Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, City Hall, N. Y.:

Dear Sir—Enclosed find clippings of the Evening World of October 6 and the
Evening Telegram of October 15, showing the necessity for the use of an automatic
and manual device for the control of gas. Said requirement should be embodied in
the Building Code now under consideration. The compulsory use of automatic and
manual devices would be a great saving of life and property and should be mandatory.

Said device or devices should be approved by the Building Superintendent or
other legally constituted authorities, so that builders and owners could know what
is required of them.

Kindly give this your personal consideration. The code as now proposed does not
appear to provide for this necessity.

sheet metal box connected by one-half inch iron conduit pipe with roller in all
elbows, through which a one-eighth inch bronze cable connects said valve with an
iron pull box, attached to the outside of the building."

President of the Borough of Manhattan—Request for Special Revenue Bonds,
\$3,500, for the Purpose of Remodeling and Making Repairs to Rooms to Be
Occupied by the Municipal Civil Service Commission.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Dear Sir—Request is hereby made for an issue of Special Revenue bonds in the
amount of Three Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$3,500) for the purpose of
remodeling and making repairs to the building located at No. 49 Lafayette Street,
to accommodate the Municipal Civil Service Commission who intend to occupy several
floors.

In my request to your Honorable Board under date of October 7th, 1914, for an
issue of Special Revenue bonds in the amount of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4,000)
for the care and operation of this building for the remainder of the year, there
was included an item of Two Thousand and Seventy-five Dollars (\$2,075) for repairs
and alterations, which was to be applied to the floors to be occupied by the Depart-
ment of Licenses.

I suggest that the amount of this request, if granted, be added thereto, making the
total amount available for repairs and alterations to the floors to be occupied by the
Department of Licenses and the Civil Service Commission respectively Five Thou-
sand Five Hundred and Seventy-five Dollars (\$5,575).

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances, relating to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 68 of article 3 of chapter 4 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "The Sinking Fund of The City of New York," is hereby repealed and the following substituted in lieu thereof.

Sec. 68. "It shall be the duty of the Comptroller to keep a correct journal of the proceedings of the said Board of Commissioners, to be authenticated by the Secretary of the Commission by his signature; and once in each year, or oftener, if required, to render unto the Board of Aldermen a full and detailed report of the proceedings of the said Board of Commissioners."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

No. 1011.

Department of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Purchase Coal Without Public Letting.

Department of Street Cleaning of The City of New York, October 22, 1914.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President of the Board of Aldermen, New York City.

Dear Sir—It has been the practice in this department to purchase coal by contract after public advertisement and letting, for the various stations in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn. This method has never attracted more than two bidders at any one time during the last four years—and at times only one—and has invariably resulted in high prices.

In the Borough of Manhattan there are 12 stables, 1 garage, 46 section stations, 3 encumbrance yards and 14 dumps to which it is necessary to deliver quantities of coal; in the Borough of the Bronx there are three stables, 5 section stations and 7 dumps; in the Borough of Brooklyn there are 9 stables, 32 section stations, 1 encumbrance yard and 25 dumps. These points of delivery are scattered over so wide a territory that the contractors are obliged to charge increased prices on account of the length of haul. Storage facilities at the various points of delivery are such that only five tons of coal can be kept at one stable, one ton at the section stations and less than that quantity at the dumps.

On account of the difficulty in estimating the quantities required for a period of six months or a year, at times there has been an excess of coal without storage facilities. Experience shows that better prices can be obtained by inviting dealers in the neighborhoods of the various stables and section stations to submit informal bids for small quantities of coal, as needed.

For the foregoing reasons, the authority of the Board of Aldermen to purchase coal in the open market without public letting, in amounts not in excess of five (5) tons per month per station, is respectfully requested.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Request for Special Revenue Bonds to Provide for an Estimated Deficit in the Fund for the Purchase of Chemicals Used in the Purification of the Croton and Bronx Water Supply.

City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, October 24, 1914.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall:

Dear Sir—On July 20, 1914, I asked that the Board of Aldermen authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$7,600, to provide for an estimated deficit to that extent in the fund for the purchase of chemicals used in the purification of the Croton and Bronx water supply.

I am now able to reduce the amount estimated to be required for this purpose to the sum of \$4,300. This reduction is made possible by transfers of funds recently effected which, however, were not practicable at the time of my previous request. In support of the estimate, I submit the following table:

Amount estimated to be consumed from October 19, 1914, to January 1, 1915, inclusive:

105 days, at 4,500 pounds per day.....	472,500 pounds.
Chloride of lime on hand October 19, 1914.....	240,366 pounds.

Amount necessary to be purchased.....	232,134 pounds.
Add 10 per cent. for weight of containers.....	23,213 pounds.

*255,347 pounds.

The estimated daily consumption of 4,500 pounds is based upon the average consumption during the past year at the Dunwoodie chlorinating plant. The price per pound is based upon the result of the last public letting, held in the latter part of September. The containers are included for the reason that they are charged for at the same rate as the contents.

I trust that you will appreciate the importance of replenishing this appropriation at the earliest possible moment, as the purity of the water supply renders it essential that an ample quantity of chemicals should be on hand at all times.

The City of New York, Department of Finance, Comptroller's Office, October 16, 1914.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on September 25, 1913, it was unanimously adopted that His Honor, Mayor Kline, appoint a committee to procure a portrait of the late Mayor Gaynor, to be hung in the City Hall. The following were appointed as such committee:

Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx, Chairman.

Lewis H. Pounds, President, Borough of Brooklyn.

Wm. A. Prendergast, Comptroller.

In accordance with our instructions, we examined the work of various artists of this city for the purpose of selecting an artist to paint the portrait. We found that Mayor Gaynor had sat for a portrait to Mr. J. Campbell Phillips, and that the late Mayor and members of his family had expressed satisfaction with the work. This portrait was for sale. We had it hung in the office of the Comptroller and invited the family and some of the friends of Mayor Gaynor to pass judgment upon it, and upon two others which were exhibited at the same time, one of which had been painted in the lifetime of Mayor Gaynor, and one since.

The consensus of opinion of all who examined the portraits was that the work of Mr. Phillips was the most desirable one, that it was an excellent portrait in every way, and that the probability of our ability to have a better portrait painted after Mayor Gaynor's death was very remote.

Your committee, therefore, selected the portrait painted by Mr. Phillips, and recommends that it be accepted by the City. The price is \$2,000. Respectfully submitted,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On September 29, 1914, the Department of Health requested, pursuant to the provisions of Section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, the establishment of the grade of position of Food Expert in the Department of Health at a salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, for the temporary employment of one incumbent. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The purpose of the request is to provide for the temporary employment of a food expert in the Department of Health to investigate and report on conditions prevailing in the packing industry, and to recommend procedure necessary to the proper regulation and sale of meats, dairy products, eggs, fruits, vegetables and other foodstuffs. Because of the anomalous condition now existing in the food market, the services of an expert with unusually wide experience in this line and an intimate knowledge of methods now pursued is desired."

In view of the foregoing facts, the temporary employment of a Food Expert to make the investigation suggested appears to be desirable.

We, therefore, recommend that the attached resolution, approving the establishment by the Board of Aldermen of the grade of position of Food Expert at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, be adopted. Respectfully,

Report of the Committee on Buildings in Favor of Adopting an Ordinance Regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and Other Systems of Piping.

The Committee on Buildings, to which was referred on September 22, 1914 (Minutes, page 370), the annexed ordinance regulating the installation and maintenance in buildings of plumbing, water supply, gas and other systems of piping, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, The Substitute Ordinance presented herewith has been prepared to meet so far as possible the criticisms that were brought out at a public hearing held October 8th.

In addition to changes made to meet these criticisms, changes were made all through the ordinance in the language in consultation with the Corporation Counsel's office. These verbal changes do not change the substance of the ordinance, but are intended to make the provisions a little clearer and to eliminate unnecessary verbiage.

In Section 1, the last paragraph was altered to meet the criticism that as previously written it would not be clear what was intended by "fifty per cent. of the existing work."

Section 4 of the ordinance as previously presented is entirely omitted, as its provisions are found to be sufficiently well covered in the Tenement House and Labor Laws.

Sections 7 and 8 of the previous draft were combined into one and now form Section 6 of the Substitute Ordinance. These provisions were very thoroughly discussed with Assistant Corporation Counsel O'Brien, who has had very extensive practice in handling violation cases for the Bureau of Buildings.

The Committee recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

SUBSTITUTE.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and other Systems of Piping.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Rules: The plumbing and drainage systems, water supply pipes, gas piping, steam or hot water heating or power systems, refrigerating systems and other systems of pipes or apparatus for holding or conveying gases, vapors or fluids hereafter installed and maintained in or upon any building in the City of New York shall conform to such rules as may be provided for by law or may be found necessary for the protection of life, health or property, and adopted by the superintendent of buildings; and it shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any such systems, piping or apparatus installed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules adopted hereunder.

Said rules, hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the CITY RECORD on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative.

Nothing herein contained or in the rules adopted hereunder shall require the alteration or reconstruction of any existing work that was lawfully installed, nor prevent repairs or the addition of new fixtures to existing work in conformity with the practice followed in the original installation, provided, however, that when such repairs involve the removal or alteration of more than one-half of the existing work affected by the repairs the rules in force at the time of such repairs shall apply.

Section 2. Shut-off Valves: Every building hereafter erected and also every existing building other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid shall have a conveniently accessible valve or other suitable device fixed to the supply pipes leading into the building at a place outside of the building, so arranged as to allow the supply to be shut off. Such valve or other device shall be so marked as to indicate the contents and purposes of the supply pipe to which it is attached.

Section 3. Tests of Plumbing: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system of plumbing and drainage hereafter installed in any building before the same has been tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system, and until a proper and adequate water supply has been provided.

The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of plumbing and drainage that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system

or the issuance of a partial certificate, nor prevent the use of such part of a larger system provided that such part constitutes by itself a complete system properly tested and supplied with water.

Section 4. Tests of Gas Piping: It shall be unlawful to use or permit the use of any new system or an extension of an old system of gas piping in any building before the same has been inspected and tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules, to insure the tightness of the system. The superintendent of buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of gas piping that is ready for such exhibition and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are complied with, shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of existing systems of gas piping without further inspection of test unless said superintendent of buildings has reason that defects exist which make the system dangerous to life or property.

Section 5. Registration of Plumbers: Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in the City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of the Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of the said City in which he performs work, under such rules as the said Bureau may prescribe.

No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the City of New York unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation and each and every member of such copartnership shall have been registered as above provided.

Section 6. Enforcement; Penalties: This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code, and each superintendent of buildings shall, in his own borough, enforce its provisions and the rules adopted thereunder. Any and every violation of the provisions of this ordinance or of the rules adopted thereunder shall subject the owner, lessee or agent of the building or premises where such violation has been committed or shall exist, and the architect, builder, contractor, or any other person who has assisted in the commission of such violation, to the same legal procedure and the same penalties as are prescribed for violations of the Building Code; and such violation shall be subject to the same legal remedies and prosecuted in the manner prescribed in said Building Code.

Section 7. Existing Provisions Repealed: Section 141 and that portion of Section 89 of the Building Code of the City of New York reading:

"Every building other than a dwelling house hereafter erected, and all factories, hotels, churches, theatres, school-houses and other buildings of a public character now erected in which gas or steam is used for lighting or heating shall have the supply pipes leading from the street mains provided each with a stop-cock placed in the sidewalk at or near the curb, and so arranged as to allow of shutting off at that point,"

—and all rules relating to plumbing or parts thereof in conflict with or so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 8. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

ORIGINAL.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the Installation and Maintenance in Buildings of Plumbing, Water Supply, Gas and other Systems of Piping.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The plumbing and drainage systems, water supply pipes, gas piping, steam or hot water heating or power systems, refrigerating systems and other systems of pipes or apparatus for holding or conveying gases, vapors or fluids, hereafter installed and maintained in any building in the City of New York shall conform to such rules and regulations, as may be provided for by law or may be found necessary for the protection of life or property, promulgated by the Superintendents of Buildings or other legally constituted authorities; and it shall be unlawful to use any such systems, piping or apparatus executed or maintained in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance or the rules and regulations promulgated hereunder.

Said rules and regulations hereafter adopted, and any changes thereof, shall be published in the CITY RECORD on eight successive Mondays before they shall become operative.

Nothing herein contained or in any rule or regulation promulgated hereunder shall require the alteration or reconstruction of any existing work that was lawfully executed, nor prevent repairs or the addition of new fixtures to existing work in conformity with the practice followed in the original installation, provided, however, that when such repairs involve changes to the extent of fifty per cent. of the existing work, or the addition includes any new vertical soil, waste or vent line, or new house drain, the rules and regulations in force at the time of such repairs or addition shall apply.

Section 2. Every building hereafter erected and every existing building other than residence buildings occupied exclusively by one or two families and having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, which may be supplied from some outside source with gas, vapor or fluid shall have the supply pipes leading into the building provided each with a conveniently accessible stopcock or other suitable device, outside of the building, so arranged as to allow of shutting off the supply. Such stopcock or other device shall be so marked or labelled as to clearly indicate the contents and purposes of the supply pipe to which it is attached.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful to use any new system of plumbing and drainage in any building before the same has been thoroughly tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with its rules and regulations, to insure the tightness of the entire system, and until a proper and adequate water supply has been provided.

The Superintendent of Buildings shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of plumbing and drainage that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found to be satisfactory and the test requirements are met shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the inspection and test of part of a system or the issuance of a partial certificate, nor prevent the use of such part of a larger system provided that such part constitutes by itself a complete system properly tested and supplied with water.

Section 4. In all buildings, occupied or used by both sexes, separate toilet facilities shall be provided for each sex, except where toilet facilities are provided for each separate family or household in residence buildings, or where private toilets are attached to single rooms or suites of living rooms.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful to use any new system or an extension of an old system of gas piping in any building before the same has been inspected and tested under the supervision of the Bureau of Buildings and in accordance with such rules and regulations as may have been lawfully promulgated to insure the tightness of the system. The Superintendent of Buildings, shall, within a reasonable time after being requested to do so, cause to be inspected and tested any system of gas piping that is ready for such inspection and test, and if the work is found satisfactory and the test requirements are met shall issue a certificate to that effect. Nothing herein contained shall prevent the use of existing systems of gas piping without further inspection or test unless there is reason to believe that defects exist which make the system dangerous to life or property.

Section 6. Once in each year every employing or master plumber carrying on his trade, business or calling in The City of New York shall register his name and address at the office of The Bureau of Buildings in the Borough of the said City in which he performs work, under such rules and regulations as the said Bureau may prescribe.

No person, corporation or copartnership shall engage in or carry on the trade, business or calling of employing or master plumber in the City of New York, unless the name and address of such person and the president, secretary or treasurer of such corporation and each and every member of such copartnership shall have been registered as above provided.

Section 7. The Superintendent of Buildings shall, each in his own Borough, enforce the provisions of this ordinance and of such rules and regulations made thereunder by any lawfully constituted authority, provided, however, that after the completion of any system of piping, apparatus or other work coming under the provisions of this ordinance which, when in use, constitutes a fire hazard the supervision of the same shall devolve upon the Fire Commissioner.

Section 8. This ordinance shall be deemed a part of the Building Code and any and every violation of the same or of the rules and regulations lawfully promulgated thereunder shall be subject to the same legal procedure and the same penalties and shall be prosecuted in the same manner as prescribed in the Building Code.

Section 9. Section 141 and that portion of Section 89 of the Building Code of the City of New York reading,

"Every building, other than a dwelling-house, hereafter erected, and all factories, hotels, churches, theatres, school-houses and other buildings of a public character now erected in which gas or steam is used for lighting or heating, shall have the supply pipes leading from the street mains provided each with a stop-cock placed in the sidewalk at or near the curb, and so arranged as to allow of shutting off at that point,"—and all rules and regulations relating to plumbing or parts thereof and all ordinances in conflict with or so far as inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 10. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordinance in Relation to Public Cartmen.

By Alderman Boschen—
AN ORDINANCE relating to public carts and cartmen.
Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:
That a new section be added to the Code of Ordinances known as section 313: Every public cartman shall keep a book or record of all transportations or removals made by him of such merchandise, household or office furniture, or other bulky articles, which shall contain (1) the name and address of such public cartman; (2) the name or names of the person, firm, corporation or association owning or claiming to own such goods, household or office furniture or other bulky articles and employing such public cartman for such transportation and removal; (3) the streets and house numbers of the respective premises from and to which such transportation or removal shall be made, and if such premises, or either of them, shall not be designated by a street number, such public cartman, in lieu thereof shall otherwise clearly identify the same. Such book or record shall be upon a form approved by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses.
A duplicate or true copy of such book or record of each such transportations or removals so made by such public cartman for the preceding month shall be filed at the end of each month in the Bureau of Attendance, Department of Education, and such book or record shall be deemed a public document and open for public inspection between the hours of 9 a. m. and 4 p. m. except on Sundays and holidays.
Any public cartman, upon conviction before the Commissioner of Licenses for a violation of the section, shall be punished by suspension or revocation of his license or the imposition of a fine not to exceed ten dollars for each offense.

An Ordinance to Amend the "Public Hack Ordinance."

By Alderman Brush—
AN ORDINANCE to amend the "Public Hack Ordinance."
Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 2 of Article 1 of the Public Hack Ordinance, approved by the Mayor June 2, 1913, as amended, be and it hereby is amended to read as follows:

2. Definitions. A public hack is a vehicle plying for hire and which solicits public patronage upon the streets and highways of this City.

A cab is a public hack so designed and constructed as to comfortably seat, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Licenses, not more than two persons as passengers inside thereof.

A coach is a public hack so designed and constructed as to comfortably seat, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Licenses, four or more persons as passengers inside thereof.

A sightseeing car is a motor-driven vehicle designed to carry seven or more persons from a fixed locality to points of interest about the City.

A taximeter is a mechanical instrument or device by which the charge for hire of a public hack is mechanically calculated, either for distance traveled or for waiting time, or for both, and upon which such charge shall be indicated by means of figures.

A cab driven by mechanical power on which a taximeter is affixed shall be known as "a little taxicab."

A taxicab is a coach driven by mechanical power on which a taximeter is affixed.

Any vehicle that has a taximeter affixed and uses the streets and avenues of the City of New York for the purpose of carrying passengers for hire, shall be deemed a public hack and licensed under this ordinance.

Any vehicle that uses the streets and avenues of the City of New York for the carrying of passengers for hire from railroad stations, steamship or ferry landings, docks and hotels, except where a written contract is made by the passenger carried for not less than a day, which contract shall be retained by the driver and shown on demand to any official of the Department of Licenses or police officer, shall be deemed a public hack and licensed under this ordinance.

This ordinance shall not apply to [or govern any vehicle hired or obtained from a livery stable or garage and which does not solicit passengers upon the streets; nor to] any omnibus running by authority of any ordinance, law, charter or permit upon a fixed route through the city.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Ordinance to Require Heads of Departments and Bureaus of The City of New York to Transmit Copies of Reports or Other Publications to the Municipal Reference Library.

AN ORDINANCE to require heads of departments and bureaus of the Government of The City of New York to transmit copies of reports or other publications to the Municipal Reference Branch of the New York Public Library.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

It shall be the duty of the head of every department and bureau of the Government of The City of New York to transmit, immediately after the issuance of the same, four copies of each annual and quarterly report or other publication of the department or bureau, to the Municipal Reference Branch of the New York Public Library, located in the Municipal Building in the Borough of Manhattan.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 2:30 o'clock P. M., on Thursday, October 15, 1914.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen; Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communications were received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to the cancellation of the old lease to the Interborough Ferry Company, and a new lease to the Interborough Twenty-third Street Ferry Company of the franchise for a ferry from the foot of 23rd Street, Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Brooklyn:

Department of Docks and Ferries, July 17, 1914.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Upon recommendation by the Commissioner of Docks, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held July 2d, 1909, adopted resolutions approving of and authorizing a lease to the Interborough Ferry Company of franchise to operate the following ferries:

1. From the foot of East 10th Street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (hereinafter called the 10th Street Ferry).

2. From the foot of East 23d Street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (hereinafter called the 23d Street Ferry).

—together with wharf property and structures belonging to the City, which had theretofore been used for the purposes of said ferries, for a term of 25 years from May 1, 1909, at a rental of two per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually, but in no case to be less than \$7,500 per annum.

On or about April 27, 1914, with the consent of the Commissioner of Docks, the Interborough Ferry Company assigned this lease to the Interborough Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, Inc., which company assumed all the obligations thereof, the assignment being made on account of the default of the Interborough Ferry Company and the New York Terminal Company (the holding company thereof) in payment of rental to the 10th and 23d Street Ferry Company, the original owner of the ferryboats used in the operation of said ferry, together with certain wharf property at the Greenpoint Avenue terminal.

The Company has submitted a statement of receipts of the 10th Street Ferry from January, 1904, to March, 1914, showing that the use of the 10th Street Ferry is rapidly falling off; that the gross returns of the use of said ferry in 1904 was approximately \$114,000 for the year, while in 1914 it has fallen to \$45,000. The operating expense

for the same period was approximately \$65,000, and each month of the year 1914 shows a decrease for the corresponding month of the year 1913. That the gross receipts of the 10th Street side of the ferry from March, 1913, was \$1,744.62, as compared with \$5,066.48 for the month of March, 1904, which showing is approximately one-half the total income of said ferry for said months; and stating that eventually all traffic will be diverted from the 10th Street Ferry.

The Company, therefore, requests to be permitted to abandon entirely the service of the 10th Street Ferry and be relieved from all obligations imposed by lease.

I am of the opinion that there is no particular demand for the continuance of the 10th Street Ferry. In 1912, while the City was engaged in rebuilding pier at the foot of East 10th Street, this ferry ceased operation for a period of eight months and the records of the Department show that practically not a single protest was made against its discontinuance during that period. Besides, the discontinuance of this ferry and the removal of the ferry racks will permit the use of the north side of the pier at the foot of East 10th Street, in a district in which a great demand exists for wharfage and berthing room, and with a few changes in the existing condition of that pier the space occupied by the ferry racks could be utilized so as to obtain a revenue for the City of at least \$3,000 per annum.

I, therefore, beg to recommend:

First—That the Interborough-Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, Inc., surrender to the City the lease dated November 20, 1909, between The City of New York, acting by the Commissioner of Docks, party of the first part, and the Interborough Ferry Company, party of the second part, which lease was duly assigned to the Interborough-Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, Inc.

Second—That upon the acceptance of such surrender by the City, the Company shall at once proceed with the removal of the ferry racks on the north side of the pier, foot of East 10th Street, or at the option of the Commissioner of Docks said ferry racks shall revert to and become the property of The City of New York.

Third—That the surrender of said lease and the removal of said ferry racks is conditioned upon the granting by the City to the Interborough-Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, Inc., of a lease of ferry franchise and wharf property for the operation of the ferry from and to the foot of East 23d Street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, upon terms which shall be mutually agreed upon and which shall be equitable and fair to the City and the Company.

In case this proposition is acceptable to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund I am prepared to recommend the granting of such a lease in accordance with the provisions of Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter. Yours respectfully,

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—Supplementing my letter of July 17, 1914, in which I recommended that the Interborough-23rd Street Ferry Co., Inc., be permitted to surrender to the City the lease dated November 29, 1909, permitting operation of ferries from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Brooklyn, to the foot of East 10th Street and to the foot of East 23rd Street, in the Borough of Manhattan, and that a new lease be approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the operation of a ferry from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue to the foot of 23rd Street.

I would advise you that after further consultation with the officers of the Company and with representatives of the Comptroller I am prepared to recommend that a new lease be authorized for an initial term of ten years at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts annually, but in no case less than \$7,500 a year. The lease should be further conditioned upon a stipulation by the Company to make repairs necessary to place terminals in Manhattan and Greenpoint in proper condition. This work is indicated in a joint survey made by Engineers of the Department of Docks and Ferries and Engineers of the Department of Finance, and shows necessary expenditures to the amount of \$66,000. It is further recommended that the Company be granted an extension term of ten years upon terms to be agreed upon or fixed by arbitration at the expiration of the original term.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

October 7, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of two communications addressed to your board by the Commissioner of Docks, dated July 17, 1914, and October 6, 1914, respectively, copies of which are appended hereto and made a part of this report, and by you referred to me for examination and report.

An examination of the matter referred to by the Commissioner of Docks discloses the following situation:

At a meeting of your board held July 2, 1909, resolutions were adopted approving of and authorizing a lease to the Interborough Ferry Company of a franchise to operate ferries as follows, i. e.:

1. From the foot of East 10th Street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (hereinafter called the 10th Street Ferry);
2. From the foot of East 23d Street, Borough of Manhattan, to the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (hereinafter called the 23rd Street Ferry);

—together with wharf property and structures belonging to the City, which had theretofore been used for the purposes of said ferries, for a term of 25 years from May 1, 1909, at a rental of two per cent. of the gross receipts of said Company annually, but in no case to be less than \$7,500 per annum.

Thereafter, on the 29th day of November, 1909, the Commissioner of Docks executed a lease to the Company in conformity with said resolution of your board.

On or about April 27, 1914, with consent of the Commissioner of Docks, the Interborough Ferry Company assigned said lease to the Interborough-23d Street Ferry Company, Inc., which Company assumed all the obligations thereof, the assignment being made on account of the default of the Interborough Ferry Company and the New York Terminal Company the holding company thereof) in payment of rental to the 10th and 23d Street Ferry Company, the original owner of the ferryboats used in the operation of said ferry, together with certain wharf property at the Greenpoint Avenue terminal. Since said assignment the ferries have been operated by the Interborough-23d Street Ferry Company, Inc.

The Company owns the property at the foot of Greenpoint Avenue used as a terminal for the 23d Street Ferry, but the property used at this point as a terminal for the 10th Street Ferry is leased from private owners at an annual rental of \$11,000, in addition to the real estate tax which, for the year 1914, amounted to \$5,464.80. The Company also leases from private owners the bulkhead at the foot of East 10th Street, used for the purposes of the 10th Street Ferry, at an annual rental of \$8,500.

In all the Company is therefore paying an annual rental of about \$25,000 for property used solely for the purposes of the 10th Street Ferry. These leases expire on May 1, 1915, and the Company desires to avoid the necessity of renewing them, claiming that the revenues derived from the operation of the 10th Street Ferry do not warrant such a heavy charge for rental and that there is not sufficient public demand for the continuance of its operations.

It has not been possible to obtain access to the books or records of the Interborough Ferry Company, the former operators of these ferries, but the Interborough-23d Street Ferry Company, Inc., the present operators, have submitted their records for the four months period from May 1 to August 31, 1914, for examination.

Statement "A," appended hereto, shows an estimate of the result of the operation of the 23d Street ferry for one year, based on the revenues and disbursements for the four months period from May 1 to August 31, 1914.

Statement "B," also appended hereto, shows in detail the revenues and disbursements for the four months period from May 1 to August 31, 1914, and an estimate of the proportions of same applicable to the two ferries separately and an estimate for one year based thereon.

From these estimates it would appear that the 10th Street ferry could not be operated at a profit under the rental charges of \$25,000 per annum, above mentioned.

The 23d Street ferry, if operated alone, could be expected to return a profit sufficient to provide 5 per cent. interest on the company's bonds now outstanding, amounting to \$550,000, and also 5 per cent. dividends on the outstanding capital stock of \$1,000,000.

The company's claim that no great public demand exists for the continuance of the operation of the 10th Street ferry is borne out by the Commissioner of Docks, who states that the operation of said ferry was discontinued for a period of about eight months in the year 1912, during the rebuilding of the East 10th Street pier, and that not a single objection to the discontinuance was received by his department.

The letter of Mr. W. E. Frew, President, 10th & 23d St. Ferry Co., addressed to the Commissioner of Docks under date of June 29, 1914, copy of which is attached hereto, indicates the strong objection of the company to continuing the leasing of the privately owned property used for the purposes of the 10th Street ferry, and in connection with the letter of Mr. F. A. Martin, President, Interborough 23d Street Ferry Company, Inc., indicates that both companies will accept a new lease, as proposed, for the operation of the 23d Street ferry alone.

The rental proposed to be paid by the Company under the new lease, 2 per cent. of the gross receipts, but not less than \$7,500 per annum, is fully equal to the rentals paid by any other companies operating ferries on the East River, and in view of the fact that traffic on all the East River ferries has been falling off in volume steadily for many years past, and is likely to continue in the same course in the future, such rental would appear to be as large as the City could expect to secure for such a franchise.

If the Company were to abandon the present lease, a possibility which is indicated by Mr. Frew in his letter of June 29, 1914, attached hereto, it would seem certain that the City would be unable to secure another lessee for the 10th Street ferry on any terms other than a virtual subsidy, and neither would it be likely to secure another lessee for the 23d Street ferry on any better terms than those included in the proposed new lease to the company. In the event of such an abandonment of the lease the City would be under the necessity of either abandoning both ferries or of operating one or both on its own responsibility, and this, demonstrably, could not be done without entailing a large expense, as the City could not operate such ferries as economically as could a private company.

It would therefore seem to be to the best interests of the City to consent to the cancellation of the present lease and to enter into a new lease for the operation of the 23d Street ferry on the terms and conditions expressed in the resolutions hereto appended, which are submitted to your board for consideration.

Whereas, Under date of July 17, 1914, supplemented under date of October 6, 1914, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the lease entered into by the City, under date of November 29, 1909, by authority of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted July 2, 1909, with the Interborough Ferry Company to operate ferries from and to the foot of East Tenth street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, be, by and with the consent of said Company, cancelled and terminated, therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby consent to the cancellation and termination of the lease entered into by the City, under date of November 29, 1909, with the Interborough Ferry Company, of a franchise to operate ferries from and to the foot of East Tenth Street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and from and to the foot of East Twenty-third Street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized and directed to effect such cancellation and termination of said lease by and with the consent of said company.

Whereas, Section 826 of the Greater New York Charter provides that the Commissioner of Docks shall have power and is authorized to lease, in the name of and for the benefit of The City of New York, in the manner provided by law, the franchise of any ferry or ferries belonging to said city, for the highest marketable price or rental, at public auction or by sealed bids, and always after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of said Commissioner, but not for a term longer than ten years; and

Whereas, It is further provided in said section that, whenever it may be determined by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, that the interests of the city will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of a ferry in the manner in said section thereinbefore directed, it shall be lawful for said Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution adopted by such unanimous vote, upon the recommendation of the Commissioner of Docks, to lease such franchise by private agreement for terms not exceeding twenty-five years, and under such conditions as, in their judgment, will best protect and further the interests of the City and the travelling public; and

Whereas, Under date of July 17, 1914, supplemented under date of October 6, 1914, the Commissioner of Docks has recommended that the interests of the city will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the ferry to and from the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, at public auction, or by sealed bids and after public advertisement and appraisal, under the direction of the Commissioner of Docks; now, therefore, be it

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, determine that the interests of The City of New York will not be best promoted by leasing the franchise of the hereinbefore mentioned ferry at public auction, as provided in section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, and be it further

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 826 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of and authorize a lease to the Interborough-Twenty-third Street Ferry Company, Inc., of a fran-

chise to operate a ferry from and to the foot of East Twenty-third street, Borough of Manhattan, to and from the foot of Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, together with the wharf property and structures belonging to the city which have heretofore been used for the purposes of said ferry, except as hereinafter provided, for a term of ten years from May 1, 1915, at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts of said company annually, but in no case shall said rental be less than seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500) per annum, with an option of renewal for a further term of ten years at a rental then to be determined, and said lessee shall furnish a bond of a surety company, to be approved by the Commissioner of Docks, in the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$15,000) for the faithful performance of all the conditions of the lease.

The word "slip" when used, shall intend and mean the ferry racks, bridges, floats, ferry houses, structures or portions of same appurtenant to and used in connection with each slip respectively; Slip No. 1 shall intend and mean the slip immediately adjoining the north side of the pier foot of East Twenty-second street; Slip No. 2, the slip immediately north of Slip No. 1; Slip No. 3, the slip immediately north of Slip No. 2; as they are at the present time.

The Interborough-23d Street Ferry Company, Inc., shall, during the term of the lease, have the use of Slip No. 2, the City, however, reserving the right to enter upon and take possession of said slip in case of its inability to use Slip No. 1 on account of repairs, rebuilding or dredging required to same, the time of such possession to continue while such repairing, rebuilding or dredging is in progress.

The lessee shall further covenant and agree that if at any time, during the term of the lease, the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding wharves, piers, bulkheads, basins, docks or slips within a section or district of the water-front which shall include the premises referred to in said lease, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, and if the Commissioner of Docks shall determine that for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, it will be necessary to terminate the interest of the lessee in the said wharf property or any part thereof, then upon service upon the lessee of written notice from the Commissioner of Docks to that effect, describing the premises or the part thereof affected thereby, the interest of the lessee in said wharf property or part thereof under this lease, shall be thereby terminated, and no claim for damages or compensation in favor of the lessee by reason of the termination of such interest in said wharf property, or to or on account of any structures or improvements that may have been erected or made by the lessee, shall at any time be made by the lessee or by any person or persons whomsoever. And in the event that the interest of the lessee in the whole or any part of the demised premises shall be terminated, as herein provided, then the Commissioner of Docks shall lease, demise and to farm let to the said lessee, sufficient wharf property for the accommodation of two slips at a locality to be designated by the Commissioner of Docks between the northerly side of East Twenty-second street and the centre line of East Twenty-third street, and any alterations to existing structures made necessary by such designation or any dredging necessary to fit the premises for ferry purposes, shall be done by and at the sole cost and expense of the lessee, in accordance with plans and specifications to be submitted to and approved by the Commissioner of Docks, and which, in his opinion, shall be the most economical layout for such two slips.

The lessee shall also covenant and agree that if at any time during the term of the lease the Commissioner of Docks shall determine to proceed with the work of building or rebuilding piers at or near the foot of East Twenty-third street, East River, according to any plan or plans now adopted and approved, or which may hereafter be adopted and approved, and pursuant to any existing or future law, then The City of New York or the Commissioner of Docks shall have the right to enter upon the premises hereby leased for the purpose of such building or rebuilding, and the lessee will not at any time make any claim for or by way of reduction from rent or otherwise or for any damage arising from or consequent upon any building or rebuilding that the City may do or cause to be done or in consequence of the occupation of the said premises by the City or its agents and contractors for the purpose of such building or rebuilding.

The lease to contain a clause that if at any time during the term of the lease the City shall decide to operate another ferry from the foot of East Twenty-third street the City reserves the right to use Slip No. 2, generally with the Interborough-23d Street Ferry Company, Inc., to such extent as the Commissioner of Docks may deem necessary.

The lease shall also contain a clause stipulating that the Company shall remove the racks from the north side of the pier at the foot of East Tenth Street, Borough of Manhattan, and further that the Company shall make the repairs needed to place the racks, bridges and structures at the terminals at East Twenty-third Street, Borough of Manhattan, and Greenpoint Avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, in first class condition and satisfactory to the Commissioner of Docks.

The lessee shall furnish a statement of the receipts and expenditures of said ferry, duly verified by the proper officer of said company, to the Commissioner of Docks whenever so requested by him and The City of New York, its officers, agents or employees shall at all times have access to and power to examine the books and accounts of said lessee relating to the affairs of said ferry. The remaining terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those contained in leases of ferry franchises and wharf property now used by the Department of Docks and Ferries, the form of which shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel, otherwise to be of no force or effect; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Docks is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when approved by the Corporation Counsel.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to the sale and removal of the buildings known as Public Schools 97-A and 97-B, on the southerly side of the approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, between Willett and Ridge Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan:

October 14, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The space under the Manhattan approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, used for the Delancey Street Market, being about to be improved, it has been considered advisable to remove the buildings formerly used as Public Schools 97A and 97B in order to provide better light and access to the market.

The Board of Education has stated that there is no objection to the removal of these buildings, as there appears to be no further need for them for school purposes.

I therefore request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by Sections 205 and 1553 of the Revised Charter, adopt a resolution authorizing and ordering that the said buildings be offered for sale at an upset or minimum price of \$100, and also authorizing and ordering the President of the Borough of Manhattan to demolish and remove said buildings if they are not sold at the said upset price, and such a resolution is herewith transmitted.

Whereas, The space under the Manhattan approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, used for the Delancey Street Market, is about to be improved and it is considered advisable to remove the buildings formerly used as Public Schools 97A and 97B to provide better light and access to the market, it is therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by virtue of the powers vested in them by law, hereby authorize and order the sale at public auction or by sealed bids, at the upset or minimum price of \$100 of the buildings known as Public Schools 97A and 97B, located on the southerly side of the approach to the Williamsburgh Bridge, between Willett and Ridge Streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, which are more particularly described on a certain map on file in the office of the Collector of City Revenue, Department of Finance, Room 368, Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan, upon the terms and conditions for the sale of buildings, etc., as authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a meeting held October 4, 1914, and the President of the Borough of Manhattan is hereby authorized to demolish and remove the said buildings if they do not realize the said upset price.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

It is essential that Attendants be able to read and write the English language and to speak it intelligibly. Laborers may properly perform light laboring work under the direction of superiors and subject to their orders, in public baths, public comfort stations, recreation piers, offices and other places open to the public. They may not be assigned to work requiring particular intelligence in the direction of the public or in the preservation of order. Where laboring work of a light character is required, as indicated in this paragraph, and, in addition, ability to read and write the English language, the Commission will not authorize the employment of Laborers.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the persons named therein:

The recommendations were adopted.

On the recommendation of Miss M. B. Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, it was

Resolved, That the action of the Commission on July 2, 1912, in ordering an open competitive examination for the position of Medical Inspector, Infants' Milk Stations, Department of Health, be and the same hereby is rescinded.

Reports (2) dated September 2 were presented from M. B. Upshaw, Assistant Chief Examiner, forwarding the following forms of advertisement for the examinations specified:

Assistant Secretary, Mayor's Office.

"The Assistant Secretary to the Mayor will be required to conduct inspections, to investigate complaints, and to formulate and submit the findings resulting from such inspections and investigations. He will also be required to examine and prepare material for the calendars of the boards and committees of which the Mayor is a member, as follows: Board of City Record, Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Committee on Franchises, Committee on the Organization of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Committee on Standardization of Supplies, Committee on Education, Committee on Social Welfare, Committee on Revision of City Charter, Committee on Assessments, Armory Board, Art Commission, Board of Trustees, Metropolitan Museum of Art, Board of Trustees, Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Sciences; Board of Trustees, American Museum of Natural History.

"A qualifying physical examination will be held. The subjects and weights of the examination are: Experience, 3; Mental Test, 4; Oral Test, 3.

"The mental test will consist of a written examination comprising a Duties paper, counting 60%, and a Government paper, counting 40%.

"The examination in duties will be a practical test on matters which would ordinarily comprise a day's work as Assistant Secretary. It will include correspondence, plans for investigations, preparation of digests of reports and of material for calendars.

"The examination in Government will be designed to test the knowledge of the candidates on the methods used in the municipal government of New York City.

"These examinations will be held on separate days.

"Applications for this examination must be filed on a special blank, Form C. Experience blanks will be issued with the applications and must be forwarded to the Commission with the applications. The experience will then be rated.

"70% is required on experience, 75% on the mental test and 75% on the oral test. Candidates receiving less than a qualifying mark in any subject will not be summoned for the subsequent test or tests.

"The age limits are 25 to 45 years.

"Candidates should possess an intimate knowledge of the government of The City of New York and should have had experience in conducting and preparing reports in relation to matters of civic importance. They should be familiar with the methods used in the preparation of the annual budgets of the City Departments."

Secretary to the Committee on Markets, Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"The function of the Committee on Markets will be to formulate a market scheme for the City and to provide for the proper development of the market system. If the Market Commission established by the last legislature is appointed, it will be the medium for the exchange of ideas between the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and that Commission.

"The duties of the Secretary to this Committee will be to conduct investigations, to formulate and submit the findings resulting from such investigations, and to examine and prepare material for the calendars of this Committee.

"Subjects and weights of the examination: Training and experience, 4; written examination, 4; oral examination, 2; total, 10.

"70% is required on each subject of the examination.

"Applications to be filed on a special blank. Experience papers to be given out with applications and to be filed with them. Candidates must obtain at least 70% on training and experience to be permitted to take the written examination.

"Candidates must obtain at least 70% on the written examination in order to be summoned for the oral examination. The written examination will be given on two days. On the first day the examination will be designed to test the knowledge of candidates relative to conditions affecting the establishment of public markets in New York City. On the second day the examination will be designed to test the secretarial qualifications of candidates in the preparation of reports and digests and in the supervision of general office work. The examination will be a practical test on matters that would ordinarily comprise a day's work as Secretary.

"Candidates must submit evidence of extended experience in the management of markets or in making investigations and reports on matters of civic importance, such as the investigation and reports of the Mayor's Market Commission, December, 1913; the report of the Committee on Terminal Improvement, June 6, 1913; the report of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries on the organization of a municipal freight terminal."

The forms of advertisements were approved.

Reports, dated September 1 and 2, were presented from Examiner Sheehan, recommending that practical tests be held for certain positions in the Labor Class and that expert examiners be appointed to conduct such examinations. The matter was referred to the President.

A communication dated September 1 was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, stating that at a meeting of that Board, held August 31, 1914, the Chief Examiner and the Secretary of the Board had been directed to institute an inspection of the records of the Municipal Commission under the provisions of civil service regulation XIII. On the recommendation of the Chief Examiner in a report, dated September 6, it was

Resolved, That John S. Shearer, of 608 East Seneca Street, Ithaca, N. Y., be and he hereby is appointed an Examiner in the office of the Commission in connection with the examination for Electrician, X-Ray, and the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to certify vouchers in payment of his services, when presented, under clause 8 of Rule XII.

On the recommendation of the Secretary to the Advisory Board in a report dated September 9, it was

Resolved, That the Secretary be and he hereby is instructed to proceed with an open competitive examination for the position of Morgue Keeper.

A report, dated September 9, was presented from the Secretary to the Advisory Board, recommending that the advertisement of the examination for Inspector of Meters and Water Consumption, Grade 2, be amended by fixing the age limit at 45 years. The recommendation was adopted.

A report dated September 9 was presented from the Secretary of the Advisory Board, forwarding a memorandum from the First Assistant Chief Examiner, dated September 2, recommending that the following procedure be adopted in the matter of efficiency records in accordance with the recent amendment to Rule 15, paragraph 22:

1. When the original and duplicate reports are received by the Commission, they should be transmitted to Assistant Chief Examiner Fuld.
2. The reports should be examined by Mr. Fuld, and if, in his opinion, no further action or investigation is required, he should so report to the Commission through the First Assistant Chief Examiner and the Chief Examiner. It might be stated that it is probable that Mr. Fuld will need assistance in the examination of the reports.

3. If, in the opinion of Mr. Fuld, additional information is necessary, or if he thinks that the form of the report is unsatisfactory, or if, for any other reason, which, in his opinion, renders the procedure advisable, he should recommend that a meeting be held for the consideration of the efficiency reports of the department affected. At this meeting there should be present a Commissioner of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Mr. Fuld, or whatever other Examiner may be designated by the Commission, and a representative of the department.

4. When the reports have been approved by the Examining Division, they should be transmitted to the Commission with recommendation that they be approved. First—That said right to construct, maintain and operate said pipes and conduits shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from November 1, 1914, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

Such right and privilege to be valued as if the Company had not exercised the same for the said period of fifteen (15) years, and no allowance shall be made to the Company in such valuation by reason of such exercise.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall in any event be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company each paying one-half thereof.

Second—The Company shall pay to the City

for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) in cash within one (1) month after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five years an annual sum which shall be equal to two (2) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than five hundred dollars (\$500).

(c) During the second term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than six hundred dollars (\$600).

(d) During the third term of five years, an annual sum which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, but which sum shall not be less than seven hundred dollars (\$700).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the total receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers.

(c) In addition to the above payments the Company shall pay to the City an annual payment of ten cents (\$0.10) for each linear foot of pipe (where separately constructed) or conduit constructed within the limits of any street, avenue, highway or other property belonging to the City, excepting, however, such pipes or conduits as are constructed within the vault space or vault spaces of any building or buildings used or occupied exclusively by the Company for the purpose of its business.

An annual payment of two dollars (\$2) for each manhole constructed within the limits of any street, avenue, highway or other property belonging to the City.

The annual charges shall commence from November 1, 1914.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on February 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to December 31 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between November 1, 1914, and December 31, 1914, shall bear to the whole of one year.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Third—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other company providing for payments for refrigerating rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sub-lease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the streets and avenues mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all conditions of this contract, and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said condition as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual, firm or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the same streets and avenues, or within the districts hereinbefore described.

Fifth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned either in whole or in part, or leased or sub-let in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything therein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Sixth—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination or forfeiture of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the pipes, conduits and appurtenances of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets, avenues or other property of the City shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its pipes, conduits and appurtenances constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets, avenues or other property of the City shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Should the Company at any time discontinue the use of any pipes or conduits at any time constructed or used by it within either of the districts specified in this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, immediately on such discontinuance remove such pipes or conduits from the streets and restore the surface of the streets to its original condition.

Seventh—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Eighth—All construction which shall be made under this grant shall be done in a manner solely upon the terms and conditions hereafter to be imposed by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, or their respective successors in authority. The said Company shall submit a working plan of construction to the said President and to the said Commissioner, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said pipes or conduits, connections, manholes and other appurtenances, and the mode of protection of all subsurface construction under the streets, avenues or other property of the City in which the Company is hereby authorized to operate.

Ninth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage system, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits of the Company, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Tenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted shall not be in preference or in hindrance

to public work of the City and should the said pipes or conduits in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets, avenues or other property of the City, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the pipes, conduits and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eleventh—The Company shall bear the expense of keeping in repair for one year after it has been replaced, all pavement which may at any time be removed by said Company, either for the purpose of construction or for the repairing of the pipes or conduits and the appurtenances thereof.

Twelfth—The Company shall bear the expense of inspection which may be required by the President of the Borough of Brooklyn and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and of all work of construction.

Thirteenth—The Company shall cause a test to be made of the pipes hereby authorized whether laid within conduits or separately whenever required by and under the supervision of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The conditions of such test shall be as follows:

(a) If the test be made in the foundry where the pipes are manufactured, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of three hundred (300) pounds per square inch.

(b) If the test be made in the field, of pipes in use or ready for use, such pipes shall be subjected to a pressure of two hundred (200) pounds per square inch.

A certificate showing that such a test has been made without injury to the pipe shall be executed by an officer of the Company, and indorsed by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and filed with the Board.

Fourteenth—The Company shall not charge consumers more than the following rates for refrigeration to be furnished to boxes properly insulated at a temperature not lower than 32 degrees Fahrenheit:

Four (4) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of not over 500 cubic feet.

Two (2) cents per month per cubic foot for boxes of over 500 cubic feet, but less than 1,500 cubic feet.

One (1) cent per month per cubic foot for boxes of 1,500 cubic feet and over.

These rates shall not apply to boxes located above the first floor of any building.

During the term of this contract the Board shall have absolute power to regulate the minimum and maximum rates, provided that such rates shall be reasonable and fair.

Fifteenth—The Company, upon the application for refrigeration of any person, firm or corporation whose premises are located within District Number 1, or if such district be extended as hereinbefore provided, then within such extended district, shall extend its pipes or conduits to such premises and furnish to said applicant refrigeration at the rates herein prescribed or at such rates as may be hereafter fixed by the Board as herein provided. The Company shall not be required, however, to furnish refrigeration to applicants whose premises are located above the first floor of any building.

Nothing contained in this subdivision shall affect the obligations of the Company, as hereinbefore contained, to extend its conduits and pipes outside the present boundaries of District Number 1, so as to furnish refrigeration to the premises of the Steel-Drake Baking Company, known as 42, 43, 44, 45, 159, 160 and 162 Wallabout Market.

Sixteenth—A correct map shall be furnished to the Board by the Company on the first day of February, 1915, showing the exact location of all pipes, conduits and manholes constructed, with reference to the street lines, the curb lines and the street surface, together with a statement of the total length of such pipes and conduits. On the same date of each succeeding year, during the term of this contract, a supplementary map shall be furnished the Board showing all pipes and conduits laid during the preceding year.

Seventeenth—The pipes and conduits hereby authorized shall be used only by the Kings County Refrigerating Company, and for no other purpose than supplying refrigeration.

Eighteenth—The Company shall submit a report to the Board not later than February 1, 31 each year, for the year ending December 31, next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. Number of feet of pipe and conduit now laid.
12. The total amount expended for same.
13. Amount, kind and capacity of machinery now in use and required for operation.
14. The total amount expended for same.
15. Quantity of refrigeration produced during the year and the average price received for same.
16. Quantity used in Company's own warehouses.
17. Quantity furnished to outside consumers.
18. Number and location of warehouses occupied by the Company, exclusively or in part, and the extent of such occupation by the Company.
19. Number of outside consumers supplied.
20. Amounts paid by Company for damages to persons or property on account of construction and operation.
21. Total expenses of operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Nineteenth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from the privileges granted under this contract, and on or before February 1 in each year shall make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of New York of the business done by the Company for the year ending December 31 next preceding in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain the number of feet of pipe and conduit laid and the number of manholes constructed during the year, and also a statement of the gross receipts from all business of furnishing refrigeration to consumers, together with such other information, and in such detail as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twentieth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the pipes and conduits constructed and in use by virtue of this

contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith. Any false entry in the books of the Company or false statement in the reports to the Comptroller as to a material fact knowingly made by the Company shall constitute such a violation or breach or failure to comply with the provisions herein contained as to warrant the forfeiture of the franchise.

Twenty-first—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its pipes, conduits and appurtenances as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board in case such pipes, conduits or appurtenances which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-second—The Company shall assume all liability for damages to persons or property occasioned by reason of the construction or operation of the pipes or conduits authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-third—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, the repairs of the street pavement and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders, or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract, or its neglect or refusal to comply with any notice or direction of the Board, or other municipal officials, given or made pursuant to the terms of the contract, or under the authority of any laws or ordinances now or hereafter in force in such case and in any of these events, the Company shall pay to the City a penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each violation, which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President or other officer to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or rights under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City. These provisions for the recovery of penalties are in addition to the right to forfeit the franchise conferred by Section 3, Twentieth, of this contract.

Twenty-fourth—The grant of this franchise, so far as it shall affect the Wallabout Market lands, is and shall be subject to such further conditions, restrictions, agreement or consent as the Comptroller may see fit to impose or require, pursuant to the authority and control over the lands of the Wallabout Market vested in him by the Charter of the City.

Twenty-fifth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-sixth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, parkways, driveways, concourses, boulevards, bridges, viaducts, tunnels, public places or any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement," included in the districts hereinabove described, and under the surface of or in which authority is hereby given to the Company to construct or maintain its pipes or conduits.

Twenty-seventh—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned or intended to be mentioned shall be transferred by law to any other Board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other Board, authority, officer or officers shall have all the powers, rights and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

SECTION 4. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, con-

ditions and requirements in this contract first and contained.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the party of the first part by its Mayor, thereunto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers, thereunto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
