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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

At an adjourned meeting of the Board of Docks, held Monday, August 13, 1900, at 2 o'clock P. M.

Present—Commissioners Meyer and Murphy.

Absent—President Cram.

The Board proceeded to open estimates on Contract No. 691, received August 6, 1900, a representative of the Comptroller being present; the bids being as follows:

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the contract opened this day for furnishing about 10,000 barrels of Portland cement, under Contract No. 691, be and hereby is awarded to the John P. Kane Company, said company being the lowest bidder, subject to the approval of the sureties, The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, by the Comptroller.

The Board then took a recess and reconvened at 2.15 P. M.

The minutes of the meetings held July 2, 3, 6, 13 and 23, and August 6, 1900, were approved.

John J. Reilly appeared and submitted an application for permission to erect an ice bridge scales and tally-house on the bulkhead adjoining the south side of the pier foot of West Fifty-fourth street. He was informed that the bulkhead between Fifty-second and Fifty-fourth streets, North river, has been set aside for the exclusive use of canal-boats.

The communication from the Engineer-in-Chief recommending that the new pier at the foot of Pike slip, East river, be shedded to provide accommodation for the business in that locality during the construction of the various new piers along the East river, was again tabled for one month.

The communication from the Bridgeport Steamboat Company requesting a ten years' lease of Pier, new 32, East river, with the adjoining bulkhead, with the privilege of a renewal term and of shedding the pier and bulkhead, was also tabled for one month.

The following reports on Secretary's Orders were referred to the Treasurer for collection.

No. 19964, submitting cost of replacing asphalt pavement where taken up to permit repairs to the suction pipe in front of Pier, new 50, North river, amounting to \$84, for collection from James Armstrong.

No. 20035, submitting cost of making necessary repairs to Pier 60, and to the bulkhead between Piers 60 and 61, East river, amounting to \$418.44, for collection from John A. McCarthy.

No. 20125, submitting cost of driving bearing and spring piles at Whitestone Landing, Long Island, amounting to \$120.50, for collection from John Stimmel.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From O'Brien & Ryder—Requesting permission to lay a salt-water pipe through the bulkhead in front of Pier, new 45, North river.

From the Degnon-McLean Contracting Company—Requesting permission to repair Pier, old 28, East river, and to construct a fence, watchman's shanty and dump on said pier, to be used in removing material excavated for the Rapid Transit tunnel.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board.

James J. Duffy, to maintain hoisting engine on the bulkhead between Piers 9 and 10, East river.

American Transit Company, to place and maintain a derrick, tally-house and tool-chest on the westerly side of Pier, new 5, East river.

Murray's Line, to place and maintain a tally-house, tool-boxes, scales and frames for canvas covers and two derricks, at the outer end of Pier, new 5, East river.

Erie and Western Transportation Company, to place and maintain two derricks, tally-house and tool-box on the easterly side of Pier, new 5, East river.

Metropolitan Street Railway Company, to use and occupy the new made land between Fiftyth and Fifty-second streets, North river; between Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, North river, and between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, and at the bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river. The compensation for the parcels between West Fiftyth and Fifty-second streets, between West Fifty-fifth and Fifty-sixth streets, and foot of East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, to be at the rate of \$1,000 per annum for each parcel, and for the parcel between West One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, at the rate of \$600 per annum, all to commence as of June 1, 1900, the date on which the company took possession of the premises, said compensation to be paid quarterly at the end of each quarter to the Treasurer.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to repair Pier 25, East river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Staten Island Rapid Transit Railroad Company, to repair the pavement in front of Pier, old 27, East river.

John J. O'Hare, to dredge in front of the bulkhead between Houston and Third streets, East river.

Sound View Land and Improvement Company, to construct a bulkhead at its property on the easterly side of the Bronx river, opposite Hunt's Point, to place filling in rear of same to provide access thereto, and to dredge in front thereof, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Standard Oil Company, to repair the pier foot of Eighth street, Long Island City, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Mrs. Alexa C. Bowden, to construct a bulkhead in front of her property in the vicinity of Jamaica avenue, Borough of Queens, and to fill in the land under water in rear of same, the work to be done in accordance with plans and specifications to be hereafter submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

Townsend & Downey Ship Building and Repair Company, to construct a pier at its property at Shooter's Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

The following permits were granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Horse Manure Company, to repair the pier foot of West Forty-fifth street from time to time when necessary, to December 31, 1900, the work to be kept within existing lines, and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any repairs.

New York and Boston Dyewood Company, to place a backing log on the bulkhead easterly of Greene street, Greenpoint, Borough of Brooklyn, and to erect a shed over the scales on the pier recently constructed 194 feet easterly of said street.

Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, to construct a coal dock in front of its property between Nicholas and Henry streets, St. George, Staten Island, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

The United Electric Light and Power Company, to run two injection pipes with an overflow through the bulkhead and for a distance of 150 feet under the pier at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street, in accordance with plans submitted.

The following communications were ordered on file:

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting certified copies of resolutions adopted by said Commissioners approving the agreement entered into by the Board of Docks with James Keese for the purchase of his forty-eight feet of bulkhead westerly of the westerly line of Clinton street, East river; and disapproving the agreements with James G. Wallace for the purchase of his property between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, North river, and with Maurice D. Barry for the purchase of his pier at the foot of Jackson street, East river.

From the President of the Borough of Queens—Requesting that the sewer-pier at the foot of Broadway, Astoria, be made available for use as a public dock, and also requesting a list of water-front property owned by the City in the Borough of Queens. Secretary directed to furnish the desired list of water-front property, and to state that if the Department of Sewers will place a deck over the pier at the foot of Broadway, Astoria, this Department will do the necessary dredging thereat.

From the Comptroller—

1st. Approving sureties on Contract No. 686, for building Pier, new 31, East river, and Contract No. 688, for building a freight shed on Pier, new 4, East river.

2d. In relation to substitution of surety on Contract No. 683.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted for the substitution of Joseph Schaeffler as surety in the place of William Moller on the estimate of Charles S. Hirsch & Co. for furnishing sawed yellow pine timber, under Contract No. 683.

3d. Advising that the sum of \$100,000 has been deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund, being the proceeds of three per cent bonds sold at par.

4th. Transmitting copy of report of the Auditing Bureau of the Finance Department, disallowing the claim of Albert H. Hastorf for \$1,000 damages for the destruction of the dumping board, formerly occupied by him on the pier foot of One Hundred and Tenth street, Harlem river.

5th. In relation to the claim of William Ryan for wages as Dock Builder for the time during which he was engaged in the Spanish-American war, and requesting that pay-rolls be drawn for the wages of John De Temple and William Ryan as Dock Builders for such time. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary pay-rolls.

6th. Requesting information in relation to the action brought by Barth S. Cronin for the sum of \$200, the amount retained by the City under the contract for the erection of the pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn. Secretary directed to state that said pier was built under the supervision of the former Department of Public Works of the City of Brooklyn, the pier having been completed before the consolidation of the various boroughs of Greater New York.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. Approving form of Contract No. 691, for furnishing cement.

2d. Approving the bonds of the Uvalde Asphalt Paving Company for the maintenance of its asphalt pavement, between Piers, old 42 and new 36, North river, and between Harrison street and Pier, new 25, North river.

3d. Transmitting bills of costs in proceedings for the acquisition of water-front property, between Watts and Canal streets, North river; at Pier, old 39, East river, and adjoining bulkhead, and between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, Harlem river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the necessary requisitions therefor.

4th. Requesting map of premises between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Second streets, easterly of First avenue, on the Harlem river. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief in furnishing same approved.

5th. Requesting six copies of map of the property to be acquired from the Screw Dock Company at Pier 39, East river. The action of the Engineer-in-Chief in furnishing same approved.

From the Department of Health—Requesting the removal of the hydrant now located at the foot of Sixteenth street, East river. The action of the Secretary in replying that this Department has no objection to the removal of said hydrant, but that the matter is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Water Supply, approved.

From the Fire Department—Requesting that repairs be made to the fire-boat dock at the Battery wall south of Pier "A," North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to make necessary repairs thereto.

From the Department of Highways—Transmitting complaint from the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company in relation to the condition of the pavement at the entrance to the pier foot of West Twentieth street. The action of the Secretary in replying that the premises where repairs are necessary, are on Thirteenth avenue and under the jurisdiction of the Department of Highways, approved.

From the Department of Bridges—In relation to the construction of the proposed bridge in the vicinity of Borden avenue, Dutch Kills canal. Action of Secretary in again requesting said Department to submit a plan showing the location of the proposed bridge pier and centre pin, approved.

From the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company—Consenting as surety on the leases of Piers, new 25 and new 38, North river, to the extension of said piers.

From W. G. Triest—Transmitting the consent of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and The City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company of Philadelphia, as sureties, to the extension of time granted to June 24, 1900, for the completion of the work of building the recreation structure on the pier foot of North Second street, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the American Bonding and Trust Company and the Union Surety and Guaranty Company—Consenting as sureties to the extension of time granted to July 16, 1900, for the completion of the work of furnishing cement under Contract No. 675.

From the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company and the American Bonding and Trust Company—Consenting as sureties to the extension of time granted to August 30, 1900, for the completion of the work of dredging north of West Thirty-fourth street, on the North river, under Contract No. 677.

From the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company—Agreeing that if by judicial proceedings it shall be determined that the City has title to the land under water covered by the proposed extension to Pier "I," at the foot of West Seventieth street, said company will then pay the City the sum of ten cents per square foot per annum as rental for such land under water, and will also pay four per cent. interest on said rental from the date the extension is completed. The action of the Secretary in replying that said agreement is satisfactory to the Board, approved.

From the New York Harbor Line Board—In relation to the application of this Department for permission to construct a platform for the protection of an intake pipe at the foot of Thirty-ninth street, East river, together with the report of the Engineer-in-Chief stating that the proposed protecting platform will not be necessary, as the New York Electric-Light, Heat and Power Company does not now desire to extend the intake pipe beyond the bulkhead line.

From William Ziegler—Transmitting notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water at Powell's Cove, East river, adjoining his uplands at Whitestone, in the Borough of Queens.

From the Undine Fishing Club—Transmitting notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water adjoining Horse Island, at Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens.

From the Manhattan State Hospital—Protesting against the establishment of a dump for manure at the foot of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, Harlem river. Secretary directed to state that no application for permission to place a manure dump at said locality has been received.

From John C. Rodgers—Requesting permission to use and occupy temporarily the pier constructed by him at the foot of Farragut street, Hunt's Point, Borough of the Bronx. The action of the Board of July 23, 1900, ordering the removal of said pier was rescinded, and permission granted John C. Rodgers, to use and occupy the pier during the pleasure of the Board, the compensation for the land under water owned by the City and covered by said pier to be fixed by the Treasurer.

From residents in the vicinity of Port Richmond, Borough of Richmond, requesting that a pier be built at the foot of Van Pelt avenue, Mariners' Harbor, Port Richmond, Staten Island.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to construct a pier in front of that portion of Van Pelt avenue, Mariners' Harbor, Port Richmond, which is now owned by the City, said pier to cost not over \$1,000.

From John D. Kernan—Requesting information in relation to the wharfage facilities along the water-front of the Port of New York. The action of the Secretary in furnishing same approved.

From Willson, Adams & Co.—Reporting damage to their truck on Pier 9, East river. Secretary directed to state that said pier is private property.

From William Simonson, John Porth and Van Orden Brothers—Requesting that this Department drive protecting piles for their boats in the oyster basin at the foot of Gansevoort street, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to drive the necessary piles.

From the Reedy Elevator Company—Requesting information as to when the improvements to the water-front north of West Washington Market, on the North river, will be commenced. Action of the Secretary in replying that the improvement will be made as soon as the property can be acquired by the City, approved.

From James Daly—In relation to the work done in connection with the construction of Piers, new 4 and 5, East river. Secretary directed to state that the piers have been constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications therefor.

From the New York Produce Exchange—Requesting a modification of Rule 18 of the Rules and Regulations of this Department as amended July 2, 1900, to permit the temporary storage of commercial fats and oils on the piers and bulkheads. Application denied.

From J. B. Simon—Requesting permission to place slot machines on the Battery landing. Application denied.

From William P. Geraghty—Requesting permission to place a movable stand, three feet square, in front of the Barclay Street ferry on the North river. Application denied.

From C. Schuler—Requesting permission to maintain a fruit stand at the foot of Fourteenth street, North river. Application denied.

From Brown & Fleming—
1st. Requesting permission to erect a dumping-board on the pier foot of Seventy-ninth street, North river, or on the adjoining bulkhead. Application denied, there being a dump now located on said pier.

2d. Requesting permission to erect a dumping board on the bulkhead at Ninety-eighth street, North river. Secretary directed to state that the premises in question are under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Parks.

From John P. Kane Company—Requesting that the payment of rental for the new-made land in the rear of the bulkhead north of Ninety-sixth street, North river, be suspended from August 1, 1900, until the completion of the work of paving thereat. Application denied, and the Secretary directed to state that the work of paving is to be done in such a manner as not to interfere with access to the new-made land in question.

From Nesmith Brothers—Requesting a lease of the south half of Pier 12, East river. Application denied and the Secretary directed to state that it is the intention of the Board to maintain said premises for open wharfage.

From Mrs. T. A. S. Sheridan—Requesting permission to load scows with cellar dirt temporarily, at the bulkhead foot of East One Hundred and Eleventh street, Harlem river. Application denied.

From Samuel Green—Requesting permission to construct a temporary platform on the southerly half of the bulkhead between One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, Harlem river, for the purpose of dumping cellar dirt thereat. Application denied.

From the North German Lloyd Steamship Company—Requesting that the permit to extend Piers 24 and 26 at the property of the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company, Borough of Brooklyn, be amended in order to allow the extension of said piers for a distance of 35 instead of 20 feet.

On motion, the permit granted July 23, 1900, to extend said piers was amended in accordance with the following resolution:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted Oelrichs & Co. to extend Piers 24 and 26, East river, between Warren and Amity streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, at the property owned by the Brooklyn Wharf and Warehouse Company, and leased to the North German Lloyd Steamship Company, the piers to be extended for a distance of about thirty-five feet outshore from the present outer ends thereof; provided the owners of the piers in question shall file with this Department an agreement that in the event of the City being awarded the present ungranted land under water thereat, said owners shall pay to the City a rental of twenty-five cents per square foot per annum for such land under water as may be covered by said proposed extensions from the date the extensions are made; all the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and in accordance with plans and specifications to be first submitted to and approved by him.

From the Dock Superintendent—Reports for the three weeks ending August 4, 1900.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

1st. Report for the year ending December 31, 1899.

2d. Report for the quarter ending June 30, 1900.

3d. Reports for the three weeks ending August 4, 1900.

4th. Recommending that the Department of Highways be requested to relay the pavement on the westerly side of West street, in the vicinity of Barclay and Warren streets, North river, to conform to the grade of the pavement on the marginal street thereat. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Reporting that the Consolidated Ice Company has failed to remove the fence and ice bridge from the foot of Bond street, Brooklyn and recommending that unless same be removed by said company within ten days, that the work be done by the force of this Department, the cost thereof to be reported for collection from said company. Recommendation adopted.

6th. Recommending that the permit granted T. C. Eastman, June 11, 1884, to maintain a float and bridge immediately south of the pier foot of Fifty-ninth street, North river, be revoked, and that said Eastman be directed to remove same in order that the work of building the new pier and bulkhead-wall thereat, may be proceeded with. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Recommending that the lessee be directed to make necessary repairs to the pier foot of Sixteenth street, North river, and to the dumping-board located thereon. Recommendation adopted.

8th. Recommending that the lessee be directed to repair and repaint the roof of the shed on Pier, new 1, North river. Recommendation adopted.

9th. Reporting damage to the pier foot of East One Hundred and Twelfth street, Harlem river, by the Transfer Boat No. 5, owned by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company, and recommending that necessary repairs be made thereto by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of said company. Recommendation adopted.

10th. Reporting damage to Pier, new 43, North river, by the steamer "William V. Wilson," and recommending that repairs be made thereto by the force of this Department at the cost and expense of Benjamin Griggs, owner of said steamer. Recommendation adopted.

11th. Recommending that plans and specifications be prepared for paving about 600 square yards of pavement in a strip about 36 feet wide, extending from the bulkhead to the westerly line of the right of way of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company, at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river, the southerly side of the pavement to be on the southerly building line of Ninety-sixth street, the work to be done under Treasurer's Order. Recommendation adopted.

12th. Recommending that an additional steam-launch be constructed by the force of the Department, to be used in connection with the work now being done along the water-front under the new plan. Recommendation adopted.

13th. Recommending that one of the rooms on the southerly side of the lower deck of the recreation pier at the foot of East Third street, be prepared for use as a Dock Master's office, and that the present unattached office thereat be removed. Recommendation adopted.

14th. Reporting washout in the rear of the wall at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, Harlem river, and recommending that the premises be refilled and that the pavement thereat be relaid by the force of the Department. Recommendation adopted.

15th. Recommending that temporary repairs be made by the force of the Department to the pier at the foot of Forty-seventh street, North river, from time to time, in order to keep said pier in a safe condition until such time as the contract is awarded for the permanent repairs thereto. Recommendation adopted.

16th. Recommending that necessary repairs be made by the force of the Department to the pier at the foot of Fifth street, East river, to the pavement at the foot of East Sixty-fourth street, and to the pavement at the foot of East Seventy-eighth street. Recommendation adopted.

17th. Reporting repairs required to the sewer at the foot of Ninety-sixth street, North river, and to the pavement on top of same, at a point about eighty feet from the present existing bulkhead, and recommending that the necessary repairs be made thereat. Recommendation adopted.

18th. Submitting specifications and form of contract for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the specifications and form of contract submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief or dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan, Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, to the extent of about one hundred thousand cubic yards, be and hereby are approved, subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel as to form, and the Secretary be and hereby is directed to have a sufficient number of blank forms of contract printed and proper advertisements inviting estimates inserted in the newspapers designated by law.

19th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 19805, stating that the dangerous portion of the property between One Hundred and Twenty-fourth and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, Harlem river, has been fenced off by the lessee of the premises.

20th. Report on Secretary's Order No. 20081, stating that repairs will not be required to the deck of the pier at the foot of East Thirty-eighth street, the Department of Street Cleaning having constructed a new dumping-board over the area proposed to be repaired.

The Treasurer, Commissioner Murphy, submitted his report of receipts for the six (6) weeks ending August 10, 1900, amounting to \$420,495.52, which was received and ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The Auditing Committee submitted a report of one hundred and fourteen bills or claims, amounting to \$224,571.51, which had been approved and audited. The report was ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

The action of the Secretary in requesting the Department of Water Supply to make necessary repairs to the water-gates or hydrants between Piers 4 and 5, North river, and at the foot of Clarkson street, North river, was approved.

The Secretary reported that the pay-roll for the month of July, 1900, amounting to \$22,025.80 ; for the week ending July 27, 1900, amounting to \$14,815.89 ; for the week ending August 3, 1900, amounting to \$15,446.15, and for the week ending August 10, 1900, amounting to \$15,525.99, had been approved, audited and transmitted to the Department of Finance for payment.

No. 20254. Submitting cost of driving piles at the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, amounting to \$94.02, for collection from the Hudson Boat Club.

No. 20240. Submitting cost of replacing piles at the new timber basin, between Forty-third and Forty-fourth streets, South Brooklyn, where damaged by the tugboat "Katie D.," amounting to \$44.76, for collection from the Dalzell Towing Line.

The following communications were also referred to the Treasurer:

From the Hecker-Jones-Jewell Milling Company—Requesting permission to run a condenser pipe through the bulkhead and under the Pier, new 32, East river.

From the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company—Requesting permission to lay a cable conduit under Newtown creek, between Oakland street, Greenpoint, and East avenue, Long Island City.

The following permit was granted, to continue during the pleasure of the Board:

J. L. Keating & Co.—To unload sand on the bulkhead south of Canal street, North river; the usual rate of compensation to be paid therefor to the Dock Master.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

New York Steam Company, to repair the bulkhead south of Pier, old 6, North river, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Consolidated Gas Company, to repair the gas-pipe at the foot of Desbrosses street, North river, all pavement to be taken up and relaid by this Department at the cost and expense of said company.

Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, to drive a cluster of piles at the outer southerly corner of Pier, new 56, North river, and to repair the sheathing on said pier, the work to be kept within existing lines.

John S. Bush, to place filling on his property at Fort Schuyler road, Westchester creek, Borough of The Bronx, in accordance with plans to be hereafter approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company, to drive 16 fender piles at its Oak Point freight yard, about 200 feet west of Cabot street, Borough of The Bronx, the work to be kept within existing lines.

Pennsylvania Railroad Company, to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to Pier, old 1, south side of Pier, old 2, Piers 4, 5 and 16, and to the Cortlandt street station on the North river, and to Pier 1, at the Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

Brooklyn Ferry Company of New York, to make general repairs during the ensuing six months to its ferry premises at Roosevelt, Grand, East Tenth and East Twenty-third streets, Borough of Manhattan, and foot of Greenpoint avenue, Grand street, and between South Sixth and South Ninth streets, Borough of Brooklyn; the work to be kept within existing lines and at least twenty-four hours' notice to be given the Engineer-in-Chief before the commencement of any such repairs.

New York and Staten Island Electric Company, to remove its storehouse from its present location at Richmond terrace to a point between Bard and Davis avenues, New Brighton, Staten Island, and to construct a temporary platform thereat, in accordance with plans to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief.

2d. Advising that his certificates have been indorsed upon Contracts Nos. 683, 684, 685, 686, 687, 688 and 689, and that same are now valid contracts.

3d. Advising that on August 13, 1900, proceeds from the sale of additional Dock Bonds, to the amount of \$200,000, and that on August 20, 1900, the sum of \$250,000, proceeds from the sale of Corporate Stock, were deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund.

From the Corporation Counsel—Approving form of Contract No. 693.

From the Department of Public Charities—Requesting that repairs be made to the float at the landing at Randall's Island. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

From the Bureau of Municipal Statistics—Requesting certain information respecting the length of water-front, number of piers, etc., in the various boroughs comprising Greater New York. Secretary directed to furnish same.

From the President of the Borough of Queens—Transmitting copy of communication from the Department of Sewers, stating that the pier at the foot of Broadway, Astoria, Borough of Queens, has been rebuilt and decked, and requesting that dredging be done thereat.

On motion, the Engineer-in-Chief was directed to order dredging thereat, the work to be done under Treasurer's order.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—Transmitting certified copy of resolution adopted by said Commissioners at meeting held August 8, 1900; which was ordered to be spread in full on the minutes, as follows:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue, from time to time, as may be required, Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to the amount of one million five hundred thousand dollars, the proceeds whereof shall be applied to the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks and Ferries."

From the West End Association—Protesting against the erection of a dumping-board by William J. Kidney on the pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street. Secretary directed to state that said permit is not, in the opinion of the Board, any violation of law, and that said dump is necessary in order that the disposal of material excavated for the underground railroad may be facilitated.

From the Long Island Railroad Company—Requesting repairs to the sewer underneath the ferry house at James Slip, East river. Secretary directed to refer the application to the Department of Sewers.

From Naughton & Co.—Requesting that the over-delivery of piles made by them at West Seventy-fifth street, be loaded on catamarans for removal at their cost and expense. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work and to report cost for collection from the applicants.

From Captain C. H. Holmes—Requesting permission to cut gangway on the southerly side of Pier, new 34, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work and to report cost for collection.

From the Bouker Contracting Company—Requesting a berth for loading cellar dirt in the vicinity of Seventy-ninth street, North river. Application denied.

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of dredging at the Rutgers Street Section, on the East river, under Contract No. 652, Morris & Cummings Dredging Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to November 1, 1900, the written consent of the sureties on said contract having been filed in this Department.

From Travers Brothers Company—Requesting an extension of time to August 22, 1900, on Contract No. 681.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the time for the completion of the work of delivering rope, under Contract No. 681, Travers Brothers Company, contractors, be and hereby is extended to and including August 22, 1900, provided the written consent of the sureties on said contract is filed in this Department.

From the Dock Superintendent—

Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair.

3d. Reporting the completion of the work of building Pier, new 32, East river, under Contract No. 676, August 25, 1900; of delivering Manila rope, under Contract No. 681, August 22, 1900; and the commencement of the work of building Pier, new 5, Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn, under Contract No. 687, August 17, 1900.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to notify the Dock Master to collect wharfage at Pier, new 32, East river.

4th. Recommending the replacing of mooring-post on the bulkhead at Fifty-fourth street, East river. Recommendation adopted.

5th. Reporting damage to the extension to Pier, new 41, North river, by the tug "Ithaca" of the Lehigh Valley Railroad Company. Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair and report the cost for collection from said company.

6th. Recommending that a renewal order be issued for repairs to the various recreation piers on the North and East rivers, at an aggregate cost not to exceed \$1,000. Recommendation adopted.

7th. Reporting repairs required to the pavement on the new-made land between the southerly side of Pier, new 20, produced, and the northerly side of Pier, new 22, produced, on the North river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Engineer-in-Chief be and hereby is directed to prepare plans and specifications for repairing the pavement on the newly-made land between the southerly side of Pier, new 20, North river, produced, inshore, and the northerly side of Pier, new 22, produced, comprising an area of about nine thousand two hundred square yards, by covering same with asphalt, and that the Treasurer be and hereby is authorized to issue an order for said work in accordance with said plans and specifications.
