Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the Week ending May 31, 1879.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works be and he is hereby directed to remove the two (2) lamp-posts now standing one on the southeast corner of Fifth avenue and Twenty-third street and one on the southwest corner of Broadway and Twenty-third street, as the said posts are used for advertising purposes and no lamps being on the same for the last three years.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau, for the week ending May 24, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 982 tenement houses, 118 private dwellings, 95 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 16 stores and warehouses, 100 stables, 1 market, 27 slaughter-houses, 13 fat rendering establishments, 2 fertilizing works, 6 public sewers, 1 lime kiln, 7 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 51 sunken and vacant lots, 1 lodging-house, 1 tannery, 81 yards, courts and areas, 67 cellars and basements, 130 waste pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 41 streets, gutters, and sinks, 8 dangerous stairways, 3 smoky chimneys, 3 piggeries, 32 other nuisances; together with 63 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 791. During the past week 206 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

90 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port; 250 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 96 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 83 houses, 83 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Two persons sick with small-pox were removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending May 24, 1879, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending May 17, 1879.

SIR—There were 444 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, May 24, 1879, which is a decrease of 55, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 5 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending May 17, 1879, was 531, which is 27.0 above the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.20 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,095,805.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 480 births, 51 still-births, 137 marriages, and 444 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, May 24, 1879. This shows an increase of 40 births, and a decrease of 1 still-birth, 63 marriages, and 55 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was an increase of 116 births and 5 deaths, and a decrease of 13 still-births, compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week. The deaths from measles decreased 2; scarlatina, 11; whooping-cough, 12; typhoid fever, 2; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 5; bronchitis, 14; heart diseases, 1; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 3; convulsions, 6; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 3; enteritis, gastritis and peritonitis, 6; Bright's disease and nephritis, 16; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and pretermatural births, 2; suicide, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 3; croup, 1; malarial fevers, 3; puerperal diseases, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 9; inanition, 3; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 9; pneumonia, 3; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; and drowning, 4.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 87 were in institutions, 216 in tenement houses, 119 in houses containing 3 families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 14 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 87 on the first, 123 on the second, 74 on the third, 41 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth, 3 on the sixth. 442 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents. 48 were stated to be single, 116 married, 61 widowed, and the condition of 219 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 444; still-births, 51; bodies in transitu, 17; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 55 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 480 births, 137 marriages, 55 still-births, 444 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 28 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and — transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 28 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending May 24, 1879, was 63.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.973, the mean humidity was 79, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 882, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.32 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 442 deaths and still-births, or 89.29 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 5; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 171; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 64; Greenwood (undenominational), 31; Lutheran (undenominational), 82; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 20; Evergreen (undenominational), 22; Woodlawn (undenominational), 13; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 5; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 7; Macpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending May 17, 1879, was 531; this is 65 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 27 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.20 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,095,805.

Communication from Isaac Fowler, lessee of Pier 61, and at Thirty-eighth street, East river, taken from the table and on file, and the Secretary directed to address a communication to Isaac Fowler, lessee of said premises, stating that this Board has never set aside for the use of the Health Department a berth on the north side of Pier 61, East river, for the boats engaged in removing night-soil from the city, and has never been requested by said Department to do so; and also, that in accordance with the terms and conditions of sale held April 15, 1878, under which the lease of Pier at Thirty-eighth street, East river, was purchased by him, he is bound to keep in safe and proper repair all parts of said pier occupied by him, and that this Department cannot repair the foundation of the pier as requested by him.

From Engineer-in-Chief—Stating that, in order to accommodate the boats of the Bureau of Street Cleaning, at Piers 37, 61, and at Twenty-second street, East river, it will be necessary to excavate and remove about 800, 2,000 and 600 cubic yards of mud respectively.

Application from Police Department taken from the table and placed on file, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition for necessary dredge scows and labor to excavate and remove the above quantities of mud from said premises in accordance with his report.

From Joseph McDonald & Co.—In reference to unsafe condition of pier at Twenty-eighth street, North river. Applicant informed that directions were given to the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department on the 7th instant to make the necessary repairs to said pier.

The Secretary directed to address a communication to F. W. Jackson, General Superintendent of Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting him to be present at the meeting of the Board to be held 28th instant, and to furnish the authority under which Pier 16, North river, was erected.

The Auditing Committee presented an audit of twenty-two bills or claims, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$3,413.15; and, being read, was,

On motion, accepted and adopted, and the Secretary directed to forward the said bills, together with proper requisitions for the amount, to the Finance Department for payment.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1879.

CHAPTER X.

AN ACT to provide for the issue to the Manhattan Savings Institution of duplicates of certain certificates of debt and stock of the city of New York and of the county of New York.

Passed January 27, 1879; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Upon being furnished with satisfactory evidence that the stock or debt of the city of New York and of the county of New York, of which stock or debt the hereinafter mentioned certificates appear to have been stolen on the twenty-seventh day of October, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, from the Manhattan Savings Institution, in whose name they are registered on the books of said city and county, is still the property of the said institution, and not subject to any lawful right adverse to its title, the comptroller of the city of New York is directed to issue to the said Manhattan Savings Institution duplicates of the certificates of such stock or debt. The duplicates so issued shall take the place of and may be used with like effect as the originals. And the said certificates, the issue of duplicates whereof is intended to be hereby authorized, are one certificate, number seven hundred and twenty-four of New York City Central Park Fund Stock for twenty-two thousand seven hundred dollars, and ten certificates, numbers one to ten, both inclusive, of New York City Improvement seven per centum stock for twenty thousand dollars each, and one certificate or New York City Revenue bond number one hundred and ninety-three for two hundred thousand dollars, and two certificates numbered one and two of New York county accumulated seven per centum debt due eighteen hundred and eighty-six for one hundred thousand dollars each, and one certificate numbered one of the like debt due eighteen hundred and eighty-seven for fifty thousand dollars, and six certificates of New York County Court-house six per centum stock number two, being certificate number twenty-three for thirty-five thousand dollars, and certificate number twenty-four for five thousand dollars, and certificate number thirty-two for ten thousand dollars, and certificate number thirty-three for forty-seven thousand dollars, and certificate number thirty-nine for ninety-five thousand dollars, and certificate number forty for ten thousand dollars. This description of the certificate is to apply to the stock or debt intended to be thereby described, as the same is registered in the name of the said institution on the books of the city or county aforesaid.

Sec. 2. The said comptroller before issuing such duplicate may, if he shall deem it advisable, require the publication for ten days respectively, in three newspapers to be designated by him, of a notice to the effect that the said duplicates are applied for, and that written objections to the issue thereof can be presented to him on or before the last day of such publication. In case objection is so made, and is accompanied by presentment of the original certificates, or by evidence reasonably tending to show that the same are held by lawful title adverse to that of the said Manhattan Savings Institution, the comptroller is authorized to cause inquiry made, and such proceedings to be taken as may be necessary or proper for the protection of the city or county in respect to the claims for said certificates of debt or stock, and for such disposition of the original and duplicate certificates pending the said proceedings as may be ordered by a court of competent jurisdiction, provided that all expenses attending such proceedings and advertising shall be borne and defrayed by said Manhattan Savings Institution. And the said comptroller is authorized to administer an oath or affirmation to every person giving evidence before him concerning the matters mentioned in the first and second sections of this act, and every person who shall willfully swear or affirm falsely to any material matter upon any oath or affirmation so administered, shall be deemed guilty of perjury and shall be punished accordingly.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

CHAPTER 261.

AN ACT to inquire into the equity and legality of certain assessments in the city of New York.

Passed May 8, 1879; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The board of revision and correction of assessments in the city of New York is empowered and directed to examine and ascertain the amount of assessments made upon the property formerly owned by George Hoffman, situate upon the corner of Fifth avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, in the city of New York, for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from the Harlem river to Eighth avenue, and for regulating, grading, curbing, guttering and flagging Fifth avenue from One Hundred and Thirtieth street to One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and if the said board determine that the said assessment or any part thereof is excessive, unjust or illegal, all or any part of the same shall thereupon, upon the certificate of said board, be vacated and canceled by the comptroller of the city of New York.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
