

A communication was received from the Chief Engineer, boroughs of Manhattan and Richmond, submitting a time statement on the contract for constructing a sewer in Riverside drive, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, covering connections with existing sewers, etc., and recommending that the time specified for its completion be extended to January 23, 1901, the day on which the work was finished, and recommending further, that the sum of \$150 be retained from the final payment as security for erecting two drop-wells and setting heads on same, which work must necessarily be deferred until the Ninety-sixth Street Viaduct is completed.

Commissioner Clausen offered the following: Resolved, That the time for the completion of contract for constructing a sewer in Riverside Resolved, That the time for the completion of contract for constructing a sewer in Riverside drive, between Ninety-fifth and Ninety-seventh streets, with connections, etc., be and the same hereby is extended to January 3, 1901, on account of unavoidable delays not due to fault on the part of the contractor, and that the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars be retained from the final estimate, as security to pay for the completion of constructing two drop-wells and for resetting heads on the same, which work cannot be prosecuted until the work of constructing a viaduct carrying Riverside drive over Ninety-sixth street, has been completed.

GENTLEMEN—Six per cent, Gold Consolidated Stock, amounting to eight million eight hundred and eighty-five thousand five hundred dollars (\$8,885,500), which was issued by the County of New York prior to its consolidation with the former City of New York, matures on July 1, 1901.

The said stock is all held by the public and is payable from the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt (No. 1), under the provisions of section 213 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897.

Under an amendment to the Constitution of the State of New York adopted at the general election held in the year 1890, the said stock is exempted, for the debirestrictive purposes of section 10 of article VIII. of the Constitution, from classification as a City debt.

In view of the present heavy demands upon the City's debt-incurring capacity, especially for rapid transit and bridge construction, it is desirable to retain the advantage gained by such exemption. This advantage wound be practically lost as to the amount of said stock if it were to be redeemed out of the Sinking Fund, or if it were refunded by the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York.

I therefore propose to extend the maturity of a considerable proportion, if not the whole of such stock, for periods not exceeding twenty years, under the authority conferred upon me by chapter 630 of the Laws of 1900, upon the best obtainable terms for the City.

It is not unlikely, however, that it may prove impossible to extend certain portions of said stock upon advantageous terms, and I therefore recommend that a resolution be adopted authorizing the Comptroller to redeem from the Sinking Fund such portions of said stock.
