

REMONSTRANCE.

By Alderman Koch-

NEW YORK, September 9th, 1873. To the Hon. the Common Council of the City of New York.

GENTLEMEN-The undersigned, your memorialists, owners of real estate and other tax-payers in the vicinity of the site selected by the Com m the vicinity of the site selected by the Colimissioners named in the act chapter 535, Laws of 1873, being "An act to provide for the location and erection of a New City Prison and place for holding certain courts in the City of New York," passed, May 15th, 1873, respectfully beg leave to represent unto your Hon. Body,

yet most earnestly hereby remonstrate against the appropriation of said land for such prison and court purposes, and beseech your Hon. Body, that, so far as in you lies to interpose in their behalf, and if possible prevent the consummation of the seigure and appropriation of the ground for the seizure and appropriation of the ground for the purposes intended by the Commissioners. As the direct representatives of the people of this city, your memorialists confidently assessed to city, your memorialists confidently appeal to you city, your memorialists confidently appeal to you to take such action as in the judgment of your Honorable Body may be best calculated to defeat the said Commissioners in the attempt to seize the block of land in question for prison and court purposes. The following among other, reasons that might be enumerated, are sufficient your memorialists confidently believe, to induce your Honorable Body to give favorable and early consideration to this humble remonstrance of your petitioners:

First—The demands of commerce required the extension and widening of Canal street years ago, and it was accomplished at a vast expense to the owners of property on the line, and the contigious property east of Centre street, particularly, and the said street is now the centre of an extensive and lucrative business which will be greatly injured, if not positively destroyed, by the establishment of the prison and court house contemplated in the said act.

Second—Canal street, between Centre street and the Bowery, is now recognized as the mart for the manufacture of furniture in this city, more than thirty millions of dollars being invested as capital in the business. This street is today, to the furniture trade, what Wall street is to the financial business of the city and county; the business will be irreparably injured, if not destroyed, by the location of the buildings provided for in this act.

Third—For many years it has been the constant purpose to improve the character and reportation of this entire neighborhood at a period First—The demands of commerce required the

Third—For many years it has been the constant purpose to improve the character and reputation of this entire neighborhood, at a period not very remote, noted as one of the most disreputable in the city. To this end, the names of streets in the locality were changed, demolished tenements were replaced by large manutactories and warehouse, and an entire and varied change for the better has taken place in residents and business of the locality. The establishment of the prison and court house on the site proposed, will inevitably result in a great deterioration in will inevitably result in a great deterioration in both, and produce a relapse to their former, if not to a worse condition.

Fourth—That in the condition of the business and finances of the city, both present and prospective, we believe it our duty, in common with the other tax-payers in this municipality to denounce as recklessly unwise, if not criminally improvident, the effort or intent to impose upon our now overburthened taxpayers, the cost of the ground and buildings, as it is stated upon good authority the expense will be six millions of dollars. If past experiences in building court-houses may be taken as a criterion for the present, it may be safely asserted that the expense will more than double this amount. double this amount.

Fifth—The practice so recently inaugurated in the State Legislature, of passing bills which impose enormous expense upon the taxable property of the people of this city, not only without their consent, but often against their most earnest remonstrance, is so reprehensible in itself, and has been productive of so many and great evils, to our suffering people, that we confidently appeal to you to interfere and prevent the consummation of this, the most recent injustice, contemplated to be perpetrated against us, and earnestly plated to be perpetrated against us, and earnestly beseech you to use the weight of your influence with the Commissioners in the said act, who are themselves officers of the city government, to induce them to forego the perpetration of this great

injustice.

Sixth—Surveys made by competent architects, and estimates made by responsible builders, can be produced to prove that the present City Prison, or "Tombs," can be so enlarged and improved, at an expense not to exceed the sum of \$250,000, as to be rendered ample for the purposes for which it was constructed, for many for which it was constructed, for many

years to come;
Wherefore, your memorialists, earnestly solicit
your Honorable Body to take such action as to
you may seem best calculated to accomplish the
objects set forth in this remonstrance, and your

Whereas, The inormous and daily increasing amount of the city debt, and the depressing effects of special State Legislation upon our Commercial, financial and industrial interests, conspicuously witnessed in the many perfidious laws and insidious interpolations in private bills that over tax our citizens without their consent, and prostitutes the city's franchises and other property to the uses and for the emolument of private individuals and Corporations, imposes upon the members of the Common Council, so far as they have the power, the duty of counteracting the injurious effects of such special legislation, and of preventing, if possible any addition, at the present time, to the taxes of our non tax-ridden community; and

whereas, The passage of the act chapter 535, Laws of 1873, being "An Act to provide for the location and erection of a New City Prison, and location and erection of a New City Prison, and place for holding certain courts in the City of New York," and the selections by the Commissioners therein named, of a location in or near the centre of the City, where land is dear, instead of in the 7th 11th or 13th Wards where land is cheap, as provided in the act as approved by the Common Council, previous to its passage, is certain to result in adding very materially to the debt of the city, thereby imposing an additional burthen upon our tax-payers; and as it is very questionable if such a building is now a necessity, as it is susceptible of proof that the present city prison can be improved and enlarged, at a comparatively trifling expense, to a size sufficient to answer the needs

proved and enlarged, at a comparatively trifling expense, to a size sufficient to answer the needs of the city for prison purposes for many years to come; be it therefore

Resolved, That the commissioners named in the said law, viz., the Mayor, Comptroller, and President of the Board of Aldermen, be and they are hereby requested, in behalf of the tax-payers of this city, to discontinue all proceedings had or taken by them in the matter of procuring such new site and erecting such new city prison and court house until some future period, when the exigencies of the public service may absolutely demand the erection of the buildings, and our overtaxed citizens be better able to pay the money necessary for the purpose; and be it further

Resolved, That said Commissioners be and they are hereby requested, to cause such addi-tions and alterations to be made to the present quirements of the public service for the present, and until a more auspicious time for complying fully with the provisions of said act.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT.

SANITARY BUREAU, New York, Sept. 16, 1873. To DR. STEPHEN SMITH, Chairman of Sanitary Committee:

SIR:—I have the honor to present the follow ing weekly report on the condition of the streets and avenues of the City, as it regard cleanliness, compiled from the weekly reports of the Inspectors and Assistant Inspectors connected with this Bureau.

Assistant Inspector Judson (tet. 2d and 5th.

this Bureau.

Assistant Inspector Judson (1st, 3d and 5th Wards) reports no material improvement in the condition of the streets of his district, most of which are filthy with mud, formed from street manure and water from the sprinkling carts.

Inspector Lockwood (2d and 4th Wards) reports that the streets in his district have been in a generally cleanly condition during the past week.

week.

Inspector Tracy (6th Ward) reports the following streets in his district as dirty with street dirt manure or garbage: Chambers street, from Chatham to Centre; Centre street, at junction with Duane; Pearl street, from Centre to City Hall Place; Park street, from Mulberry to Mott; and Cortlandt Alley.

Assistant Inspector Emerson (7th Ward) reports that the condition of the streets in his district is better than for many weeks, with the exception of Hamilton and Division, between Clinton and Montgomery, where piles of street dirt were allowed to stand, during the early part of the week.

of the week.

Assistant Inspector Hughes (8th ward), reports the following streets in his district as filthy with ashes and garbage: Thompson between Canal and Spring; Sullivan, between Grand and Spring; Greenwich and Washington streets; Spring, between Renwick and West; Charlton, between Varick and West, and King, between Varick and Hudson. The remaining streets he reports in fair condition.

Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th wards), reports a continual improvement in the condition of the streets, and that in many places the pavements are being repaired.

Inspector Munde (11th ward), reports that the streets in his district are cleaner than usual, with the exception of those where the pavement is notoriously bad, and where the inhabitants persist in throwing garbage &c., into the streets and gutters. He can specify none as particularly dirty.

Inspector Hall (14th word)

Inspector Hall (14th ward), reports that the streets in his district, have been kept uniformly clean during the past week.

Assistant Inspector Hamilton (16th ward), reports an improvement in the condition of the streets in his district, with the exception of 21st street, between 7th and 9th avenues.

Assistant Inspector Atwater (17th Ward) reports that the streets in his district are well swept and clean.

swept and clean.

Inspector Russell (18th Ward) reports that the streets in his district are in a fair condition, the exception being 18th street, east of First av-

Assistant Inspector Walker (20th Ward) re-oorts that the streets in his district are better than during the previous week, the exceptions being 36th, 38th and 39th streets, west of Tenth

Assistant Inspector Ewing (22d Ward, lower part) reports that, with the exception of those that are unpaved, the streets in his district are kept tolerably clean.

Assistant Inspector Strong (22d Ward, upper part) reports all the paved streets in his district as faultlessly clean.

Inspector Roberts (21st Ward) reports that all the streets in his district have been swept during the week, and that the well-paved streets are in a fair condition.

Inspector Post (19th Ward, lower part) reports that the streets in his district are in a cleanly condition with the exception of the unpaved streets, and also the following: First avenue, between 44th and 47th streets; Second avenue, streets, and also the following: First avenue, between 44th and 47th streets; Second avenue, between 42d and 43d, 46th and 50th, 51st and 54th streets; Third avenue, between 44th and 47th, 57th and 54th, 53d and 56th streets; 41st street, between Madison and Fourth and between Second and Third avenues: 42d street between

Third and Fourth avenues; 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th and 56th streets, between First and Second avenues; 51st and 52d streets, between First and Third avenues; and 54th street, between Lexister and Fourth avenue.

Assistant Inspector Fowler (12th Ward, upper part) reports the streets in his district in good condition, except the unpaved, and those that are badly paved.

BUREAU OF THEATRES, HOTELS, SCHOOL-HOUSES AND SPECIAL SURVEYS.

Abstract of operations for the week ending September 13, 1873:

THEATRES

Official examination of eight theatres, viz., Booth's, Wallack's Union Square, Bryant's, Broadway, Olympic, Niblo's, and the Theatre Comique have been made, and no violations of the law found to exist therein. During the summer vacation many of them have been refitted and decorated. Important alterations have been made in Mr. Augustin Daly's Broadway Theatre, whereby egress is rendered perfectly safe and easy, two additional eight feet openings have been made from the lobby into Broadway, connecting directly with the balcony and parquette on either side, thus affording egress from the entire auditorium, by three broad openings, directly into the street, beside which the side alleys have been cleared of obstructions, and the large side windows opening thereon rendered available in case of fire—the entire auditorium may now be emptied in four minutes.

The Theatre Comique, beside entire renovation during recess, has been additionally secured against fires, accidents by impaired flues, and egress to the rear rendered more easy, and additional openings made into the side alley; the entire auditorium and stage may now be emptied in six minutes.

HOTELS.

Official surveys have been made of the Washington Hotel, at Fourth avenue and Twenty-seventh street; Barnum's Hotel, Twentieth street and Broadway; West Side Hotel, Fifteenth street and Sixth avenue, and the Fifth Avenue Hotel, at Twenty-third street and Fifth avenue, and no violation of law reported in either. The Fifth Avenue Hotel proprietors have adopted and their hotel is provided with every modern appliance for safety and security against fire, in compliance with the law.

A survey of the Lapierre House, located on the northwest corner of Eighth street and Broadway, disclosed an unsafe condition of the southerly wall thereof; and upon notice, the owners at once commenced to render the same safe and secure, and the necessary repairs are now in progress thereon.

SCHOOL-HOUSES.

Official examination of thirteen public school houses have been made, and necessary repairs ordered and completed in four, and in the remainder repairs are in progress for violations reported.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Board of Co.nmissioners of the Department of Public Parks for the week ending Saturday, September 13th, 1873.

TUESDAY, September 9, 1873, 7:30 o'clock P. M.

The Commissioners met informally, with the Comptroller of the city of New York, the President, Treasurer, Secretary, and a number of the Trustees of the Metropolitan Museum of Art, in pursuance of an invitation directed to be extended to them on the 29th August, 1873, and for the purpose of conferring together as to the building about to be erected for said Museum of Art, under authority of chapter 290, laws of 1871.

Subrequently the Board met in session and adjourned without transacting any business, to meet on the 10th September, 1873, at 9 o'clock A. M.

Park-keeper Jacob Weinig was allowed full pay during the time of his illness, occasioned by an accident received on 3d July last, while in the discharge of his duty.

That no person shall boil, heat, dry, keep, store or manufacture any offal, swill, blood, bones, fat, tallow or lard, or any decaying animal or vegetable mattallow or lard, or any decaying animal or vegetable matter; nor shall the business of bone crushing, bone boiling, bone grinding, bone or shell burning, lime making, gut cleaning, skiming, or making glue from any parts of dead animals, heating, drying, storing, shipping or transporting any blood, scrap, fat, grease, or offensive animal or vegetable matter, or manufacturing materials for manure, be allowed or conducted in the city of New York, or in its waters, without a special permit from this Board, to be applied for in writing, specifying the nature and precise location of the proposed business.

Section 130. That no ship, boat or other vessel or article shall be taken or allowed by any person to come into or lay to, or at, or within any dock, pier, bulkhead or slip, or be placed thereon for the purpose of the shipment or removal of any offal, garbage, rubbish, blood or offensive animal or vegetable matter, dirt or dead animals, or for the use of any contractor about the removal of any of the foregoing substances, without a permit from this Department.
