, 1. The number of deaths from typhoid fever, aneurism, and convulsions, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 198 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 268 under two years, 354 under five years, and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 51 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 50.64 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 126 were in institutions, 407 in tenement-houses, 154 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 12 were on the basement floor, 139 on the first, 178 on the second, 128 on the third, 83 on the fourth, 25 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth. 697 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 56 were stated to be single, 126 married, 67 widowed, and the condition of 450 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 699; still-births, 48; bodies in transitu, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 57 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 458 births, 232 marriages, 48 still-births, 699 deaths. 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 78 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 4 transcripts of the birth record, 10 of marriage, and 40 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 25, 1881, was 68.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 20.854, the mean humidity was 63, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 946, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.00 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 657 deaths and still-births, or 87.95 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 262; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 83; Greenwood (undenominational), 51; Lutheran, (undenominational), 128; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 15; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 90.

SIR—There were 699 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 25, 1881, which is an increase of 62, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 496 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. The actual mortality for the week ending June 18, 1881, was 636, which is 100.2 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.64 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,241,253.

CHAPTER 33.

An Act relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the City Record, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of the sact.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of

and eignty, remaining unpated at the date of the passage of the sact.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretolore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of artisting laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property sall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:
