That the report of the Special Committee on the Riverside and Reception Hospitals be accepted, their action approved, and the Committee be discharged, and that these hospitals be placed under the immediate charge of the Assistant Sanitary Superintendent who will report to the Sanitary Superintendent.

That the Board of Police are hereby respectfully requested to permit Mr. Crowley, their Superintendent of Telegraphs, to arrange a telegraph between the office of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Riverside Hospital on Blackwell's Island, at the expense of this Department.

That the Attorney be directed to commence an action against B. A. Mylius, M. D., for a violation of section 131 of the Sanitary Code.

That a permit be granted to Felix Doughty to store and deposit manure and stable straw upon lots lying between Thirty-seventh and Thirty-eighth streets, North river, provided the same be removed on or before May 1, 1875.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 23, 1875. The number of inspections made by the Inspectors was 2,121, as follows:

5 public buildings, 1,195 tenement houses, 162 private dwellings, 209 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 57 stables, 1 brewery, 40 slaughter-houses, 3 manure dumps, 4 fat-rendering establishments, 3 head and tripe-boiling establishments, 2 gut-cleaning establishments, 6 sunken and vacant lots, 43 yards, courts, and areas, 59 cellars and basements, 74 waste-pipes and drains, 86 privies and water-closets, 5 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 14 dangerous stairways, 6 cisterns and cesspools, 2 dangerous and smoky chimneys, and 105 visits to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 475.

During the past week 41 complaints were re-

ceived from citizens, and referred to the Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 93 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 89 houses, privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

50 Cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital, and 4 dead bodies to the Morgue by the Ambulance Corps.

29 Permits were granted to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

27 Permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases was reported during the week ending January 23, 1875: Typhus fever 2, typhoid fever 14, scarlet fever 55, measles 13, diphtheria 133, small-pox 84, and cerebro-spinal meningitis 6.

100 loads of night-soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy-vaults of the city.

The following amount of meat was condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending January 23, 1875, viz.: Cattle, 1 carcass; calves (bob), 1 carcass; calves (case), 2 carcasses; sheep, 7 carcasses; and hogs 11.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

During the week ending January 23, 1875, there were issued from this Bureau 664 burial permits for city deaths, 23 for bodies *in transitu*, and 38 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 664 deaths, 146 marriages, 454 births, 38 still-births, 23 applications for transit permits, and 87 returns from Coroners. There were 42 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 6 transcripts of birth-records, 4 of marriage, and 26 of death were issued from this Bureau; 3 cases of death were referred to the Coroners.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR—There were 664 deaths reported in this city last week, against 677 reported, and 696 verified, in the previous week. The greatest mortality occurred on the 15th instant, when there were 110 deaths, 49 of which were children under 5 years of age. The excessive mortality during the past few weeks is associated with records of frequent and extreme fluctuations of temperature. The range of temperature last week was from 1 degree below zero to 40 degrees above, or a fluctuation of 41 degrees. In the previous week the range was from 3 degrees below zero to 39 above, and the day of greatest mortality the mean temperature was 16.6 degrees Fahrenheit. The mean for that week was 19.9 degrees, and the mean for last week was half a degree lower.

Pulmonary phthisis was charged with 89 deaths last week, and 94 deaths the previous week. Bronchitis and pneumonia were charged with 135 and 127 deaths in these two weeks respectively. There were 49 deaths from diphtheria reported last week, and in the previous week 73 occurred.

The death-rate last week was equal to 33.20 per 1,000 annually, and in the previous week it was equal to 34.80 per 1,000. The death-rates in European cities at the beginning of winter are reported as follows: In the 21 chief cities of Great Britain, for the week ending January 24, the rate was equal to 41 per 1,000 yearly. It was 42 in the 1,000 in Edinburgh, 69 in Glasgow, 45 in Dublin, and 37 in London. These excessive death-rates are due to similar causes on both sides of the Atlantic, namely, extreme fluctuations of temperature, the presence of infectious diseases, destructive to life in children, and most of all, the excessive crowding and sanitary wants of the poor classes in these cities during the winter.
