

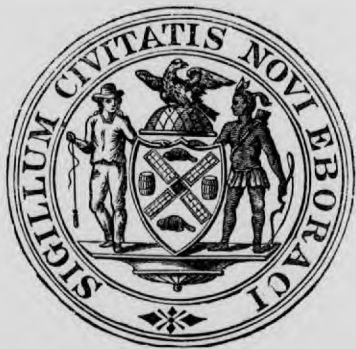

### ASSESSMENT COMMISSION.

No. 280 BROADWAY,  
FRIDAY, December 3, 1886—2 o'clock P. M.

The Commission created by chapter 550 of the Laws of 1880, to revise, vacate, or modify assessments for local improvements in the City of New York, met pursuant to adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.: Commissioners Daniel Lord, Jr. (Chairman), Allan Campbell, Joseph Garry, and John W. Marshall.

The Clerk presented copies of the CITY RECORD and "Daily Register" of December 2 and 3, 1886, showing the publication of notices of the meeting.

The minutes of the meetings held on November 23, 26 and 30, 1886, were read and approved.

The Clerk reported that he had filed in the Finance Department on December 2, 1886, certificates reducing assessments in the cases specified in resolution adopted on November 30, 1886.

#### Calendar.

### HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, November 19, 1886.

The Board met this day.

Charles A. Jackson, counsel for William E. Booraem, appeared before the Board and submitted a statement and affidavits in respect to the manufacture of raisin wine, which were ordered on file, and on motion it was,

Resolved, That the report of the Inspector, of date November 9, upon the so-called wines of W. E. Booraem, which were seized, recommending that such wines be destroyed as unwholesome and injurious to health, is approved, and the opinions expressed in the said report having been agreed with by the examiners Drs. Isham and Linehan who examined the alleged wines pursuant to the provisions of section 42, of the Sanitary Code, the said alleged wines are hereby ordered destroyed, and the Sanitary Superintendent is directed to take the necessary measures to that effect.

Resolved, That the proprietor may be allowed to redistill these wines, to extract the alcohol and application be made therefor, and the Sanitary Superintendent may grant a permit to this end, under proper conditions.

Resolved, That the Attorney and Counsel be and is hereby authorized and directed to discontinue suit with out cost against Dr. Alexander J. Peet for violation of the Sanitary Code, a satisfactory explanation having been made.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending November 20, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 8,183.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 349.

During the past week 167 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 47 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 5 permits.

There were issued under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 77 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 98 visits were made, and 51 disinfections and 13 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital, was 4.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,809 of which 1,275 were primary, and 534 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 10,110 pounds of meat, and 5,280 gallons of wine.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 61, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 142, the number of arrests made was 3.

The certificates of 641 births, 58 still-births, 228 marriages, and 683 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, November 20, 1886. This shows an increase of 49 births and 4 still-births, and a decrease of 132 marriages and 32 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 96 births 126 deaths, and a decrease of 4 still-births and 21 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 6; croup, 14; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 5; malarial fevers, 6; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; heart diseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 12; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 13; apoplexy, 14; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 26; cyanosis and atelectasis, 4; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 2; diphtheria, 7; puerperal diseases, 1; inanition, 4; alcoholism, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; bronchitis, 7; pneumonia, 14; aneurism, 2; convulsions, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 4; premature and pre-natural births, 1; surgical operations, 1; suicide, 3. The number of deaths from whooping-cough, typhoid fever, rheumatism and gout, and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 152 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 204 under two years, 289 under five years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 20 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 42.31 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 133 were in institutions, 405 in tenement-houses, 130 in houses containing three families or less, 9 in hotels and boarding-houses, 4 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 98 on the first, 188 on the second, 129 on the third, 92 on the fourth, 27 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 663 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 20 non-residents; 85 were stated to be single, 165 married, 91 widowed, and the condition of 342 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 683; still-births, 58; bodies in transitu, 19; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 52 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 641 births, 228 marriages, 58 still-births, 683 deaths; 19 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 141 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 8 of marriage, and 79 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending November 20, 1886, was 42.5 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.893; the mean humidity was 64, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,730, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.57 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 645 deaths and still-births, or 87.94 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 24; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 291; City, pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 71; Greenwood (undenominational), 30; Lutheran (undenominational), 103; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 14; Evergreen (undenominational), 36; Woodlawn (undenominational), 20; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 18; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 10; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending November 13, 1886, was 718; this is 160 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1885, and 124.6 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.66 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,454,068.

## NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
