Petition for grading and paving Third avenue, between Sixtieth street and the Shore road.

Following report from the Department of Highways:

CITY OF NEW YORK—BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN,
DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS,
MUNICIPAL BUILDING, September 19, 1900.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROAT, President of the Borough of Brooklyn:

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of the 4th instant, forwarding petition signed by William Keegan, requesting the grading and paving of Third avenue, between Sixtieth street and the Shore road, with asphalt pavement, I beg to advise you that the records of this Department show that some time ago proceedings were instituted to open Third avenue as an 80-foot street between the points named above. The street is at present 60 feet in width, but undoubtedly the street is to be improved as it is proposed to open it. A street of this width in the former City of Brooklyn would have had a roadway of 42 feet, but the estimate is based on a roadway 44 feet in width, as specified in the Town Survey Map of New Utrecht for an 80-foot street, and as there is a railroad on this street, and it is the main thoroughfare of that section of the borough, the additional space will be valuable.

The ordinance should provide that the railroad company having tracks on the street pave the space between the tracks and rails with granite-pavement laid on a concrete foundation, with pitch and gravel joints.

The estimate, including the cost of paving between the tracks, is as follows:

15,000 cubic yards of grading.
19,545 square yards asphalt pavement on concrete foundation;
22,170 linear feet of curbing.
19,170 square yards granite-block pavement between railroad tracks laid on a concrete foundation, with pitch and gravel joints.

Total estimated cost, \$216,000.

A proper district of assessment is one-half the block on each side of the street, which includes an area having an assessed valuation of about \$1,350,000.

DEAR SIR—In reply to your letter of the 25th ultimo, I beg to call your attention to the fact that while your letter calls for the "grading and paving of Fifty-second street, between Sixth and Eighth avenues," the petition attached thereto requests the improvement of "Fifty-first street, between Sixth avenue and Eighth avenue," estimate is therefore submitted on the location as given in the petition (herewith returned).

Repaying with asphalt pavement Fifty-first street, between Sixth avenue and Eighth avenue.

Quantities and cost are as follows:

4,000 cubic yards of grading.
3,040 linear feet of curbing.
3,070 square yards of asphalt pavement on concrete foundation.
15,000 square feet of flagging or cement walk.

Total estimated cost, based on five years of maintenance, \$19,100.

A proper district of assessment would be one-half the block on each side of the street, including an area having an assessed value of \$46,600.

There is no record to show that that portion of the street between the ward line and Eighth avenue ever has been legally opened. It would be advisable to have the width of the street fixed at the same width as those prevailing throughout the thorough.
