

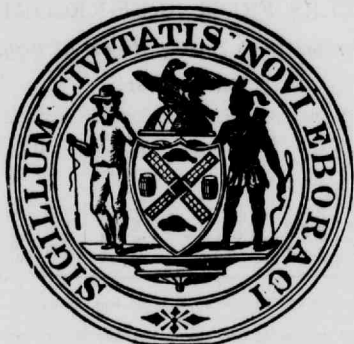

DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC PARKS.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending August 9, 1879.

Meeting held Wednesday, August 6, 1879.

Present—Commissioners Wenman, Wetmore, Conover, and Lane.

At nine o'clock, the Comptroller of the City being present, the bids for laying new and repairing old walks in the City Hall Park with cement, Neufchatel or other pavement, were received and opened. The Comptroller of the City having retired, the following communications were received:

From Topographical Engineer, presenting plan of streets, roads, and avenues, etc., in the West Farms District of the Twenty-fourth Ward.

Whereupon the President offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That under and by virtue of the powers conferred on the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks of the City of New York, by chapter 604 of the Laws of 1874, they do hereby lay out the streets, roads, and avenues, and public parks, or places within that portion of the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York included between the Bronx river, Webster avenue, Fordham and Pelham avenues, Hoffman street, Fordham or Third avenue, and by adopted streets, roads, and avenues, defining a line about 400 to 1,300 feet north of the line of the Twenty-third Ward, shown on a map or plan entitled "Plan of Streets, Roads and Avenues, and Public Parks or Places in the West Farms District" of the Twenty-fourth Ward of the City of New York, dated "New York, June 27, 1879," and signed "Julius Munckwitz, Superintending Architect, Department Public Parks," and "E. B. Van Winkle, Topographical Engineer, Department Public Parks," of the widths, extent, and direction that said streets, roads, and avenues, and public parks and places, are designated on said map or plan, the same being such as the said Commissioners or a majority of them, deem most conducive to the public good; and that the President of the Department cause the said several streets, roads, and avenues, and public parks or places, to be surveyed and designated by proper monuments where the same are not already so designated, and also cause three similar maps or plans of the same to be prepared and submitted to this Board, to be filed in pursuance of said law above mentioned. Adopted.

From E. C. Morrison, presenting bill for Surveyor's fees on Concord avenue. Referred to Auditing Committee.

From Department of Docks, asking permission to lay drain-pipe from Pier 1, North river, across Battery, to connect with sewer. On motion of Commissioner Conover, granted.

From L. P. di Cesnola, Director of Metropolitan Museum of Art, presenting requisition for racks and brackets. On motion of Commissioner Wenman, requisition approved, and purchase of articles authorized.

From Engineer of Construction, presenting plans, profiles, and specifications for sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-third street, with branches in Lincoln, Alexander, and Willis avenues. On motion of Commissioner Wenman, said plans and specifications approved.

On motion of Commissioner Wenman, the action of the Board of Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, awarding contract for glass to Messrs. Holbrook & Bros., as lowest bidders, was approved.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to W. B. Smith to pave the sidewalk a space ten feet wide, with Belgian blocks, in front of his premises, Nos. 745 and 747 Water street; also to Wm. O'Connor & Sons to pave the sidewalk in like manner, in front of their premises, Nos. 740 and 742 Water street; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James H. McMillen and Joseph D. Billard, Jr., to erect and retain a platform scale for the weighing of ice, coal, etc., at the foot of West Fifty-seventh street, 325 feet west of Eleventh avenue, the work to be done at their own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 22, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, August 4, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby granted to Michael Murphy to erect a watering-trough for the use of horses in front of his premises, No. 77 Watts street, corner Greenwich, said trough to be five feet long and two feet wide, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense; the permission to continue during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 22, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, August 4, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to J. Gall & Co. to place and keep a stepping-stone on the sidewalk, near the curb-stone, in front of No. 21 Union square, not to exceed two feet in height, two feet and six inches in length, and two feet in width, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 22, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, August 4, 1879.

Whereas, In the work of reconstructing the elevated railroad on Greenwich street, now in progress, the old material and the new is piled in such quantities, not only in Greenwich street, but also in many of the intersecting streets, that they are nearly impassable, and, as a consequence, great annoyance and frequently loss and damage is inflicted upon those of our citizens who are compelled to travel in said streets, whether as pedestrians or in vehicles, and is in violent conflict with the rights of all our citizens to the free uses of the streets of this city; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized and directed to prevent any unnecessary or avoidable impediment or obstruction to the free use of Greenwich street by the New York or any other railroad company, and to prevent any obstruction or incumbrance whatever by any such elevated railroad company of any of the streets intersecting Greenwich street; that he report immediately every violation of the ordinances of the city, or this resolution, to the Corporation Attorney for prosecution, and that he take whatever measures he may deem necessary and exercise the full power conferred upon him by law or ordinance, to prevent such unnecessary or avoidable obstruction of Greenwich street, or any incumbrance or obstruction whatever of any of the streets intersecting Greenwich street by the New York Elevated or any other railroad company.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, July 22, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, August 4, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to P. McNevin & Co. to place and keep a sign at No. 68 Chatham street, said sign to be not more than 6 by 4 feet, and to be placed on the Duane street entrance of said premises; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.
