MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following communications from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 1838.

Veto by His Honor the Mayor of "An Ordinance to Amend Section 99 of Article 8 of Chapter 14 of the Code, Relative to Hack Stands."

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, August 6, 1915.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I return herewith, disapproved, proposed Ordinance No. 1838, entitled:

"Ordinance to amend Section 99 of Article 8 of Chapter 14 of the Code, relative to Hack Stands."

The proposed legislation provides that where the owner or operator of a sightseeing car leases an office on the ground floor or in the basement of a building he may establish in the front of that building a stand for his sightseeing car if he first secure the consent of the Police Commissioner and the "written consent of the owner of said building."

This would permit these large sightseeing cars to stand at all times in front of such an office where the two consents above mentioned have been obtained.

At the present time sightseeing stands are designated under the Code of Ordinances by the Commissioner of Licenses, many of said stands having been located throughout the city, to which all owners of sightseeing cars may go for patronage. The Commissioner of Licenses has, furthermore, issued orders that where the owner of a sightseeing car maintains an office where prospective passengers are collected he may drive up with his sightseeing car and stand in front of this office for fifteen minutes while the passengers collected may be taken on the vehicle. It seems to me that in the establishment of permanent stands accessible to all similarly situated, with fifteen minutes' privilege in front of offices, we have gone as far as we should in this direction. To secure the right to stand at all times in front of an office with the consent of the owner of the building is, in effect, the maintenance of a private stand where others may be excluded.

Prior to the passage of the present Public Hack Ordinance in 1913 private hack stands were allowed in this city and were most generally established in front of the large hotels. The ordinance in force at that time provided that these private hack stands could be maintained with the consent of the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses and "the written consent of the owner or lessee of the premises." It was by the granting or withholding of the "written consent" above referred to that the owners or lessees of the large hotels in the city were able to charge \$20,000, or even as high as \$30,000 per annum, for their consent to establish the stand. All this extra overhead charge was paid for by the traveling public and it was the "consent" of the hotel owners and others similarly situated that made the cab charges in this city unnecessarily high and exorbitant.

The ordinance passed by your Honorable Board in May, 1913, which became effective on August 1, 1913, did away with all these private hack stands and established in place thereof public stands accessible to all duly licensed vehicles. One of the most bitter legal contests then arose to test the validity of your ordinance, the City finally being successful in the Court of Appeals in *Waldorf-Astoria Company vs. The City* (212 N. Y., 97). In this case the right of municipal corporations to do away with private privileges and establish public stands was once and for all upheld.

The Legislature of the State in December, 1913, passed chapter 813 of the Laws of 1913, adding section 444 to the Penal Law. By this statute it was intended to preserve the entire state from the unnecessary burden of private stands and prohibit them for the future. This section added to the Penal Law reads in part as follows:

"The owner, lessee or other occupant of any real property * * * who shall make * * * any * * * arrangement whatsoever whereby the right is attempted to be granted * * * to use any portion of any public highway, street, avenue, boulevard, park or other public property owned by the State of New York or any municipality therein for the purpose of permitting any vehicle to stand while awaiting passengers for hire and * * * who shall make or enter into any contract or arrangement for the payment of or receives thereby any sum of money, percentage or profits or other thing of value, * * * for such use of such public property * * * shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

As I read this addition to the Penal Law I cannot see how we can pass an ordinance providing for the consent of an adjacent owner permitting a vehicle to await passengers in front of any particular premises. Such a situation is almost certain to produce violations of this statute that would be very difficult for the administration to abate.

There are other matters in the present ordinance which appear to me would have a bad effect, namely; taking away from the Department of Licenses the consent to the establishment of such a sightseeing stand and allowing the solicitation of passengers on the sidewalk.

For the reasons above mentioned I feel constrained to return this ordinance to you disapproved.

The Committee on Public Thoroughfares, to which was referred on June 15, 1915 (Minutes, page 710), the annexed ordinance in favor of amending the Code of Ordinances relative to "hack stands" for the regulation of sightseeing cars, respectfully

REPORTS:

That, after several hearings and consultation with the Police Commissioner, it has evolved a substitute ordinance which, it believes, covers the subject in a way to provide proper regulation and at the same time afford relief from too severe restriction sought by the sightseeing car owners.

It therefore recommends that the accompanying substitute ordinance be adopted.

"SUBSTITUTE."

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 99 of article 8 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relative to "hack stands."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:
Section 1. Section 99 of article 8 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances relative to "hack stands" is hereby amended by adding thereto a new subdivision to read as follows:

4. Sightseeing cars; where they may stand. Whenever the owner or operator of any sightseeing car, designed to carry ten or more persons, shall maintain an office seating ten or more persons, for the sale of tickets and the accommodation of intending passengers, on the ground floor or in the basement of any building fronting on any street where the roadway, exclusive of the sidewalk is thirty feet in width or more,

such sightseeing car, while waiting employment by passengers may stand in said street at the curb opposite such office upon obtaining the consent of the Police Commissioner, which consent shall be operative for a period of one year from date of the issuance of the license, unless sooner revoked by the Police Commissioner, and the written consent of the owner of said building, to be filed with the Police Commissioner, and upon paying an additional annual license fee of twenty-five dollars for each sightseeing car so operated. No such car, however, shall, under the provisions of this subdivision, stand in any street on which are located the tracks of any street car line, where the distance between the curb and the nearest track to the curb is twenty-three feet or less, nor shall any such car stand nearer than five feet from the building line of the intersecting street. Public patronage may be solicited in a quiet and orderly manner for a sightseeing car while the same is not in motion, by the driver or conductor thereof, who, while so soliciting, may stand not more than two feet from said sightseeing car. No sightseeing car shall take on any passengers except at a public hack stand specifically designated for sightseeing cars in the official list issued by the Department of Licenses, City of New York, or at a stand opposite an office as herein provided.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Communication from His Honor the Mayor Urging Board to Authorize Expenditure of \$5,000 as Reward for Apprehension of Michael A. Rofrano.

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, September 20, 1915.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Michael A. Rofrano was indicted by the Grand Jury of this county on September 14, 1915, for murder in the first degree. As I intend to issue a proclamation offering a reward for Rofrano's apprehension, under section 130 of the code of ordinances, and as the amount mentioned in said section, namely \$500, is inadequate to meet the situation, I urge your Honorable Board to authorize the expenditure of \$5,000 for this purpose, the said sum to be paid to any person or persons, other than members of the Police Department of The City of New York, who shall furnish information on which the said Rofrano may be taken into custody.

In connection herewith the Vice-Chairman and Alderman Stevenson offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That, in accordance with the communication of the Mayor received this day, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested, in pursuance of the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Charter, to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the sum of five thousand (\$5,000) dollars, the proceeds thereof to be paid out of the City Treasury upon the certificate of the Mayor, as a reward to such person or persons, other than any member of the Police Department of The City of New York, as may furnish information on which Michael A. Rofrano may be taken into custody; and be it further

Resolved, That the provisions of chapter 2, article IV, section 130 of the Code of Ordinances, in so far as the same limits a reward to the sum of five hundred (\$500) dollars, be and the same hereby are suspended for this case only.

Alderman Dowling moved that said resolution be amended by inserting in the first paragraph thereof after the words "Police Department of The City of New York," the words "or Sheriff or Deputy Sheriff in any of the five counties embraced within the City boundaries."

Veto by His Honor the Mayor of "An Ordinance Amending the Code of Ordinances Relating to Motorcycles."

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, September 21, 1915.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—I am returning, disapproved, proposed ordinance No. 1455, entitled "Ordinance amending the Code of Ordinances relating to motor cycles."

The control of motor cycles is a matter that requires attention, and your honorable Board has done well to consider such traffic regulation. But, in the ordinance drafted, there appears to be no clause for comity with other cities, and the regulation of motor cycles passing through The City of New York would be rendered difficult if the ordinance, as drafted, became a law.

In considering this matter, would it not be well for you to see what was done last year in the Legislature in reference to a motor cycle statute for the entire state? I am sending herewith, for your convenience, the veto message of Governor Whitman, pointing out defects in the legislation presented to him.

Memorandum filed with Senate Bill Introductory No. 651, Printed No. 2049, Assembly Reprint No. 2239, entitled: "An act to amend the highway law, in relation to the registration fees of motor vehicles."

Not approved.

This bill is defectively drafted. Under the provisions of subdivision 5 of the bill as amended, the time of registration and reregistration applies only to motor cycles. Under the existing statute as it is now on the books, it applies to all motor vehicles.

Under the present law the provision for registration and reregistration is as follows:

"5. Times for registration and reregistration. Registration applied for on or before August first, nineteen hundred and ten, shall take effect on that date and certificates issued on such application or under any application made prior to January thirty-first, nineteen hundred and eleven, shall expire on the latter date. The fees for such registration shall be one-half of the annual fees provided herein. Registration thereafter shall be renewed annually in the same manner and upon payment of the same annual fee as provided in this section for registration, to take effect on the first day of February in each year beginning with such date in the year nineteen hundred and eleven; and the certificates of registration issued thereunder or issued between any such dates shall expire on the succeeding thirty-first day of January."

Under the provisions of this bill this subdivision has been amended so that it applies only to motor cycles, and reads as follows:

"5. Times for registration and reregistration. Registration of motor cycles applied for on or before August first, nineteen hundred and fifteen, shall take effect on that date and certificates issued on such application or under any application made prior to January thirty-first, nineteen hundred and sixteen, shall expire on the latter date. The fees for such registration shall be one-half of the annual fees provided herein. Registration of all motor cycles shall, except as above provided, be made, and shall be renewed annually in the same manner and upon payment of the same annual fee as provided in this section for registration, to take effect on the first day of February in each year; and certificates issued succeeding thirty-first day of January."

By a comparison with the two subdivisions as quoted above, it can readily be seen that there is no requirement for the renewal of registration of a motor vehicle if it is not a motor cycle.

If this bill should be approved it would destroy the system of the registration of motor vehicles throughout the State of New York. Its approval in its present form, in my judgment, would lead to serious confusion and might result in a very great financial loss to the State of the revenue which the State now receives under the existing law, providing for the reregistration of motor vehicles.

In view of the serious defects contained in this measure, I am compelled to withhold my approval.

REPORTS:

That, having examined the subject and held a public hearing thereon, it believes the proposed ordinance to be necessary. There is no regulation of this class of vehicle, and their use is increasing so rapidly that it is high time rules for their guidance were established.

It therefore recommends that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Motorcycles."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by the addition of an article to be known as Article 16, as follows:

ARTICLE 16.

Motorcycles.

Section 190. Licenses.

191. License plates.
192. Fee.
193. Equipment.
194. Lamps.
195. Age Limit.
196. Violations.
197. Ordinances repealed.
198. Date of taking effect.

Section 190, Licenses.—No motor cycle or motor tricycle, either private or commercial, with or without body attachment, shall be operated on any public highway or place in The City of New York unless the owner shall have first registered the same with the Department of Licenses and received from the Department a certificate or license to operate the same for a period of one year, and containing the name, age and address of the owner, the number of the vehicle and the name of the manufacturer; said certificate shall be in the possession of the operator at all times when the vehicle is in use and shall be produced when required by any member of the police force.

Section 191, License Plates.—At the time of issuing the license the Department shall deliver to the applicant two metallic plates seven inches in length by two and one-half inches in width on which shall be placed a distinctive number consisting of numerals one and three-fourth inches in length by three-eighths of an inch in width; such plates shall be placed in a conspicuous rigid position one on the front and the other on the rear of the vehicle.

Section 192, Fee.—On receiving such certificate and metallic plates the owner shall pay to the Department a fee of Two dollars.

Section 193, Equipment.—Every such vehicle operated in any public place or highway in The City of New York shall be equipped with an adequate brake, kept in good order, and with an adequate bell, horn or similar device for signaling, and, if propelled by an internal combustion engine, with an adequate muffler or silencer through which all exhaust gases from the engine will pass into the atmosphere.

Section 194, Lamps.—No such vehicle shall be operated or permitted to stand in any public place or highway of The City of New York between sunset and sunrise unless it shall carry a lamp in front showing a white light visible two hundred feet ahead, and a lamp in the rear showing a red light visible fifty feet behind, the rear lamp to show also a white light on the said metallic plate carried on the rear of such vehicle, in such manner as to render the numerals thereon visible for a distance of fifty feet in the rear.

Section 195, Age Limit.—No person under the age of eighteen years shall be permitted to operate any such vehicle in any public place or highway of The City of New York; nor shall any person under the age of ten years be permitted to ride on the rear seat of any such vehicle unless the seat is equipped with an adequate back rest and foot supports; nor shall any person under the age of six years be permitted to ride on any such vehicle, except in a body attachment and accompanied by parent or guardian.

Section 196, Violations.—Any person operating such a vehicle in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction by any city magistrate, be fined a sum not exceeding Ten dollars, and, in default of payment, committed to prison until paid, not exceeding ten days.

Section 197, Ordinances Repealed.—All ordinances and parts of ordinances of The City of New York, inconsistent with or contrary to the provisions of this ordinance, are hereby expressly repealed.

Section 198, Date of Taking Effect.—This ordinance shall take effect on the first day of October, one thousand nine hundred and fifteen.

Resolution Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to Consider Suggestion of the Board of Aldermen as to an Economical Policy in the Making Up of the 1916 Budget.

Resolved That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is respectfully requested to consider the following suggestion of the Board of Aldermen in making up the 1916 budget:

A policy of sound economy is in the City's best interest. This applies to payment for personal services as well as other kinds of budgetary appropriation. Unnecessary positions should be eliminated; excessive salaries reduced to what the work is worth. But these steps should be taken with every care to avoid injustice. A card index may properly describe the work of two positions as exactly alike, or show how four men should do the work of five. But in neither case can the card show the personal equation of the man. Particularly should long and faithful service to the City be considered. A member of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is worth more to the City after four years of faithful work than on the day he took office. So is any other City employee. It is suggested that men or women who meet this test of personal merit and long service be transferred to other City work if their present positions are deemed unnecessary. If their work is needed, but their pay deemed too much, let their positions, as they gradually become vacant, by death or resignation, be then filled at the lower rates. Such a policy will, in a very few years, squeeze out any water that is still left in the City's payroll, and it will prevent impairment of the morale of the service, and avoid casting out employees who, by reason of having grown old in the City's service, will find it no easy matter, in these times to obtain other employment. No policy of economy should be so sudden and rigid as to forbid special consideration of persons under moderate wage whose cases come within the equities above suggested.

Resolution Appointing Committee to Consult with Health Commissioner to Take Action to Prevent Foul Odors in Riverside Drive Section of the City, Caused by Manufacture of Chemicals on New Jersey Side of Hudson River.

J. J. Archbold Forwarders, Inc.—Protest with Respect to License Fees for the Conduct of Public Carts.

J. J. Archbold Forwarders, Inc., 204 Franklin Street, New York, July 15th, 1915.
Hon. Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:

Gentlemen—An ordinance was adopted by your Board on June 2nd, 1914, and approved by the Mayor June 6th, 1914, that all public carts in Class A and B were to pay an annual license fee of \$2, and that all licenses shall expire on the 31st day of July each year.

While we do not object to this law, we wish to file a protest on being forced to pay a \$2 fee per cart for only three months, namely, May, June and July, 1915. We have paid \$80 for 40 licenses for these three months, and this being one-fourth of the year we think we are justly entitled to a refund of three-fourths, of \$60, of this amount, covering the unexpired period that we will be forced to pay again when we apply for the new licenses on August 1st, 1915.

You will readily see that we have paid twice as much as in previous years for one-fourth of the time.

Communication Regarding Filling Positions in the Service of The City of New York.

To the Honorable Board of Aldermen, New York:

Honorable Sirs—May I respectfully call your attention to a matter which is of the utmost importance to the citizens of New York City and State.

In recent issues of our Brooklyn papers I noticed that the Civil Service Commission has announced that an examination for the position of Superintendent of one of the City Institutions at Randalls Island was soon to be held and that "only citizens of New York" State was abrogated. This restriction was eliminated so that men and women residing in Seattle, Wash., Colorado or Texas can enter into our municipal civil service examinations and perhaps, after attentive coaching and posting, may succeed, as they often have done, in getting on the head of the list.

You gentlemen were elected to protect the interests of the citizens of the Greater New York. Is there not a law, rule or ordinance governing the Civil Service Commissioners? It seems to me there is, and, if so, why does your Honorable Board permit such violations to suit the personal purposes of the Commissioner of any Department?

A non-resident is not eligible to be elected Mayor of New York. Neither should men residing outside the State be appointed Commissioners in any City department. Investigate a few of the City Departments and you will find residents of Pennsylvania and many Western cities holding lucrative positions, which should be occupied by residents of this City or State.

Are there not sufficient men in New York capable of filling positions in our Municipal Government, or are we compelled to go to the mines of Pennsylvania to procure them? To look after such matters which are necessary for the protection of the rights of our citizens is, I presume, a duty which you have overlooked. If it be not within the province of the Board of Aldermen to stop this intrusion on the rights of our citizens, you could at least protest against such unpatriotic methods as practiced by some of our City Commissioners.

Trusting you will give this matter consideration, and that you will protect our City Offices from invasion by Pennsylvania, Westerners and Texans, I am

Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Resolutions Relative to Sidewalk and Roadway Widths in Certain Boroughs.

City of New York, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Office of the Secretary, Municipal Building, July 12, 1915.

Hon. GEORGE McANENY, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I transmit herewith for the information of the Board of Aldermen certified copies of resolutions adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 1, 1915, viz:

Cal. No. 2. Resolution fixing the sidewalk width of West 177th Street, between Riverside Drive and Haven Avenue, and of the new service street extending from West 177th Street to Riverside Drive at a point about opposite West 168th Street, Borough of Manhattan.

Cal. No. 6. Resolution fixing at five feet the width of the southerly sidewalk of 56th Street in the section between 17th Avenue and the angle point about 175 feet westerly therefrom, from which point the width of the northerly sidewalk is fixed at 10 feet, Borough of Brooklyn.

Cal. No. 15. Resolution establishing a width of 15 feet for the westerly sidewalk of North Railroad Avenue, between Locust Avenue and Lincoln Avenue, Borough of Richmond.

Cal. No. 16. Resolution fixing at 40 feet the roadway width of Castleton Avenue, between Haven Esplanade and Brighton Avenue, Borough of Richmond.

Cal. No. 16. Resolution fixing the widths of the roadways and sidewalks of Barrett Boulevard, between Duer Lane and Brighton Avenue, and of Forest Avenue, between Brighton and Greenwood Avenues, Borough of Richmond.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby fixes the sidewalk width of West 177th Street, between Riverside Drive and Haven Avenue, and of the new Service Street extending from West 177th Street to Riverside Drive at a point about opposite West 168th Street, Borough of Manhattan, in accordance with a map or plan changing the lines and grades of the street system within the territory bounded by Riverside Drive, West 181st Street, Haven Avenue, Fort Washington Avenue and West 165th Street; the said map bearing the signature of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated May 1, 1915, and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment July 1, 1915.

I hereby certify that the foregoing is a true copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting of said Board held on July 1, 1915.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby fixes at 5 feet the width of the southerly sidewalk of 56th Street in the section between 17th Avenue and the angle point about 175 feet westerly therefrom, from which point the width of the northerly sidewalk is hereby fixed at 10 feet, Borough of Brooklyn; this treatment affording a roadway width of 30 feet.

Gentlemen—On June 15, 1915, the Board of Aldermen requested an issue of \$10,000 in special revenue bonds for the purpose of making alterations to the Criminal Courts Building, rendered necessary through the establishment of an additional part of the Court of Special Sessions. This request was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision on June 29, 1915, which Bureau reports thereon as follows:

"At a meeting of the Sinking Fund Commission on May 19, 1915, the Comptroller presented a report recommending that said Commission ask the Board of Aldermen to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of \$10,000 in special revenue bonds to be expended under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Manhattan, for the purpose of making alterations in the Criminal Courts Building, Borough of Manhattan, rendered necessary through the establishment of an additional part of the Court of General Sessions, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 134 of the Laws of 1914. The resolution carrying the Comptroller's recommendations into effect was adopted, and on May 25, 1915, it was received by the Board of Aldermen, with a communication from the Secretary of the Sinking Fund Commission, and was referred to the Finance Committee. The Finance Committee in its report recommended that these special revenue bonds be authorized, but through a clerical error the word 'Special' was substituted for the word 'General.' In the printed Minutes of the meeting of June 15, 1915, of the Board of Aldermen, reference is made to the Sinking Fund Commission's request, which, already stated, asks that these funds be authorized so that alterations might be made to provide an additional court room for the Court of General Sessions."

"On April 7, 1915, the Sinking Fund Commission, pursuant to the provisions of 205 of the Greater New York Charter, adopted resolutions providing for a new part for the Court of General Sessions by the removal of the offices of the Labor Bureau of the Municipal Civil Service Commission from the Criminal Courts Building and by changes in the present location, in that building, of the First District Magistrates' Court and the offices of the Chief Justice and Clerks of the Court of Special Sessions, to become effective when the necessary alterations are completed."

"Tentative plans and estimates of costs to complete this work have been made, which approximate \$9,905. In order to provide this additional court three separate jobs will have to be performed, one depending upon the completion of the other; that is, making alterations to the quarters formerly occupied by the Labor Bureau of Municipal Civil Service Commission and the removal to the altered quarters of the offices of the Chief Justice and Clerks of the Court of Special Sessions; then the alteration and fitting up of the offices of the Chief Justice and Clerks of the Court of Special Sessions into a court room for the City Magistrates; and, finally, the rearranging of the present City Magistrates' Court so that it might be adapted to the requirements of the new part of the Court of General Sessions. As the present plans are only tentative in form, and as definite plans are to be developed as each job is completed, it is believed advisable, in providing these funds, that the Board of

Estimate or its authorized representatives approve the form of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of costs or schedules of personal service which may be necessary to make these alterations."

"Under the present form of the Board of Aldermen's resolution it would be improper for your Board to concur in this resolution until the error referred to has been rectified. In the meantime, however, in order that this work might be carried on without needless delay, it is suggested that the schedule supporting the appropriation of \$167,250 in Code 424 for General Repairs in the budget appropriations to the President, Borough of Manhattan, be modified so that funds would be available to take care of this matter temporarily, and until the error already referred to has been corrected. There is an unencumbered balance of over \$100,000 available in this appropriation; in the line 'Pavements Other Than Stone (revised to)' \$60,000, which is part of this appropriation, there is a balance of over \$54,000."

"It is suggested that this line be reduced to \$30,000, and the line 'Care of Public Buildings and Offices,' 'Alterations to Criminal Court Building to Provide for Additional Part of Court of General Sessions, \$10,000,' be added, along with a resolution that the Board of Estimate or its duly authorized representative approve the form of contracts, plans, specifications and estimates of costs or schedules of personal service which are to be expended from this fund until the Special Revenue Bond Fund, to which the expenditures might be properly chargeable, has been authorized by your Board after the error already referred to has been rectified. The Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan has consented to this method of providing funds temporarily in view of the urgency of this work."

I recommend that your Board request the Board of Aldermen to correct the error made in their resolution, dated June 15, 1915, and also that the attached resolution modifying the schedule for Code 424 be adopted at this time, so that the alterations in the Criminal Courts Building may be promptly made.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 19, 1915, you referred to the Corporate Stock Budget Committee a request from the Commissioner of Public Charities for the authorization of an issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$4,600, to provide for fire escapes and balconies at the Neurological Building, Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division, and also a request that the corporate stock account C. C. H. 39-C, authorized on July 17, 1912, \$14,500, "For the Erection of an Addition to, Alterations in and Equipment of the Present Storehouse, Kings County Hospital," be amended to make the amount read \$9,900, a reduction of \$4,600.

It is proposed to erect a balcony on the second floor of the Neurological Building, one hundred feet long and twelve feet wide, and to furnish means for escape in case of fire.

There are at present sixty-five female patients, badly crippled, housed on this floor, which has a capacity for eighty. The floor is reached by two stairways, one of which is very narrow. The patients are unable to walk, and a number of them have not been outside of their rooms since their arrival. The purpose of the balcony is to furnish a place where the patients, wheeled out by attendants, can have plenty of fresh air and sunlight and see something besides the walls of their rooms, privileges which some of them have not enjoyed in over six years.

To provide means of escape in case of fire, it is proposed to erect a fire-escape of the steel spiral type, with exit from the balcony. There are several fire-escapes of this type installed on various buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, and they are considered very satisfactory in transferring helpless people to the ground in case of emergency.

Provision has been made in the request for corporate stock for fire prevention work in the buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department, for the construction, in the Neurological Building, of a fire wall dividing the building into two sections, fire doors and other fire prevention work. This together with the proposed fire-escape will afford proper protection to the inmates in case of fire.

Based on similar work on buildings at Randalls Island, it is estimated that the balcony and fire-escape will cost \$4,000.

We recommend that the request be granted by the adoption of the attached resolution, amending the authorization of \$14,500 so as to make \$4,000 available for the erection and completion of the balcony and fire-escape at the Neurological Building, Home for the Aged and Infirm, Brooklyn Division, Respectfully,

Whereas, The City, through the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, entered into a contract with the Ornamental Lighting Pole Company of 114 Liberty Street, New York City, on December 30, 1912, pursuant to the terms of which the Contractor was to furnish and deliver 100 type "C" street lighting poles at sixteen dollars (\$16) each, amounting to sixteen hundred dollars (\$1,600); and

Whereas, Deliveries of said poles were to be fully and entirely performed on the part of the Contractor within 125 calendar days, plus certain extensions of time duly granted by the Department, aggregating a total of 155 days properly allowable for deliveries, said deliveries were not fully and entirely performed until the expiration of 263 days; and

Whereas, The said Contractor in good faith furnished and delivered to the City the said 100 street lighting posts, which have been applied to the uses of the City; and

Whereas, The Contractor inadvertently omitted to request an extension of time which, if duly requested, would undoubtedly have been granted by said Department and thereby obviated in whole any liquidated damages, said omission being admittedly due to the oversight of the Contractor in failing to familiarize itself with the provisions for extensions of time in its contract, but which omissions were not prejudicial in any particular to the interests of the City; and

Whereas, The Contractor in the performance of the said contract was impeded by certain labor troubles and was put to considerable expense and loss of work and material on the first lot of 100 posts made up by it and rejected by the said Department; and

Whereas, It appears the City suffered no loss by reason of the delay in furnishing and delivering the said lighting posts; be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 418 of the Charter, unanimously recommends to the Board of Aldermen that the liquidated damages imposed against the Ornamental Lighting Pole Company, under the terms of said contract No. 35152, be waived and the Contractor released from all fines and penalties under the said contract, and the Comptroller be and hereby is directed to pay the amount otherwise due under the contract as a legal claim.

Dear Sir—The Ornamental Lighting Pole Co., No. 114 Liberty Street, New York City, filed a claim No. B1176 in the Department of Finance in the sum of \$1,600 alleged to be due on Contract No. 35152, for furnishing and delivering 100 Type "C" Street Lighting Poles, at \$16 per post.

The said posts were deemed necessary by the previous administration; contract was executed December 30 1912; deliveries were required, under the terms of the contract, to be made as of July 20, 1913, but were not fully completed until November 5, 1913. As a result of non-compliance with the time requirements of the contract, the matter of liquidated damages arises under Clause "H" of the contract as an offset whereby the Company is penalized for 108 days at \$25 per day, or \$2,700. In explanation of the said offset for liquidated damages, I submit herewith copy of letter dated April 30, 1914, from the then Chief Engineer of Light and Power to the Commissioner.

In an opinion dated February 16, 1915, the Corporation Counsel advises the Department of Finance that " * * * the remedy of the contractor lies in section 418 of the Charter," and further, that:

"Upon the unanimous recommendation of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Board of Aldermen may release the contractor from the liquidated damages incurred by it under its contract. If the contractor should be so released by the Board of Aldermen, then the claim for the services rendered no longer being subject to an offset for liquidated damages, may be paid as a legal claim.

"It appears, however, that no formal certificate of over time has been made by the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity pursuant to Clause "G" of the contract. In the absence of such certificate, the City is not in a position to offset any claim for liquidated damages which may have accrued to it by reason of the failure of the contractor to complete the contract within the time agreed upon.

"It is essential, therefore, that such certificate of overtime be procured from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. With this purpose in view I return herewith the papers transmitted with your communication."

Pursuant to the above, I transmit herewith statement entitled "Resume of Contract for Furnishing and Delivering 100 Cast Iron Lamp Posts," in which the several details are enumerated, and are hereby certified by me as a correct statement of deliveries, overtime, etc. After due investigation, this Department has satisfied itself that the Contractor acted throughout in good faith; that the final product was entirely satisfactory; that the City has unquestionably received benefit at the hands of the contractor and been in no wise prejudiced in the performance of the said contract, and I therefore recommend that said contractor be released in full for the amount of the said liquidated damages and paid in full.

Also, I submit herewith form of resolution for action by your Honorable Board, and respectfully request that you recommend to the Board of Aldermen that, under the provisions of section 418 of the Greater New York Charter, the said Contractor be released from any fine or penalty incurred under said contract. Gentlemen—On July 20, 1915, the Commissioner of Public Charities requested early consideration by the Corporate Stock Budget Committee of an item included in the Department's general corporate stock request of \$30,000 for an addition to the Nurses' Home, Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwells Island.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports thereon as follows:

"The Nurses' Home is a four-story and attic building, with a wing of one story high. It is proposed to add three stories and attic to the wing, making it uniform with the main building. The foundations were built with this end in view.

"The bed capacity of the present home is 148, of which 28 have to be used for domestics, leaving 120 for nurses. Every bed is occupied, and in addition there are 23 nurses occupying rooms in the hospital buildings which should be used by patients. Sixteen of these are occupying the ground floor of the wing of the Metropolitan Hospital. This wing, two stories high, should be devoted exclusively to children service on account of the great increase in this branch of the hospital work, over 500 now being taken care of. The upper story is now used as a detention ward to prevent the spread of disease. The lower story should be used for treatment of whooping cough, as there are at present insufficient quarters for the proper isolation of cases. This is impossible until quarters have been provided for the nurses.

"The present census of the hospital, exclusive of tubercular patients, is 1,115. The present nursing force is inadequate to properly care for this number, and it is impossible to take full advantage of the appropriation allowed in the 1915 Budget for nurses until additional housing facilities are provided. This addition will provide accommodations for thirty-six nurses and the necessary additional domestics.

"There is no question of the urgent need for an addition to the Nurses' Home."

Gentlemen—On June 17, 1914, the Corporation Counsel requested authority to fill four vacant positions of Typewriter in the Law Department. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"The request of the Corporation Counsel is for an authorization, pursuant to the provisions of Resolution 11c of the 1915 budget, to fill four vacancies in the position of Typewriter in the main office. The salary of one of the places is \$1,200, two are \$1,050 and the fourth is \$750. On June 24, 1915, the Corporation Counsel amended his original request to fill all the vacancies by appointments from the Civil Service list to the extent of asking approval of the transfer of Florence Lewengood, Stenographer and Typewriter, at \$1,050, in the Bureau of Street Openings of the Law Department, to the \$1,050 vacancy in the main office. The Corporation Counsel states that it is necessary to fill these vacancies at once on account of the approaching vacation period, during which time the number of Stenographers available for duty is much less than at any other time of the year. The duties of the position fall within the Stenographer Group, Grade 1, of the proposed standard specifications, with a minimum salary of \$720 per annum. The lowest salary fixed for the position in the Law Department, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Charter, is \$750 per annum. No increase in salary or appropriation is involved by reason of the request."

The representative of the Corporation Counsel has agreed to this.

In view of the facts stated in the report of the Bureau of Standards, we recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the transfer of Florence Lewengood, Stenographer and Typewriter, from the Bureau of Street Openings, to the main office at a salary of \$1,050 per annum, authorizing the filling of three vacant positions of Stenographer and Typewriter, at salaries of \$750 per annum each, pending establishment of the minimum rate of \$720 and establishing the \$720 rate for three incumbents. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On May 26, 1915, the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals requested modification of three salary schedules for the year 1915. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"It is proposed to increase the salary of Sylvia T. Barteau, Hospital Clerk, from \$900 to \$1,200 per annum, without maintenance.

"A request was made on June 17, 1914, to increase this salary from \$900 to \$1,050, to take effect as of June 1, 1914. It was desired to increase the salary to \$1,200, but, on the ground that the Trustees would endeavor to secure an increase to \$1,200 dating from January 1, 1915, Miss Barteau consented to remain at Bellevue the last half of that year at \$1,050.

"In July, 1914, the Bureau of Standards prepared a favorable report; in September the papers were returned by the President of the Board of Aldermen, to be considered in budget estimate for 1915. Miss Barteau has declined offers of positions at \$1,200 per annum, in the belief that she would obtain that salary in the City service. Following are some of the positions that have been offered:

"Boston Hospital—This institution employed Florence Babcock, the assistant to Miss Barteau, who received \$480 per year in Bellevue. She now receives a larger salary than Miss Barteau.

"Flower Hospital offered Miss Barteau \$1,200 as an initial salary about two years ago. A St. Louis hospital offered her \$1,200 or better last year. The New York Hospital offered her \$1,200 in June, 1914. Memorial Hospital of Richmond, Va., offered her \$1,200 in June, 1914.

"All of these offers were declined on advice of persons interested in the record bureau of Bellevue.

"There have been no increases allowed for the Record Rooms for about five years. During that time responsibility has increased, new methods have been introduced, and about 200,000 records added.

"In this Bureau at present there are about 1,200,000 different records, in addition to those in book form.

"Many of the improved methods have been initiated and installed by Miss Barteau.

"The position demands a person qualified as medical statistician. The clerk in charge must compile monthly a statistical table on all cases coming into the hospital, showing all conditions in detail, including mortality, cause, etc. She must also prepare a detailed statistical table on all accident cases, showing character of violence, etc., in conformity with the requirements of the Workmen's Compensation Law. She also prepares all data of this character for the quarterly and annual reports.

"The title and compensation as well as the work to be performed fall in the second grade of the Hospital Clerk Group of the proposed specifications, with a salary range of from \$840 to \$1,200 per annum without maintenance. Advancement within this grade is conditional upon appraisal under the rules of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, indicating that the rate requested does not exceed the value of the work to be performed.

"The request involves an increase in salary of \$300 per annum to the maximum rate in the grade.

"It is further requested that the salary of Agnes Aikman, Trained Nurse, be increased from \$900 to \$1,200.

"This Nurse is in charge of the School for Midwives, and is practically an Assistant Superintendent of Training School. There are from 25 to 30 women in training for midwives. Assisting Mrs. Aikman in this work are two Trained Nurses during the day and one Trained Nurse during the night.

"The title and compensation as well as the work to be performed fall in the third grade of the Nurse Group of the proposed specifications with an initial salary of \$1,320.

"The request involves a salary increase of \$300 per annum to a rate \$120 less than the minimum of the grade.

"It is further requested that the salary of David L. Collins, Foreman of Drivers, be increased from \$1,050 to \$1,200 per annum.

"The duties of Mr. Collins include the directing and supervising the work of all Automobile Enginemen and Ambulance Drivers in the Department. There are four stables in which are a total of 21 Drivers and Auto Enginemen, with salaries ranging from \$600 to \$1,200 per annum, and 16 Hospital Helpers with salaries ranging from \$180 to \$300 per annum. Two of the above employees have a salary of \$1,200 per annum, or \$150 per annum more than the Foreman of Drivers.

"Mr. Collins has had no increase in salary since 1912.

"The standard specifications for this position have not been completed, but the Bureau will probably propose a minimum of \$1,200 for the work.

"The increase in salary of the above named three incumbents cannot be made at this time as the positions at the requested salary are not established by the Board of Aldermen."

In view of the above facts, we recommend the adoption of the following resolution to establish the above positions and grades of positions in the Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. Respectfully,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On March 12th the District Attorney of Queens County requested establishment of the position of Process Server at \$3.50 per day. On April 6 the Board of Aldermen adopted a resolution requesting \$600 special revenue bonds to pay emergency process servers during 1915. Action has been suspended awaiting further facts from the District Attorney. On June 12th both requests were renewed. The Bureau of Standards reports as follows:

"In the estimate for 1915, the District Attorney requested three additional process servers at \$1,000 per annum each. It was shown at the hearing that in 1914 about \$1,500 had been spent for the employment of emergency process servers at \$3.50 per day, in addition to the regular force. The Board allowed one additional process server at \$1,000, increasing the regular force to four.

"The present District Attorney found about four hundred unfinished cases. He endeavored to dispose of them. An unusually large number of subpoenas were served. Records show an increase of about 43 per cent. in work of the criminal courts for the last four months of 1915. The volume of work was greater than the regular force of process servers could handle and the district attorney employed temporary help to meet the emergency. Bills incurred for such service already amount to about \$1,400. The Budget allowance for Contingencies was \$600. The Board of Aldermen has requested \$600. It may be necessary later to make a request for a further appropriation.

"Following is a statement of the District Attorney explaining the necessity for the request:

"I have but four permanent process servers, whose compensation is \$1,000 per annum each. But with a territory covering nearly 400 square miles, with two parts of the County Court holding criminal term, with subpoenas to be served for the Grand Juries and Court of Special Sessions and other messenger work to be performed, it has not been possible for these four men to do the work required, and it is therefore necessary from time to time to employ temporary services of other men to do this work. A per diem wage of \$3.50 was paid to such temporary men by my predecessor during the years 1913 and 1914, and I have engaged them at the same rate because their services are performed not only during the day but also at night and at long distances from their homes.

"Vouchers in favor of these men have been filed with the Finance Department, but payment has been withheld awaiting the establishment of the proper schedule line. None of these temporary employees have been paid for services performed during the last five and one-half months. They have been compelled to expend their own money for traveling expenses, and as their bills have not been audited this has been a great hardship to them."

"The work of a process server falls within grade 2 of tentative specifications for the Messenger Group, with compensation from \$840 to \$1,200. The rate of \$3.50 per day for three hundred days amounts to \$1,050 per annum, or \$210 more than the minimum rate provided in the specifications. The specifications are based on annual employment. Temporary employment is usually at a higher rate per day because of its uncertainty, and in this case, the employment embraces irregular hours, and is attended by many inconveniences. Giving consideration to all the circumstances, the rate of \$3.50 per day is reasonable.

"The district attorney has stated that the employment of the extra process servers was necessary. Section 240 of the County Law makes all necessary expenses of the district attorney a county charge."

In view of the report of the Bureau, the Committee recommends adoption of the attached resolutions. First recommending to the Board of Aldermen establishment of the position of Process Server at \$3.50 per day; second, concurring in the resolution of the Board of Aldermen requesting \$600 special revenue bonds to pay emergency process servers; third, modifying the schedules. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 25, 1915, the Surrogate of Queens County requested establishment of two positions. The Bureau of Standards reports as follows:

"The purpose is to change the titles of two Assistant Clerks, at \$1,500 each to Probate Clerk and Accounting Clerk, without change of compensation. The proper titles are Law Clerk (Probate) and Clerk. In December, 1914, the State Civil Service Commission was requested to approve the change. It replied that the request appeared to be entirely reasonable, and would be approved if the positions were established by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

"Section 2491, of the Code of Civil Procedure, provides, in part, as follows:

"The Board of Supervisors, or in the counties embraced within The City of New York, the board of aldermen, as the case requires, must fix the compensation of the clerk or clerks appointed under this section. * * *

"Mr. William A. Brooks performs the duties of Probate, Administration and General Clerk. Receives all petitions for the probate of wills, the granting of letters of administration and all miscellaneous proceedings in the court. This involves an examination of the petitions to see that this court has jurisdiction, that the statutory requirements have been fully complied with, that the petitions are in proper form and contain all the statements required by law. When petitions are deemed not to be complete or not in proper form, the attention of parties filing them is called to the discrepancies, and subsequently statutes and decisions must be consulted. When this Clerk deems the issues demand further inquiry, they are, by him, referred to the Chief Clerk, and occasionally the latter must even refer to the Surrogate to have him pass upon various questions of jurisdiction, etc. Also examines all sureties on bonds to determine their qualifications as to property, etc., to act as such surety. In cases where letters of administration are issued with limitation as to the prosecution of an action for negligence or otherwise, application is later made for the removal of such restrictions and making letters full and complete. These petitions, affidavits, etc., must be carefully scrutinized in order to determine whether or not the facts set forth warrant the removal of the restrictions and the extension of the letters. In probate and other proceedings, citations are usually issued. The proofs of service thereof on the parties in interest must be examined with great care to determine that service has been properly made, giving the court jurisdiction over the persons and property in each proceeding. A blank form is filled out with the record of each case, of its filing and progress through the court until finally disposed of and corresponding entries made in a book, and the case kept track of until finally disposed of when the papers are sent to the record room for recording, and subsequently checked up. Also takes depositions of witnesses to wills under a special authorization by the Surrogate. Also keeps accounts of all fees received. The duties of this Clerk require an extensive and intimate knowledge of the law governing the practice in Surrogate's Courts. In the absence of the Clerk in charge of the Accounting and Guardianship Departments, he takes his place. Also in the absence of the Chief Clerk, this Clerk is in charge of the office.

"Mr. Robert McClintock Robinson, Jr., has charge of the Department of Accounting and Guardianship and the bookkeeping of the office. Receives all petitions for accounts and for the issuance of letters of guardianship; examines such petitions in order to determine that they are in accordance with the laws governing practice in Surrogate's Courts; that they contain all of the statements necessary to give the court jurisdiction over the persons and property involved, and that they in every respect comply with the law. Examines accounts submitted to see that they are in proper form to be passed upon by the court; makes a record on blank provided for the purpose of the details of each petition and enters same in a book kept for the purpose. Receives the proofs of service of citations and examines same to see that they have been properly served so as to give the court proper jurisdiction. Examines decrees submitted to see that they conform with the amounts and with whatever decisions may be made by the Surrogate in cases where the accounts have been contested. When matters arise deemed to be too complicated for this Clerk to pass upon they are referred by him to the Chief Clerk, who occasionally may also refer to the Surrogate for final decision. Also receives all petitions for the issuance of letters of guardianship, examines same in the manner indicated above, makes sheet record and record in book and keeps track of all cases in his department until completed and delivered to the record room, and subsequently checks same off as having been filed and recorded. Keeps the books and accounts of the court, prepares payroll and the various monthly and other statements required by the Comptroller. This Clerk must have an extensive knowledge of the laws governing the practice as to all matter in his department. In the absence of the Clerk in charge of Probate and Administration Department, he takes his place.

"The duties performed by Mr. Brooks clearly fall within the second grade of the Law Clerk Group. The special knowledge of probate work which is probably required in this position is indicated by the word Probate in brackets in accordance with the principle recommended by the Bureau of Standards for all specialized positions falling under an accepted general title. The title of Accounting Clerk has a definite descriptive significance in the procedure of the Surrogate's office.

"The request is merely for a change of title and does not involve any change in compensation."

"Medical Superintendent at \$2,520, Superintendent Training School at \$1,320, Clerk at \$840, Stenographer and Typewriter at \$720, Dietitian at \$20, and Engineers and Firemen (regular) were allowed on the previous modifications, but only the Clerk, Stenographer, Engineers and Firemen have been employed. All the salaried regular positions except the following are recommended, as the proposed rates do not exceed the minimum of the specifications and the positions appear to be necessary.

"Superintendent Training School, \$1,800.

"This position was allowed in the previous modification at \$1,320, the minimum of the specifications, and no additional amount is recommended. The rate paid the Assistant Superintendent of Training School, in charge of Fordham Hospital and Training School, and the Supervising Nurse, assigned to the same work at Gouverneur, is \$1,200 per annum.

"Deputy Superintendent Training School, \$1,200.

"This position is not required in this hospital according to the report of the Hospital Investigating Committee and is therefore not recommended. Other city hospitals of larger bed capacity do not have this position in addition to a Superintendent of Training School.

"Supervising Nurse, \$840.

"The minimum of the specifications for this position is \$780, and this amount is recommended, as the Department have not yet selected any one now employed in the service at a higher rate for transfer to this position.

"Pupil Nurse (12 at \$144; 19 at \$120).

"The specifications provide \$120 for this position and 31 at this rate are recommended.

"Resident Physician, \$1,200.

"The minimum of the specifications for this position is \$900, and the nearest established rate is \$1,000. The latter sum is therefore recommended, and the position at the minimum recommended to be established.

"Interns, Resident (3 at \$480).

"The minimum of the specifications for this position is \$240, and the nearest established rate is \$480. The latter sum is therefore recommended and the position at the minimum recommended to be established.

"The paid resident medical staff allowed this institution is in excess of the other city hospitals of equal bed capacity.

"Radiographer, \$1,200.

"This position has not been established. The specifications provide for Physician (Roentgenologist) at a minimum of \$1,500 for this work, and the establishment of this position at this rate is recommended.

"Housekeeper, \$600.

"The minimum of the specifications for this work is \$540 and the title is Matron. Neither the position of housekeeper nor matron has been established at \$540, and the nearest established rate of \$600 is recommended as is also the establishment at the minimum of the specifications.

"Auto Engineman (2 at \$960, with Maintenance).

"The minimum of the specifications for this position is \$960 without maintenance, and this rate is recommended.

"Clerks.

"In addition to the clerk at \$840 now allowed, and one requested at \$750, three hospital helpers (clerks), 2 at \$480 and 1 at \$360, with maintenance, are requested. Two hospital clerks at \$480, without maintenance, are recommended. This is in excess of the clerical force allowed hospitals of this size.

"Telephone Operator.

"Two at \$600, without maintenance, and 1 hospital helper at \$480, with maintenance for telephone operating work are requested. Three telephone operators at \$600 without maintenance are recommended.

"Hospital Helpers.

"For hospital helpers a lump sum of \$18,840 is requested and the Department has consented to the following allowance, the annual cost being \$15,060, the positions being allowed at the minimum of the specifications, the number of employees being determined by the expected necessity, the persons to be employed only as required.

"Engineers and Firemen.

"The Engineers and Firemen are recommended as requested, the number of days for engineers, including vacation time, being 1,092, and the firemen 1,119, the difference being due to the different dates of appointments of these persons.

"The annual cost of the force on the modification recommended is \$544.81, which will be reduced to \$539.01 when the additional grades are established.

"The Commissioner states in regard to this report as follows:

"We desire to approve and request the unanimous consent of the report made by the Bureau of Standards. With certain items of this report we do not agree and desire later to make request to the Board of Estimate for certain modifications more particularly affecting the salary of the Superintendent of the Training School for Nurses, the salary of the Resident Physician, the salaries of the Resident Internes, the necessity for a Deputy Superintendent of Training School, and the salaries of certain other positions."

In view of the facts set forth above, we recommend that the report of the Bureau of Standards in regard to the segregation of this Code be approved by the adoption of the attached resolutions modifying the schedule authorizing the filling of certain positions in excess of the minimum, and recommending the establishment of certain positions. Gentlemen—On June 5, 1915, the Police Commissioner requested establishment in the Police Department, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of the position of Secretary to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner, at \$1,800 per annum, and Stenographer to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner, at \$1,200 per annum. The Bureau of Standards reports thereon as follows:

"Duties now assigned to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner are as follows:

"General supervision and direction of:

"Special squad assigned to obtain evidence of illicit use of drugs.

"Special squad of detectives assigned to investigate and secure evidence on bomb explosions and other relative crime.

"Direction of the uniformed force of the Borough of Queens.

"Direction of the Boiler Squad, comprising about 17 men, engaged in the examination and testing of steam boilers, investigating applicants for engineers' and firemen's certificates, etc.

"Supervision of the issuing of parade and pistol permits, pension investigations, etc.

"Directing the investigation of all applications for pool table licenses, about 2,500 annually.

"Direction of special emergency squads, depending in number and purpose on crime problems presented from time to time.

"Supervision of the Board of Surgeons, etc.

"If the position of Secretary to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner is established, it is proposed to have the incumbent supervise various activities under the direction of the Deputy Commissioner. Directing the proper transmission of orders, miscellaneous papers, etc. Make special investigations relative to various problems coming under the jurisdiction of the Fifth Deputy Commissioner. Reviewing applications and making recommendations for the granting or denying of parade, pistol and other permits. Conducting the office, furnishing information, etc., at such times as the Deputy Commissioner may be personally conducting outside work, on tours of inspection, etc.

"Other work to be assigned to the Secretary, if allowed, will be as follows:

"Preparing correspondence, acting as intermediary between the Deputy Commissioner, the public and members of the Department. Supervising various activities under the direction of the Deputy Commissioner. Directing the proper transmission of orders, miscellaneous papers, etc. Make special investigations relative to various problems coming under the jurisdiction of the Fifth Deputy Commissioner. Reviewing applications and making recommendations for the granting or denying of parade, pistol and other permits. Conducting the office, furnishing information, etc., at such times as the Deputy Commissioner may be personally conducting outside work, on tours of inspection, etc.

"The work planned falls within Grade 1C of the Private Secretary Group of the proposed specifications, and is one of the examples of positions for this grade. The compensation for this grade ranges from \$1,800 to \$2,160, and, under the provisions of resolution 2C of the Budget, the position should be filled at the minimum rate of \$1,800.

"The position of Stenographer to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner is requested because of the great amount of confidential and verbatim work that is necessary to the performance of the function of the office. The incumbent of this position will be called upon to report hearings, take verbatim statements of prisoners, informers, complaints, etc., and upon the accuracy of his work much will depend.

"The work of the Stenographer falls within Grade 3 of the Stenographer Group of the proposed specifications, with salaries ranging from \$1,320 to \$1,560. The establishment of the position is asked for at \$1,200 to conform to compensation now allowed for similar stenographic occupations.

"The work of the office of the Fifth Deputy Commissioner is of such character as to require considerable night work, and both the Secretary and Stenographer will be subject to call at any time while off duty."

We believe that the work assigned to this office is of such importance as to require the assistants requested, and we, therefore, recommend the adoption of the attached resolution providing for the establishment of the positions of Secretary to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner at \$1,800 per annum, and Stenographer to the Fifth Deputy Commissioner at \$1,200 per annum, in the Police Department.

Gentlemen—On August 9, 1915, you referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades a request from the Commissioner of Health for the establishment in the Department of Health of the grade of position of Engineer, at \$2,400 for one incumbent. The request was subsequently orally amended to read "Assistant Engineer."

The Bureau of Contract Supervision reports thereon as follows:

"The necessity of an engineer in the Department of Health is based on the following reasons:

"1. Supervision of the Department's inspection of building work and engineering construction and enforcement of the contract specifications for same.

"The following work has been recently started:

"Construction of four pavilions at Riverside Hospital.

"Installation of heating plant and equipment in the new kitchen building at Kings-ton Avenue Hospital.

"Construction of pavilion for diphtheria patients at Kingston Avenue Hospital.

"Construction of medical staff house and nurses' home at Willard Parker Hos-pital.

"Fire protection work for department buildings at foot of East 16th Street, Man-hattan.

"Equipment of Jamaica Hospital, construction of sewer facilities and improve-ment of the site.

"Planning development of Seton Falls Hospital site, Bronx.

"At the Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Otisville. Completion of the sewage disposal plant and of the water supply system.

"Construction of recreation building, staff house and nurses' home,

"Equipment of laundry building.

"Improvement of grounds and road building.

"In addition, there is about \$465,000 of corporate stock unencumbered, the use of which has been definitely planned, but the contracts are being held back until the necessary completion of other work.

"2. Trained supervision of the operation of the heat, light and power plants, and of the steamboat service of the Department. The 1915 appropriation for these items was \$157,749.50, of which \$86,796.50, was for fuel and \$70,953 for personal service.

"Considering the increasing demands on these plants, a close study of the needs by a competent engineer should result in more effective service at less cost.

"3. The branch offices, clinics and infant milk stations approximate one hundred buildings. There is a constant demand for repairs, the cost of which should be materially reduced under intelligent supervision. In addition to the contract and open market order service, \$86,278.40 was allowed for repairs in 1915.

"4. Reorganization and competent supervision of the wagon and motor service of the Department. This service includes the ambulances, auto trucks, goods wagons for emergency disinfection work, express service, collection of stray dogs, mosquito extermination and passenger automobiles. The appropriation for 1915 was \$104,608.75.

"It is believed that by careful study a system can be evolved whereby better service can be obtained at reduced cost.

"5. Numerous minor activities of the Department demand the attention of an engineer who should be the means of providing more effective control of sanitary conditions, such as drainage, ventilation, sewage disposal, mosquito extermination, overcrowding of street cars, etc.

"Furthermore, an engineer will obviate the necessity of employing outside help in many instances. Just recently architects' fees could have been saved on the specifications for sewage disposal at Jamaica, and for fire protection at Willard Parker Hospital.

"There is no doubt that the cost of repairs and other jobs incidental to the proper maintenance of the Department's buildings, grounds and mechanical equipment can be materially lessened if the specifications are prepared and enforced by an engineer.

"The Department of Health will not require any additional funds for this position, but will be able to provide for it out of their present appropriation."

I therefore beg to request that you amend Chapter 15, Article 2, Section 26, of the Code of Ordinances, so that it would not include the block between Division Street and East Broadway, and I would suggest that the section be made to read as follows:

Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Preliminary Endorsement of the Hersey Detector Meter for Use in The City of New York.

City of New York, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, Office of the Commissioner, Municipal Building, New York City, July 21, 1915.

Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—In accordance with action taken by the Board of Aldermen on June 22, 1915, the Hersey Manufacturing Company have requested this department to submit to your Board a preliminary endorsement of the Hersey Detector Meter.

This meter is designed to give an unobstructed flow on fire lines, and at the same time measure the water flowing through the meter whether the stream be a large or small one.

The meter consists of a comparatively large casting having three passages for the water:

- (a) A direct opening corresponding in diameter with that of the main line and provided with a weighted valve.
- (b) A by-pass of smaller diameter around the weighted valve in the main line and passing directly through a standard Hersey disc meter.
- (c) A still smaller by-pass around a deflector plate, located between the weighted valve and the entrance end of the larger by-pass, and passing through a small standard Hersey disc meter.

As the measurement of flow is by means of two disc meters of a type approved by your Board, the department, acting on an opinion rendered by the Corporation Counsel in 1910 has permitted these meters to be set without this special pattern having been approved by your Board.

I was unable to concur in the conclusion of my predecessor, that action by your Board was unnecessary, and therefore notified the Hersey Manufacturing Company that it would be necessary to have this meter approved as to pattern and price by your Board.

The meter has been in use in the City of New York since about 1905, and over 100 of these meters have been set during the past five years. All the meters set have been tested by the department and have satisfactorily measured both high and low flows. The service rendered by the meters after being set has been satisfactory.

I am informed that the meter is acceptable to the fire insurance interests as suitable for installation on sprinkler and other fire service equipment.

The prices charged for the meter are as follows:

Three-inch, \$85; 4-inch, \$175; 6-inch, \$375; 8-inch, \$600; 10-inch, \$825; 12-inch, \$990.

These prices are practically the same as the prices charged by the various companies for similar sized meters, and are considered reasonable.

Attached hereto are 2 cuts, illustrating the Hersey Detector Meter.

I recommend that this type meter be approved by your Board for use in the City of New York on fire service lines, where this type of meter is considered suitable by the department. Respectfully,

The Department has conducted tests of this meter to determine accuracy and durability. The Department has a complete record of the material and labor employed by the company on this work, which is now nearing completion. Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, The Board of Aldermen, New York City:

Sir—I respectfully ask that your Honorable Board will request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of one hundred and thirteen thousand, five hundred and fifteen dollars and sixty-three cents (\$113,515.63), to provide for the balance of our request of June 28th. By the issue of July 21st, provision was made for approximately half of the amount requested as per table shown below.

With the exception of Code No. 2651, Food Supplies, the balances noted above will probably be sufficient, but the need for a larger amount in Food Supplies is made evident by the unusually high census (for this time of the year) and there is no doubt whatever that during the months of October, November and December of this year, his department will be called upon to provide for a minimum census of seven thousand five hundred (7,500).

I wish therefore to make request for \$85,000 more in Code No. 2651, Food Supplies, instead of the balance (\$44,437.50) indicated in the table, which is an increase of \$40,562.50 over my original request of June 28th, for this particular appropriation.

Hon. GEORGE MCANENY, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I write to supplement the request of the Department of Correction for revenue bonds amounting to \$113,515.63. The budget appropriation provided funds for an average of five thousand (5,000) inmates for the year 1915. The average to be cared for will be seven thousand (7,000) or more for the year, or an excess of two thousand (2,000) over that for which appropriation was made. Approximately \$85,000 of the requested amount is for food supplies. All food supplies on hand, now contracted for, will be exhausted by October 25th. Revenue bonds in the amount of \$93,396.60 have already been allowed this year. The total of the budget and revenue bond appropriations for the year 1915 will be \$1,519,317.14, if all of our present request is allowed. This will mean a per capita cost of \$217.60 per inmate for the year, a reduction of \$27 below the per capita cost for 1914. The per capita cost for 1914 was \$224, or \$38 less than it was the last year of the present administration. In other words if no reduction had been made during this administration in the annual per capita cost of this department, it would require \$1,980,370 to board, maintain and care for all the prisoners that have been and will be cared for by this department during the year 1916. In other words, the reduction of per capita cost below the 1913 figure has really saved the City \$461,020. There can be no basis of criticism on this request of this department at this time, as \$217 is at least \$8 less than the per capita cost of caring for prisoners in any institution in any part of the country, and in the judgment of this department is too little to provide decent clothing and decent facilities.

May I ask the unanimous consent of your Honorable Board at the first meeting on September 21, 1915, so that the bonds requested may be voted at that time, as ten days must elapse between the time of your action and the Mayor's approval under the law, and then another period must elapse before the Board of Estimate can take action making the appropriation legal. As it is, it does not seem possible to secure the appropriation, advertise for bids, award the contract, and secure deliveries of food supplies by the time our present supplies are exhausted. Please bear in mind that this situation is not of our making. A grant of half of the revenue bonds requested on June 28th was made by your Honorable Board. Any help you can give us will be greatly appreciated. Respectfully yours,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On July 14 and August 11, 1915, the Board of Education requested establishment, pursuant to the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, of rates of compensation for the janitor of the Murray Hill Vocational School, Manhattan Trade School for Girls, East 91st Street Supply Depository, Public Schools 8, Manhattan; 135, Brooklyn; 45, 63 and 99, Queens. In connection therewith we report as follows:

For the janitor of the Murray Hill Vocational School an allowance of \$50 is proposed in addition to his regular compensation to reimburse him for expense incurred by him in employing the services of a watchman from June 1 to June 30, 1915. This allowance is made necessary by the fact that the Committee on Care of Buildings, Board of Education, authorized the janitor of said school to employ a watchman throughout the year, allowing him additional compensation at the rate of \$600 per annum, which action was ratified and approved by the Board of Education on June 9, 1915. Subsequently when this matter came before the Committee on Salaries and Grades of your Board for investigation and report, it was recommended that the request for the establishment of the increased rate of compensation for the janitor of the Murray Hill Vocational School be disapproved. The Committee on Care of Buildings, Board of Education, accordingly advised the janitor on June 30, 1915, to discontinue the services of the watchman.

With regard to the Manhattan Trade School for Girls additional compensation at the rate of \$50 per month is proposed for the janitor. The request of the Board of Education states that the allowance is for the purpose of engaging the services of a cleaner to care for fourth floor of the Fifth National Bank Building used as an annex to said school and also for the care of room 213 of the main building. In this connection, it should be noted that the janitorial compensation for the main building of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls, located at 209-213 East 23rd Street, if based on the adopted measurement schedule would be \$1,860 per annum, as against \$2,076 actually fixed for said building, the former rate not providing for the additional space above mentioned for which extra compensation is requested.

As regards the additional space, Superintendent C. B. T. Snyder states that the Board of Education has been unable to procure the further use of the loft in the Fifth National Bank Building as proposed. Concerning the additional room in the main building which has been acquired, it should be noted that it has an area of only 2,250 square feet. In view of the foregoing facts it is recommended that the proposed additional compensation for the janitor of the Manhattan Trade School for Girls be not allowed.

"Further and final study of the sewage system at the Farm Colony, which is now operated in such a way as to cause serious, persistent and increasing sanitary nuisance

upon adjacent private property, indicates that a simple solution is to be had by connecting the buildings now giving rise to the nuisance with the public sewer. * *"

This money is for the purpose of purchasing the materials for this sewer. The laying of these pipes will be done by departmental labor, thereby saving about \$2,000 of the cost if a contract were to be let for the construction of this sewer.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 170 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Itinerant Musicians.

By the Vice-Chairman—

AN ORDINANCE to amend Section 170 of Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Itinerant Musicians.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 170 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§170. ITINERANT MUSICIANS. No person shall [engage in the business of a street musician, playing for hire or voluntary contributions from door to door or otherwise without having first obtained a license therefor] *use or perform on any musical instrument in any street or public place unless he shall have been licensed as an itinerant musician, as hereinafter provided.* [Such licenses shall be granted by the Commissioner; provided that the person or persons applying therefor shall have been residents of the city for at least 1 year prior to such application and shall pay for such license the sum of \$10, the license to be renewed from year to year, upon the annual payment of such fee. The term of residence required by this section shall be proved by affidavits of the person applying for such license and of 2 other persons resident of the city, which affidavits shall state the different places of residence in the city occupied by said applicant during the year preceding his application.] *Upon payment of a license fee of \$10 per annum the Commissioner of Licenses may grant and issue licenses to such number of itinerant musicians as he may deem proper; not to exceed, however, the total number of 800. No person licensed as an itinerant musician shall solicit, ask or request any money for his performance, as such, in any way, shape or manner, directly or indirectly. No person shall use or perform upon any musical instrument in any street or public place, before the hour of 9 A. M. nor after the hour of 6 P. M. of any day; nor during any part of the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday; nor within a distance of 500 feet of any schoolhouse or house of public worship, during school hours or hours of public worship, respectively; nor within a like distance of any court, public office, hospital, asylum or other public institution, nor within a distance of 250 feet of any tenement house, dwelling house or other building, when directed or requested by any occupant thereof to refrain from or discontinue using or performing upon such musical instrument.*

All licenses for itinerant musicians now in force, which shall not sooner expire, shall expire on the thirty-first day of December next succeeding the date on which this ordinance shall take effect. All licenses for itinerant musicians now in force, the terms of which would otherwise bring their expiration to a period beyond the thirty-first day of December next succeeding the date this ordinance takes effect, may be renewed by the licensees for another term, if presented on or before the said December thirty-first, and for such full calendar month of the unexpired time of the old license a pro rata amount of the fee paid therefor shall be applied toward the payment of the new fee. All licenses for itinerant musicians issued between the date this ordinance becomes effective and the following December thirty-first, shall be charged the full fee mentioned above, but all such licenses may be renewed by the licensees, if presented on or before the said December thirty-first, at the pro rata rates heretofore prescribed in this paragraph. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and shall not be construed [so as] to affect any band of music or organized musical or religious society engaged in any military or civic parade, or to any musical performance conducted under a license from municipal authority.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph a of subdivision 4, Section 90, Article 5, Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

4. In the Borough of Queens. a. Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line of the East River at its intersection with the centre line of Winthrop ave., thence running southeasterly along the centre line of Winthrop ave., to a point one hundred feet southeast of the southeasterly side of Steinway ave., thence running southwesterly one hundred feet southeast of and parallel to the southeasterly side of Steinway ave. to a point one hundred feet north of the northerly side of Astoria ave., thence running easterly one hundred feet north of and parallel to the northerly side of Astoria ave. to the Old Bowery Bay Road, thence running southerly along the centre line of the Old Bowery Bay Road to Woodside ave., thence running southerly along the centre line of Woodside ave. to Middleburg ave., thence running westerly along the centre line of Middleburg ave. to Dickson st., thence running southerly along the centre line of Dickson st. to a point one hundred feet south of the southerly

side of Greenpoint ave., thence running westerly one hundred feet south of and parallel to the southerly side of Greenpoint ave. to Borden ave., thence running easterly along the centre line of Borden ave. to [a point one hundred feet east of the easterly side of Clifton ave., thence running southerly one hundred feet east of and parallel to the easterly side of Clifton ave.] *Laurel Hill boulevard, thence running southwesterly along the centre line of Laurel Hill boulevard to Meeker ave., thence running southerly along the centre line of Meeker ave. to Newtown Creek, thence along Newtown Creek to the East River, thence running northerly along the bulkhead line of the East River to the place of beginning.*

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance Relating to Safeguards Against Spread of Fire in The City of New York.

By Alderman McNally (on behalf of Committee on Buildings)—

AN ORDINANCE relating to safeguards against spread of fire in the City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article 18 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE 18.

[Fire walls and shafts.

Section 370. Restriction upon area of stores, warehouses and factories.

371. Light and vent shafts.

372. Inclosure of elevator shafts.

373. Protection of shafts and hoistways.

374. Dumb-waiter shafts.

375. Fireproof shutters and doors.]

Safeguards against spread of fire.

Section 370. Definitions.

371. Fire walls.

372. Fire partitions.

373. Shafts.

374. Existing hoistways.

375. Protection of exterior openings.

376. Opening protectives.

§ 370. Definitions. For the purposes of this chapter,

a—a fire wall is any wall built for the purpose of restricting the area subject to the spread of fire;

b—a fire partition is a subdividing partition built for the purpose of protecting life by providing an area of refuge;

c—a shaft is an inclosed space extending through one or more stories of a building connecting a series of two or more openings in successive floors, or floors and roof;

d—an open shaft is one that extends through the roof of a building and is open to the outer air at the top;

e—a vent shaft is one used solely to ventilate or light, or both, one or more water-closet compartments or bathrooms;

f—an elevator shaft is one that encloses any device used for carrying persons on things upward or downward;

g—a dumbwaiter shaft is an elevator shaft which has a cross-sectional area at any point of nine square feet or less, and in which the device is used only for the carrying of things;

h—the term "self-closing," as applied to a fire door or other opening protective, means closing automatically after having been opened for use;

i—the term "automatic," as applied to a fire door or other opening protective, means normally held in an open position and automatically closing by the action of some approved releasing device.

§ 371. Fire walls. 1. Construction. Fire walls shall be constructed of any form of approved masonry or reinforced concrete permitted by this chapter for the exterior walls of the building in which it is erected. The thickness shall not be less than that required for the exterior walls. In non-fireproof buildings fire walls shall be continuous from the foundation to the roof and provided above the roof with a parapet wall as specified in § 259 of this chapter.

2. Openings. No opening in a fire wall shall exceed eighty square feet in area, and the aggregate width of all openings at any level shall not exceed twenty-five per cent. of the length of the wall, except that in the first story of buildings equipped throughout with an approved system of automatic sprinklers, larger openings and a greater percentage of wall length may be used by the special written permission of the superintendent of buildings stating the reason for such allowance. Every opening in a fire wall shall be protected on each side of the wall with an approved automatic fire door. When any fire wall serves also as a fire division partition it shall have no openings other than door openings not exceeding forty-eight square feet in area, and one of the automatic fire doors at each opening shall be replaced by a self-closing fire door.

§ 372. Fire Partitions. 1. Construction. Fire partitions shall be constructed of the materials and in the manner herein specified, as follows:

a—approved masonry;

b—any form of fireproof partition, constructed as required in § 355 of this chapter, provided, (1) that such partition is supported on each story on fireproof construction, (2) that, unless otherwise approved after the three hours' fire test herein provided, the thicknesses are not less than eight inches for brick, not less than six inches for stone or cinder concrete, or hollow blocks of terra cotta, concrete or gypsum, and not less than four inches for stone or cinder concrete if properly reinforced with steel, (3) that, unless constructed of expanded metal or wire lath and cement mortar of a finished thickness of not less than two and one-half inches, metal lath construction shall not be used, and (4) that all openings in partitions of hollow building blocks, gypsum or metal lath construction, shall be adequately reinforced with steel; or

c—any material and form of construction that may be approved by the superintendent of buildings as conforming to the requirements of the fire test prescribed in subdivision 3, § 355 of this chapter, provided, however, that for fire partitions the duration of such test shall be not less than three hours and that such partitions shall be supported at each story on fireproof construction.

2. In non-fireproof buildings. In non-fireproof buildings fire partitions, if required in any story, shall be continuous through all stories from the foundation to the roof, provided that if any of the floors of the building are of fireproof construction for their full extent and all stairways are enclosed in approved fireproof construction, fire partitions shall be required to be continuous only from one such fireproof floor to another or to the roof. Any such fire partition shall be deemed continuous, even though the several parts are not directly over one another in successive stories, if the intervening floors at the levels where offsets occur, are of fireproof construction and all parts not supported directly on the foundations are carried on fireproof construction. Fire partitions shall be carried at least three feet above any non-fireproof roof.

3. Openings. Fire partitions shall have no openings other than the required door openings. No such door opening shall exceed forty-eight square feet in area. If more than one door opening is required, the distance, measured along the line of the fire partition, between any door and the next one shall not be more than sixty feet. Every opening in a fire partition shall be protected by an approved self-closing fire door.

§ 373. Shafts. 1. When required. Unless otherwise specifically provided by any other law or ordinance, shafts as in this section described and specified shall be provided in all fireproof and non-fireproof buildings for every series of floor openings, except stairways, hereafter placed or constructed in any such building, whether for air, light, elevator or any other purpose, or hereafter altered so as to enlarge any of such openings or to change their use. The provisions of this section shall not, however, be taken to apply to ducts permitted by Article 19 of this chapter.

2. Open shafts. All open shafts hereafter placed in any building shall be constructed of approved masonry or reinforced concrete, and of the thicknesses required for exterior walls, provided that for shaft walls not exceeding ten feet in length the thickness may be reduced to not less than eight inches for the uppermost forty feet and four inches more for each lower section of forty feet.

3. Shafts exceeding nine square feet in area. Except as hereinafter provided in this section, all shafts hereafter erected in any building and having a cross-sectional area at any point within the enclosing walls of more than nine square feet, and all existing shafts hereafter enlarged so that the cross-sectional area at any point ex-

ceeds nine square feet shall be constructed in the manner and of the materials and thicknesses prescribed in subdivision 1, § 372 of this article for fire partitions, or subdivision 2 of this section for open shafts.

4. Shafts not exceeding nine square feet in area. All shafts hereafter erected in any building and having a cross-sectional area at any point of nine square feet or less, except as hereafter provided in this section, shall be constructed of approved masonry, reinforced concrete, or any material or form of construction, not less than two inches thick, permitted under the provisions of § 355 of this chapter as permanent fireproof partitions, set in a steel frame of proper strength or suitably reinforced with metal dowels, or in such other manner as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings.

5. Elevator shafts in existing residence buildings. In existing residence buildings which have not more than fifteen sleeping rooms any elevator shaft hereafter erected, when the available space does not permit of the construction required by subdivision 3 of this section, may be constructed as required by subdivision 4 of this section.

6. Non-fireproof shafts. Vent shafts hereafter erected in non-fireproof residence buildings, when extending through not more than one story in height, carried not less than three feet above the roof and covered with a ventilating skylight of metal and glass, and dumb-waiter shafts hereafter erected that do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in residence buildings occupied by not more than two families or having not more than fifteen sleeping rooms, may be built of wood filled in solidly with brick or other approved incombustible material, or covered on the inside with plaster on plaster board or metal lath, or with sheet metal not less than one-sixteenth of an inch in thickness, provided that the part of any such dumbwaiter shaft which extends into the cellar shall be enclosed in eight-inch brick walls.

7. Existing elevators. In every non-fireproof public building all elevators not already enclosed in fireproof shafts shall be enclosed in walls constructed and arranged as in this section required for elevator shafts.

8. Existing dumbwaiter shafts. Any existing dumbwaiter shaft which extends into the cellar or basement, except such as do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in residence buildings, shall be enclosed in the cellar or basement with walls or brick eight inches thick or other fireproof construction approved by the superintendent of buildings, unless already enclosed in some form of construction conforming to the requirements of subdivision 4 of this section.

9. Openings. a. In open shafts having a cross-sectional area at any point of thirty-six square feet or less, hereafter erected or altered, all openings shall be protected with fire doors, fire shutters or fire windows.

b. In vent shafts, hereafter erected or altered, except non-fireproof vent shafts, all openings shall be provided with fire windows.

c. In elevator shafts hereafter erected or altered, all door openings shall be protected by self-closing fire doors. No other openings shall be provided in such shafts, except window openings to the outer air.

d. In dumbwaiter shafts hereafter erected or altered, there shall be no openings other than door openings protected with self-closing fire doors.

e. All other shafts not provided for in this subdivision, hereafter erected or altered, shall have all openings protected with self-closing fire doors.

10. Enclosure at top. All shafts hereafter erected or altered to extend into the top story of any non-fireproof building shall be carried through and not less than three feet above the roof, of the same materials and construction as required for the shaft within the building. Every shaft extending above the roof, except open shafts, shall be enclosed at the top with a roof of fireproof construction and a metal skylight of at least three-fourths the area of the shaft in the top story, except that the skylight herein required may be replaced by a window of equivalent area in the side of the shaft provided the sill of such window is not less than three feet above the roof and the window does not face a property line within ten feet. Any shaft that does not extend into the top story of the building shall have the top enclosed with fireproof construction.

11. Enclosure at bottom. The bottom of every shaft, hereafter erected or altered, except vent shafts, shall be enclosed with fireproof construction.

12. Elevator machinery compartment. When any compartment which contains machinery for operating an elevator communicates with an elevator shaft it shall be enclosed with partitions of the same materials and construction as required for the shaft, and shall have fire doors on the openings.

13. Number of elevators restricted in shaft. Not more than two elevators shall be placed hereafter in any one shaft, and where there are only two elevators in any building they shall be placed in separate shafts.

§ 371. Light and vent shafts. In every building hereafter erected or altered, all the walls or partitions forming interior light or vent shafts shall be built of brick or such other fireproof materials as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings. The walls of all light or vent shafts, whether exterior or interior, hereafter erected, shall be carried up not less than 3 feet above the level of the roof, and the brick walls coped as other parapet walls. Vent shafts to light interior bathrooms in private dwellings may be built of wood filled in solidly with brick or hard-burnt clay blocks, when extending through not more than 1 story in height, and carried not less than 2 feet above the roof, covered with a ventilating skylight, of metal and glass.

§ 372. Inclosure of elevator shaft. 1. In new buildings. All elevators hereafter placed in any building, except such fireproof buildings as have been or may be hereafter erected, shall be inclosed in suitable walls of brick or with a suitable framework of iron and burnt-clay filling, or of such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings, except that the inclosure walls in non-fireproof buildings over 5 stories high, used as warehouses or factories shall be of brick. If the inclosure walls are of brick, laid in cement mortar, and not used as bearing walls, they may be 8 inches in thickness for not more than 50 feet of their uppermost height, and increasing in thickness 4 inches for each lower 50 feet portion or part thereof. Said walls or construction shall extend through and at least 3 feet above the roof. All openings in the said walls shall be provided with fireproof shutters or fireproof doors, made solid for 3 feet above the floor level, except that the doors used for openings in buildings intended for the occupancy of one family may be of wood covered on the inner surface and edges with metal, not including the openings in the cellar, nor above the roof in any such shaft walls. The roofs over all inclosed elevators shall be made of fireproof materials, with a skylight at least three-fourths the area of the shaft made of glass set in iron frames. When the shaft does not extend to the ground the lower end shall be inclosed in fireproof material.

2. In existing hotels. In every non-fireproof building used or occupied as a hotel, in which there is an elevator not inclosed in fireproof shafts, such elevator shall be inclosed in suitable walls, constructed and arranged as required in this chapter for elevator shafts.

3. Open grill-work inclosures. Open grillwork inclosures for passenger elevators, not extending below the level of the first floor, may be erected in staircase inclosures in buildings where the entire space occupied by the stairs and elevators is inclosed in brick or stone walls, and the stairs are constructed as specified in § 440 of this chapter.

§ [373] 374. [Protection of shafts and] Existing hoistways. 1. Gates and trap-doors. In any existing building in which there shall be any hoistway, [or freight] elevator or wellhole inclosed in walls constructed of brick or other fireproof material and provided with fireproof doors, the openings thereof through and upon each floor of said building, shall be provided with and protected by [a] substantial guards or gates and with such good and sufficient trap-doors as may be directed and approved by the superintendent of buildings. [Such guards or gates shall be kept closed at all times, except when in actual use, and the trap-doors shall be closed at the close of the business of each day by the occupant or occupants of the building having the use or control of the same.] [2. Freight elevators.] When, in the opinion of the superintendent of buildings, automatic trap-doors are required to the floor openings of any unincluded [freight] elevator, the same shall be constructed so as to form a substantial floor surface when closed, and so arranged as to open and close by the action of the elevator in its passage either ascending or descending.

[3] 2. Enforcement of section. Except as otherwise provided by law or ordinance, the [Each] superintendent of buildings [within his jurisdiction] shall have [exclusive] power and authority to require the openings of hoistways, [or hoistway shafts] elevators and well holes in buildings to be enclosed or secured by trapdoors, guards or gates and railings.

3. Guards, gates and trap-doors to be closed when not in use. All guards or gates required by this section shall be kept closed at all times, except when in actual

use, and the trap-doors shall be closed at the close of the business of each day, by the occupant or occupants of the building having the use or control of the same.

§ 374. Dumbwaiter shafts. All dumbwaiter shafts hereafter created in any building, except such as do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in dwelling houses, shall be enclosed in suitable walls of brick or with burnt-clay blocks, set in iron frames of proper strength, or fireproof blocks strengthened with metal dowels, or such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the superintendent of buildings. Said walls or construction shall extend at least 3 feet above the roof and be covered with a skylight at least three-fourths the area of the shaft, made with metal frames and glazed. All openings in the inclosure walls or construction shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors. When the shaft does not extend to the floor level of the lowest story, the bottom of the shaft shall be constructed of fireproof materials. In buildings erected prior to the passage of this ordinance any existing dumbwaiter shaft which extends into the cellar or lowest story, except such as do not extend more than three stories above the cellar or basement in dwelling houses, shall be enclosed in the cellar or lowest story with walls of brick 8 inches thick, unless already enclosed in some form of construction conforming to the requirements hereinbefore prescribed for new dumbwaiter shafts. All openings in said walls shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors.]

§ 375. Protection of exterior openings. 1. When required. In addition to the protection of openings required elsewhere in this chapter, or by any other law or ordinance, fire doors, fire windows, fire shutters, open sprinklers or other approved protectives, shall be provided on every window or other opening above the first story in the exterior walls of every fireproof and non-fireproof business building, more than forty feet in height, except openings airtight in a direct line more than thirty feet from any other exterior opening not in the same vertical plane, or more than fifty feet above a neighboring roof.

2. Fire shutters to be readily opened. When fire shutters are used in exterior openings at least one row in every three vertical rows of shutters on front window openings shall be arranged to be readily opened from the outside. Distinguishing marks, satisfactory to the Fire Commissioner, shall be provided on these shutters.

3. Openings to fire escapes. When fire doors or fire shutters are used on exterior openings leading to fire escapes or exterior exits of any kind they shall be self-closing and so arranged as not to obstruct such fire escape or exit.

4. Vertical separation of windows. In fireproof and non-fireproof business buildings over forty feet in height, exterior openings that are located vertically above one another and that do not require any protectives under this section, shall have not less than three feet of solid masonry between the top of one opening and the bottom of the one next above, and no such opening shall be arranged to open within one foot of the ceiling of the story in which it is located, provided, however, that part of such masonry between openings may be replaced by wire glass in fixed metal sash and frame.

5. Closing protectives. All fire doors, fire shutters and fire windows on exterior openings, unless provided with approved automatic closing devices operative from either side, shall be closed when not required to be open, and at the close of business each day by the occupant or occupants of the building having the use or control of them.

§ 376. Opening protectives. 1. Construction. All opening protectives required or permitted under this chapter shall be constructed as prescribed in such rules, consistent with the provisions of this chapter, as may be promulgated by the superintendent of buildings, or, in the absence of such rules, as specified in the standard requirements of the National Board of Fire Underwriters; or they may be constructed in any manner and of any material that will comply with the fire test hereinafter prescribed.

2. Fire test. In testing the fireproof qualities of any opening protective a complete sample of the device of the maximum size to be approved, constructed and installed in every respect as in actual service, shall be subjected to a fire on one side, continuous for not less than one hour, at a temperature, in the case of fire doors and fire shutters increasing gradually from that of the outer air to eighteen hundred degrees Fahrenheit within the first half hour and to two thousand degrees Fahrenheit during the second half hour, and in the case of fire windows, increasing gradually from that of the outer air to fifteen hundred degrees Fahrenheit within the hour, without permitting the passage of flame or the transmission of heat to a dangerous extent.

3. Use of wire glass. When wire glass is required or permitted by this chapter or the rules authorized thereunder, for fire doors, fire shutters or fire windows, the panes shall not exceed seven hundred and twenty square inches in area, and shall not be less than one-quarter inch in thickness, and shall be set not less than five-eighths of an inch in the frame. When the use of glass is permitted in any fire door or fire shutter only wire glass shall be used. For the glazing of fire windows only wire glass shall be used.

§ 375. Fireproof shutters and doors. 1. Buildings requiring every building which is more than 2 stories in height above the level, except dwelling houses, hotels, school houses and churches, shall have doors, blinds or shutters made of iron, hung to iron hanging frames or to iron eyes built into the wall, on every exterior window and opening above the first story thereof, excepting on the front openings of buildings fronting on streets which are more than 30 feet in width or where no other buildings are within 30 feet of such openings.

2. Construction. The said doors, blinds or shutters may be constructed of pine or other soft wood of two thicknesses of matched boards at right angles with each other, and securely covered with tin on both sides and edges, with folded lapped joints, the nails for fastening the same being driven inside the lap; the hinges and bolts or latches shall be secured or fastened to the door or shutter after the same has been covered with the tin, and such doors or shutters shall be hung upon an iron frame independent of the woodwork of the windows and doors, or 2 iron hinges securely fastened in the masonry; or such frames, if of wood, shall be covered with tin in the same manner as the doors and shutters.

3. Shutters opening on fire-escapes. All shutters opening on fire-escapes, and at least 1 row, vertically, in every 3 rows on the front window openings above the first story of any building shall be so arranged that they can be readily opened from the outside by firemen.

4. Rolling shutters. All rolling iron or steel shutters hereafter placed in the first story of any building shall be counterbalanced so that said rolling shutters may be readily opened by the firemen.

5. Inside shutters of metal. No buildings hereafter erected other than a dwelling house or fireproof building shall have inside iron or steel shutters to windows above the first story.

6. Exemption. All windows and openings above the first story of any building may be provided with other suitable protection, or may be exempted from having shutters by the superintendent of buildings or the board of examiners, as the case may be.

7. Fireproof doors. All buildings specified in this section hereafter erected or altered having openings in interior walls shall be provided with suitable fireproof doors where deemed necessary by the superintendent of buildings.

8. Closing shutters and doors. All occupants of buildings shall close all exterior and interior fireproof shutters, doors and blinds at the close of the business of each day.]

Section 2. Subdivision 2 of § 447 of Article 21 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinance of the City of New York is hereby repealed.

Section 3. The provisions of this ordinance shall take effect three months after its adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

An Ordinance Relating to Roofing and Roof Structures in The City of New York. By the same—

AN ORDINANCE relating to roofing and roof structures in The City of New York. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article 20 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 420. General. Except when otherwise specifically provided for in this chapter, all construction, other than water tanks, hereafter placed above the roof of any part of any building within the fire limits or of any building more than forty feet in height outside the fire limits, shall be of incombustible materials.

§ 421. Roofing. 1. Materials. Except as otherwise in this chapter specifically provided, every roof hereafter placed on any building or part thereof, shall be covered with an approved roofing of brick, concrete, tile, slate, metal, asbestos, slag, gravel, or other approved incombustible material.

2. Planking. When wood planking or sheathing is permitted in roof construction it shall not, in any case, extend across any side or party walls.

3. Repairs. No roofing on any existing roof shall be renewed or repaired except in conformity with the requirements of this section, provided, however, that when the renewal or necessary repairs do not constitute more than one-fourth of the roofing in any one roof surface, the new work may be made to conform to the existing roofing.

§ 422. Cornices and gutters. 1. Construction. All cornices inclusive of those on show windows, and gutters hereafter placed on the exterior of any building, except buildings that are permitted to be of frame construction, shall be of incombustible materials. Cornices shall be secured to the walls with metal framing or anchors, spaced not more than four feet apart, and extending not less than four inches into the wall at top and bottom.

2. Repairs. All cornices or gutters that may now be or that may hereafter become unsafe shall be taken down, and if replaced, shall be constructed to conform to the requirements for new cornices, except that when any such cornice or gutter is not damaged to a greater extent than one-half, it may be repaired with the same material as originally constructed.

§ 420. Mansard roofs. If a mansard or other roof of like character having a pitch of over 60 degrees be placed on any building, except a wood building, or a dwelling house not exceeding 3 stories nor more than 40 feet in height, it shall be constructed of iron rafters and lathed with iron or steel on the inside and plastered, or filled in with fireproof material not less than 3 inches thick and covered with metal, slate or tile.

§ 421. Roofing and leaders. 1. Roofing. The planking and sheathing of the roofs of buildings shall not in any case be extended across the side or party wall thereof. Every building and the tops and sides of every dormer window thereon shall be covered and roofed with brick, tile, slate, tin, copper, iron; or plastic slate, asphalt, slag or gravel may be used, provided such roofing shall be composed of not less than 5 layers of roofing felt, cemented together and finished with not less than 10 gallons of coal tar, pitch or asphalt to each 100 square feet of roof, or such other quality of fireproof roofing as the Superintendent of Buildings, under his certificate, may authorize, and the outside of the frames of every dormer window hereafter placed upon any building shall be made of some fireproof material. No wood building within the fire limits more than 2 stories or above 20 feet in height above the curb level to the highest part thereof, which shall require roofing, shall be roofed with any other roofing or covered except as aforesaid. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit the repairing of any shingle roof, provided the building is not altered in height.

§ 423. [2.] Leaders. All buildings shall be [kept] provided with proper [metallic] leaders for conducting water from the roofs [in such manner as shall protect the walls and foundations of said buildings from injury]. In no case shall the water from leaders be allowed to flow upon the sidewalk, but [the same] it shall be conducted by pipe or pipes to [a] the sewer. If there be no sewer in the street [upon which such buildings front], then the water from [said] the leader shall be conducted by proper pipe or pipes, below the surface [of the sidewalk] to a street gutter, or to a cesspool.

§ 422. Cornices and gutters. On all buildings hereafter erected within the fire limits, the exterior cornices, inclusive of those on show windows, and gutters shall be of some fireproof material. All fireproof cornices shall be well secured to the walls with iron anchors, independent of any woodwork. In all cases the walls shall be carried up to the planking of the roof. Where the cornice projects above the roof the walls shall be carried up to the top of the cornice. The party walls shall in all cases extend up above the planking of the cornice and be coped. All exterior wooden cornices that may now be or that may hereafter become unsafe or rotten shall be taken down, and if replaced, shall be constructed of some fireproof material. All exterior cornices of wood or gutters that may hereafter be damaged by fire to the extent of one-half shall be taken down, and if replaced shall be constructed of some fireproof material; but if not damaged to the extent of one-half, the same may be repaired with the same kind of material of which they were originally constructed.

§ 423. Bulkheads and scuttles. Bulkheads used as inclosures for tanks and elevators, and coverings for the machinery of elevators and all other bulkheads, including the bulkheads of all dwelling houses more than 4 stories in height hereafter erected or a tere may be constructed of hollow fireproof blocks; or of wood covered with not less than 2 inches of fireproof material, or filled in the thickness of the studding with such material, and covered on all outside surfaces with metal, including both surfaces and edges of doors. All such buildings shall have scuttles or bulkheads covered with some fireproof materials, with ladders or stairs leading thereto, and easily accessible to all occupants. No scuttle shall be less in size than 2 by 3 feet.

§ 424. Staging or stands on roofs. No staging or stand shall be constructed or occupied upon the roof of any building without first obtaining the approval of the superintendent of buildings.]

§ 425. Skylights. 1. Construction. All skylights [having a superficial area of more than nine square feet,] hereafter placed in any building, shall have the sashes and frames thereof constructed of [iron and glass] metal. [Every fireproof roof hereafter placed on any building shall have, besides the usual scuttle or bulkhead, a skylight or skylights of a superficial area equal to not less than 1-50 the superficial area of such fireproof roof. Skylights hereafter placed in public buildings, over any passageway or room of public resort, shall have immediately underneath the glass thereof a wire netting, unless the glass contains a wire netting within itself.] except that skylights in foundries or buildings where acid fumes are present as an incident to the occupancy of the building may be of wood in the discretion of the superintendent of buildings. The frames and other parts of metal skylights shall be riveted or otherwise securely fastened, in addition to soldering.

2. Glazing. Skylights placed over shafts of any kind shall be glazed with plain glass not less than three-sixteenths of an inch in thickness. No pane of glass in any skylight hereafter placed in any building shall exceed seven hundred and twenty square inches in area.

3. Protection. Every skylight in which plain glass is used shall be protected by a wire screen placed not less than four inches nor more than ten inches above the glazed portion of the skylight at all points. Such screen shall be not lighter than No. 12 U. S. gauge, shall have a mesh of not less than three-fourths of an inch nor more than one inch, and shall extend beyond the glazing on all sides a distance not less than the height of the screen above the glazing. When any such skylight is located over any passageway or any room of public resort a similar screen shall also be placed below the skylight.

§ 425. Scuttles. Unless provided with some other means of access to the roof, every building more than fifteen feet high, except dwellings with peak roofs, shall have in the roof a scuttle, with a substantial iron ladder leading thereto. All scuttles shall be covered on the top and edges with sheet metal or other approved incombustible material. The scuttle openings shall be at least two feet by three feet in size.

§ 426. Roof houses. 1. Definitions.

a. The term bulkhead as used in this section includes all such enclosed structures above the roof of any part of a building as enclose only stairways, tanks, elevator machinery or ventilation apparatus, or shafts.

b. The term pent house as used in this section means any enclosed structure, other than a bulkhead, extending not more than twelve feet above a roof.

2. Bulkheads. The walls of any bulkhead hereafter erected on any roof of a fireproof building shall be constructed as required for fire partitions by subdivision 1,

§ 372 of this chapter. Such walls may be used as bearing walls of the bulkhead roofs when they do not exceed fifteen feet in height and thirty-five feet in length, and the roof span does not exceed twelve feet. The roofs of such bulkheads shall be of fireproof construction as provided by § 354 of this chapter. The walls and roofs of all bulkheads, unless constructed of approved masonry, shall be covered on the outside with incombustible, weatherproof material.

3. Pent houses. Every pent house shall be considered a story of the building and, except as may be otherwise specifically provided by law, its construction shall conform to the requirements for buildings of a height to which such pent house is carried; provided that when any exterior wall of such pent house sets back not less than five feet from the exterior walls of the next lower story of the building it may be constructed of brick not less than eight inches thick, or hollow building blocks not less than six inches in thickness, covered on the outside with incombustible, weatherproof material, and supported by steel or reinforced concrete girders.

4. Doors and windows. All doors and door frames in the exterior walls of bulkheads or pent houses shall be metal or metal covered wood. All windows in bulkheads or pent houses, except where otherwise specifically provided for, shall be constructed as other windows of the building similarly located.

5. Sun parlors. Nothing in this section shall prevent the erection on any roof of any building, of sun parlors or rooms for similar purposes, provided that only incombustible materials are used in the construction, and the floor of such structure is constructed as required for the roof of the building.

§ 427. Slanting roofs. 1. Construction. Every mansard or other slanting roof having a pitch of more than sixty degrees, hereafter placed on any non-fireproof building over forty feet high, shall be constructed fireproof as specified in § 354 of this chapter.

2. Dormer windows. Every dormer window hereafter erected shall be constructed in the same manner as the roof on which it is placed. The sides and top shall be covered with any of the materials approved for roofing.

§ 426] 428. Tanks. 1. Supports. Tanks [containing] of more than 500 gallons capacity [of water or other fluid] hereafter placed in [any story,] or on [the roof or above the roof of] any building [now or hereafter erected], shall be supported on masonry, reinforced concrete or steel construction [iron or steel beams] of sufficient strength [to safely carry the same; and the beams shall rest at both their ends on brick walls or on iron or steel girders or iron or steel columns or piers of masonry] and carried to a proper foundation.

2. Emergency outlet. Every such tank shall have in the bottom [Underneath any said water tank] or on the side near the bottom [of the same, there shall be] a [short] pipe or outlet, not less than four inches in diameter, fitted with a suitable quick-opening valve [having lever or wheel handle to same; so that firemen or others can readily discharge the weight of the fluid contents from the tank, in case of necessity] for discharging the contents in an emergency.

3. Location. Such tanks [shall be placed where practicable at one corner of a building, and] shall not be placed over nor near a line of stairs or an elevator shaft, unless there is a solid roof or floor underneath the tank.

4. Covers. All unenclosed roof tanks shall have covers with proper slope. [Covers on top of water tanks placed on roofs, if of wood, shall be covered with tin.]

5. Hoops. When hoops are used in the construction of tanks they shall be of metal round in section.

§ 429. Cooling towers. Cooling towers hereafter erected above any roof shall be of incombustible material, except the drip bars which may be of wood.

Section 2. The provisions of this article shall take effect three months after its adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows: Section 1. Article 10 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 190. Enforcement of article. Except as may be otherwise provided by any law or ordinance, the provisions of this article shall be enforced by the superintendent of buildings, and all safeguards required by the provisions of this article or by any rules authorized thereunder shall be subject to the supervision of the bureau of buildings. The superintendent of buildings shall, from time to time, adopt such rules, consistent with the provisions of this article, as may be necessary to secure fully the protection of persons and property. In case any safeguard shall not be provided as prescribed by this article, the superintendent of buildings shall cause a notice to be served personally upon the person whose duty it may be to provide the same or upon the owners of the buildings affected, requiring such safeguards and specifying the manner in which the same shall be erected. If such safeguard is not provided, as required in such notice, within three days after the service thereof, the superintendent of buildings shall have full power and authority to provide or cause the same to be provided as herein specified. All expenses connected with same may become a lien on the property inclosed or protected, which lien may be created and enforced in the same manner as now provided in § 652 of this chapter.

§ 191. Sidewalk sheds. Whenever any building or part thereof, within ten feet of the building line, is to be erected or raised to exceed forty feet in height, or whenever such a building more than forty feet in height is to be demolished, the owner, or the person doing or causing such work to be done shall erect and maintain during such work a substantial shed over the sidewalk in front of said building and extending, so far as practicable, from building line to curb. Such shed shall remain in place until the building is enclosed or, in case of a demolition, until the building has been reduced to twenty feet in height. Every such shed shall be kept properly lighted at night.

§ 192. Temporary fence. In any building operation that does not require a sidewalk shed as provided in § 191 of this article, the owner or person doing or causing such work to be done, shall, unless relieved by a general rule of the superintendent of buildings, or a special permit from him, erect and maintain in front of the building during such building operation, a substantial fence not less than eight feet high, of wood or other suitable material. Such fence may extend not more than six feet into the highway, and shall be built solid for its full length except for such openings, provided with sliding doors or doors swinging inwards, as may be necessary for a proper prosecution of the work.

§ 193. Roofs and skylights of adjoining buildings. When any building is to be carried more than fifteen feet above the roof of any adjoining building, proper means for the protection of the skylights and roof of such adjoining building shall be provided, at his own expense, by the person constructing or causing the construction of such building, provided that, if the owner, lessee or tenant of the adjoining building should refuse permission to have the roof and skylights so protected, the responsibility and expense for the necessary protection shall devolve on the person refusing this permission.

§ 194. Scaffolding. All scaffolds used in connection with the erection, alteration or demolition of any building shall be constructed in a manner to secure the safety of the workmen on them and of all persons passing under or near them. All scaffolds used on or about buildings at a height of more than twenty feet above the street or ground level, or a floor, except scaffolding wholly within the interior of a

building and covering the entire floor space of any room therein, shall be provided, along the outer edges and ends with substantial railings or enclosures of wire mesh or other suitable material, extending at least three feet above the working platform.

§ 195. Floors to be filled in or covered over. If the floors of any building are to be of fireproof construction the floor filling shall be completed as the building progresses. If the floors consist of wood beams the under-flooring, when double flooring is to be used, shall be laid on each story as the building progresses; when double floors are not to be used, the floors two stories below the story where the work is being performed shall be kept planked over. If the floor beams are of iron or steel, the entire tier of iron or steel beams on which the structural iron or steel work is being erected, except such spaces as may be reasonably required for the proper construction of such iron or steel work, and for the raising or lowering of materials to be used in the construction of such building, or such spaces as may be designated by the approved plans for stairways and shafts shall be thoroughly planked over.

§ 196. Protection of floor openings. All floor openings within a building in the course of construction shall be inclosed or fenced in on all sides by a barrier of suitable height, except on those sides which may be used for the handling of materials hoisted through such openings, or at which stairs or ladders land, provided that such sides, other than landings, shall be guarded by an adjustable barrier not less than three nor more than four feet from the floor and not less than two feet from the edge of such opening.

§ 197. Weather protection. Whenever permission has been given under any of the provisions of this chapter to enter any adjoining building the person who receives such permission or who is responsible for the work requiring such permission, shall provide for such adjoining building adequate protection against the weather.

§ 198. Cellar drainage. Before the foundation walls of any building are completed provision shall be made to prevent water accumulating in the excavation or cellar to the injury of the foundation, and if there is a sewer in the street the cellar shall also be connected therewith.

§ 199. Overloading prohibited. No building or part thereof, or any temporary support or scaffolding in connection therewith, shall be loaded during erection, alteration or demolition in excess of its safe carrying capacity.

§ 200. Precautions during demolition. In demolishing any building or part thereof, story after story shall be completely removed. No material shall be stored upon a floor of any building in the course of demolition, but old material shall be lowered to the ground immediately upon displacement. The material to be removed shall be properly wet to lay the dust incident to its removal.

§ 190. Sidewalk sheds. Whenever buildings shall be erected or increased to over 65 feet in height upon or along any street, the owner, builder or contractor constructing or repairing such buildings shall have erected and maintained during such construction or repair a shed over the sidewalk in front of said premises, extending from building line to curb, the same to be properly, strongly and tightly constructed, so as to protect pedestrians and others using such streets.

§ 191. Scaffolding. Whenever outside scaffolds are required to carry on the construction of buildings over 85 feet in height, whether the same be constructed by poles or thrust-out scaffold, there shall be erected on its outer edge and ends an inclosure of wire netting of not over 2-inch mesh, or of boards not less than 3/4 of an inch thick, placed not over 1 1/2 inches apart, well secured to uprights not less than 2 inches by 4 inches, fastened to planks or timbers, and resting on put logs or thrust outs. The said inclosure shall be carried up at least 5 feet in advance above the level on which the workmen employed on said front are working. The said thrust outs shall be not less than 3 by 10, of spruce or yellow pine, and to be doubled or tripled, as may be required for the load to be carried, and to be thoroughly braced and secured; or said timbers can be in one stick, if proportioned to the load. The flooring on thrust outs and put logs shall be tightly constructed with plank. This said floor and inclosure shall not be removed until a like floor and inclosure is already prepared and in position on the story above.

§ 192. Inclosure of windows. In all buildings over 85 feet in height, during construction or alteration, the windows on each floor above the second shall be properly inclosed as soon as the story is built.

§ 193. Roofs and skylights of adjoining buildings. If the walls of such buildings are carried upon 2 stories or more above the roofs of adjoining buildings, proper means shall be provided and used for the protection of skylights and roofs of such adjoining buildings, the protection over skylights shall be of stout wire netting not over 3/4-inch mesh, on stout timbers, and properly secured. Should said adjoining owner, tenant or lessee refuse to grant permission to have said roofs and skylights so protected, such refusal by said owner, tenant or lessee shall relieve the owner of the building in course of construction from any responsibility for damage done to persons or property on or within the premises affected.

§ 194. Enforcement of article. All sheds and inclosures required by the provisions of this article shall be subject to the inspection of the bureau of buildings. In case any necessary inclosure or protection shall not be erected, as prescribed by this section, the superintendent of buildings shall cause a notice to be served personally upon the owner, or his authorized agent, constructing or repairing such buildings, or the owner, tenant or lessee of adjoining premises, requiring the provision of such inclosure or protection, specifying the manner in which same shall be erected. If such inclosure or protection is not erected, strengthened or modified as provided in such notice, within 3 days after the service thereof, the said superintendent shall have full power and authority to cause the same to be so erected and the skylights to be protected as herein provided. All expenses connected with same may become a lien on the property in interest so inclosed and protected, which lien may be created and enforced in the same manner as now provided for in § 652 of this chapter.

Section 2. The provisions of this ordinance shall take effect three months after its adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

Resolved, further, That permission be and the same is also hereby given to all political organizations and associations to parade through the streets, avenues and thoroughfares of The City of New York with vehicles containing bells or bands of music, the last privilege to be under the direction of Police Department, and the first two privileges to be under the direction of the Presidents of the Boroughs, respectively; the several permissions hereby given to continue only until November 6, 1915, any resolution or ordinance heretofore passed to the contrary notwithstanding.

Provided, however, that when a permit is issued and there is likelihood of any loss or damage to The City of New York through the exercise thereof such permit shall take effect only upon the filing of a bond, in form and amount to be approved by the Corporation Counsel, indemnifying The City of New York against any loss or damage sustained thereby.

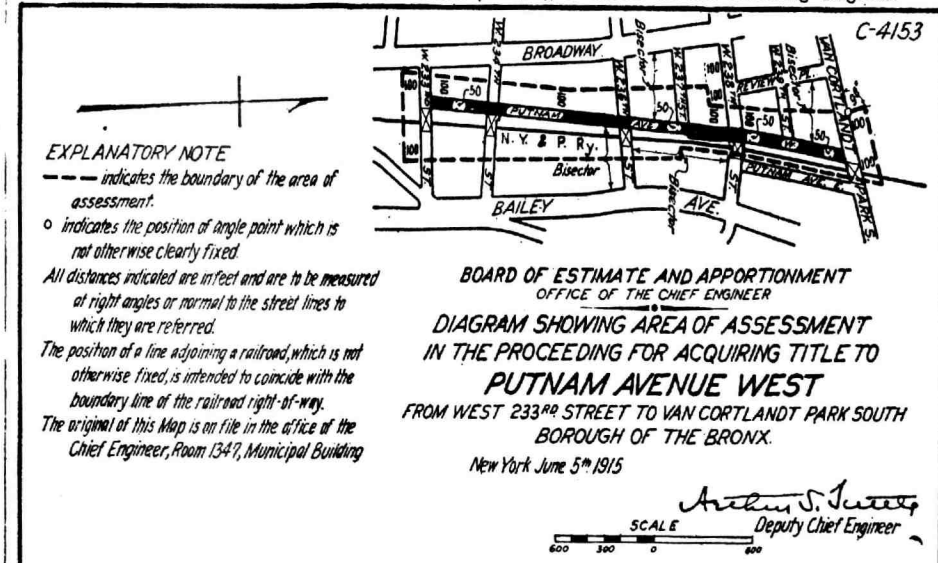

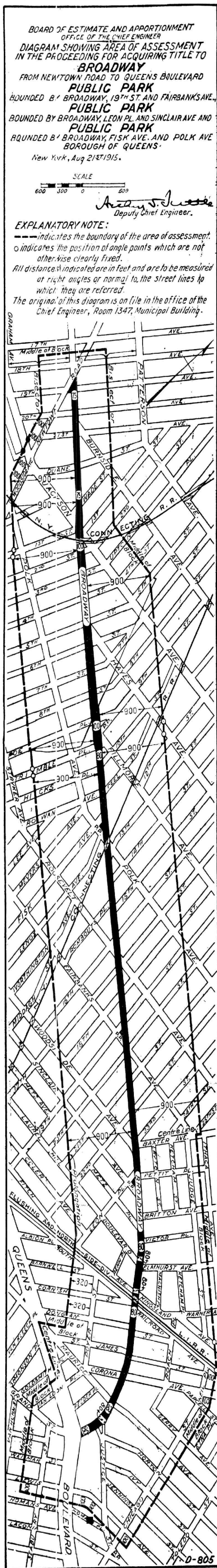

Cars may be operated upon the remaining said tracks described in Section 1 hereof by electric power or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York. It is understood, however, that no overhead wires, except trolley wires, shall be permitted for the operation of said tracks by electric power."

8. Section 2, Twelfth, of said contract of June 29, 1911, is hereby amended by striking out therefrom the word "passengers" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "pedestrians."

9. Section 2, Nineteenth, of said contract of June 29, 1911, is hereby amended by striking out in the third line thereof the word "street."

10. All of Section 2, Twenty-fifth, of said contract of June 29, 1911, is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000), and on or before December 31, 1915, shall deposit with the Comptroller an additional sum of Two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, both of which sums shall constitute a fund which shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the rendering of efficient public service at reasonable rates, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice, the quality of construction of the railroad and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or in default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, relating to the obstruction of traffic, the maintenance of gates and flagmen, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, all of which sums shall be deducted from said fund.

The procedure for the imposition and collection of the penalties in this contract shall be as follows:

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10) days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of seven thousand five hundred dollars (\$7,500), and in default thereof, this contract shall be canceled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting on behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of action belonging to the City."

11. Section 2 of said contract of June 29, 1911, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the following additional clauses, numbered, respectively, Thirty-first, Thirty-second, Thirty-third, Thirty-fourth, Thirty-fifth, Thirty-sixth, Thirty-seventh, Thirty-eighth and Thirty-ninth.

Thirty-first—The words "Jay Street Terminals" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean the freight yards or terminals, so-called, at the present time lying within the districts generally described as follows:

Old Terminals:
Bounded on the north by the East River; bounded on the east by Gold Street; bounded on the south by John Street; bounded on the west by Jay Street.

New or Proposed Terminal:
Bounded on the north by the East River; bounded on the east by Main Street; bounded on the south by Water Street; bounded on the west by New Dock Street.

—or as such yards or terminals may hereafter be extended or changed; together with the tracks, connections, turnouts and switches contained in or comprising said yards or terminals, which said yards or terminals are maintained or operated either by the firm or partnership known as The Jay Street Terminal or by any individual, firm or corporation which may acquire or succeed to the rights or interests of the said The Jay Street Terminal in or to either or both of said yards or terminals.

Thirty-first—The words "South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean any freight railroad along or near the water-front in the Borough of Brooklyn, westerly or southwesterly from the tracks or extensions herein authorized, which shall be constructed or operated by the

City, or under a contract with the City, any part of which railroad shall be so located that a connection can be made with the tracks or extensions of the Company herein authorized, or with any portion thereof.

Thirty-second—The Company hereby agrees that the City shall have, and it hereby grants to the City, the right to use in common with the Company the tracks, structures, equipment and power of the Company, necessary for the operation of cars and locomotives of or from the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad upon that portion of the tracks and extensions herein authorized, described as follows:

Beginning at a point in Extension B where the same is intersected by the tracks hereinabove described as Extension D; thence westerly along Plymouth Street to the westerly line of Main Street, also southerly along Main Street over the tracks hereinabove described as Extension E, together with all connections, turnouts or sidings which are now or may hereafter be authorized from said Extension E and that portion of Extension B herein described.

Such use shall be permitted to the City upon notice to the Company by resolution of the Board. The compensation to be paid by the City for such use shall be fixed by agreement between the City and the Company. In case of failure of the City and the Company to agree, however, upon such compensation, the City shall nevertheless have the right, after the expiration of thirty (30) days from the date of such notice as above, to make the necessary connection or connections with the tracks above described and thereafter use such tracks for the operation thereon of cars and locomotives of or from the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad. The compensation to be paid by the City for the use of such tracks, structures, equipment and power shall in such case be determined by arbitrators selected in the manner provided by this contract.

It is agreed that nothing herein contained shall be construed to give to the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad the right to use the locomotives or rolling stock of any kind of The Jay Street Connecting Railroad.

Thirty-third—The City and the Company hereby agree to interchange loaded or empty cars between the railroad of the Company and the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad at transfer points to be hereafter agreed upon between the City and the Company; the Company on its part and behalf agreeing to accept such cars from said South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad and deliver the same to any point along its railroad, or to the Jay Street Terminals as herein defined, at the same rates as similar service is performed for any individual, firm or corporation served by the Company, and the City on behalf of the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad agreeing to accept such cars from the railroad of the Company and deliver the same to any point along the said South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad at the same rates as similar service is performed for any individual, firm or corporation served by said South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad.

The City and the Company shall share equally the cost of providing and maintaining the necessary transfer facilities at such points as may be agreed upon as above.

Thirty-fourth—It is agreed that the Board, upon six (6) months' notice to the Company, shall have the right to terminate the rights and privileges hereby granted as to Extensions C and D hereinabove described, and all connections therefrom. Such right may be exercised by the Board at any time after the expiration of ten (10) years from and after July 1, 1915, except that in the event the City shall exercise its right to acquire or condemn the remaining tracks of the Company, known and described herein as Main Track, Extension B and Extension E, together with the connections therefrom, and also the terminal property or properties herein defined as the Jay Street Terminals, then the right of the Board to terminate the franchise as to said Extensions C and D and the connections therefrom may be exercised, and such termination shall take effect as of the date when the City shall become vested with title to the tracks and property acquired under condemnation proceedings, as herein provided. The right of the Board to terminate the franchise as to Extensions C and D and the connections therefrom shall, however, be upon condition that the City shall pay to the Company an amount to be determined as follows: Beginning with the date of the completion of construction or installation of the tracks, structures and equipment which may be recaptured as herein provided, or of any portion thereof, should said tracks, structures and equipment be constructed or installed at different periods, it shall be assumed that the Company has provided a fund to consist of such payments made annually out of the revenues of the Company, computed at four (4) per cent. compound interest, as will at the end of the term of this contract equal the actual cost of such property when constructed or installed. The accumulations from such fund which may or should have accrued up to the time when the City shall exercise its right of recapture shall be deducted from such actual cost of such tracks, structures and equipment to be recaptured and the remainder shall represent the sum which the City shall pay to the Company for such tracks, structures and equipment; provided, however, that in no event shall the sum to be paid by the City to the Company exceed the actual value of the tracks, structures and equipment to be recaptured, at the time of such recapture, and provided further that no compensation shall be paid to the Company for any tracks, structures or equipment forming or included in any connection with the building or premises of any individual, firm or corporation where such tracks, structures or equipment have been constructed or installed at the expense of such individual, firm or corporation.

At the time of the recapture of the tracks, structures and equipment as herein provided, the Company shall furnish the Board a statement or statements, verified under oath by an officer of the Company, containing in detail the actual cost of such tracks, structures and equipment to be recaptured, the actual value thereof at the time of recapture and also the accumulations which have or should have accrued as the fund above provided for. Should any disagreement arise between the City and the Company as to whether the actual cost of the tracks, structures and equipment when constructed or installed exceeded the fair value thereof at the time of such construction or installation, or as to the actual value of the tracks, structures and equipment at the time of recapture, the question shall be submitted to arbitrators, as hereinafter provided, and the fair value of such tracks, structures and equipment when constructed, as determined by said arbitrators, shall be taken as and for the actual cost thereof for the purposes herein specified.

In case the question of the fair value of the tracks, structures and equipment to be recaptured shall be submitted to arbitrators, as hereinabove provided, and such arbitrators shall determine as such fair value, a sum less than the actual cost of the property as certified by the Company and upon which it is assumed that the aforesaid fund is based, then the amount to be deducted upon the recapture of the property, as hereinabove provided, shall be reduced in a like proportion.

Thirty-fifth—The rights hereby granted shall not become operative until the Company shall itself execute and shall procure and cause to be

executed by the firm or partnership known as The Jay Street Terminal, proved in proper form for record, and shall deliver to the Board an agreement whereby and wherein the Company shall consent on behalf of itself, its successors and assigns, to the condemnation by the City of any and all of the remaining tracks known and described herein as Main Track, Extension B and Extension E, together with the connections therefrom and the structures and equipment within the streets and the franchise authorizing the same owned by the Company as part of or in connection with the railroad authorized by this contract or as the same may be hereafter notified. Such consent shall only become operative in the event that the City shall acquire, by condemnation or otherwise, the Jay Street Terminals, as herein defined.

In said agreement the Company shall further agree that in any such condemnation proceeding no award or compensation shall be claimed for the value of the franchise granted by this contract or as the same may be hereafter modified. Said agreement shall further provide that said The Jay Street Terminal shall agree that during such time as it shall maintain or engage in the business of operating or maintaining a freight terminal, lighterage or car-float service, it will receive, handle and lighter at, to or from the Jay Street Terminals, as herein defined, the cars coming from or destined to the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad, and furnish the necessary car-float service for the handling or transit of such cars between the Jay Street Terminals as herein defined and any of the trunk line railroads with which they have connection.

The said The Jay Street Terminal shall further agree that the service to be furnished the South Brooklyn Marginal Freight Railroad shall be the same service furnished to the Company and at the same rates as may be charged for similar service to the Company.

Thirty-sixth—The Board, upon application of the Company, may by a resolution authorize the construction, maintenance and operation of such further connections, in addition to those herein authorized, as may be necessary to permit the Company to furnish service to any individual, firm or corporation whose building or premises shall be situated on any of the streets or avenues through or along which the Company is herein authorized to construct, maintain and operate its tracks or extensions.

Thirty-seventh—The Board may, by resolution, direct the Company to construct such further reasonable and practicable connections, in addition to those herein authorized, as may be necessary to permit the Company to furnish service to any individual, firm or corporation whose building or premises shall be situated on any of the streets or avenues through or along which the Company is herein authorized to construct, maintain and operate its tracks and extensions. The cost of constructing such connections shall be borne by the individual, firm or corporation whose building or premises is so connected. The connections shall, however, when constructed, be the property of the Company and shall be a part of the railroad herein authorized. If and when so directed, the Company agrees to construct and to thereafter maintain and operate such necessary connections and to furnish service to such individual, firm or corporation in the same manner and at the same rates as such class of service is furnished to any other individual, firm or corporation served by the Company. It is agreed by the parties hereto, and it is the intention of this contract, that the Company shall maintain as part of its railroad the connections referred to in this subdivision. Nothing contained in this subdivision shall, however, prejudice the right of the Company to recover the cost of such maintenance from the individual, firm or corporation whose premises may be connected, as herein provided. In case of the failure of the Company to construct any such connection within four (4) months after being so directed by the Board, and after such individual, firm or corporation has paid, or in writing agreed to pay, the cost of construction thereof, or in case of the Company's failure to thereafter maintain and operate the said connections and furnish its service as herein provided, the rights hereby granted may be forfeited by resolution of the Board.

Thirty-eighth—Should it be necessary to submit any question or matter to arbitration, pursuant to the terms of this contract, the arbitrators shall be disinterested persons appointed in the following manner:

When the necessity for such arbitration arises, either party may appoint its arbitrator and give written notice of such appointment to the other party. Within thirty (30) days after the receipt of such notice, such other party shall appoint its arbitrator. Within thirty (30) days after the appointment of the second arbitrator, the two arbitrators so appointed shall choose a third arbitrator. A determination concurred in by any two of such arbitrators shall be conclusive and binding upon the parties hereto. Should either party fail to appoint its arbitrator within thirty (30) days after notice from the other party as above, or should the two arbitrators appointed as above fail to choose the third arbitrator within thirty (30) days after their appointment, then the question or matter shall be determined by a referee or commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party. Should no two arbitrators concur in a determination within sixty (60) days after the appointment of all the arbitrators as above, then such submission to arbitrators shall be deemed to have been revoked, any provision of law to the contrary notwithstanding, and no written revocation shall be necessary; the question or matter shall in such case be determined by a referee or commissioner appointed by the Supreme Court on the application of either party.

The compensation and expenses of the said arbitrators or of said referee or commissioner shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Thirty-ninth—This contract and the rights of the parties under it shall at the option of the Company cease and determine if The Jay Street Terminal goes out of the lighterage and terminal business.

12. All of Section 4 of said contract of June 29, 1911, is hereby stricken out and the following substituted therefor:

"Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that all the provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company."

Section 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms, provisions and conditions contained in said contract dated June 29, 1911, excepting those which are herein expressly amended or modified, shall remain unchanged and shall apply to the routes herein described in Section 1 of this contract with the same force and effect as when they applied to the routes described in said contract dated June 29, 1911.

It is understood and agreed by the parties hereto that the security deposit of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) required by Section 1, clause 10, of this contract to be made "within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor," refers to and is intended to mean the sum of Five thousand dollars (\$5,000) heretofore deposited with the Comptroller of the City, pursuant to the terms of said contract of June 29, 1911.

Section 4. The Company covenants and agrees to abandon and relinquish, and does hereby abandon, surrender and relinquish to the City

of its rights and franchises to construct, maintain and operate a railroad in, upon or across the streets on those portions of the route described in the said contract dated June 29, 1911, which are not covered by the description of the new and amended routes as herein described, and which are not shown on the map of such new and amended routes, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

Section 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

"On the north by the East River; on the east by Gold Street; on the south by Front Street; on the west by Dock Street and New Dock Street."

This provision for condemnation does not apply to that portion of the tracks, structures and equipment of the Railroad Company which is subject to recapture pursuant to the terms of said contract of June 29, 1911, modified as above, or as the same may be hereafter modified.

The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, protecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and it is further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
