The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes of the stated meeting of June 2, 1903. On motion of Alderman Marks, further reading was dispensed with and the minutes were approved as printed.

### MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

Nos. 2142 and 2149.

City of New York—Office of the Mayor.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith, without my approval, resolutions adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 2, 1903, (1) permitting the St. Anna's Italian Society to display fireworks on July 27 and 28, 1903, on Adelphi street, Borough of Brooklyn; and (2) permitting the Corpus Domini Society to display fireworks on Carroll street, Borough of Brooklyn, on June 10 and 11, 1903.

My objection to these resolutions is that the granting of permits for the display of fireworks is governed by the regulations of the Municipal Explosives Commission. Under these regulations permits may be granted for the discharge of fireworks upon application to the Fire Commissioner; and no suspension of the fireworks ordinance is necessary.

New York, June 9, 1903.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Corpus Domini Society to display set pieces of fireworks on Carroll street, between Third and Fourth avenues, Brooklyn, June 10 and 11, 1903, and that the ordinance relating to fireworks be suspended so far as it may apply to the above location and dates.

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is given to the St. Anna Italian Society to display colored fire, firecrackers and pinwheels (non-explosive) on July 27 and 28, 1903, on Adelphi street, between Fulton street and Atlantic avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Parks transmitting ordinance

No. 2153.

The City of New York, Department of Parks,  
Arsenal, Central Park,  
June 4, 1903.

Hon. ARMITAGE MATHEWS, Chairman, Committee on Laws and Legislation,  
Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York City:

My Dear Sir—On March 10 park ordinances adopted by the Park Board were submitted to the Board of Aldermen for adoption, as provided in the Charter, and the same were referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation. It was found that these ordinances were incomplete, and they have since been redrafted, and I now inclose you a new copy of the same.

The ordinances as now submitted have been adopted by the Park Board and I am requested by that Board to ask that your Committee will report the same for adoption by the Board of Aldermen, in lieu of the ordinances laid before them on March 10.

#### ALL PERSONS ARE FORBIDDEN

I. To cut, break or in any way injure or deface the trees, shrubs, plants, grass, posts, railings, chains, lamps, lampposts, benches, tree-guards, buildings, structures, or other property in or upon any of the public parks, parkways, squares or places of or within The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, or to dig into or upon the soil within the boundaries of any such parks, parkways, squares or places, or of any roads or roadways upon or across the same.

II. To go on foot or otherwise upon the grass, except when and where permitted, or to throw or leave any paper, refuse or rubbish on any of the lawns or walks of the said parks, parkways, squares or places.

III. To expose any article for sale or exhibition, unless previously licensed by the Department of Parks therefor, on any part of such public parks, parkways, squares or places.

IV. To post any bill, placard, notice or other paper upon any structure within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or upon any street or avenue adjacent thereto under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, unless previously licensed so to do by the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and in accordance with the provisions of section XVI. hereof.

V. To play upon any musical instrument within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or to take into, carry or display any flag, banner, target or transparency without the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

VI. To erect any structure, stand or platform, or hold any meetings in such parks, parkways, squares or places without previous permission therefor from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

VII. To use threatening, abusive or insulting language upon any of such public parks, parkways, squares or places, or doing any obscene or indecent act thereon, or any act tending to a breach of the public peace.

VIII. No hackney coach, carriage, wagon, cart or other vehicle for hire shall stand upon any such public park, parkway, square or place, or upon any street or avenue adjacent thereto under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, without previous license, and then only at such place as shall be indicated and allowed by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

IX. No horse or other animal shall be allowed to go at large upon such public parks, parkways, squares or places, except that dogs may be allowed therein when led by a chain or proper dog-string not exceeding six feet in length.

X. No persons shall bathe or fish in any of the waters or fountains, nor cast any substance therein, nor disturb or interfere in any way with the fish, birds or animals within such public parks, parkways, squares or places, except in the waters adjacent to Pelham Bay Park, where bathing and fishing shall be permitted, subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx. Fishing may be allowed in the lakes of Prospect Park under permits granted by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XI. All drunken, disorderly, or improper persons, and all persons doing any act injurious to such parks, parkways, squares or places, shall be removed therefrom by the parkkeeper or police in charge thereof. When necessary to the protection of life and property, the officers and keepers of the park may remove all persons from any designated part thereof.

XII. No animal or vehicle shall be permitted to stand, nor any incumbrance of any kind be allowed to remain upon any street adjacent to or bounding upon any public square or place in The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks without permission of the Commissioner for the boroughs wherein located, except that vehicles may be permitted to take up and set down passengers, and to load and unload merchandise in the usual manner, and may occupy the street a reasonable time for the purpose, provided, however, that they shall not while so doing unnecessarily incumber the street or obstruct travel therein.

XIII. No one shall throw stones or other missiles, nor beg or publicly solicit subscriptions or contributions, nor tell fortunes, nor play games of chance, or with any table or instrument of gaming, nor make any harangue, nor climb upon any wall, fence, shelter, seat, statue, or other erection, within such public parks, parkways, squares or places within The City of New York.

XIV. No automobile or horseless vehicle shall be driven upon or over the drives of such public parks, parkways, squares or places at a greater rate of speed than eight miles an hour.

XV. No fence in or about any land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, parkway, square or place in The City of New York, shall be erected until a plan, showing the height, character and method of construction of the proposed fence, has been submitted to the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, and approved by him, and a permit in writing issued therefor.

XVI. No poster or advertising device shall be placed upon any fence or other structure used for advertising or the exhibition in, about or upon any land fronting upon or adjacent to any public park, parkway, square or place in The City of New York, until a description or a drawing of the same shall be filed with the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, and approved by him, and a permit in writing issued therefor.

XVII. Owners of fences or other structures now existing in, about or upon lands fronting upon or adjacent to any park, parkway, square or place in The City of

New York used for advertising or the exhibition of advertisements, shall not modify or alter such structures or the advertising device placed thereon until a written application has been made to the Commissioner having jurisdiction over the same, requesting his permission for the said alteration or modification, which shall be fully described in the said application, and the necessary permit obtained therefor.

XVIII. No military or target company or civic or other procession shall be allowed to parade, drill or perform upon any of the parks, parkways, squares or public places without permission from the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction, except in the case of the use of Van Cortlandt Parade Ground, in Van Cortlandt Park, by the National Guard of the State of New York.

XIX. No automobile, stage or other vehicle shall be allowed to carry passengers for hire over or upon any of the parks, parkways or drives, concourses, plazas or circles, under the control of the Department of Parks, excepting upon traffic roads and except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XX. It shall be unlawful for the owner or operator of any automobile to go upon or stop near any of the music stands or other places in or about any of the parks, parkways, plazas, concourses, circles or squares of the said Department of Parks, where any number of persons are accustomed to congregate, or where such automobiles would be a source of danger to life and limb.

XXI. No garbage, ashes, manure or other offensive material is to be carried over any of the parkways or through such parks, circles, squares or concourses, except upon traffic roads set apart for such purpose. When such refuse is to be removed from residences fronting on any of the above parkways, etc., the vehicles collecting such refuse must leave the parkway as soon as such collection is accomplished, and within the time prescribed by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

No earth, sand or broken stone is to be carted over any of the parkways except on traffic roads unless special permit for the same is obtained from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXII. It shall not be lawful to modify, alter or in any manner interfere with the lines or grades of any of the aforesaid parkways, concourses, circles, squares, avenues, roads, streets, entrances or approaches under the jurisdiction of the said Department of Parks, nor to take up, move or disturb any of the curb and gutter-stones, flagging, trees, treeboxes, railings, fences, sod, soil or gravel, or to go upon or across said parks, parkways, concourses, circles, squares, roads, streets or avenues, except by the means and in the manner provided therefor; nor shall it be lawful to open or otherwise expose or interfere with any of the water, gas and sewer pipes or any of the hydrants, stopcocks, basins or other constructions within or upon said places, nor to take any water or gas therefrom, nor to make any connection therewith, except by special written consent of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and where such consent is given, a deposit of money may be required to insure the restoration of the said curbs, gutters, flagging, etc.

XXIII. No person in bathing costume will be permitted to walk or ride upon any parks, parkways or beaches, except Pelham Bay Park, under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. No boat or vessel shall be placed upon any of the waters of the said parks, except by special permission from the Commissioner having jurisdiction. No skating or sledding will be allowed on the lakes unless the ice is declared by the Commissioner having jurisdiction to be in a suitable condition for that purpose.

XXIV. No one shall fire or carry any firearm, firecracker, torpedo or fireworks, nor make a fire nor make any oration nor conduct any religious or other meeting or ceremony within any of the parks, parkways, squares or places in The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks without special permission from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXV. No one shall enter or leave the parks except at the established entrance ways; nor shall any one enter or remain therein after 12 o'clock at night, except as, on special occasions, general use thereof may be authorized beyond the regular hours.

XXVI. The drives shall be used only by persons in pleasure carriages, on bicycles or on horseback; the bridle paths only by persons on horseback. Animals to be used on either shall be well broken and constantly held in such control that they may be easily and quickly turned or stopped; they shall not be allowed to move at a rate of speed on the drives or bridle paths of more than eight miles an hour; and when it shall be deemed necessary to safety, good order or the general convenience that the speed of an animal or an automobile should be checked, or that it should be stopped, or its course altered, and the officers on duty shall so direct, by gesture or otherwise, such direction shall be obeyed; and no horse or other beast of burden or draft nor automobile shall be driven or suffered to stand anywhere except on the drive or bridle path.

XXVII.—No hackney coach or other vehicle for hire shall stand within the public parks, parkways, squares or places under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks for the purpose of taking up passengers, other than those whom it has brought in, excepting with the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction. No public omnibus or express wagon, and no wagon, cart or other vehicle, carrying or ordinarily used to carry merchandise goods, tools or rubbish shall enter such public parks, parkways, squares or places without permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, excepting upon traffic roads provided for the purpose. No fire engine or other apparatus on wheels for extinguishing fire shall enter or be allowed upon any part of the park excepting the transverse and traffic roads.

XXVIII. No military or target company, and no civic, funeral or other procession, or a detachment of a procession, and no hearse or other vehicle, or person carrying the body of a dead person, shall enter or be allowed on any part of the public parks except by the permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXIX. No person shall bring into or carry within the Central Park any tree, shrub, plant or flower, nor any newly plucked branch or portion thereof without a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

XXX. No camping shall be allowed in any of the public parks, parkways, plazas, squares or public places under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks, except to the National Guard of the State of New York at the parade grounds situated in Van Cortlandt Park.

XXXI. No person shall solicit passengers for any coach or other vehicle for hire within or upon any of the parks, parkways, squares or places within the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks. All drivers or attendants of vehicles for hire standing upon or within any such parks, parkways, squares or places shall remain in close proximity to their vehicles while so standing, and shall not follow, solicit or importune any person entering or leaving the said parks, parkways, squares or places.

Ordinances relating to the use of vehicles in the public parks, parkways and streets under the jurisdiction and control of the Commissioners of Parks of The City of New York.

1. All vehicles must carry a lighted lamp, showing a white light ahead, from thirty minutes after sunset until thirty minutes before sunrise.

2. All vehicles and horsemen, when passing another vehicle or horseman going in the same direction, must keep to the left and leave the vehicle or horseman they are passing on the right hand.

3. All vehicles or horsemen going at a walk or slow trot must keep near the curbstone or gutter on the right hand side of the road; those going more rapidly must keep nearer the middle of the road.

4. No vehicle should stop for any purpose without drawing up to the curbstone or gutter, and always on the right hand side of the road.

5. Before pulling up and before crossing from one side to the other of the road or street, the driver should signal to those behind him by raising his whip.

6. On all drives and parkways where grass plots divide the drive, all vehicles and horsemen must keep on the right hand side drive or bridle path.

7. Drivers, riders and cyclists must not exceed a speed of eight miles an hour in the parks and parkways.

8. Cyclists must not coast in the parks, nor on the parkways or bicycle paths, and must keep their feet on the pedals and their hands on the handle-bars.

9. Cyclists must not mount or dismount, except on the extreme right of the roads or bicycle paths.

10. All bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes or other vehicles of propulsion must be provided with a bicycle bell, not to exceed three inches in diameter.

11. Riding more than two abreast is prohibited.

12. Instruction in operating automobiles, bicycles, tricycles, velocipedes or other such vehicles of propulsion, and all trick or fancy riding on the same, is prohibited in the parks and parkways at all times.



13. Wheelmen shall not ride on the paths in any park; those walking upon the park paths may push their wheels along said paths; but in no case shall the wheels be taken upon the turf.

14. The delivery of supplies to the residences of West Seventy-second street, Riverside Drive and Cathedral Parkway (One Hundred and Tenth street west of Seventh avenue) will be permitted in the forenoon; but no business vehicles shall enter upon or pass over the said parkways after the hour of noon, excepting by special permission of the Commissioner of Parks for the boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond. In passing over the said parkways, business vehicles must go direct to place of delivery, must leave the said parkways without unnecessary delay, and by the shortest route—the place of entry, if possible. The said parkways must not be used to enable business vehicles to reach places exterior to them.

Ordinances applying to the Harlem River driveway.

1. The use of the Speedway is restricted to light vehicles of the classes known as buggies, runabouts, surreys and other like vehicles adapted to the speeding of light harness horses, seating not more than four persons and drawn by one or two horses, except by permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction. Exercising carts may be used until 1 p. m. only.

2. Speeding on Sundays and holidays, and after 3 o'clock p. m. on other days, will be permitted in one direction—from north to south only.

Turning is forbidden except at the ends of the driveway and at the bridges.

3. When not speeding, drivers must keep closely to the right hand side of the road and keep moving.

4. Pedestrians must not cross on the Speedway; subways are provided for that purpose.

5. Loud shouting to make horses break or to urge them on is strictly forbidden.

6. The use of hobbles, or other similar device or apparatus to fetter or connect the legs of horses, for the purpose of restricting or hampering their motion or gait, is forbidden upon the Harlem River Driveway.

Rules and regulations for establishing limits of projection for constructions on the line of Riverside Drive.

1. No structure or construction of any description or any part thereof shall be placed or permitted on or under Riverside avenue until working plans in duplicate, drawn to a scale of one-quarter inch to the foot, shall have been filed with the Department of Parks, with an application for the erection or construction of the said structure; said drawings to show elevations, floor plans and vertical sections of the extent of projections, and that the applicant has received permission to erect the said projection, as shown on drawings from the Department of Parks.

A (a) Stoops or steps, courtyards and areas, or any part or appurtenance thereof shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than 5 feet where the sidewalk is 16 feet wide; 7 feet where the sidewalk is 20 feet wide; 8 feet where the sidewalk is 25 feet wide; and in proportion to the above where the sidewalk is between 16 and 20 feet or between 20 and 25 feet.

(b) No stoop or steps shall be covered, except over the landing or platform at the top; nor shall they be inclosed except by an open railing not more than 4 feet in height.

B (a) Bay windows shall not project in the avenue beyond the building line to the extent of more than 4 feet.

(b) Bay windows when allowed to project in the avenue shall not occupy longitudinally with the avenue more than two-thirds of the width of the building from which they project.

C (a) No balcony, cornice or ornament shall project in the avenue beyond the house line to the extent of more than 4 feet.

(b) No balcony shall be inclosed on the front or sides, except by a railing not over 4 feet in height.

D. No vault or other construction below the sidewalk shall be built, except in such manner as shall leave the sewers, gas and water pipes, or space proposed to be occupied by the same, free and uninclosed and in safe condition; nor in any case to extend in the clear beyond the curb line.

Ordinance adopted, pursuant to chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902.

1. No shade or ornamental tree or shrub shall be planted in any of the streets, avenues or public thoroughfares of The City of New York until such tree or shrub shall have been first approved by a duly appointed employee or expert of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and a permit granted therefor.

2. No holes or excavation shall be prepared for planting any tree or shrub unless sufficient mould of satisfactory quality shall be used, and a duly appointed employee or expert of the Department of Parks shall report that the conditions, such as the absence of poisonous gas and deleterious substances, have been made satisfactory and a permit granted therefor.

3. No stem, branch or leaf of any such tree or shrub shall be cut, broken or otherwise disturbed until a permit has been granted therefor by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

4. No root of any such tree or shrub shall be disturbed or interfered with in any way by any individual or any officer or employee of a public or private corporation until a permit shall have been issued therefor by the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

5. The surface of the ground within three feet of any tree or shrub growing on any street, avenue or other public thoroughfare shall not be cultivated, fertilized, paved, or given any treatment whatever, except under permit granted of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

6. It shall not be lawful to attach or maintain any guy rope, cable or other contrivance to any tree or shrub, or to use the same in connection with any banner, transparency, or any business purpose whatever, except under a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

7. It shall not be lawful to cut, deface, mutilate, or in any way misuse, any tree or shrub, nor shall any horse or other animal be permitted to stand in a manner or position where it may or shall cut, deface or mutilate any tree or shrub, nor shall any building material or other material of any kind or any debris be piled or maintained against any tree or shrub.

8. It shall not be lawful to attach or string any electric or other wire, or to adjust or carry the same into or over any park or parkway, except under a permit from the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

9. Any person violating the foregoing ordinances of chapter 453 of the Laws of 1902 shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall on conviction thereof before a City Magistrate be punished by a fine not exceeding \$50, or in default of payment of such fine, by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days.

Rules and regulations relating to projections and line of curb and surface constructions, under provisions of section 612 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 723 of the Laws of 1901.

1. Each Commissioner may grant permits for the erection and maintenance of projections on any park, parkway, square or public place in his jurisdiction, and on all streets and avenues within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet from the outer boundaries thereof, upon such terms and conditions and upon the making of such compensation to the City as in his discretion he may determine with respect to the particular locality.

2. Where permits have heretofore been granted upon the making of compensation and a new permit is desired to correct any irregularity, defect or supposed want of jurisdiction in the granting of such permit, a new permit may be granted without the making of further compensation.

3. Each Commissioner may determine the line of curb and the surface constructions of all streets and avenues lying within any park, parkway, square or public place in his jurisdiction or within a distance of three hundred and fifty feet from the outer boundaries thereof as he may deem advisable according to the particular locality, and best calculated to maintain the beauty and utility of such parks, parkways, squares and public places.

4. All applications for the privilege of erecting bay windows or other house projections shall be made to the Commissioner in whose administrative jurisdiction the park or parkway affected lies, who may in his discretion grant the same upon payment of a fee to be determined in each case by said Commissioner.

5. Working plans in duplicate, drawn to a scale of one-quarter inch to the foot, shall be required to accompany each application, showing elevation, plans and vertical section of extent of projection, one copy of which will be filed in the office of the Commissioner having jurisdiction, and one other shall be returned to the applicant for filing in the Department of Buildings.

6. No permit will be granted to cover more than four feet of projection beyond the house or building line, nor shall the projections occupy longitudinally

with the street or avenue more than two-thirds of the width of the building from which they project.

Rules and regulations relating to statuary and works of art.

1. No statue, bust, memorial or memorial building of any description shall be erected in any of the public parks, parkways, squares or places of The City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks without the consent of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.

2. No existing natural scenery, no rock, woodland, lawn or existing drive shall be destroyed or altered in order to accommodate any statuary or memorial, and such statuary or memorial shall be secondary in importance to the natural features which must prevail in a park.

3. Statuary, buildings or other structures of whatever character, shall be considered:

First—As objects of art.

Second—In their relation to the landscape.

No such statuary, building or structure, even if in itself satisfactory as a work of art, shall be accepted unless it will help to heighten the beauty of the landscape, and unless a satisfactory and appropriate site shall be found in conformity with previous rules.

4. Buildings required for the comfort of the public or for administrative purposes shall be excepted from the above restriction, but such buildings shall be made as unobtrusive as their purpose will admit, and must be of the most moderate size and shall be screened from view as much as possible.

5. The pedestal of any statue or bust placed in any of the public parks, parkways, squares or places of The City of New York, within the jurisdiction of the Department, shall not exceed two-thirds of the height of the statue proper, nor shall the base occupy more area than is necessary in order to preserve the proper proportions of the pedestal and statue.

6. Statuary and structures already in the public parks, parkways, squares and places, if not placed in conformity with the previous rules, may, if condemned by the Municipal Art Commission, be removed by the Commissioner of Parks having jurisdiction.

Affecting Central Park and Fifth Avenue.

1. Owners of property on the easterly side of said Fifth avenue, between Fifty-eighth and One Hundred and Eleventh streets, are permitted to inclose, for courtyard purposes, and not otherwise, fifteen feet of the sidewalks adjacent to and in front of their respective lots; and the stoops of buildings erected on said avenue may, in such cases, project to the extent of such courtyards; provided further, that such stoops shall, in every instance, be open above the railing or balustrade thereof, and the form, size and character thereof, together with the form, size and character of the area railings, shall be subject to the approval of the Commissioner having jurisdiction; and provided further that no stoop or area railing shall be constructed or put upon said Fifth avenue, or upon any of the streets or avenues surrounding said park, within the boundaries first above mentioned, until the plan thereof has been submitted to and approved by the said Commissioner.

2. No more than four horses shall be allowed to be driven together in the parks of the Borough of Manhattan, and then only when attached to private vehicles, except by special permit.

3. No person shall go on the turf without the permit of the Commissioner having jurisdiction except when and where a blue flag with a white star is shown as an indication that at that time and place all persons are allowed to go on it.

4. No bicycle or tricycle shall be allowed to be taken upon or remain on the Mall in Central Park during the progress of a concert.

Rules Relating to Visitors at the Park Conservatories.

1. The conservatories will be open daily between 10 a. m. and 4.30 p. m.

2. Visitors on entering will keep to the right in order to avoid crowding.

3. Any person found pilfering flowers or leaves or causing damage to the buildings or plants will be arrested and punished.

4. No intoxicated, noisy or disorderly persons will be admitted.

5. Children under eight years of age will not be admitted except when accompanied by parents or guardians.

6. No dogs will be allowed inside the buildings or on the grounds.

7. The scattering of paper or refuse inside the buildings or on the grounds is prohibited.

8. Any incivility on the part of employees should be reported to the Commissioner having jurisdiction. Visitors are requested not to engage in unnecessary conversation with employees.

9. Fifteen minutes before closing time visitors will be warned by the call "All out."

10. No person will be permitted in a house or wing of the conservatory which is not open for public inspection.

11. No smoking will be allowed.

12. Loud, indecent or noisy language is strictly prohibited.

Rules and Regulations Relating to the New York Botanical Garden in Bronx Park.

1. The picking of flowers, leaves, fruits, nuts, or the breaking of branches of any plants, either wild or cultivated, the uprooting of plants of any kind, the defacing of trees, and the carrying of flowers, fruits or plants into or from the grounds of the garden are prohibited, except by written permission of the Director-in-Chief of the garden.

2. Leaving or depositing paper, boxes, glass or rubbish of any kind within the grounds of the garden is forbidden.

3. Dogs are not allowed within the limits of the garden except in leash.

4. It is forbidden to take fish from within the garden, or to molest in any way squirrels, birds, snakes, frogs, toads, turtles or any other wild animal.

5. Throwing of stones or other missiles, playing ball, football, tennis or any other game is prohibited.

6. It is forbidden to offer for sale food, candy, newspapers, books, tobacco, beverages, flowers or other objects, without written permission from the Director-in-Chief and the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx.

7. Boating or rafting on the ponds, lakes and streams is forbidden.

8. Trucking or the driving of business wagons of any kind is forbidden on the roads of the Garden, except those designated for such purposes.

9. It is forbidden to accept or solicit passengers for any cab, carriage or other conveyance at any point within the grounds of the Garden, without written permission from the Director-in-Chief of the Garden and the Commissioner of Parks for the Borough of The Bronx.

10. Visitors are not allowed within the Garden after 11 o'clock at night, nor before 6 o'clock in the morning, except upon driveways and paths designated for their use between those hours.

Ordinances Applicable to the Ordinary Use of the Ocean Boulevard, the Eastern Parkway and the Speedway in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens.

Light harness driving on the Speedway, Ocean Parkway (Ocean Parkway, between Bay Parkway and Kings Highway) shall not be restricted as to speed between the hours of sunrise and sunset; speeding, however, is only to be permitted from Bay Parkway towards Coney Island, and drivers shall be compelled to observe the rules of the road. Automobiles will not be permitted on the Speedway, but must take the west road on the Ocean Parkway, between Bay Parkway and Kings Highway, at all times.

Business wagons, trucks, etc., heavy or light, are prohibited from using the main drive of the Ocean Parkway, and must use the west road at all times. Business wagons, trucks, etc., must use the block pavement at either side of the main road or the traffic roads of the Eastern Parkway.

Prospect Park.

1. All lawns in Prospect Park are commons, and may be used as such, except those restricted by special order, and such restricted sections plainly indicated by proper signs.

Coney Island Cycle Paths.

Cyclists must use the west path when going toward Coney Island, and the east path in returning.

Cyclists must not exceed a speed of twelve miles an hour on the bicycle paths. Racing on the bicycle paths is prohibited, except by special permission of the Commissioner having jurisdiction.



Horses, wagons, carriages and pedestrians must not use the bicycle paths.

Rules for Employees of the Department of Parks.

1. Employees must at all times while on duty wear the uniform prescribed for them.
2. Employees must not enter saloons while wearing the uniform of the Department.
3. Employees must not smoke while on duty in the parks.
4. The bringing of beer or intoxicating liquors of any description at any time into the parks or parkways is positively forbidden, and is a sufficient cause for immediate discharge.
5. Employees must be in uniform, ready for work, at the hour set for beginning their daily work, and must remain actively at work up to the time for quitting. Washing up and changing of clothes must be done after working hours, and not before the hour of quitting.
6. Any employee who is absent from duty must promptly report the reason for his absence to his foreman or person in charge of the gang in which he is employed. Absence without proper excuse will result in dismissal.
7. Employees must conduct themselves properly at all times while on duty.
8. Employees must be civil and polite to visitors at all times. No uncivil conduct or rude replies to questions will be permitted.
9. All employees are required to answer questions asked by visitors to the best of their knowledge and ability.
10. Employees must give their names and numbers to any citizen requesting the same.
11. All changes of address must be reported forthwith.
12. Absence of over three days without leave is equal to a resignation, and employees who so absent themselves without a written resignation or permission will be promptly discharged for cause.
13. Employees must wear their badges prominently displayed on their outer garment.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore adopted affecting the parks, parkways and public places of the City of New York under the jurisdiction of the Department of Parks inconsistent with or in conflict with the ordinances above set forth are hereby repealed.

Which was referred to the Committee on Laws and Legislation.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment transmitting amended ordinance:

No. 2154.

Department of Finance—City of New York,  
June 8, 1903.

Hon. CHARLES V. FARNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held June 5, 1903, a representative of the Erie Railroad Company appeared and requested the Board to amend a resolution adopted at the meeting of May 29, fixing the money value of the ordinance granting to said company the use of Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or place extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, by striking out of section 2, paragraph 2, after the words: "Privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon" and preceding the words: "Notice in writing to the grantee," the words: "Six months," and inserting in place thereof the words: "One year's," making the sentence read: "Privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon one year's notice in writing to the grantee."

The Comptroller moved the reconsideration of the vote by which the resolution was adopted at the meeting held May 29, which motion was unanimously carried.

The Comptroller then moved the amendment requested by the representative of the company, and this motion was unanimously adopted.

I send you herewith a certified copy of the amended resolution as adopted at the meeting held June 5, 1903.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, having received from the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to a resolution of such Board adopted March 3, 1903, a proposed ordinance, granting the franchise or right to use Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or place extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, for the purpose of constructing and operating thereon a double railroad track, from the bulkhead to the lands of the Erie Railroad Company adjoining the easterly side of Thirteenth avenue, and between Twenty-eighth and Twenty-ninth streets aforesaid, and having duly inquired into and considered the matter, does hereby, pursuant to the Greater New York Charter, fix the terms and conditions of the proposed grant and the money value of such franchise or rights proposed to be granted, as follows:

I. The Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns shall pay into the Treasury of The City of New York for this franchise the following sums of money:

- During the first term of five years, the annual sum of \$675.
- During the second term of five years, the annual sum of \$700.
- During the third term of five years the annual sum of \$725.
- During the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$750.
- During the fifth term of five years the annual sum of \$800.

The amounts hereafter to be fixed for any renewal term of such franchise shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually during the last five years of the original franchise, and no renewal of such franchise shall provide for a further renewal.

II. Upon the termination of such franchise, right or privilege, whether original or by way of renewal, the plant and property with its appurtenances of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, in the street and upon the marginal wharf or way aforesaid, shall be forthwith removed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and the surface of the said street or marginal wharf or way upon which such railroad was laid shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface and pavement of such street and wharf. In default of the performance of this condition by the grantee, its successors or assigns, the proper local authorities may cause such property and plant to be removed from the street and wharf aforesaid, and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described at the expense of the grantee, its successors or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

III. The ordinance granting such franchise or right should be in substance, as to the terms and conditions of such grant, in the words and figures following:

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Erie Railroad Company the right or franchise to construct and operate a railroad in and upon Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way lying between Thirteenth avenue and the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Erie Railroad Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise, right and privilege to construct and operate a double-track surface railroad, with a single switch connecting the two tracks, to be operated by steam locomotives or other motive power which may be lawfully employed, except horses or the overhead system of electricity, across Thirteenth avenue and the marginal wharf or way extending from the westerly side of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of this franchise is subject to the following conditions:

First—This ordinance as to the marginal wharf which extends from the westerly line of Thirteenth avenue to the waters of the Hudson river shall not be operative and no rights thereunder shall vest in the grantee, its successors or assigns until the Commissioner of Docks, under the provisions of section 819 of the Charter of The City of New York, shall approve by resolution, license or otherwise, the use of such marginal wharf by the grantee in the manner herein provided, or in such other manner as he may prescribe, not inconsistent with the terms of this ordinance.

Second—The said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate such railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, for the term of twenty-five years from the date when this ordinance is signed by the Mayor,

unless sooner terminated as hereinafter provided, with the privilege of renewal of the grant for a further period of twenty-five years, upon a fair revaluation of said right, privilege and franchise, but such renewal shall not provide for any further renewal. Such revaluation shall be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said railroad by itself, and is not to include any valuation derived from the ownership, operation or control of any other railroad by the grantee, its successors or assigns. It shall be made in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment or its successor in authority; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railroad company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six months prior to the expiration of the grant, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller or his successor in authority within three months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience, and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine the books of the railroad company. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but shall not in any event be less than the minimum amount fixed as the sum to be paid annually for the last five years of the original franchise.

Provided, however, and this grant is upon the express condition that the right, privilege and franchise conferred by this ordinance may be cancelled and annulled upon one year's notice in writing to the grantee, its successors and assigns, by the joint act of the Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York and of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or their respective successors in authority, and thereupon all the rights of the grantee, its successors or assigns in and upon the street and marginal wharf or way aforesaid shall cease, and the railroad and its structures thereon shall be forthwith removed and the pavement of the street or wharf restored under the same conditions and covenants as are contained in the following paragraph of this section, designated third:

Third—Upon the termination of such franchise, right or privilege, whether original or by way of renewal, the plant and property, with its appurtenances, of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, in the street and upon the marginal wharf or way aforesaid, shall be forthwith removed by the grantee, its successors or assigns, and the surface of the said street or marginal wharf or way upon which such railroad was laid shall be restored to a condition equal to that of the surrounding surface and pavement of such street and wharf. In default of the performance of this condition by the grantee, its successors or assigns, the proper legal authorities may cause such property and plant to be removed from the street and wharf aforesaid and the surface thereof to be restored in the manner above described at the expense of the grantee, its successors or assigns, and such expense shall be recovered by The City of New York by action or otherwise.

Fourth—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall pay for this franchise to The City of New York the following sums of money:

- During the first term of five years the annual sum of \$675.
- During the second term of five years the annual sum of \$700.
- During the third term of five years the annual sum of \$725.
- During the fourth term of five years the annual sum of \$750.
- During the fifth term of five years the annual sum of \$800.

Such sums shall be paid into the Treasury of The City of New York on November 1 in each year.

Fifth—The rights and franchises granted hereby shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title thereto, or right, interest or property therein pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Erie Railroad Company, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of The City of New York, acting by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, or its successors in authority, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—The said railroad may be operated by locomotive steam power or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law, excepting overhead electrical power and horse power, provided, however, that the locomotive steam engines used shall be housed or boxed so as to conform to the type commonly known as the dummy engine.

The number of cars to be included in any train operated upon the railroad shall be limited to ten, and the speed of the engines and cars shall never exceed six miles per hour. No car or engine shall be permitted to remain stationary within the limits of Thirteenth avenue, or upon the marginal wharf or street at any time.

Seventh—The railroad constructed under this ordinance shall be maintained and operated solely for the purpose of the transportation of goods, wares and merchandise and for no other purpose, and especially for no purpose in connection with the passenger traffic as commonly understood.

Eighth—Such railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railroad construction and operation, and solely upon the terms and according to the lines and surveys and of the character of the rails and other parts of the construction approved by the Commissioner of Docks of The City of New York and the President of the Borough of Manhattan. Such railroad of the grantee, its successors or assigns, shall be maintained in good condition throughout the term of this grant.

Ninth—Said railroad shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York, and especially shall in all respects be subject to the power and authority of the Commissioner of Docks to regulate and control the uses of the marginal wharf or way above described, and the transportation of property thereon.

Tenth—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall at all times keep the street between the tracks, and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow.

Eleventh—The grantee, its successors or assigns, shall keep in permanent repair the portion of the surface of the street and of the marginal wharf or way between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. And The City of New York shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of the street and marginal wharf or way, and in that event the grantee, its successors or assigns shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer at its own expense, and the provision as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twelfth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this grant may be forfeited and annulled by The City of New York by an action brought by the Corporation Counsel on ten days' notice to the grantee, its successors or assigns.

Sec. 3. This grant is upon the further and express condition that the provisions of the Railroad Law applicable thereto, and all laws or ordinances now in force or which may be adopted relating to surface railroads operating in The City of New York shall be strictly complied with.

Sec. 4. The grantee, its successors or assigns shall commence the construction of the railroad under this franchise and complete the same within six months from the date when it has obtained the necessary permits and resolutions of the City officials and Departments, and on or before January 1, 1904, otherwise this grant shall be forfeited forthwith and without any proceedings either at law or otherwise for that purpose, provided, however, that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for a period not exceeding six months.

Sec. 5. This grant is upon the express condition that the grantee, within thirty days after it has been duly authorized to construct or operate its railroad hereunder and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York the sum of \$1,500, either in money or in securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance of the terms and conditions of this grant, especially those which relate to the



payment of the annual charge for the franchise, the repairs of the street pavement and the removal of snow and ice, and the quality of construction of the railroad. In case of default in the performance by said company of such terms and conditions, The City of New York shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same with interest from such fund after ten days' notice in writing to the said company.

In case of any drafts so made upon this security fund, the said company shall, upon thirty days' notice in writing, pay to the Comptroller of The City of New York a sum of money sufficient to restore the said fund to the original amount of fifteen hundred dollars, and in default thereof the grant hereby made may be canceled and annulled at the option of the Comptroller of The City of New York, acting on behalf of said City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this section shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to The City of New York.

Sec. 6. This grant shall not become operative until said railroad company shall duly execute, under its corporate seal, an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant and agree on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and file the same in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York within thirty days after the signing of this ordinance by the Mayor.

Sec. 7. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Gentlemen—In compliance with your communication of the 27th instant, referring back to me my letter of May 14, 1903, relative to fixing certain salaries of Inspectors, Steam Engineers and Firemen in the Department, and requesting that such application be submitted without regard to personnel, I hereby request your Board to pass a resolution, recommending to the Board of Aldermen that the following positions or grades be established in the Department of Bridges:

Inspector of Steel, \$1,650 per annum.

Steam Engineer, \$1,500 per annum.

Fireman, \$1,050 per annum.

In regard to the above positions I desire to say that I wish to promote an Inspector of Steel from \$1,500 to \$1,650 per annum. The individual intended to be thus promoted is a very capable, hard-working man, who works early and late, and, in emergencies is called out at night, on Sundays or holidays, and as he gets an annual compensation, is not given any additional pay for overtime. He also is in charge of the repair gang of bridge mechanics, and supervises the repairs made by that gang to all the bridges over the Harlem river and Ship canal, which in itself is exceedingly responsible work. He has been performing his duties with perfect satisfaction since 1897, and is a very valuable man, whose service is worth much more than he now receives.

The Steam Engineers in charge of the bridges over the Harlem river and Ship canal, Willis Avenue Bridge, Third Avenue Bridge, Madison Avenue Bridge, Macomb's Dam Bridge and Ship Canal Bridge are in complete charge of their respective bridges, and are responsible for their condition and the proper working of their machinery. They are capable men, of long continued service in the Department, and have considerable responsibility upon them. I believe \$1,500 per year is fair and reasonable pay for men of their class.

The Firemen intended to be increased are detailed at the Third and Willis Avenue bridges as oilers, where there is considerable machinery to be taken care of. They oil and clean the machinery and assist the Engineers in making repairs. They are both licensed Engineers and relieve the regular Engineer in case of necessity. As their duties are of a higher order than those of the other Firemen it seems only proper and just that they should get somewhat more pay. I therefore purpose to give them \$1,050 per annum.

Dear Sir—The following is a synopsis of the workings and requirements of the Topographical Bureau of the Borough of Queens from 1902 to date:

Maps requested for street opening proceedings, forty-nine (49).

Total length of streets to be opened, 253,300 feet, or nearly 48 miles.

Of this amount the Bureau has completed seven (7) streets, with a total length of 13,880 feet, or 2.6 miles.

There are eight streets, with a total length of 30,000 feet, or nearly six (6) miles, of which final damage maps have been made and forwarded to the Corporation Counsel. There are six (6) streets, with a total length of 23,900 feet, or nearly four and one-half (4½) miles, for which the damage maps have been submitted to the Corporation Counsel. There are twenty-three (23) streets, with a total length of thirty-one miles, surveyed and ready to be compiled. The remaining five streets, with a total length of three and one-half (3½) miles, have not as yet been asked for by the Corporation Counsel.

The cost of surveying and compiling these maps from January 1, 1902, to April 1, 1903, is as follows:

January 1 to December 31, 1902 .....	\$15,712 00
January 1 to March 31, 1903 .....	6,133 00

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It will take six (6) Draughtsmen at least nine (9) months to finish these maps, and the cost will amount to six thousand dollars (\$6,000).

Ingleside.

The Ingleside drainage area, situated in the Third Ward, amounts to 1,600 acres. Within this area there has been about fifty miles of streets laid out, and the lines of these should be monumented at once. The cost of the same will amount to about \$10,000.

Maspeth.

The Maspeth drainage area, situated in the Second Ward, which contains 3,300 acres, is partly surveyed, and with the six parties who are now in the field, this field work is expected to be completed shortly. There are at present nine Draughtsmen compiling the topographical map and expect this map to be completed about July 1.

The cost of making the topographical map of this section to April 1 is as follows:

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This is not the real cost of this portion of the topographical map as the Board of Public Improvements had located monuments, established bench marks and made a traverse of a large section of this drainage area which this Bureau was able to make use of. As soon as this map is completed and adopted the street line monuments should be placed in position. The estimated cost is \$25,000.

Woodside.

The Woodside drainage district contains about 1,500 acres, and to complete the topographical map of same will cost about \$8,000.

Richmond Hill.

The Richmond Hill, Woodhaven and Morris Park Drainage District contains about 7,000 acres. To make the surveys and complete the topographical map will cost about \$55,000. To complete these various maps and monument the streets this year will require the following estimated amounts:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to the request made of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to establish the grade of Assistant Engineer at a salary of \$3,000 per annum, in the Bureau of Highways, this Borough, and in response to the request for further information I beg to submit the following:

No grade exists for Assistant Engineer in the Department under the President of the Borough of Brooklyn between \$2,550 and \$4,000. For the due organization of the Department it is both proper and necessary that an intermediate grade should be established without requiring that promotions, when made, should go to the extreme above described. For this reason the establishment of the grade of \$3,000 is asked.

I further point out that in its practical application this grade will apply to such a post as that of the Assistant Engineer in charge of the Topographical Division, and that the establishment of this post at this salary is a much less compensation than is paid for it in other portions of the City, and is due and right, having regard to the large area of this borough and to the volume of work done.

The same grade also would apply to the post of the Assistant Engineer who is in charge of the Repair Division in this borough. This post has under its jurisdiction 450 miles of paved streets, other than asphalt, and as many miles more of dirt roads; in all, between 900 and 1,000 miles of streets and highways. This is more than double the entire street mileage of the Borough of Manhattan, and I would point out that the post, when established at \$3,000 per annum, will be at a lower grade of pay than is given in other boroughs for the same work.

Under this same classification would come also the posts of the Assistant Engineers in charge of all the pavements laid in this borough, both original and repaving. The amount of work being done under the appropriation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is greater than ever before in the history of Brooklyn and involves care and skill in its supervision, for which the salary proposed to be established is not a large compensation. It is that which has heretofore been paid for the same work in this borough.

Dear Sir—Replying to your favor of April 9 relative to the salary of Cornelius Lynch, Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry in the Bureau of Buildings, I beg leave to advise you that Mr. C. B. J. Snyder, Superintendent of School Buildings, to whom your communication was referred, writes me under date of April 17, as follows:

"Yours of the 13th instant, forwarding copy of communication received from Deputy Comptroller Stevenson in regard to the appointment of Cornelius Lynch, Inspector of Masonry and Carpentry, at \$20 per week, is received.

"In reply I would say that we needed the services of an Inspector on new Public School 34, Fingerboard road, Borough of Richmond, and all those certified lived in the boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, and were unwilling to accept a position in the Borough of Richmond as long as they could be employed in the other boroughs.

MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Malone asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 2172.

AN ORDINANCE authorizing and providing for the location of a Public Market Place and for the establishment and maintenance of a Public Market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, for the acquisition of lands for this purpose, and for the regulation and maintenance of the same.

Whereas, The requirements of the inhabitants of the southerly and westerly portion of the Borough of Brooklyn, comprising an area equal to one-third of the entire borough, demand the location of a Public Market in that vicinity, there being no market south of the Wallabout Market, distant about four miles from said localities; and

Whereas, The means of transportation by vehicles and cars, both trolley and steam, throughout said localities concentrate at or near the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry in said borough; and

Whereas, The establishment of a Public Market in that vicinity would tend to greatly increase the assessed valuations of real estate throughout said localities, which are capable of sustaining a population at least four times greater than that now existing.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Provision is hereby made for the acquisition and establishment of a Public Market in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, upon the lands or lands under water hereinbelow described, which are hereby selected for a Public Market in said Borough of Brooklyn, and surveys and maps thereof are hereby directed to be made and filed as provided by law. Said lands or lands under water shall be acquired for said purposes by purchase or by condemnation proceedings as required by law, provided, however, that this matter be submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that no further proceedings be taken until the acquisition of said lands or lands under water is approved and authorized by a majority vote of all the members of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as required by law.

Sec. 2. The Corporation Counsel is directed and instructed to take the necessary steps to acquire title to said lands or lands under water and any and all rights and hereditaments in and to the same by condemnation proceedings to be conducted as required by law.

Sec. 3. The lands or lands under water so selected, whether purchased or acquired as above provided, shall be set apart for use as a market and dedicated to market purposes, and shall be used and occupied as such in the manner provided by law.

Sec. 4. The expense of the purchase and acquisition of said lands or lands under water and interests therein, or any part thereof, and the amounts of the awards made in condemnation proceedings for the value of said lands or lands under water and interests therein, and the money for the payment thereof, together with the fees of the Commissioners of Estimate, compensation of such necessary clerks or assistants as they may employ, and all other necessary expenses in and about said condemnation proceedings, including the fees of counsel employed by the Corporation Counsel in the proceeding and all other reasonable expenses incurred by said Corporation Counsel in the conduct of said proceeding, shall be paid through the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, and the Comptroller of said City is hereby authorized and directed, upon the requisition of said Board of Estimate and Apportionment, to issue such Corporate Stock of The City of New York from time to time to the amount of such requisition or requisitions, in the manner provided by law, and the amount so issued is hereby created a fund for the purposes aforesaid, but no bonds or other evidences of indebtedness shall be issued under the authority of this ordinance unless the proposition for creating such debt shall first be approved by a majority vote of the whole Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by law. The proceeds of such bonds shall be paid into the City Treasury and shall be used solely for the purposes aforesaid.

Sec. 5. #### REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the resolution should be adopted and payment made. The resolution covers the following bills, all of which have been verified by an officer of the company, as appears from the statements annexed:

1. Bills for the telephone in the office of the City Clerk in the City Hall, for the last six months of 1902. From these bills it appears that during the summer quarter there were no extra local telephone messages, although there were as much as \$42.15 for messages outside of the borough. In the last quarter, however, there were 294 additional messages, and there was \$43 for messages outside of the borough. As to the out of the borough messages, some are doubtless necessary, but your committee call attention to the fact that some of them are messages to points not within the City even. In August two were to Hoboken, one to Jersey City and one to Larchmont; and in September two were to White Plains; in October two were to Jersey City; in November two were to Lakewood; in December two were to White Plains, two were to Albany and one was to Philadelphia. Your committee are unaware as to what City business would have called for such telephone messages. Some one has an affection for Fort Lee, which increased from one telephone message in September to ten in November, and dwindled to four in December.

2. Telephone in the committee room of the Board of Aldermen in the City Hall. This covers the whole year, and has some outrageous features. The foreign messages, while not itemized, are almost as much in every month as the regular charge, and in some months considerably exceed it. Apparently unjustifiable charges also occur, and while the items are not given for any except the last quarter of the year, they appear there in plentiful amount. In October there was one to Mt. Vernon, three to Middletown; in November two to Mt. Vernon, two to Philadelphia, one to White Plains and one to Jersey City; in December two to Yonkers, eight to Jersey City, one to New Rochelle, Fort Lee messages, to which we called attention under the other bill, also appear here, though not in as great degree. There are in November two, and in December four. Just what City business there is in Fort Lee your committee are unaware, though they recognize the importance of messages to Aqueduct and Sheepshead Bay.

They therefore recommend that the said resolution be adopted.

It has become known to me that your Honorable Board has decided to change the name of "William street," of this Borough, to "Wagner street." Also that there is a petition under way by the Pioneer Iron Works to have this set aside and make its name "Pioneer street," which, I think, is only a matter of business on their part. It is my opinion that, if there is to be a hearing on this case, we should have a word, as we have for the past thirty years conducted our Mission on that street, and we receive yearly about 20,000 letters addressed to the seamen who visit us. It is probably more than the combined mail of all other residents of the entire street; and as the proposed change is to facilitate the mail service, and not for the benefit of any one business concern, I will, in my own and the many hundred seamen's names, most humbly petition you to decide to keep the originally intended name of "Wagner street," as it is easier to pronounce correctly, and much shorter to write, and a much prettier sounding name.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on December 9, 1902 (Minutes, page 1790), the annexed resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay the bill of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for \$284.70, for services in the Borough Hall, in Brooklyn, and on March 31, 1902 (Minutes, page 1264), the resolution to authorize the Comptroller to pay the bill of the New York and New Jersey Telephone Company for \$92 for similar services, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, having examined the subjects, they believe the payments should be authorized.

These two resolutions cover the telephone services in the room of the Board of Aldermen in the Borough Hall of Brooklyn for 1902. The first of them covers the first three-quarters of the year, and the second covers the last quarter of the year. Your Committee recommend, with reluctance, the payment of these bills, but recommend payment because the Telephone Company could doubtless recover a judgment against the City, and put the City to the expense of paying the costs of the judgment, unless the Comptroller is authorized to pay the bills, there being no doubt of the City's liability.

There are two features of these bills to which your Committee particularly call attention. The regular charge every quarter is \$37.50, but in the first quarter of the year, as will appear from the verified statements hereto annexed, the extra charges amounted to \$44.55, or more than as much again as the regular charge. In the second quarter they amounted to \$78.68, or more than twice as much again as the regular charge. In the third quarter they amounted to \$49.05, or considerably more than as much again as the regular charge. In the fourth quarter they amounted to \$54.50, or considerably more than as much again as the regular charge. Every time there was a telephone to this Borough there was an extra charge. Necessarily there were many such messages. For the first quarter they amounted to 422; for the second to 765; for the third 499, and for the fourth to 519; and in addition there were telephones to places in the Borough of Queens, within the Greater City, for all of which extra charges were made, although the bills show that this telephone belongs to the Long Island Division.

To the Telephone Company it is apparent that the different Boroughs do not constitute one City. Your Committee are curious as to whether the cost of maintaining telephone service between the City Hall in Manhattan and the Borough Hall in Brooklyn is equal to the cost of maintaining telephone service between the extreme ends of the Borough of Manhattan, although the charges greatly differ. Your Committee understand that it is impossible to get the Telephone Company to give a contract for messages all over the City. This Company operates only in the Boroughs on Long Island, and in New Jersey. The New York Telephone Company is the Telephone Company which controls the system in the Borough of Manhattan. Your Committee recommend, for the reasons above stated, the adoption of the resolutions.

AN ORDINANCE governing sidewalk widths in the Borough of Richmond.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. In carrying out street improvements in the Borough of Richmond, where the regulation of sidewalks and curbing is affected, in all new streets and in old ones, where possible, unless serious difficulties interfere, to be then determined by the President of the Borough, the sidewalks between street lines and curbs shall be of widths as follows:

A—Where street is less than forty (40) feet wide—to be determined by the President of the Borough, as each special case may require.	Special
B—Where street is forty (40) feet wide and less than fifty (50).....	10 feet
C—Where street is fifty (50) feet wide and less than sixty (60).....	12½ feet
D—Where street is sixty (60) feet wide and less than seventy (70).....	15 feet
E—Where street is seventy (70) feet wide and less than eighty (80).....	17½ feet
F—Where street is eighty (80) feet wide and less than one hundred (100).....	20 feet
G—Where street is one hundred (100) feet wide and over.....	25 feet

Sec. 2. For all new sidewalk pavement the footway shall be not less than five (5) feet in width, with either flagstones or artificial stone, in full accordance with or better than called for in the Standard Specifications for this work, on file in the office of the President of the Borough of Richmond.

Sec. 3. All sidewalks shall be laid on a grade rising from top of the curb, one-half (½) of an inch to each foot, where only one five (5) foot width of pavement is laid; and of one-third (1-3) of an inch where the whole sidewalk width is to be paved.

Sec. 4. All ordinances, or parts thereof, now in effect conflicting with these, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred the annexed ordinance in favor of forbidding the presence of dogs in the streets, highways, parks and public places of the Borough of Manhattan, except under certain restrictions, respectfully

REPORT:

That a considerable number of cases of rabies in dogs and a few cases of hydrophobia have aroused public sentiment to the necessity of an ordinance imposing greater restrictions upon the presence of dogs in the City's streets. Your Committee held a well-attended public hearing, at which the public sentiment referred to was given expression. The present ordinance now in force in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx (section 672 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897) requires that all dogs in the public streets shall be in leash, but, as is well known, this ordinance is not enforced. The reason for this is that the ordinance prescribes a penalty of three dollars (\$3), to be recovered from the owner of the dog by suit brought by the Corporation Attorney upon the complaint of the Police Commissioner, a proceeding which fails to provide a direct and speedy remedy. The ordinance fails also to reach the homeless and ownerless dogs, which are the chief cause of offense and danger. The ordinance which was submitted to the Committee has the approval of the medical profession generally and of the Board of Health. Your Committee has prepared and reports with its approval the annexed substitute ordinance, which differs from the original ordinance in no essential particular, simply embodying a change in language introduced by the Committee to meet a criticism which was offered. The proposed ordinance is a compromise between the present law and the desires of the extreme advocates of muzzling. It offers to dog owners a choice between the leash and the muzzle. The ordinance applies to the Borough of Manhattan only.

Your Committee recommends that the substitute ordinance be adopted.

(Original.)

AN ORDINANCE forbidding the presence of dogs in the streets, highways, parks and public places of the Borough of Manhattan, except under certain restrictions.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose or at large in any of the streets, highways, parks or public places in the Borough of Manhattan unless such dog shall be securely muzzled so that it shall be impossible for it to bite, tear or otherwise wound with the teeth any human being or any other animal.

Sec. 2. The Police Commissioner is hereby directed to secure the enforcement of this ordinance by providing for the taking and detention in the public pound of any dog found going abroad loose or at large and not muzzled as aforesaid. Every dog so taken shall be detained in the public pound for a period not to exceed three days. The owner of such dog may recover the same upon his filing with the Clerk employed by the Police Commissioner and designated Property Clerk, pursuant to section 331 of the Greater New York Charter, an affidavit stating the fact of ownership, his place of residence and a description of the dog sought to be recovered, and upon payment to said Clerk of the sum of three dollars (\$3). The said Clerk shall thereupon furnish to the said owner a certificate authorizing the Keeper of the Pound to deliver the said dog to the said owner, and upon delivery to him of the said certificate the said Keeper shall forthwith release the dog detained as aforesaid. At the expiration of three days' detention of any dog, such dog shall be destroyed. All moneys collected pursuant to this ordinance shall be paid into the Police Pension Fund.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the presence of any dog in any street, highway or public place, provided such dog shall be in the charge of a competent person, and shall be securely held by a chain or leather strap not more than four feet long.

Sec. 4. Section 672 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(Substitute Ordinance.)

The failure of the owner of any dog to recover the same within three days after its taking shall be deemed an abandonment of the same, and such dog shall be destroyed at such time and in such manner as may be determined by order of the Police Commissioner. All moneys collected pursuant to this ordinance shall be paid into the Police Pension Fund.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this ordinance shall prevent the presence of any dog in any street, highway or public place, provided such dog shall be in charge of a competent person, and shall be securely held by a chain or leather strap not more than four feet long.

Sec. 4. Section 672 of the Revised Ordinances of 1897 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

(Substitute Resolution.)

Resolved, That the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx, Queens and Richmond be and are hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a commission of five, one member at least of which to be a civil engineer in active and actual practice of his profession, to prepare a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of the said boroughs, the members of which shall serve without pay, and who shall report their full findings back to the Board of Aldermen to be concurred in; and be it further

The Minority of the Committee on Finance, to whom was recommended on April 21, 1903 (Minutes, page ), the annexed resolution and ordinance in favor of the appointment of a Commission to prepare a plan for beautifying the City, etc., and for the issue of \$10,000 of Special Revenue Bonds to defray its expenses, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That, pursuant to the directions of the resolution recommitting the matter, your Committee, on Monday, April 27, 1903, held a public hearing.

No one appeared in opposition, but the representatives of many public-spirited bodies interested in beautifying and developing the City appeared and addressed your Committee.

In order that there may be no doubt as to the intention of the ordinance, your Committee recommend not the present ordinance, but the ordinance with the amendment which the Chairman of the Committee offered to accept at the last meeting of the Board of Aldermen, so that the Commission will undoubtedly confer with the Heads of Departments and Borough Presidents while preparing their plans.

There is nothing for the Committee to add to the report which they previously made to the Board at length, and which they now annex. Your Committee urge the adoption of the ordinance, believing it will be greatly to the City's good. In beauty, sanitation, housing and traffic arrangements, the City is suffering from the fact that the plans were adopted in 1807. May it never be said of this Board, one hundred years later, that it showed short-sightedness and, in 1903, hesitated to take means to remedy the mistakes and avoid further ill consequences of the plan of 1807.

Your Minority accordingly urge the adoption of the amended substitute ordinance.

Your Committee do not agree with the majority report for the reason that such a commission should be for the whole City, and should be appointed by the Mayor, who represents the whole City.

AN ORDINANCE, in relation to the appointment of a City Commission for preparing a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of the City, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. His Honor the Mayor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a commission to confer with the heads of departments and Borough Presidents to prepare a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of this municipality, the members of which shall serve without pay, and shall make a report on or before the 1st day of May, 1904, to the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen.

Sec. 2. That for carrying out the purposes of said commission the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested, in pursuance of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue special revenue bonds to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars, the proceeds of which are to be applied to the defraying of the expenses of said commission.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Hon. SETH LOW, Mayor of New York:

Sir—In response to your request the Municipal Art Society has the honor to furnish you with such information as it has been able to obtain, which in its judgment should be of service in the preparation of a comprehensive scheme looking toward the improvement and beautification of the City.

This information is derived from the past work and the present suggestions of various public-spirited societies and individuals whose courtesy it desires to acknowledge—and is contained in the annexed report.

Any scheme for the adequate beautification of the Greater City must have as its basis the fundamental plan upon which the City is to improve and develop.

In a city expending an annual income of one hundred millions—appropriating, as it has, some two hundred millions for permanent improvements—where three private corporations now propose to expend one hundred and fifty millions—it goes without saying that such an expenditure should be made with reference to a logical plan, accepted in advance, and so broad in its scope as to provide not only for public improvements, but for private expenditure; and so comprehensive as to make unnecessary changes in the near future.

Manhattan is to-day dominated by a plan created in 1807, and, as yet, unmodified in essential details; the other boroughs are still unrelated in structural plan; the suburbs, while tributary to the Greater City, are without its jurisdiction, and permitted, through deference to antiquated laws, to develop along lines which, as they prove inadequate, must be changed at enormous expense.

New York's location is such that it must become a greater centre than the world has ever seen. Nothing but the folly of its citizens can postpone the prompt realization of this. A fundamental plan is necessary and needed now. The commercial supremacy of the City demands it. Private enterprise is paralyzed until it is had.

Any practical scheme for embellishment must be based upon it. For it must wait the solution of our ever more pressing social problems in City growth. Public spirited citizens have no outlet for their civic interest, and generous donors no opportunity for their benevolence.

The absence of such a plan makes co-operation with adjacent districts and neighboring cities an impossibility. Schemes proposed to-day must be changed to-morrow. Costly improvements adequate to local conditions must eventually be made obsolete by the steady growth of the greater City.

Millions upon millions are thus needlessly wasted. All projected developments are met with "pleas of economy." There could be no greater economy for the City than its adoption of an intelligent plan as to which details, as planned, shall conform. It need not be carried out at once, but its establishment would guide the imagination of our citizens and make possible the effective co-operation of all interested in the development of our world metropolis.

Our conditions so differ from European ones as to make it difficult, if not impossible, to follow the precedents there set. The Hausmannizing of Paris, possible under imperial rule, might have been impracticable under the Republic. But while the precise methods adopted by European cities may not be the best here, their failures can be utilized as timely warnings. The great imagination of the French people made possible the revivification of Paris on a scale, in its inception, considered adequate for the City for long years to come. But it has already been found too cramped in that it ignored outlying districts, and to-day definite action has been taken to raze the exterior walls and to permit the city to extend its area.

In the procurement of the information which it submits, the society has had the valuable assistance and co-operation of the following important organizations, which it called in conference:

The Merchants' Association of New York.  
The New York Board of Trade and Transportation.  
The Manufacturers' Association of New York.  
The American Society of Civil Engineers.  
The Architectural League of New York.  
The National Society of Mural Painters.  
The National Sculpture Society.

While it is not implied that the societies conferring have endorsed any of the suggestions other than those contributed by them, and those only as tentative examples to lead to better things, it is suggested that these schemes and plans, contributed during the last fifty years by leading engineers, artists and laymen, without hope of remuneration, but simply with the desire of arousing public opinion and inciting interest, may form the basis of discussion from which some definite plan may be wrought out.

#### Freight Traffic.

Such a plan should transcend City limits and provide for great freight terminals, such as the one proposed for Communipaw, with its logical changes of the contiguous property—the Newark Meadows; readjustment of the New York Central tracks at Forty-second street; the Pennsylvania Railroad tunnel and the other tunnels to follow; possible canals for freight distribution; judicious development of the water fronts—and the eventual connection of these with the underground system. A successful city must be so planned as to permit economical and prompt delivery of merchandise. Natural advantages should be so supplemented as to utilize them to the utmost.

#### Passenger Traffic.

The problem of passenger traffic should be met by realizing that in time every important street must have an underground—not as at present constructed, but with the street excavated from house line to house line, thus permitting at the sides ample room for electric conduits, pipe galleries and water mains, and saving in expense of repaving, excavation and water waste. Union stations could then be so placed as to easily distribute the immense and ever growing traffic. Avenues without adequate outlet should be made to connect with main arteries. Bridge terminals should be made points of distribution and created to relieve congested districts. Slight modifications might materially benefit many existing points. Subsidiary streets and arcades should further relieve specially crowded hours; and street traffic on main avenues and along water fronts should be aided, through division, by isles of safety.

#### Parks.

The proposed plan, while considering existing park area, should add water front parks, connected by parkways and forming breathing space, with appropriate opportunities for recreation. The small park system should be extended, not always by condemnation of large tracts or even blocks, but by competent designing of small tracts. Old parks could easily be rearranged to suit new conditions, and outlying districts so encouraged to acquire Park reservations as to supplement the plan of the City itself.

#### Public Buildings.

Any plan should consider the design, grouping or location of public buildings with reference not only to utilitarian requirements, but as factors of one or more convenient, attractive and dignified local centres. Instead of letting government buildings be located at hazard, their location wait until sites are hard to get, reservations should now be made which, as the City grows, can be utilized as sites for monumental structures. Without the accident of the reservoir at Forty-second street and Fifth avenue, a proper site for the Public Library would have been difficult to find. Many equally important projects are delayed, if not discouraged, by lack of proper location. The adoption of a proper plan would make possible the co-operation of citizens interested in its welfare, and eventually by gift or bequest many public or quasi-public buildings would be added by private or semi-public enterprises. The location of libraries, hospitals, schools, colleges, settlement houses and charities, could thus be so guided as to provide more appropriate City buildings.

#### Decoration of Public Buildings.

Public buildings should have not only consistent architecture, but should have as well their sculptural and mural decorations selected with reference to the purpose for which the building was created and the historic interest of the section in which it is placed. Such buildings should be treated with rational decoration, considered at the inception of the building by men whose special artistic training fits them for such planning. The work should be regarded as an integral part of the building—the decoration to be appropriate in character and represent the art of our country. Public buildings would thus become storehouses of popular history, and the custodians of much now found only in isolated museums; and more that would never be created except for the opportunity thus furnished.

#### Public Monuments.

A city is known by its monuments, and the truest test of citizenship is pride in records of those individuals who, from century to century, have contributed to its welfare; and of those events which, under test of time, have been deemed historic. Of all recommendations received, no list is longer than that of the subjects suggested for patriotic and historic expression—a water gate and triumphal arch at the Battery; a monument in Battery Park to record the growth of the country from immigration; a public forum at Union square; a monument to the prison ship martyrs at Fort Greene, Brooklyn; a historic monument at or near Twenty-third street and Fifth avenue, to record the events of the Civil War; historical tablets; memorial fountains—many if not all of which would be given by our public-spirited citizens, if they could but feel that in so doing they were contributing to perfect the detail of a plan so grand that, when completed, it would make our City the leading city of the world.

Such a plan as that proposed would be rather a guide for whatever the City might do than a requisition calling for action; nor would its realization involve drastic changes of law. As has been so ably stated by Mayor Hewitt in his message of 1888 to the Board of Aldermen:

"There are no such things as vested rights which can interfere with the power of the community to do those things which are essential for its growth, its safety and its progress in civilization."

"Improvident grants have been made; but, when they come in contact with the superior rights of the people, indemnity may be claimed and awarded, but their existence cannot be pleaded as a bar to improvement. This proposition is true not only



of those companies which have their works under the streets, but of all companies which occupy them for any purpose whatever. The only theory upon which the rights of private corporations to use the public streets has ever been justified is that they give greater facilities to the purpose for which the streets were created. But the right of the City to require the streets to be used in such manner as will from time to time promote the general convenience of the community is unquestionable."

With such authority in the hands of the City, with the unquestioned desire to co-operate on the part of great corporations with the undoubted interest of our citizens, there is no reason why, if action is taken at the present time, the great results foreshadowed in that address could not be achieved in the immediate future:

"With its noble harbor protected from injury, and the channels of approach straightened and deepened; with its wharves and docks made adequate for the easy transfer of the vast commerce of the country; with its streets properly paved and cleaned, and protected from destructive upheavals; with cheap, easy and rapid transit throughout its length and breadth; with salubrious and attractive parks in the centres of dense population; with an ample supply of pure water, now nearly provided; with a system of taxation so modified that the capital of the world may be free to come and go as the air of heaven, the imagination can place no bounds to the future growth of this City in business, wealth and the blessings of civilization. Its imperial destiny as the greatest City in the world is assured by natural causes, which cannot be thwarted except by the folly and neglect of its inhabitants."

and such supplementary recommendations as have been obtained from public spirited organizations and individuals.

In submitting the accompanying plans and propositions, the various societies represented in the conference must not be understood as specially committed either in favor of any item or against every other treatment of the problems considered. Nor must any society be considered responsible for suggestions other than those credited to it.

While it is fully appreciated that in so summary an inquiry it may not have been possible to note many very meritorious projects, it is still believed that those submitted are so far inclusive or typical as to clearly indicate the nature and extent of the re-planning and embellishment of The City of New York.

Such a problem is, first of all, an engineering one, for it involves the consideration of problems of design and of construction in almost every branch of applied science, aesthetic and economic.

The several boroughs of the Greater City which have heretofore been treated only as units, and that too exclusively from a real estate point of view, must be considered anew as parts of a whole to be made beautiful as well as useful.

Contrasting as they are in topography, geological formation, character of occupation and subdivision, an effort must be made to render them attractive in appearance, accessible at all points and from all points, and thoroughly supplied, each according to its needs, with water, light and transport, and with means for disposal of waste. And all this must be so accomplished that while constant and marked progress is made toward a definite end, excessive inconvenience to large sections for protracted periods shall not be caused, as has occurred in some recent undertakings.

To bring about this result, the co-operation of men experienced in management of problems in commerce, in finance, in transportation, in engineering, in landscape architecture, in architecture, and in the fine arts, is essential. Any Commission to consider the question should include in its membership representatives of each of these classes of occupation who are experts, commended by the test of work done under their direction, as well as a member of the legal profession, well versed in municipal law.

In view of the above it was unanimously resolved:

Whereas, Any practical development or embellishment of New York City must be based upon its first essentials—those of a port at which centres land commerce; a site for the manufacture and trade dependent thereon; a home for those engaged therein, and a centre of finance as well as of society, literature and art.

Resolved, That we recommend to the Mayor the appointment of a commission to consider this subject in all its phases, broad enough in scope to include representatives of

COMMERCE, FINANCE, TRANSPORTATION, ENGINEERING, LANDSCAPE ARCHITECTURE, ARCHITECTURE, THE FINE ARTS, MUNICIPAL STATISTICS AND MUNICIPAL LAW.

(Original.)

Resolved, That his Honor the Mayor be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a commission to prepare a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of this municipality, the members of which shall serve without pay, and be it further

Resolved, That for carrying out the purposes of said commission, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested, in pursuance of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), the proceeds of which are to be applied to the defraying of the expenses of said commission.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on January 20, 1903 (Minutes, page 215), the annexed resolution for \$10,000 of Special Revenue Bonds, for the defraying of the expenses of a special commission to be appointed by the Mayor to prepare a plan for the beautifying of the City, respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the Board should authorize the appointment of such a commission and the expenditure of such a sum of money. Having conferred with the introducer of the resolution, they have received from him an ordinance as a substitute, and in place of the resolution originally introduced, they accordingly recommend the adoption of the annexed ordinance.

The adoption of this ordinance will be carrying out the recommendation on this subject made in this year's message of the Mayor. The object is to secure the best expert knowledge and advice both for the development of the transportation and other facilities of the City, and also for the beautifying of the City. We all recognize two peculiar features of New York. One is the necessarily congested nature of its centre—the Borough of Manhattan. The physical formation of the City's surroundings, which cause this congestion, make up the other feature, and that other feature is the natural beauty of the City. Despite her problems New York offers opportunities for artistic development such as does no other city in the world. But one thing is needed. That, in part, this ordinance is intended to provide, namely, the use of her best brains to deal with her problems and to utilize her great advantages. Washington is beautiful because many years ago her best brains were made use of. The same is the reason for the beauty of Paris. Neither Washington nor Paris can be compared with New York in the advantages which nature has given for the rendering of beautiful effects. If we can secure a comprehensive plan for the future, and focus upon it the attention, understanding and enthusiasm of our people, the time will not be long before our City will be known not only as the centre of the world in business and finance, but also as the first city of the world in beauty.

Annexed hereto, marked "A," is a communication from the Secretary of the Municipal Art Society addressed to the Mayor upon this subject, and a resolution, marked "B," containing resolutions passed by a number of public-spirited bodies, therein mentioned, making recommendations in line with which is this ordinance.

(Substitute Ordinance.)

AN ORDINANCE in relation to the appointment of a City Commission for preparing a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of the City, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. His Honor the Mayor is hereby authorized and empowered to appoint a commission to prepare a comprehensive plan for the beautifying and development of

this municipality, the members of which shall serve without pay, and shall make a report on or before the 1st day of May, 1904, to the Mayor and the Board of Aldermen.

Sec. 2. That for carrying out the purposes of said Commission the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested, in pursuance of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding ten thousand dollars, the proceeds of which are to be applied to the defraying of the expenses of said commission.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

They therefore recommend that the substitute ordinance be adopted.

Resolved, That for the carrying out of the purposes of said Commissions the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested, in pursuance of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, to issue Special Revenue Bonds to an amount not exceeding fifteen thousand dollars, the proceeds of which shall be applied to the defraying of the expenses of such Commissions, and distributed among the boroughs as follows:

Manhattan, five thousand dollars; Brooklyn, four thousand dollars; The Bronx, twenty-five hundred dollars; Queens, two thousand dollars; Richmond, fifteen hundred dollars.

Hon. JAMES J. DEVLIN:

Sir—In our efforts during the past year to better the condition of the dependent ones in our charge, which I am pleased to see have proved in many ways successful, I discovered that the inmates of our Almshouses were sadly in need of something to occupy their time and thoughts. Of course, those able to work are employed, and I am not referring to them. But with few exceptions our inmates are not able-bodied or fit to work. The vagrants do not reach us. They wind up in the Work House, so that our population consists of feeble or sickly people. While many of them have led reckless or dissipated lives, there are not a few whom circumstances, through no fault of their own, have rendered penniless and homeless. As officials in the Department of Charities it behooves us to keep in sight and be guided by the meaning of the word Charity. In short, "Do unto others as we would wish others to do unto us." Prompted by that feeling, I secured from Brother Leontine last summer the Protectory Band for Saturday afternoon concerts. I wish you could have seen the effect of that music upon those poor people. For the time being they were completely metamorphosed and forgot their surroundings. The music proved a bright spot in their existence and furnished them pleasant anticipations as well as recollections.

It seems to me then, that in the arrangement that is annually made for furnishing open air concerts in the different parks of the City in the summer time, our Department could be appropriately included, and I urgently request you to aid in bringing this result about, for I firmly believe that no concerts gave greater pleasure than did those we had last summer at Blackwell's Island.

Whereas, Upon each such map or plan so made there has by authority of this Board been placed a memorandum as a part thereof and clearly indicating the particular estate or estates, rights, terms, privileges, franchises or easements to be acquired or extinguished for the purposes of such construction and operation, in relation to such parcel of property, such memorandum being substantially in the form following, to wit:

"Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York.

"Memorandum indicating the particular estate, rights and easements to be acquired for the purposes of the construction and operation of the Rapid Transit Railroad in relation to the piece or parcel of property shown upon this map, May 7, 1903.

"An estate in fee simple absolute, free from all liens or encumbrances, in and to the lands and premises, with the buildings thereon and the appurtenances thereto belonging, described as follows, that is to say:

the southerly side of Westchester avenue; running thence (5) northerly along the said westerly side of Brook avenue thirty-seven (37) feet to the southerly side of Westchester avenue; running thence (6) westerly along the southerly side of Westchester avenue fourteen and seventy-five one-hundredths (14.75) feet; running thence (7) southwesterly and parallel to the course hereinbefore described and numbered (4) two hundred and twenty and seventy-one one-hundredths (220.71) feet; running thence (8) in a southwesterly direction along a curve with its convexity to the east with a radius of five hundred and six and five-tenths (506.5) feet to a point in a line parallel to the northerly side of Gerard street and one hundred and forty-seven one-hundredths (100.47) feet northerly therefrom, which point in said line is one hundred and fifty-seven and twenty-six one-hundredths (157.26) feet easterly from its intersection with the easterly side of Bergen avenue; running thence (9) westerly along said last-mentioned line six (6) feet; running thence (10) in a southwesterly direction along a curve with its convexity to the east with a radius of five hundred and eight (508) feet to a point in a line perpendicular to the northerly side of Gerard street and intersecting the said northerly side of Gerard street seventy-nine (79) feet from the intersection of the said northerly side of Gerard street and the easterly side of Bergen avenue, which point in said line is eight (8) feet northerly from the said northerly side of Gerard street; running thence (11) along said line southwesterly eight (8) feet to the northerly side of Gerard street; and running thence (12) easterly along the said northerly side of Gerard street forty-seven (47) feet to the point or place of beginning.

The President reported for the Committee on Plans that it was awaiting advice from Paris with reference to the operation of the continuous train there, before reporting further on that matter.

The President submitted the following letters, which were read:

NEW YORK, May 2, 1903.

ALEXANDER E. ORR, Esq., President, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners,  
No. 320 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—In regard to the complaint of property owners on Joralemon street that work was being carried on at earlier and later hours than I had intimated, I beg leave to say that the only instances where work had been carried on after seven o'clock in the evening were, in one case, for repairing machinery, and in the other for diverting the sewer in Joralemon street. This latter work had to be carried on at a time of night when the sewers were not taxed with a large flow of water, and the work was done very promptly and with the least inconvenience to the people as was possible.

In regard to working in the morning before seven o'clock, you may recall that in Mr. Boardman's agreement I was not to do any hauling except between 6 a. m. and 7 p. m., and I am told this has never yet been done and the young man who told you we did not begin until seven o'clock was ignorant of the arrangement mentioned in Mr. Boardman's letter, and I am very sorry that anything he has said should have misled you in corresponding with the property owners.

I am this week going to take up with my engineer and superintendent some rearrangement for working hours to submit to you, which would involve beginning later in the morning and working later at night. I understand the Health Board permits work to be carried on until eleven o'clock at night, but I am not informed as to what time they will permit work to be started in the morning. I will have the whole matter fully gone into, as before even suggesting any change I would like to give the matter the very closest study.

If the people residing on Joralemon street would be a little patient and not object to our rushing the work, we could the sooner remove the derricks, which are only temporary and to be used until the shafts are sunk and the shields installed, when they will be entirely removed and the work housed in and the dumping done from the ends instead of from the sides.

I will write you again later in regard to the hours of work.

DEAR SIR—The Law Department has been consulted by officers of the Board of Health as to the duties of the latter in the matter of complaints made to them in reference to the disturbance caused by the action of the contractor at the shaft in Joralemon street, between Garden place and Henry street.

It seems that one of the ladies living on that block, I think a Miss Phillips, is seriously out of health and claims that her malady is very much aggravated by the noise and confusion resulting from the prosecution of the work. One particular phase of the complaint is that work is begun at an unreasonable hour in the morning, so that all sleep is prevented after half-past five.

The question referred to us is receiving consideration. Irrespective of what may be the duty of the Board of Health in such a case it appears to me to be proper that I personally call your attention to the situation and it may be that, without any prejudice to public interests, some course can be adopted which will obviate the particular hardship which has led to this particular complaint.

The President reported that the Committee on Plans had had a conference with President E. W. Winter, of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, on the comprehensive plans proposed by Mr. Parsons, and that Mr. Winter had at the suggestion of the Committee written the Board. His letter was as follows:

May 5, 1903.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, Chairman, Rapid Transit Commission, No. 320 Broadway,  
New York, N. Y.:

DEAR SIR—Complying with your request that the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company state in writing to your committee its attitude in regard to the recommendations contained in the report of Wm. Barclay Parsons, Chief Engineer to the Rapid Transit Board, under date of March 12, 1903, so far as they bear on the question of facilities for this company in Manhattan and development of the system in Brooklyn, I beg to submit the following:

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company is prepared to adopt the plan of a subway connecting with the Manhattan end of the Williamsburg Bridge leading to Maiden lane, thence by tunnel and subway to a point in Brooklyn, near Tillary street, and there connecting with the proposed elevated tracks of this company, as recommended in Mr. Parsons' report, and to lease and operate the same on terms substantially similar to those applying to the contract of the Interborough Company with this exception.

The First Refunding Gold Mortgage of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company runs for one hundred (100) years from March 20, 1902. Very large outlays for extending and adding to the properties of this company will be made from the proceeds of this mortgage. The subway and tunnel would become an integral part of the property in its earning capacity, and its undisturbed use for the purpose and



in the manner prescribed should be assured for the full term to the owners of these securities.

And upon the further condition of lease for the same period of the New York and Brooklyn, the Williamsburg and Manhattan bridges on terms to be agreed upon.

An arrangement for elevated connection of the Williamsburg Bridge with the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, via the Second Avenue Division, and operation of the elevated trains of this company pending the completion of the subway and tunnel.

Granting of franchises for extension and enlargement in Brooklyn according to requirements and substantially as recommended in Mr. Parsons' report.

Permit me to say, should your committee desire it, the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company would be glad to consider any alternative that might be suggested as equally well calculated to meet the requirements of the situation.

The President reported that one of the Commissioners of Appraisal appointed for the condemnation proceedings in Brooklyn to condemn the easements through the streets had declined to serve, and that another had been appointed; that title would be vested after expiration of twelve days' additional period of announcement as to the changed Commissioner.

The President presented letter of Henry George, Jr., of 6th instant, as follows:

No. 101 WEST EIGHTY-FOURTH STREET,  
NEW YORK, May 6, 1903.

Hon. ALEXANDER E. ORR, President, New York Rapid Transit Commission:

DEAR SIR—About three weeks ago, being drawn into a controversy with Mr. Albert B. Boardman, of Counsel for the Rapid Transit Commission, over criticisms of the contracts made by that body, I pointed out in a communication to the newspapers (April 16) the anomalous and even scandalous relations of Mr. Boardman with the Commission, he being, by his own statement in a letter addressed to you as President of the Board and by you placed on its minutes, the paid attorney of the Pennsylvania Railroad in matters relating to its dealings with the Rapid Transit Commission.

At least one meeting of the Board has been held since I called public attention to this matter, but as no action was taken it may be fair to subject was passed over because not formally brought before the Board. I therefore now formally address you as President of the Commission, and through you invite consideration of the Board to the followings facts:

A year ago this month, after the Commission had made its grant of a great tunnel franchise to the Pennsylvania Railroad, Mr. Boardman, while retaining his position as counsel for the Commission, accepted a position as counsel to the Pennsylvania Company. You received both private and official information of this fact at the time. On June 5, 1902, Mr. Boardman addressed to you, as President of the Board, a letter formally announcing the employment of his firm by the Pennsylvania Company, adding: "In view of this professional relation, I respectfully request that my firm be excused from any service to the Board in connection with the Pennsylvania matter."

While it is now eleven months since this letter was put upon the minutes of the Commission, no action has been taken upon it. Mr. Boardman, while attorney for the Pennsylvania Company, continued to act, and still persists in acting, as counsel for the Commission, and as such draws from the City the salary of \$10,000 a year. The minutes show that he continued to attend the Board meetings, a large proportion of which dealt with Pennsylvania matters. Nor could it be said that while he was an active legal adviser for the Rapid Transit Commission he was only a passive attorney for the Pennsylvania Company, for, as a matter of fact, he has recently actively represented the railroad in court proceedings relative to the building of the tunnel.

The Rapid Transit Commission is not a private, but a public body. Yet it seems scarcely necessary to observe that such a position as Mr. Boardman is permitted to hold is against all public usage. No man is supposed to be able to render in all respects faithful service to the public if at the same time he be attorney for a private interest contracting with the public. The ethics governing public office condemn such a thing, and the law in some instances expressly forbids it. If such a practice is permissible with the Rapid Transit Commission it should likewise be permissible with all other public offices and bodies—municipal, State and Federal. We know full well what a general cry would go up if Tammany were in possession of the Rapid Transit Commission, or of any of our municipal offices, and should permit a public legal adviser attached thereto to have the dual and conflicting relations represented by Mr. Boardman as counsel for the Rapid Transit Commission and also as attorney for the Pennsylvania Company, which has franchise relations with the Commission involving millions of dollars.

Much might be said touching this important subject, but this doubtless will suffice to invite your official consideration of the matter and suggest appropriate action by the Rapid Transit Board.

The Committee on Quarters and Staff reported that within the next few months the completion of the Commission's new quarters would, for the first time, make practicable the arrangement and use of its library and collections; that (largely from the extent to which office conditions had not permitted otherwise necessary expenditures) this year's appropriation had been so sparingly used as to leave a margin of at least \$750 to \$1,000 now available; and that its experience last December, under authority then given, to secure maps, street plans, prints, books, etc., dealing with the subject matter of the Commission's work, had shown not merely the great value and extent of material that should be secured, but also how hard and expensive was its collection, except by picking it up where found—mainly in European cities.

After discussion, it was

Resolved, That the Assistant Secretary be relieved from other duties during the months of July and August; that he be and is instructed, during such time, to inquire and report upon matters relating to the work of the Commission, namely, municipal art, City development, civic centres, public and quasi-public buildings, noteworthy modern instances of City embellishment, including boulevards, bridges, plazas, interior as well as exterior decoration of public and quasi-public buildings and matters connected therewith, visiting the cities of Copenhagen, Stockholm, St. Petersburg, Moscow, Vienna, Budapest, Munich, Dresden, Berlin, Hamburg, Antwerp, Brussels and Paris, and to purchase maps, plans and illustrated material, subject to instructions by the Commission and Committee; and that the time occupied in such duties be understood to include the vacation usually allowed him; further

Resolved, That \$150 be appropriated towards the traveling expenses of the Assistant Secretary for the above purposes.

The matter of specific instructions as to purchase for the Commission's library of plans, maps, photographs or other published matter was discussed, but reserved for further action.

The subject of representation of the Commission at the Dresden Municipal Exhibition of 1903 was presented, but also held for further consideration.

The Chair presented a communication from Mr. Daniel C. French, relative to the removal of trees that interfered with the view of the Sherman Statue, by Mr. Saint Gaudens, at the Plaza in Central Park.

The Assistant Secretary presented the bill of Commissioner Coombs for \$22.50, being expenses in connection with the work of the Commission.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
