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DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS.

At a meeting of the Board of Docks of the City of New York, held at the office of the Board, Pier "A," Battery place, Thursday, December 28, 1893, at 11 o'clock A.M.

Present—Commissioner Phelan.

" " White.

Absent—President Cram.

The minutes of the meeting held on the 21st instant were read and approved.

A representative of Henry Hart was present respecting the order of the 3d inst., to show cause why a penalty should not be imposed for filling in foot of Lexington avenue and One Hundred and Thirty-first street, Harlem river.

On motion, the order of April 30, 1891, was revoked, and the said Hart directed to continue the fence from its present termination down to low-water mark.

The report of the Engineer-in-Chief on Secretary's Order No. 13451, submitting specifications and form of contract as modified in accordance with the recommendation of the President on the 21st inst., was tabled.

The following communications were referred to the Treasurer:

From William F. Cunningham—Offering to purchase the right to fill in between One Hundred and First and One Hundred and Fourth streets, East river.

From Thomas J. Cummins, manager—To furnish the weekly circular of Albany news during the legislative session.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—Requesting instructions as to the additional filling-in required at West Forty-fourth street.

The following communications were referred to the Engineer-in-Chief to examine and report:

From Moses Engle—Requesting an extension of time to complete the removal of Pier, old 29, North river, under Contract No. 401.

From Matthew Baird—Requesting an extension of time for the completion of the deliveries of granite for bulkhead or river wall under Contract No. 412.

From the Analytical and Assay Laboratories of Dr. Gideon E. Moore—To make tests of cordage, hawsers, cables, etc.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, lessee—To make improvements to the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street.

E. M. Van Tassel Elevating Company—To change the grade of the bulkhead foot of West Eleventh street.

The following communications were received, read, and,

On motion, ordered to be placed on file, viz.:

From the Department of Taxes and Assessments:

1st. Requesting information as to the ownership of the Piers foot of East Ninety-fourth, Ninety-fifth and One Hundred and Nineteenth streets, Harlem river. Notify the Department that the said piers are the property of the City.

2d. Requesting a copy of the volume giving locations and sizes of piers and bulkheads, together with the names of the owners. The Secretary directed to reply.

From the Department of Street Cleaning:

1st. Requesting the removal of two loose piles at West Nineteenth street dump. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to remove.

2d. Requesting dredging at the dump foot of Thirtieth and Seventy-ninth streets, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to make requisition.

From the Department of Buildings—Respecting certain alterations without permit to a structure on the Pier foot of East Twenty-fifth street. The Secretary directed to apply for a permit.

From John H. Starin and the sureties to the lease of Pier, new 58, North river—Consenting to the sub-letting of said pier to the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company, in accordance with the resolution adopted November 9, 1893.

From the East Bay Land and Improvement Company—Respecting the bill rendered for nine months rent of land under water in the vicinity of Leggett's Creek. Transmit copy to the Counsel to the Corporation.

From Robert Halstead—Complaining of a scow loaded with manure foot of East One Hundred and Tenth street. Notify John Anton to remove said scow at once.

From Henry Keteltas—Requesting an offer for his bulkhead in front of Corlears Park, East river. Notify him that the Department does not desire to acquire the property.

From H. M. Loud—Requesting a remission of wharfage charged vessels delivering timber to the Department under Contract No. 456. Application granted.

From James Symington—Requesting an extension of time until January 20, 1894, to complete the deliveries of granite for bulkhead or river wall under Contract No. 457. Application granted, provided the consent of the sureties in writing is filed in this Department.

From the F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company—Renewing their application for permission to build a crib extending about 120 feet north of the northerly line of Fifty-first street, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the F. & M. Schaefer Brewing Company to build a small crib-work between Fifty-first and Fifty-second streets, on the East river, in accordance with their application dated December 22, 1893, and under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, on condition that the same is temporary only and shall remain only during the pleasure of the Board, and that said company file an agreement in writing to remove said crib-work within ten days whenever directed to do so by the Board, and agree to pay as compensation for said privilege the sum of one dollar per month, payable at the end of each month, to the Dock Master of the district.

From the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association—Requesting permission to make alterations to the market building foot of Fulton street, East river.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted the Fulton Market Fish Mongers' Association to make alterations to the market buildings between Piers 22 and 23, East river, by substituting for the wooden posts and joists iron posts and joists, and for the present wooden doors sliding iron shutters, the work to be done under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From David McClure, attorney—Agreeing to sell to the City the bulkhead and water-rights on West street, extending southerly from the southerly line of Perry street a distance of about 100 feet for the sum of \$500 per running foot.

On motion, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, David McClure is the attorney for the Farmers' Loan and Trust Company, trustees of the estate of George S. Miller, deceased, owners of the bulkhead and water-rights opposite the premises on West street, extending southerly from the southerly line of Perry street a distance of one hundred feet, together with all the rights of wharfage, cranage, advantages, emoluments, and appurtenances connected therewith; and

Whereas, The said David McClure has agreed to sell to the City the aforesaid bulkhead and water-rights for the sum of five hundred dollars per running foot front on West street.

Resolved, That this Department enters into an agreement for the purchase of the aforesaid bulkhead and water-rights for the sum of five hundred dollars per lineal foot measured on the bulkhead-line, provided, however, that a good and sufficient title in all respects to the said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto or connected therewith can be acquired by, conveyed to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, free and clear from all incumbrances, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From Jeremiah Pangburn—Agreeing to sell to the City 89 feet 6 inches of bulkhead between Perry and West Eleventh streets, North river, for \$500 per front foot.

On motion, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, Jeremiah Pangburn is the agent of the owners of the bulkhead and water-rights opposite the premises on West street, extending northerly from the northerly line of Perry street a distance of eighty-nine feet six inches, more or less, together with all the rights of wharfage, cranage, advantages, emoluments and appurtenances connected therewith; and

Whereas, The said Jeremiah Pangburn has agreed to sell to the City the aforesaid bulkhead and water-rights for the sum of five hundred dollars per running foot front on West street;

Resolved, That this Department enters into an agreement for the purchase of the aforesaid bulkhead and water-rights for the sum of five hundred dollars per lineal foot measured on the bulkhead-line, provided, however, that a good and sufficient title in all respects to the said property, together with all rights, terms, easements and privileges pertaining thereto or connected therewith can be acquired by, conveyed to and vested in the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, free and clear from all incumbrances, subject, however, to the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

From the Treasurer:

1st. Reporting that he has been unable to ascertain the name of the owner or owners of the canal-boat sunk north of Pier, new 22, North river, or to collect the cost of removal of said boat, as requested, on the 21st instant.

2d. Recommending that the permit granted November 16, 1893, to John W. Sullivan for a berth for a dry-dock on the south side of Pier 54, East river, be revoked, as said Sullivan refuses to accept the price named. Permit revoked.

3d. Recommending that the compensation to be charged the Knickerbocker Steamboat Company for a berth at the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street for the steamer "Albany" be fixed at the rate of \$2.50 per day, and for each of the small boats at the Pier foot of West Fifteenth street the rate of seventy-five cents per day each, Sundays included, payable at the end of each week to the Dock Master.

From Dock Master Martin—Reporting a steam-hoisting derrick on the bulkhead between One Hundred and Thirty-first and One Hundred and Thirty-second streets, North river, without a permit. Notify George Grossman to obtain a permit.

From Dock Master Coye—Reporting repairs required to the pavement in front of Pier 18, North river. The Engineer-in-Chief directed to repair if necessary.

From the Engineer-in-Chief:

1st. Report for the week ending December 27, 1893.

2d. Reporting the completion of the work of building a new pier near the foot of Canal street, North river, under Contract No. 434. Notify the Dock Master to collect wharfage.

3d. Partial Report on Secretary's Order No. 131C8—As to the dredging done in the half slip adjoining the south side of Pier, new 41, North river. Notify lessee to complete the work of dredging thereat to a uniform depth.

4th. Submitting specifications and form of contract for supplying about 1,200 tons of anthracite coal. Approved, subject to the approval of the Counsel to the Corporation as to form, and the Secretary directed to advertise for estimates.

TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1893), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereafter liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act:

When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

The said estimates will be publicly opened and read at a meeting of the Board of City Record to be held in the Mayor's office at or about the time above-mentioned.

Each person making an estimate shall inclose it in a sealed envelope, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Printed, Lithographed or Stamped matter," and with his name and the date of its presentation.

Each estimate shall state the name and place of residence of the person making it; if there is more than one such person, their names and residences must be given; and if only one person is interested in the estimate it must distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.
