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## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No 280 Broadway, New York City, on Wednesday, May 6, 1903, at 3 o'clock p. m.

Present—Mayor Low, Comptroller Grout, Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis and the Chief Engineer.

The Construction or Executive Committee referred to the Commissioners Report No. 560 of the Chief Engineer, dated April 30, 1903, transmitting two reports of Prof. James Furman Kemp, of Columbia University, and Prof. John J. Stevenson, of the University of New York, geologists, in regard to the character of the material underlying the foundation of the core-wall now in process of removal at the south end of the New Croton Dam, the same being dated April 16 and April 30, 1903; with a recommendation that the Chief Engineer be authorized to cause such examinations to be made of the material underlying the foundation of the New Croton Dam as he might deem advisable, and that the whole subject matter be referred to the Chief Engineer for further report.

The recommendation of the Committee was approved and it was so ordered.

The following resolutions were presented:

Whereas, The Aqueduct Commissioners on March 27, 1903, adopted certain resolutions intended to effectuate a settlement of the claims of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company against The City of New York for damages arising from the construction of the New Croton Dam Reservoir, and subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, undertook therein to pay the sum of \$364,992.85 as compensation for the taking, using and occupying certain real estate of the said railroad company within the boundaries of said New Croton Reservoir, and for the damages arising therefrom, and to furnish to said railroad company the new right of way for the New York and Mahopac Railroad; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on April 7, 1903, adopted a resolution approving and concurring in the said resolutions adopted by the Aqueduct Commissioners; and

Whereas, The New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company subsequently declined to contract on the terms proposed in said resolutions on account of an oversight on its part in not including certain items of additional cost of labor and materials in its final estimate or proposal; and

Whereas, In view of the public necessity for the completion of the work, the Aqueduct Commissioners have again taken up negotiations with said railroad company with the view of trying to arrive at an early agreement; therefore

Resolved, That the President be and hereby is requested to transmit a copy of the foregoing preambles and this resolution to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its information in the premises.

Which was adopted.

A communication was received from Special Counsel Dykman, dated White Plains, N. Y., May 6, 1903, in reference to the "proposed amendments to the petition, matter of eighth supplemental petition, Cornell Dam, so far as the same relates to the acquisition of the railroad properties."

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

The Chief Engineer presented Report No. 567, dated May 6, 1903, requesting that a list from which two Inspectors of Masonry could be appointed, at a salary of \$4.50 per day, be obtained from the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

The report was ordered filed, and the Secretary was directed to obtain the list desired.

A communication was received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 5, 1903, submitting an eligible list for the position of Axeman.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

A communication was also received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated May 5, 1903, submitting an eligible list for the position of Laborer.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer for report.

The Commissioners then adjourned until Friday, May 8, 1903, at 11 a. m.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Adjourned Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, Held at Their Office, No. 280 Broadway, New York City, on Friday, May 8, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m.

Present—Commissioners Ten Eyck (President), Ryan, Windolph and Curtis, and the Chief Engineer.

The Chief Engineer presented the following report:

Report No. 568.

May 6, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I herewith transmit the original draft of form of proposal, contract, bond and specifications for stop-cock valves, special castings and ladders for the Jerome Park Reservoir, to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

The report was ordered filed, and the President was requested to transmit said form of contract to the Corporation Counsel for approval.

The Chief Engineer also presented the following report:

Report No. 569.

May 8, 1903.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—On March 30 of this year, in Report No. 534, I called to your attention the character of the natural foundation disclosed as underlying the core-wall at the south end of the New Croton Dam, which is in process of removal, prior to the substitution thereof of the solid masonry construction recommended by me shortly after my appointment as Chief Engineer. In that report I stated that the natural limestone foundation was more or less disintegrated and gave every evidence of being in the process of further disintegration, and that the softer portion would quickly absorb water and could be easily and completely crushed in the hand to the form of sand.

On April 3, in Report 539, I stated that after receiving an official report from the Division Engineer on the subject I would recommend that the services of competent geologists be obtained to make a report upon the character and probable extent of any soluble and shattered material found under the core-wall, gate house and in the foundation pit, and also upon the character of the rock upon which the said extended masonry dam will be founded. At your meeting on that day you approved of my recommendation and authorized and directed me to invite Professor James Furman Kemp, of Columbia University, and Professor John J. Stevenson, of the New York University, geologists, to give their opinion upon this subject, as suggested.

On April 30, with Report No. 560, I transmitted to you, in accordance with your resolution of April 3, two reports from Professors Kemp and Stevenson, dated April 16 and 30 respectively. In these reports the insecure and unstable character of the formation underlying the core-wall is shown. In certain locations it is stated that the material was found so soft that it "runs with water like sand," and that it is uncertain how far down the disintegration may have penetrated, depending largely upon geological conditions in the past. They find the condition of the foundation of Gate House No. 1 and the adjoining portions of the Old Aqueduct as "deserving very serious consideration." These last mentioned portions of the structure are south of and adjoining the core-wall before mentioned, which is now partly removed.

In my weekly report to you, dated May 5, I stated that the foundation had been investigated to a depth of 45 feet below the base upon which the core-wall stood, and that at that depth no improvement had been shown in the character of the material.

As a result of these investigations it may be necessary to remove and reconstruct Gate House No. 1 and small portions of the adjoining sections of the Old Aqueduct and to make further geological and engineering examinations.

The conditions to which I call your attention do not necessarily involve the stability of the main portion of the dam. The records show the existence of two narrow seams of softer material than the surrounding rock, which were examined and treated before its construction was begun. There may be leakage under the masonry, but there is no evidence of it, and the investigation suggested will set at rest any doubts on this point.

In view of these facts and considering the importance of the engineering work involved, I recommend that the Aqueduct Commissioners appoint a Consulting Expert Engineer to advise with me in such investigations and upon all future questions arising in the construction of the New Croton Dam.

Resolved, That Professor William H. Burr, of Columbia University, be and hereby is retained as an Expert Engineer to advise the Aqueduct Commissioners and consult with the Chief Engineer on the subjects mentioned in his Report No. 569.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

Affirmative—Commissioners Ten Eyck, Ryan, Windolph and Curtis—4.

The Secretary presented a communication received from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, requesting that this Commission certify that in its opinion Abraham Clarke is competent to perform the duties of Stoker.

Which was referred to the Chief Engineer.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, dated May 7, in reply to a letter of April 29, and stating that Nicholas S. Hill, Chief Engineer of said Department, would be unable to act with the Engineers of the Department of Finance and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in making an examination of the plans for the concrete flooring outlet and drain pipes on the westerly section of the Jerome Park Reservoir.

The communication was ordered filed, and the President was requested to acknowledge its receipt.

A communication was received from Mr. H. T. Dykman, dated White Plains, N. Y., May 7, 1903, acknowledging receipt of letter of this Commission of May 6, 1903, referring to the subject matter of Reports Nos. 561 and 565 of the Chief Engineer.

Which was ordered filed.

A communication was received from Mrs. Abner L. Crosby, dated Towners, N. Y., May 4, 1903, in relation to certain wages alleged to be due Abner L. Crosby, deceased, formerly in the employ of this Commission.

Which was referred to the Secretary for reply.

A resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, April 21, 1903, requesting the heads of the several departments of The City of New York, in which a holiday was granted to per diem employees on Good Friday, April 10, 1903, to allow pay for the holiday so granted, was presented, and ordered filed.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

To allow the building to be classed as a twelve-story building, inasmuch as the pent house on top of same occupies only 42 per cent. of the area of the building, and the total distance from the curb line to the top of pent house is only 149 feet.

Also to allow the outside walls of pent house to be constructed of angle iron and fireproof terra cotta blocks as originally shown.

The construction of the pent house will be as follows: All the brick walls surrounding the pent house will be carried up to their proper heights.

The north and west enclosures will be of hollow terra cotta tile laid up in cement and covered with sheet metal.

The floor will be made of cement.

All sash, doors, frames and trim will be kalamein.

Proper skylights will be provided.

The highest point of the pent house will not exceed 150 feet from the curb level. No combustible material will be employed in the construction of the pent house. The standpipe will extend into pent house with hose connection.

The entire pent house will be constructed absolutely fireproof.

Inasmuch as the highest point of this building will be kept within the 150-foot limit, we respectfully ask that this case be considered by your Honorable Board and the modifications as above set forth be granted.

#### Superintendent's Report.

Mr. Michael J. Rickard, Acting Superintendent in the absence of Dr. Mabon, reported as follows:

A representative of the Eagle Oxygen Company called here in response to the Secretary's letter of May 1, 1903. He said that he was willing to remove from his billheads the words "Contractors for Bellevue and Allied Hospitals," and he was directed to communicate with you in writing. His letter is submitted herewith.

In accordance with the directions of the President two comparative statements of the census of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for the first four months of 1902 and the first four months of 1903 are herewith submitted, one statement based upon the patients only and the other upon the inmates. The census has never before been so high at this season of the year.

In the absence of Dr. Biggs of the Department of Health the matter of the cases of diphtheria in Ward 31 was referred to Dr. Billings. Dr. Studdiford was sent to Bellevue Hospital to represent the Department of Health, and he, with Miss Delano, Dr. Shearer and the Acting Superintendent, examined the ward. Dr. Studdiford suggested that cultures be taken of all patients and submitted to the Board of Health for examination. This was done, and the examination revealed "Loeffler" in nine of the inmates, four female adults, four children and one Nurse. Dr. Studdiford was notified of the result of the examination and again called, and, after consultation with Dr. Shearer, it was decided that the eight patients be isolated in the solarium and the children transferred to the general ward. Dr. Studdiford directed that all inmates of the ward be immunized and that cultures be taken of all new cases. This is now being carried out. The Nurse, Miss Bradley, has been isolated by Miss Delano. Dr. Studdiford recommended that the Nurses in handling these cases in the Isolating Ward wear gowns and caps, and Miss Delano is now having them made.

The plans of Gouverneur Hospital, brought here by a representative of Mr. Rudolph, are herewith submitted.

An officer from Police Headquarters called here on Monday in reference to a communication sent to Chief Inspector M. M. Cortwright on May 9, and stated that if the communication were sent to General Greene, Commissioner of the Department, the request for an additional Policeman for the alcoholic ward and gate would be granted. On Tuesday, May 12, a letter was written to General Greene, but no reply has as yet been received.

Resolved, That the Superintendent be requested to investigate as to whether it is possible to remove some of the women patients from Ward 31 to other wards.

Mr. WILLIAM C. REDFIELD, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—I send you herewith map and technical description for the change of grade on

Parade place, between Woodruff avenue and Caton avenue;

St. Paul's place, between Caton and Woodruff avenues;

Crooke avenue, between Parade place and Ocean avenue.

This does not make a very great difference from the present grade, but in that locality would help the property very materially.

I have suggested this change myself without any petition from the property owners, as the land in that vicinity is very flat, and I have adjusted the grade so as to make as little filling as possible.

The matter should be presented to the Local Board and acted upon as soon as possible, as there is a resolution now before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for paving St. Paul's place.

Technical description for change of grade on the following streets:

Parade place, between Woodruff avenue and Caton avenue;

St. Paul's place, between Caton avenue and Woodruff avenue;

Crooke avenue, between Parade place and Ocean avenue.

Parade Place, Between Woodruff Avenue and Caton Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Woodruff avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 56.6 feet, as heretofore; thence southerly to the intersection of Crooke avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 54.5 feet; thence southerly to the intersection of Caton avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 52.4 feet, as heretofore.

St. Paul's Place, Between Caton Avenue and Woodruff Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Woodruff avenue and St. Paul's place, the elevation to be 56.6 feet, as heretofore; thence southerly to a point distant from the northern building line of Crooke avenue 120 feet, the elevation to be 57.06 feet; thence southerly to the intersection of Crooke avenue and St. Paul's place, the elevation to be 56.0 feet; thence southerly to the intersection of Caton avenue and St. Paul's place, the elevation to be 54.62 feet, as heretofore.

Crooke Avenue, Between Parade Place and Ocean Avenue.

Beginning at the intersection of Crooke avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 54.5 feet; thence easterly to the intersection of St. Paul's place and Crooke avenue, the elevation to be 56.0 feet; thence easterly to a point distant from the western building line of Ocean avenue 170.0 feet, the elevation to be 58.8 feet, as heretofore; thence easterly to the intersection of Ocean avenue and Crooke avenue, the elevation to be 55.61 feet, as heretofore.

All elevations referred to are datum as established by the Bureau of Highways, Borough of Brooklyn.

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Flatbush District, Borough of Brooklyn, after hearing had this 23d day of April, 1903, deeming it for the public interest so to do, hereby recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that proceedings be initiated to alter the map or plan of The City of New York by changing the grade of the following streets:

Parade Place, Between Woodruff Avenue and Caton Avenue.

St. Paul's place, between Caton and Woodruff avenues, and on Crooke avenue, between Parade place and Ocean avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, as shown on the accompanying map, and more particularly described as follows:

Parade Place, Between Woodruff and Caton Avenues.

Beginning at the intersection of Woodruff avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 56.6 feet, as heretofore; thence southerly to the intersection of Crooke avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 54.5 feet; thence southerly to the intersection of Caton avenue and Parade place, the elevation to be 52.4 feet, as heretofore.

St. Paul's Place, Between Caton and Woodruff Avenues.

## BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN.

At a meeting of the Board of Local Improvements of the Washington Heights District, held April 14, 1903, the following members were present: Aldermen Klett, Meyers and President Cantor.

The President presented the matter of paving West One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street from Eighth avenue to Macomb's Dam road with asphalt blocks and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same, and on motion the question was again laid over, it having been laid over at the last meeting of the Board.

Mr. J. M. Horton and a representative of the Fleishman estate appeared and opposed the improvement.

The matter of changing the name of Convent avenue was also laid over. This matter was referred to Alderman Florence at a previous meeting for report.

Suitable resolution was adopted approving of the paving of West One Hundred and Twenty-first street from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway with asphalt blocks and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same. Estimated cost, \$9,011. Assessed value of property affected, \$1,044,000.

(Note—As water mains have not been laid between Amsterdam avenue and Morningside avenue West, the work will have to be confined between Amsterdam avenue and Broadway.)

Resolution was adopted approving of the alteration and improvement to sewer in West One Hundred and Twentieth street between Amsterdam avenue and Morningside avenue West. Estimated cost, \$5,967. Assessed value of property affected, \$457,000.

The Clerk read a communication from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, to the effect that plans and estimates for water mains in West One Hundred and Eighty-fourth street from Amsterdam avenue to Broadway have been filed, but it was not considered advisable to enter upon the work of laying these mains until the sewer, which is now in process of construction, has been completed.

On motion, the communication was ordered filed.

The President presented the matter of repaving Lenox avenue from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Forty-fifth street with bitulithic form of bituminous macadam pavement.

On motion, the matter was referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

The matter of repairing sidewalks in front of Nos. 240-242 West One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street was approved. Estimated cost, \$100. Assessed value of property affected, \$16,500.

The question of repairing sidewalk in front of Nos. 102-104 West One Hundred and Thirteenth street was approved. Estimated cost, \$45. Assessed value of property affected, \$9,000.

The matter of repairing sidewalks on the west side of Edgecombe avenue between One Hundred and Fifty-ninth and One Hundred and Sixtieth streets was approved. Estimated cost, \$5. Assessed value of property affected, ....

The matter of reflagging sidewalks on the west side of St. Nicholas avenue from One Hundred and Twenty-eighth to One Hundred and Forty-fifth streets was laid over, as the walk abuts on a public park.

The matter of paving Broadway, including the area between the tracks of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company north from Dyckman street to Spuyten Duyvil creek bridge, with sheet asphalt and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same was laid over until April 21, as the Engineer was not ready to report on that matter until that date.

The Clerk read a communication from Henry F. Mager, requesting that gas mains be laid in West One Hundred and Eighty-eighth street from Wadsworth to Amsterdam avenues, and on motion of Alderman Klett suitable resolution was adopted recommending to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that gas mains be laid in this street between the points mentioned.

The President presented the matter of paving the roadway of One Hundred and Eighty-first street between Broadway and the Boulevard Lafayette with asphalt blocks.

Inasmuch as the grade of this street between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue is five per cent., a resolution was introduced and adopted providing for the paving between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue with asphalt blocks and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same. And inasmuch as the grade of One Hundred and Eighty-first street between Fort Washington avenue and the Boulevard Lafayette is nine per cent., a resolution was adopted providing for the paving between these points with granite blocks and the curbing and resetting of the curb of same.

Alderman Meyers submitted a petition signed by William Green and twenty others, asking that One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, between Lenox and Seventh avenue be repaved with asphalt, and on motion of Alderman Meyers the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Local Improvement of the Washington Heights District requests the President of the Borough of Manhattan to repave the roadway of West One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street between Lenox and Eighth avenues.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City or New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
