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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week Ending Saturday, October 25, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Comptroller—
1st. Stating that his certificates were attached to Contract No. 750 and Contract No. 751, class I.
2d. Approving sureties on Contract No. 754.
3d. Requesting information relative to claims filed by Horgan & Slattery for services rendered in connection with preparation of plans for recreation buildings at Pier, new 30, East river, at the foot of East Forty-ninth street and foot of West Thirtieth street.

From the Corporation Counsel, approving amended form of lease for the privilege of maintaining a dumping-board on the Pier foot of West Forty-seventh street to Alexander Crawford Chenoweth.

From the Fire Department, requesting repairs to Pier foot of Grand street and the cutting of a runaway thereat. Engineer-in-Chief directed to do the work.

From the Department of Public Charities, requesting modification of plan of proposed Pier to be erected in the vicinity of Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island, by providing two sluiceways instead of one. Granted.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—
1st. Stating that under rule 38 of the Civil Service Rules the Department may hold an examination for promotion of Hiram C. Calkins, Assistant Engineer, from sixth to eighth grade. Notified that the Engineer-in-Chief reported that Hiram C. Calkins passed examination.

2d. Submitting list of persons eligible for appointment as Machinists. Bauer and John J. Cronin appointed with compensation at the rate of forty-three cents per hour while employed.

From the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, requesting paving at the approach to dumping-board between Stanton and Rivington streets and repairs to bulkhead. Ordered.

From Jacob A. Cantor, attorney for American Malting Company, stating that the ice-bridge at the foot of East Sixty-third street will be removed immediately.

From Judson Lounsbury, complaining of dumping of cellar dirt on Pier foot of Wall street, East River. Notified that the permit will be revoked when the erection of shed is commenced.

From the Atlantic Transport Company, requesting dredging in slips adjoining Piers, new 39 and 40, North river. Ordered.

From Martin B. Brown Company, requesting extension of time for completion of delivery of stationery and printed and lithographed forms under Contract No. 740, to and including October 29, 1902. Granted, provided the consent of sureties is filed with this Department.

From Alexander C. Chenoweth, accepting terms and conditions of lease of dumping-board on West Forty-seventh Street Pier.

From Compagnie Generale Transatlantique, in reference to extension of Pier, new 42, North river.

From Consolidated Gas Company, accepting terms and conditions of permit granted for the maintenance of dumping-board between Twentieth and Twenty-first streets, East River.

From Charles W. Davis Transportation Line, requesting permission to cut sluiceway at Pier 54, East river. Notified that the work will be done by this Department, provided they agree to pay the cost.

From Edward Doran, requesting transfer from Recreation Pier Cleaner to Sweeper. Ordered, provided the consent of the Municipal Civil Service Commission is obtained.

From the Erie Railroad Company, protesting against the granting of any permit for the maintenance of fruit stand in front of Chambers Street Ferry. Notified that no permit has been issued.

From the Edison Electric Illuminating Company, requesting that charge of \$300 per annum for privilege of laying cable across the Wallabout canal at the south side of Washington avenue be canceled, as their franchise from the City gives them the privilege of running wires through public places. Referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion as to whether the Department has the right to make the charge.

From the D. Grieme Coal Company, protesting against the maintenance of dumping board at the foot of West Forty-seventh street. Engineer-in-Chief directed to erect a fence on the Pier foot of said street, which will prevent the carts from interfering with said company.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company, requesting that a franchise be granted for the operation of a ferry in the vicinity of West Twenty-third street to the foot of Newark street, Hoboken, N. J. Secretary directed to write and ask for additional information.

From the International Navigation Company, stating that the matter of the proposed offer of leasing piers in the Chelsea Section will be taken up by Mr. Griscom and his directors upon his return to New York.

From A. L. & S. F. Jacobs, attorneys for owners, offering to sell the City the property owned by their clients between Eighteenth and Nineteenth streets, Eleventh and Thirteenth avenues, with the bulkhead rights, for the sum of \$320,000, with interest from May 14, 1900, and taxes amounting to \$2,500. Corporation Counsel requested to advise as to the amount fixed for said property by the City appraisers.

From the Lone Star Boat Club, requesting permission to drive piles and erect a three-story frame building at the foot of One Hundred and Fifty-third street, Harlem river. Notified that application must be made to the Building Department for approval of plans for the building, after which this Department will grant permission to drive piles and erect foundation.

From Edward Lauterbach, in relation to the proposed improvement of Staten Island Ferry.

From the Metropolitan Steamship Company, accepting terms and conditions of permit for the erection of shed on bulkhead between Piers 9 and 11, North river.

From Murray & Co., transmitting consent of sureties to extension of time to December 31, 1902, for furnishing sand under Class 2, Contract No. 722.

From Geo. W. Wickersham, attorney for the New York and Brooklyn Ferry Company, accepting the amended terms of sale of franchise for the East Forty-second street ferry, and requesting a draft of the proposed clauses in the lease.

From the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company requesting reduction of wharfage charged for landing the steamers "Richard Peck" and "Chester W. Chapin" at Pier foot of East Twenty-first street, on September 1, 1902. Charge reduced to \$15 per day for both boats.

From the New York Bridge Iron Company requesting permission to maintain a building within the lines of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, east of Park avenue. Denied, and said company notified to remove the structure.

From Mrs. Henry Parsons, withdrawing request for the inclosing of recreation Pier at the foot of West Fiftieth street.

From the Rapid Safety Filter Company stating that the contract for the renting of filter does not expire until June 18, 1903.

From Theresa A. S. Sheridan requesting a six months' permit for repairing dumping board foot of West Ninety-seventh street. Filed.

From the South Brooklyn Board of Trade transmitting petition requesting the construction of piers between Twenty-seventh and Bay Ridge avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that a pier has been ordered at Bay Ridge avenue.

From Wallabout Market Merchants' Association in relation to a proposed hearing to consider a plan for enlarging the navigable facilities of the Wallabout channel. Notified that a hearing will be had in this Department in relation thereto on Thursday, October 30, 1902.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief.

Yorkville Ind. Hygeia Ice Company, to erect a coal mast and gaff for unloading coal at the foot of East Eighty-second street.

Interurban Street Railway Company to dredge in front of bulkhead between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-sixth streets, East river.

John B. O'Donohue, to build a sheet pile bulkhead at Seagate, Coney Island.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, and to be kept within existing lines:

S. W. Bowne Company, to repair bulkhead at Gowanus canal, south of Creamer street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, to rebuild bulkhead in front of Third Street Car Station, at First street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

American Tartar Company, to repair bulkhead at Hamilton avenue and Smith street, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner:

Lehigh Valley Railroad Company, to handle and store hay on Pier, new 56, North river, provided said hay is covered with tarpaulins.

John Monks & Son, to maintain tally house on bulkhead at Pier, new 31, North river.

United States Steamship "New Hampshire," to store small boats on the lower deck of pier foot of East Twenty-fourth street.

Joseph Ridley, to maintain watchman's shanty on the bulkhead at Pier 53, East river.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue during the pleasure of the Commissioner, but not longer than May 1, 1903:

Murtagh & McCarthy, to occupy space 50 by 100 feet of the new-made land north of East Ninety-first street, at the rate of \$300 per annum.

James B. Brady, to use and occupy a space 50 by 100 feet of the bulkhead foot of One Hundred and Fourth street, Harlem river, and between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets, East river, at \$25 per month for each location.

Thomas Ward, to occupy a berth for unloading coal at the foot of West Eightieth street, at \$50 per month.

M. Kane & Son, to occupy a space 50 by 100 feet between Piers, new 42 and 43, East river, and Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, North river, at \$300 per annum for each plot.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms:

James R. Myers, to repair water main leading to ferry house foot of Chambers street, North river.

Consolidated Telegraph and Electrical Supply Company, to build subways between Twenty-first and Twenty-third streets, East river, and between One Hundred and Twenty-ninth and Manhattan streets, North river.

The order to remove the ice bridge, etc., between Piers 59 and 60, East river, was revoked, the American Ice Company having paid rent therefor.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the extension to Pier, new 6, East river, was completed September 18, 1902; the extension to Pier, new 24, North river, June 7, 1901, and the extension to Pier, new 39, North river, October 17, 1902.

The Superintendent of Docks was directed to provide a berth for the steamer "Chrystenah" at the Pier foot of West Twentieth street.

The compensation to be paid by James J. Duffy for the privilege of storing sand on bulkhead between Nineteenth and Twentieth streets, North river, was fixed at \$300 per annum instead of \$200 per month.

The Secretary was directed to readvertise Contract No. 735 for furnishing anthracite coal in the papers designated by law and to advertise the contract for dredging on the North river, between West Twenty-first and West Twenty-third streets.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the delivery of cement under Contract No. 731 was completed October 6, 1902, by the John P. Kane Company, contractors.

Bids were opened on Contract No. 756 for furnishing, delivering and putting in place small cobble and riprap stone, and Contract No. 757 for preparing for and building a new pier, with appurtenances, at the foot of East One Hundred and Thirty-second street, East river, in the Borough of The Bronx; the following estimates being received:

Contract No. 757 was awarded to Augustin Walsh, he being the lowest bidder, subject to approval by the Comptroller of his sureties, viz., the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland and the City Trust, Safe Deposit and Surety Company, of Philadelphia.

A credit account was opened with Adam Weber Sons.

The application of David Tullock, Driver, for promotion was denied.

The application of Nicholas Ryan for reinstatement as Engineman in this Department was denied, as no additional Engineman is required at the present time.

The application of Thomas Barker for reinstatement as Deckhand was denied.

William J. Long was assigned to duty in the Dock Master's office at Eighteenth street and Avenue C.

The application of James C. Daly, Foreman of Dock Builders, for increase of salary was denied.

K. Yano, Cook, was discharged, to take effect November 1, 1902.

The compensation of Benjamin Dickerson, Coxswain, was fixed at \$14 per week.

The resignations of W. E. Belknap, Assistant Engineer, and Joseph F. Hefele, Leveler, were accepted.

The name of James R. Misk, Messenger, deceased, was taken from the list of employees.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief, in accordance with his recommendations:

To place a silt basin in rear of bulkhead wall foot of East One Hundred and First street.

To renew mooring-post on bulkhead foot of East Fifty-third street.

To drive piles to permit berthing of light scows between Little West Twelfth and Thirteenth streets, North river.

To repair old crib bulkhead immediately north of One Hundred and Seventh street, Harlem river.

To repair Pier foot of West One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

To renew braces on pile system holding float at East One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street.

To repair coal dock at Randall's Island.

To prepare plans, specifications and form of contract for the building of a Pier 500 feet long and 60 feet wide at the foot of Bay Ridge avenue, Borough of Brooklyn.

To repair Pier foot of West Thirty-fifth street.

To proceed at once with the construction of bulkhead wall as soon as the City acquires title to premises at the Chelsea section.

To prepare all material, so that contracts for new recreation building on Pier, new 30, East river, may be advertised immediately after receipt of working drawings from the architect.

To place about 9,000 cubic yards of riprap at Pier, new 30, East river, to provide for additional strength for carrying without excessive vibration the recreation structure built on Pier, new 30, East river.

To repair the deck sheathing on approach to Pier at West Forty-fourth street.

To repair the deck and sheathing at Pier foot of West Thirty-ninth street.

To repair the bulkhead foot of Seventy-third street, East river.

The following permit was revoked:

Interurban Street Railway Company, to maintain iron frame awning shed on the new-made land between Piers, new 31 and 32, North river.

The following order was issued:

The Engineer-in-Chief reported the following work done under Commissioner's orders:

No. 528. Filled in swimming pool between Seventy-fifth and Seventy-sixth streets, East river, and fenced off premises where necessary.

No. 712. Repaired Pier 6, East river.

No. 719. Repaired pile platform foot of East One Hundred and Twentieth street, Harlem river.

No. 607. Repaired Pier foot of East Twenty-ninth street.

No. 606. Repaired Pier foot of East Twenty-sixth street.

Building of fence at foot of West Forty-seventh street to prevent interference with the approach to dump.

No. 724. Preparing set of blue prints showing 4-inch borings along the bulkhead line on a portion of the North and East rivers; also sectional profiles, marginal maps, etc., for William H. Hobbs, Assistant Geologist, United States Geological Survey.

At One Hundred and Thirty-first Street, North River.

Lot No. 34.—Three bunches of pile butts, containing about 46 pieces.

The Engineer-in-Chief submitted plan for the improvement of the water front at Port Richmond, New Brighton and Clifton, Staten Island, whereupon the following orders were issued:

Ordered, That the map or plan submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for the improvement of the water front at Vanderbilt avenue, Clifton, in the Borough of Richmond, be and is hereby approved and directed to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

Ordered, That the map or plan submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for the improvement of the water front at Port Richmond, in the Borough of Richmond, be and is hereby approved, and directed to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

Ordered, That the map or plan submitted by the Engineer-in-Chief for the improvement of the water front at South street, New Brighton, Borough of Richmond, be and is hereby approved, and directed to be transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for their approval.

The proposed improvement in the vicinity of Vanderbilt avenue, at Clifton, in the Borough of Richmond, consists in establishing an area of land under water for the proposed ferry structures. The area so established is a strip 100 feet wide, extending from the present bulkhead to Vanderbilt avenue, easterly to the pier-head line established by the Secretary of War in 1899; its centre line running from the easterly prolongation of the centre line of that portion of Vanderbilt avenue which lies easterly of Bay street.

The proposed plan for improving the water front in the vicinity of Richmond avenue, Port Richmond, Borough of Richmond, comprises establishing a bulkhead line, a marginal street wharf or place and an area of land under water for ferry structures.

The proposed bulkhead line begins at a point in the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, said point being at the intersection of the northerly prolongation of the easterly line of Broadway and the said bulkhead line, running thence westerly in the westerly continuation of the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1890, until it intersects a line drawn at right angles with that portion of Richmond avenue lying northerly of the Richmond terrace; thence westerly along said line drawn at right angles with Richmond avenue to the easterly side of Ferry street, and passing through a point in the westerly side of said Richmond avenue, distant 230.69 feet northerly from the present or existing corner of Richmond avenue and Richmond terrace.

The proposed marginal street, wharf or place will be 100 feet in width, bounded on the outshore side by the above-described bulkhead line, on the inshore side by a line drawn parallel therewith and 100 feet distant southerly therefrom, and extending from the westerly side of Richmond avenue to the easterly side of Ferry street.

The area of land under water proposed for ferry structures is bounded on the easterly side by the northerly prolongation of the westerly side of Richmond avenue, on the westerly side by the northerly prolongation of the southerly side of Ferry street, and extends from the above-described bulkhead line northerly to the pier-head line established by the Secretary of War in 1890.

All of the above as shown on the accompanying map submitted herewith in duplicate.

The proposed improvement of the water front in the vicinity of St. George, near the foot of South street, in the Borough of Richmond, consists in establishing a marginal street, wharf or place, and an area of land under water for the proposed ferry structures, as follows:

That marginal street, wharf or place begins at a point on the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1889, where the centre line of South street intersects the same; running thence westerly along the centre line of South street 230 feet; thence northerly at a line at right angles with the centre line of South street 33 feet more or less to the northerly line of South street; thence northeasterly 172 feet to a point in a line drawn parallel with the said bulkhead line and distant 100 feet westerly therefrom; thence northerly along said parallel line 180 feet; thence northeasterly in a straight line to a point in a line drawn parallel with the said centre line of South street and distant 400 feet northerly therefrom, said point being 50 feet westerly of the said bulkhead line; thence easterly along said line drawn parallel with the centre line of South street and 400 feet northerly therefrom 50 feet to the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1889; thence southerly along said bulkhead line to the point or place of beginning.

The area of land under water proposed for ferry structures is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the bulkhead line established by the Secretary of War in 1889, where the centre line of South street intersects the same; thence running northerly along said bulkhead line to a line drawn parallel with the centre line of said South street, and distant 400 feet northerly therefrom; thence easterly along said parallel line to the pier-head line established by the Secretary of War in 1899; thence southerly along said pier-head line to the intersection of the easterly prolongation of the centre line of said South street; thence westerly along said prolongation of the centre line of South street to the point or place of beginning.

The Engineer-in-Chief recommended that the Pier foot of West Twenty-second street be removed by the force of the Department to commence the work of improvement on the Chelsea section, whereupon the following order was issued:

"Whereas, In and by an indenture of lease made the 29th day of May, in the year one thousand nine hundred and two, by and between The City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of Docks, party of the first part, and Eben E. Olcott, party of the second part, all and singular the wharfage which may arise, accrue and become due for the use and occupation in the manner and at the rates prescribed by law, at all that certain wharf property situated on the North river in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, County of New York, and known and described as follows, to wit: Pier foot of West Twenty-second street, with the right to use the shed erected on said pier, together with the right to enter upon said property for the purposes of said lease and to collect the said wharfage, was leased for the term of ten years from the first day of May, 1902; and

"Whereas, In and by said lease the party of the second part covenants and agrees that if at any time during the term hereby created, the building or rebuilding of wharves, piers and bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water front which shall include the premises hereinbefore described according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the said party of the first part shall determine that for the purpose of such building or rebuildings, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of said party of the second part in the wharfage to arise, accrue or become due from said wharf property or any part thereof, or if at any time during the term hereby created, the said party of the first part shall determine that the said premises or any part thereof shall be used for some other purpose than for the purpose of the collection of wharfage and that it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the party of the second part in said wharfage, then upon receipt by the party of the second part of written notice from said party of the first part to that effect describing the premises or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of the said party of the second part in said wharfage and in said wharf property or part thereof under this lease shall be thereby terminated and the rent hereby reserved shall cease from the date of receipt of such notice and no claim for damages or compensation payable to said party of the second part by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharfage or wharf property or for damages or injury to

any steam or sailing vessels or water craft moored thereto or on, in or about the same, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by said party of the second part, shall at any time be made by the party of the second part or by any person or persons whomsoever," therefore be it

Ordered, That the Commissioner of Docks hereby determines to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding the wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within the section or district of the water front of the City of New York between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets on the North River, which said district includes the wharf property hereinbefore described, according to the plan adopted by the Department of Docks on January 14, 1898, and July 19, 1901, and approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund March 11, 1898, and July 31, 1901, and be it further

Ordered, That the said Commissioner of Docks determines that for the purpose of such building or rebuilding it will be necessary to terminate the interest of Eben E. Olcott, the said party of the second part in said lease mentioned, in the wharfage to arise, accrue or become due from said wharf property or from any part thereof; and be it further

Ordered, That the Commissioner of Docks hereby terminates the interest of Eben E. Olcott, said party of the second part, in said lease mentioned, said termination to take effect upon the service upon Eben E. Olcott of written notice of this order; and be it further

Ordered, That notice of this order terminating the interest of said Eben E. Olcott, the said party of the second part, in said lease mentioned, be served upon him.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for Week Ending Saturday, November 1, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor's office, giving notice of conference on November 5, 1902, to discuss the matter of enlarged facilities for the fish trade.

From the Comptroller—

1st. Stating that the sum of \$250,000 was deposited in the City Treasury to the credit of the Dock Fund on September 18, 1902.

2d. Stating that his certificate had been attached to Contract No. 752.

3d. Approving sureties on Contract No. 757.

4th. Requesting that blank payroll checks distributed by the Comptroller's office be carefully guarded.

5th. Stating that he has fixed on November 12, 1902, for the payment of awards in the proceeding for the acquisition of Pier, old 12, East river. Chief Clerk directed to draw the requisition.

6th. Requesting to be advised of the date of discharge of Henry Scriver, Dockmaster. Secretary directed to furnish the information.

From the Corporation Counsel—

1st. In relation to the request of C. A. Shea for the construction of a public dock at Rossville, S. I., and stating that a search is now being made to determine the ownership thereof.

2d. Transmitting report containing list of ejectment actions brought by this Department.

3d. Stating that the proceeding for the acquisition of bulkhead between One Hundred and Fourth and One Hundred and Fifth streets, Harlem river, would be proceeded with as soon as possible.

4th. Stating that none of the Appraisers have as yet furnished the valuation of property between Eighteenth and Twenty-third streets, North river.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

TRANSACTIONS FOR WEEK ENDING SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 15, 1902.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor:

First—Requesting to be advised whether the Department has the necessary funds to proceed with improvements at Riker's Island. Secretary directed to advise that the Department has at present no funds available for the purpose.

Second—Transmitting communication from the President of the Rapid Transit Commissioners requesting that the permit for dumping board on Pier foot of West Seventy-ninth street be not revoked, as the cancellation of the lease would seriously interfere with the work of construction of the subway.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Approving forms of leases of the easterly half of Jackson Street Pier West, East river, and the advertisement for sale of leases of dumping board privileges on bulkhead between West Seventy-eighth and West Seventy-ninth streets, and on the northerly side of Pier foot of West Thirtieth street.

Second—Stating that the Union Ferry Company is liable for rental of ferries on the East River at the rate of 7 3/4 per cent. of the gross receipts, and that the ferry company is solvent.

Third—Stating that the occupants of premises between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-fourth streets, Harlem river, offer settlement, the City to obtain possession of all property easterly of the westerly line of the marginal street.

Fourth—Advising that a resolution has been adopted by the Commissioners of the Land Office to the effect that all applications for grants of land under water must be accompanied by map or plan showing the location of the lands applied for.

Fifth—Requesting information relative to the controversy between the Pennsylvania Railroad Company and the Anchor line regarding premises between Piers 53 and 54, North river, and also in relation to the application for placing a gymnasium on one of the Recreation Piers. Notified that the matters have been dropped by the various parties and that no opinion is now necessary.

From the Comptroller—

First—Stating that in future in certifying estimated cost of contracts a clause should be added to the effect that the estimated amount is based on the lowest bids for such supplies. Corporation Counsel requested to advise as to whether there is any objection to the insertion of such a clause.

Second—In reference to telephone service.

Third—Complaining of delay in transmitting bills for payment. The suggestion of the Comptroller was adopted that the signature of every Department official who certifies the claim be dated; also that the date of receipt of a bill be placed thereon.

Fourth—Stating that he will be glad to name Alfred T. White of Brooklyn as appraiser on behalf of the City in connection with the Staten Island ferry Property.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—

First—Stating that William C. Crosby can be promoted from fourth to fifth grade Draughtsman only after a non-competitive examination for such promotion.

Second—Stating that the promotion of Patrick F. Crowley, Hydrographer, from \$1 200 to the \$1,500 grade per annum, will be approved after Crowley passes the non-competitive examination which is provided by rule 38 of the Civil Service Rules.

From Davies, Stone & Auerbach, attorneys for the New York Dock Company, stating that they will communicate in a few days in relation to the property adjoining the south side of Hamilton Avenue Ferry, Borough of Brooklyn.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund—

First—Returning proposition for the establishment of ferry between Twentieth and Twenty-third streets, North river, by the Hoboken Ferry Company.

Second—Transmitting certified copies of resolutions approving plans for improvement of the water front at St. George, Clifton and Port Richmond, in the Borough of Richmond.

Third—Transmitting copy of resolution approving the proposed lease of ferry franchise foot of West Forty-second street, to the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

From the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, reporting that steamer "Trinidad," berthed on the north side of Pier, new 32, North river, blocks the slip. Notified that the steamer has been removed.

From the Police Department, reporting the arrest of James Oakley, dock builder, for disposing of lumber at Wallabout Basin, Borough of Brooklyn. Requested said Department to submit facts to the District Attorney.

From the President of the Borough of Manhattan, reporting that the Local Board for the Harlem District contemplates action respecting the establishment of a public park between One Hundred and Twenty-third and One Hundred and Twenty-fifth streets, and from First avenue to the East river. Notified that this Department is opposed to any use of the water front which interferes with its use for commercial purposes.

From the President of the Borough of Queens, requesting to be advised as to whether the Long Island Railroad Company proposes to abandon the James Slip Ferry. Notified that the lease of said ferry expires May 1, 1903, and that no intimation has been received of any intention of the company to abandon same.

From Various City Departments, advising that certain old material of no use to this Department can be used by them. Requested opinion of Corporation Counsel as to the authority of this Department to transfer same.

From the Collector of Customs, stating that the steamers "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" are owned by the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, and that the steamers "Middletown," "Southfield" and "Westfield" are owned by the Staten Island Railway Company.

From the Secretary of State, Albany, N. Y., stating that copies of grants of land under water issued since January 1, 1898, covering property in the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, will be prepared as requested.

From the Commissioners of the Land Office, transmitting the following applications for grants of land under water:

Brooklyn Benevolent Society, south of Amity street, East river, Borough of Brooklyn;

John Jamieson and John A. Bond, at Jamaica Bay, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens; and

Vincent P. and Francis C. Travers, at Raritan Bay, Borough of Richmond.

From the Association of Civil Employees, requesting that the wages of Pavers be increased from \$4 to \$4.50 per day. Notified that the wages of Pavers have been fixed at 56 1/4 cents per hour while employed in such work.

From the estate of Jane Bergh Brown, in relation to the acquisition of bulkhead north of Gouverneur street, East river, and suggesting that if this property is taken that Pier, old 52, East river, be included. Requested her to name a price for the private interests in said Pier and bulkhead.

From the Brooklyn Daily Eagle, requesting list of employees of the Department. Secretary directed to furnish.

From Bolognesi, Hartfield & Co., requesting dredging in the slip south of Pier at West Thirty-fourth street. Notified that soundings show that a sufficient depth of water exists.

From Receiver for Bernheimer & Schmid, requesting permission to repair pumping station at One Hundred and Eighth street, North river. Advised that property is under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works.

From Bell Brothers, requesting renewal of pile at bulkhead foot of East Fifty-third street. Ordered.

From Jefferson Hogan, requesting permission to sublet to the Occident Dock Company, lease of Pier, new 59, North river, and from the Citizens' Steamboat Company requesting permission to sublet, for a term not exceeding one year, a portion of the north side of Pier, new 46, North river, to the Old Dominion Steamship Company. Permission granted the above parties, provided the lessees and their sureties file in this Department a written agreement that their obligations under the

provisions of their respective leases shall not in any manner be affected or impaired by reason of such subletting.

From Patrick Curtis, requesting berth for unloading coal at the bulkhead between Piers 38 and 39 or between Piers 39 and 40, North river. Notified that when bulkheads are not in use application may be made therefor.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, together with report of Engineer-in-Chief, in relation to proposed improvement of the water front in the vicinity of Piers, old 12, 13 and 14, North river. Corporation Counsel requested to advise as to whether the agreement submitted by said company is legally sufficient.

From attorney for Joseph Eagan, requesting that action be taken on the plan submitted for the construction of dumping board between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets, North river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to examine plan without prejudice to the questions arising in reference to lease.

From the Fort George Coal and Lumber Company, requesting lease of bulkhead at Sherman's creek, Harlem river, together with new made land in rear thereof. Notified said company that an application will be entertained for a space 380 feet in length.

From the Knickerbocker Steam Towage Company, requesting permission to substitute concrete block in place of granite block to repair damage at the outer end of Pier, new 1, North river. Denied.

From William Kleeman & Co., requesting information as to the ownership of pier foot of East Twelfth street. Notified that the charge made for railroad barges by this Department is \$1, and that no additional compensation shall be charged for the use of the dock unless goods are allowed to remain there more than twenty-four hours.

From John D. Lohman and James Prior's Sons, respecting the permit granted to Patterson & Elder for the occupation of bulkhead between Piers 31 and 32, East river. Said parties notified that the permit is a temporary one, to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner.

From John P. McGovern, renewing application for permission to maintain express office foot of Christopher street, North river. Application denied.

From William J. McGirr, renewing application for permission to store sand at bulkhead between Piers 4 and 5, East river. Application denied, as the berth has already been assigned to other parties.

From the New York Board of Trade and Transportation, transmitting copy of resolutions adopted by said Board approving the application of this Department for extension of the pier head line between West Eleventh and West Twenty-third streets, North river.

From H. C. Pierce, requesting a credit account. Application denied, but the Auditor notified to present bills monthly.

From W. M. K. Olcott, requesting a lease of pier to be built at the foot of West Forty-first street.

From Bernard Rolf, transmitting consent of sureties to the extension of contract No. 736.

Whereas, The Municipal Civil Service Commission, in a letter dated October 21, addressed to the Secretary to the President, has stated that such increase of pay is to be viewed by said Commission in the light of a promotion, and that in consequence a non-competitive examination for such promotion must be taken by the incumbents eligible for the examination under Rule 38 of the Civil Service Regulations; and

Whereas, Said Rule 38 provides that whenever there are less than three persons eligible for promotion to fill a vacancy and willing to compete therefor, such persons may be examined by the Department in which the promotion is to occur; and

Whereas, In the grade of Resident Physician there is only one incumbent eligible for promotion, namely, Dr. Flavius Packer, and in the grade of Assistant Resident Physician there is only one incumbent, namely, Dr. Menas Gregory; therefore be it Resolved, First, That Charles H. Fenn, Secretary of the Departmental Board of Examiners, be authorized to procure the assistance of an alienist, acceptable to the President of the Board; and, second, to conduct such examination as shall meet the requirements of the Civil Service Commission at such date as may be convenient, and report to this Board at earliest possible date; be it further

Resolved, That a copy of the questions and answers submitted at the examination, together with a certificate of character, conduct and efficiency of the applicants, be forwarded to the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

And read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
