Resolved, That the contract opened this day for preparing for and laying second-hand Belgian block pavement on the new-made land in rear of the bulkhead-wall at West Twenty-third street Section, on the North river, in the vicinity of Piers, new 53 and 54, under Contract No. 482, be and hereby is awarded to John Slattery, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Inasmuch as John C. Orr, Bell Bros. and the Yellow Pine Company, have relinquished all claim to the contract for furnishing sawed spruce timber to this Department, under Contract No. 484, for which their bids at the public letting held this day were a tie with that of the East River Mill and Lumber Company; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for furnishing sawed spruce timber, under Contract No. 484, be and hereby is awarded to the East River Mill and Lumber Company, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for removing the present platform and for preparing for and building a new wooden pier and approach with appurtenances, including a sewer box, at the foot of East Sixty-second street, East river, be and hereby is awarded to Barth. S. Cronip, he being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties by the Comptroller.

Augustus W. Cruikshank, agent, appeared respecting the purchase of the north half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river.

On motion, the following preambles and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, Under section 715 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, the Board of the Department of Docks of the City of New York is authorized to acquire by purchase in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, wharf property in said city, and all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and agree with the owners thereof upon a price for the same, and in case of failure to so agree to initiate legal proceedings to acquire the same for the improvement of the water-front of said City; and

Whereas, Said Board is desirous of acquiring in the name and for the benefit of the Corporation of the City of New York, in fee simple, all riparian and wharfage rights, and all interest in or appurtenant to the following described premises, to wit: the half block bounded by Thirteenth avenue, Bethune street, West street, and the middle of the block between Bethune and Bank streets, together with all water rights in front of same; and

Whereas, It appears that Augustus W. Cruikshank is agent for the owners in fee simple of the above described premises, with all hereditaments and easements therewith connected.

Resolved, That this Board offers to purchase the above described premises and pay for a good and sufficient title thereof, to be approved by the Counsel to the Corporation of the City of New York, the sum of four hundred and fifty thousand (\$450,000) dollars, subject to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as prescribed by law; and

Resolved, That a copy of these preambles and resolutions be served upon the said Augustus W. Cruikshank, agent, as aforesaid, and he be and hereby is requested within ten days from receipt hereof to notify this Board in writing whether he will sell the rights and interests in above described premises to the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, for the price above named; and in the event that he shall fail to notify this Board of his willingness to so

convey the rights and interests as aforesaid, it shall be deemed that no price can be agreed upon for the purchase of said premises between the said owners thereof and this Department.

The communication from the Fire Department requesting a berth for the fire-boat "William F. Havemeyer" at Pier 55, East river, was tabled for three weeks.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

Cusick & Ryan—To unload one boatload of sand at the bulkhead between Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets, East river.

Knickerbocker Steamboat Company—To berth one of the steamboats of the Albany Day Line at the foot of West Fiftieth street; compensation therefor to be fixed by the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—To replace the pontoon under the Freight Transfer Bridge foot of West Sixty-eighth street.

Department of Public Charities and Correction—To erect a waiting-room about 10 x 15 feet on the Pier foot of East Sixty-fourth street; said structure to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Board.

From the Department of Public Charities and Correction—Requesting the removal of the float from the foot of Eighty-sixth street to One Hundred and Twentieth street, East river.

The Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work.

From the West Shore Railroad Company—Requesting information respecting the renewal of its lease of the Pier foot of West Thirty-sixth street.

On motion, said company was requested to advise the Board whether it will consent to a cancellation of said lease.

From the White Star Line—Complaining of inadequate accommodations at the piers now occupied by them and requesting to be advised when new piers will be built north of West Tenth street. The Secretary directed to reply.

From the New York Building and Contracting Company—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of Contract No. 468.

On motion, the time was extended to October 4, 1894, provided the written consent of the sureties be filed in this office.

From Olcott & Olcott, attorneys—Declining the offer of the 27th ultimo, for the purchase of the south half of the block between Bank and Bethune streets, North river.
