Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending Au-

gust 15, 1874:

The number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,990,

tary and Assistant Sannary Inspectors was 1,990, as follows:

4 public buildings, 950 tenement houses, 189 private dwellings, 186 other dwellings, 19 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 79 stables, I market, 4 breweries, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 33 slaughter houses, 2 dumping-grounds, 14 fat-rendering establishments, 51 sunken and vacant lots, 3 public sewers and drains, 49 yards, courts and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 56 waste-pipes and drains, 136 prives and water-closets, 80 streets, gutters, and sinks, 6 dangerous stairways, 5 cisterns and cesspools, 12 other nuisances, together with 2 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 693.

During the past week 106 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for inspection and report.

The Disinfacting Corps have visited 64 premises

and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for inspection and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 64 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 44 houses, 44 privysinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

In addition to the regular duties, the Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 233½ miles of streetgutters in the following Wards: First, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Sixth, Seventh, Eighth, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, Twentieth, Twenty-first and Twenty-third. The following markets were also disinfected twice—Catharine, Fulton, Spring, and Washington.

The block bounded by Eleventh avenue, North river, Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, known as the Manure Dump, was disinfected, together with 729 privies and water-closets, 137 yards, courts, and areas, and 83 cellars and base-

Fifteen cases of small-pox were removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Permits have been granted consignees of 74 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

141 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported by the officers during the week ending August 15, 1874: Typhus fever, typhoid fever, 5; scarlet fever, 26; measles, 14; diphtheria, 30; Small-pox, 23; and cerebro-spinal meningitis, 4.

485 loads of night-soil were removed from the privy-vaults of the city by the night scavengers.

The following amount of meat and fish was condemned by the officers, as unfit for human food: cattle, I carcass; calves (bob), 3 carcasses; calves (case), I carcass; sheep, 2; lambs, 2 carcasses; beef, 173 pounds; veal, 57 pounds; poultry, 80 pounds; and 4,375 pounds of fish.

# Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending August 15, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 722 burial permits for city deaths, 42 for bodies in transitu, and 49 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 722 deaths, 113 marriages, 523 births, 49 still-births, 42 applications for transit permits, and 66 returns from Coroners. There were 25 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and one transcript of birth record, 2 of marriage and 19 of death were issued from this Bureau. To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—
In the week that ended on Saturday, the 15th inst., there were 722 deaths reported in this city. The number of deaths verified as occurring in the week ending August 8th was 691. Though there was a slight increase in the total mortality, there was a decrease of infantile deaths, and of those from diarrhoeal diseases. Both have the same significance, and by this decrease about 30 infants under two years of are were saved. significance, and by this decrease about 30 infants under two years of age were saved. There were 84 deaths caused by phthisis, 26 by diphtheria, 10 by scarlatina, and 12 by small-pox last week, or an increase of mortality by these four diseases, which is greater than the difference in the apparent mortality of the two successive weeks.

Only one death, from small-pox, occurred last week in a city dwelling; eleven of the twelve fatal cases of this disease were in the hospital on

Blackwell's Island. The following is a brief summary of the whole number: In the hospital there died one native of Germany, aged 25 years; three of Ireland, aged 24, 28, and 30 years, respectively; one of England, aged 24, and seven native-born children, aged 2 months and 8 months; two aged 5 years; two aged 2, and one aged 6 years, respectively. The one case within the city was an infant of two months, that died in the rookery at 31 Baxter street. The fact, that in this city there is in the tenement houses, alone, a monthly increase of two thousand by birth, and about as many more, by immigration, from abroad, accounts for such occasional increase of this contagious pest, which demands the more effective measures for nfaintaining a perpetual system of public vaccination, as now ordered by the Health Department, under the new law. new law.

The records of causes of death show that the The records of causes of death show that the tenement-house districts and the badly drained quarters suffer from the evils of local impurities. The death-rate of such localities has for six weeks been twice as great as in the well drained and well housed quarters of the city. The records for the First, Sixth, Eleventh, Twentieth, and Twenty-third Wards the past month prove this, and the death-rate in children under two years of age in all the tenement districts shows the true cause of all the tenement districts shows the true cause of the generally excessive death-rate in summer.

The following summary shows that in the past eight weeks of midsummer the infants under one year old suffered 48.99 per cent. of the total mortality, and the children under five years suffered 60.90 per cent.of the total:

The gradual increase of mortality as the sum-The gradual increase of mortality as the summer weeks passed on occurred only among young children, and this increase continued until last week, though the temperature continued at the standard below where it was at the beginning of the period. During the past eight weeks there died 3.349 children under hve years of age, or 418 per week, while of persons over five years of age only 143 died per week. The last census found 111,205, or 11.8 per cent. of the city population under five years old, and 88.2 per cent. was over five years of age.\* These records for eight weeks show that in every 1,000 deaths 600 were children five years of age.\* These records for eight weeks show that in every 1,000 deaths 600 were children under five years of age, yet only 118 of every 1,000 city inhabitants are of this tender age, in which the rate of mortality has for eight weeks been at the rate of 268.8 in the 1,000 at that age, yearly, while the entire population over five years of age was losing at the rate of 8.12 per 1,000 annually of the latter ages.

\* The present total population of the city being estimated at 1,040,000, the present child population under five years of age being (according to census) 11.8 per cent of the total, is estimated at 122,720. That portion of the population which is five years of age and over, constitutes 88.2 per cent of the total. These ratios are given to show how the perils of childhood stand in contrast with the very small death-rate in the population that has past the fifth year of life in this city.
