MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

No. 970.

By Alderman Devlin (by consent):—

Whereas, The unfortunate occurrence which resulted in a scene of violence at the corner of Grand and Sheriff streets, Manhattan, on Wednesday, July 30, 1902, on the occasion of the funeral of the late Rev. Chief Rabbi Jacob Joseph, has aroused indignation among thousands of our citizens, and

Whereas, Such riotous and turbulent disturbances should be avoided in future; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Police be and he is hereby respectfully requested to make a strenuous and thorough investigation of the affair so that the instigators of the riotous proceedings may be discovered, and if found guilty, summarily dealt with.

Which was adopted.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from His Honor the Mayor:

City of New York—Office of the Mayor,
July 28, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

I return herewith, without my approval, the resolutions suspending the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks, adopted by the Board of Aldermen July 15, 1902, as follows: Permitting a display in the Sixth Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, on August 22, 1902; permitting a display in the Thirty-ninth Aldermanic District on August 25, 1902; permitting a display on the lot corner of Stone and Dean streets, Borough of Brooklyn, on August 18, 1902; permitting a display at the celebration of the Sciacca Maritime Association, on August 15, 1902, on Elizabeth street, Borough of Manhattan; permitting a display of the Society of St. Rocco, on Navy street, Borough of Brooklyn, on August 25 and 26, 1902.

Also, the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 22, 1902, suspending the ordinance relative to the discharge of fireworks so far as same may apply to the Metropolitan Traction Company's employees, on the occasion of their festival on August 30, 1902, in the Twenty-second Police Precinct.

My objection to these resolutions is that it has appeared, from reports made to me from time to time by the Fire Commissioner, that such suspensions of the ordinance in relation to fireworks have become more and more frequent, and have led to an increased fire hazard and consequent increased insurance rates. A protest against such suspensions, signed by a number of citizens and property owners, was recently presented to your Honorable Board, and your Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom it was referred, reported that the complaint had foundation in fact. I have received similar protests, with statements that the fireworks are frequently set off by persons inexperienced in handling them, and that in many such instances it is necessary for property owners to station men on the roofs and about their premises, with buckets of water and apparatus for extinguishing fires.

It, therefore, seems to me that such displays should be allowed only when a permit is obtained from the Fire Commissioner, and under such regulations as he shall prescribe.

No. 940.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended in the Thirty-ninth Aldermanic District so as to permit of a display on August 25, 1902.

No. 945.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks in The City of New York be and the same is hereby suspended so as to permit of a display in the Sixth Assembly District, Borough of Manhattan, on August 22, 1902, under the direction of the Commissioner of Police.

No. 947.

Resolved, That the ordinance relating to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so far as it may apply to the celebration of the Sciacca Maritime Association on August 15, 1902, on Elizabeth street, between Broome and Grand streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, such suspension to continue only for the time and place above mentioned.

No. 959.

Resolved, That the ordinance relative to the discharge of fireworks be and the same is hereby suspended so far as the same may apply to the Metropolitan Traction Company's employees on the occasion of their festival on August 30, 1902, in the Twenty-second Police Precinct, such suspension to continue only for the place and date above mentioned.

Which was laid over, ordered to be printed in the minutes and published in full in the "City Record."

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

No. 971—(S. O. No. 45).

City of New York, Office of the Mayor,
New York, July 28, 1902.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

At the last meeting of your honorable Board a resolution was considered to enable the City to take, by condemnation, certain land at the junction of Fourth avenue and Astor place, the effect of which would be to widen Fourth avenue at this point, where it is now much congested. The resolution received a majority vote, but not the necessary four-fifths vote which is required to make it effective.

The City is obliged to provide a right-of-way for the Rapid Transit tunnel at this point, where the tunnel turns from Lafayette place into Fourth avenue. The City can meet this obligation in only two ways: (1) by condemning the easement underground, under the Rapid Transit Act; or, (2) by the adoption of the resolution now pending before your Board, the effect of which will be to make the City the owner of the land both on the surface and underground.

It is the belief of the Comptroller and myself that it will cost the City almost as much to secure the easement underground as it will to buy the property in fee. By taking title to the property, however, the City not only secures the right-of-way for the subway, but it also widens Fourth avenue where it is much congested.

The Rapid Transit contractor has agreed to contribute \$75,000 to the purchase of the fee, as an off-set to what he would be obliged to pay for the easement alone.

I cannot help hoping that, with this statement before the Board, the necessary majority can be had for the resolution now pending. It has been passed, unanimously, by the Local Board, and is before your Board with the favorable report from the Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to which it was referred. It will be apparent, I am sure, that the only sufferer from the failure to enact the resolution will be the City itself, and the only gainers will be the individual property owners, who will be in a position to make the City pay an easement a very large part of what it would have to pay for a title to the land itself. In the meanwhile, if the City gets only an easement, the conditions upon the surface are not improved; if it acquires the title, Fourth avenue will be widened importantly at a point where such widening is very desirable.

PETITIONS AND COMMUNICATIONS.

No. 974.

By Alderman Shea—

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The petition of Milliken Brothers respectfully shows:

I. That your petitioners are a copartnership firm, composed of Edward F. Milliken and Foster Milliken, engaged in the business of manufacturing structural and ornamental iron and steel work of all descriptions for bridges, buildings and roofs, and having their principal office and place of business at No. 11 Broadway, Borough of Manhattan, New York City.

II. That your petitioners are desirous of erecting a plant for the use of their said business on land (on which they have acquired options) situated at Howland Hook, in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, and shown on the accompanying map. That said land extends from the right of way of the Rapid Transit Railroad Company on the south to the bulkhead line of Newark Bay on the north, and thus lies on both sides of the Shore road (also known as Richmond terrace).

III. That it is necessary for your petitioners' said business, if they are to erect a plant on the land aforesaid, that four railroad tracks be constructed, connecting with the tracks of the said Rapid Transit Railroad Company, at the south, and extending over the land of your petitioners, across said Shore road (or Richmond terrace), to their shops and the water front on Newark Bay, and that it would be impossible for petitioners to operate a plant on said land without such tracks. That the options for the purchase of said land are expressly conditioned, on the part of petitioners, that leave be obtained to lay said tracks. That the points on the said Shore road (or Richmond terrace), between which your petitioners desire permission to cross the same with their said tracks, are as follows: On the east, a point about two hundred and sixty-six (266) feet westerly (measured along the northerly line of said Shore road) from the westerly side of Holland avenue, as laid out, as the same would be if extended northwardly across said Shore road; and on the west, a point about one thousand (1,000) feet westerly from the point above described, measured along the northerly line of said Shore road, the said points being within the limits, on the northerly side of said Shore road, of the land mentioned in paragraph II, herein on which your petitioners have acquired options.

IV. That the said Shore road between the points aforesaid is little used for general traffic, and that said tracks would not, as your petitioners are informed and believe, be detrimental to any interest, but that, on the other hand, the erection of the plant proposed by your petitioners, as aforesaid, to which the said tracks would be a necessity, would be a positive benefit to the surrounding neighborhood and the said Borough of Richmond. That, except where they cross the said Shore road, the said tracks will be wholly on the land of your petitioners. That, in crossing the said Shore road, the said tracks would have to cross the tracks of the Staten Island Electric Railroad Company, which company, as your petitioners are informed and believe, does not object to the laying of the four tracks across the said Shore road, as aforesaid.

V. Wherefore your petitioners pray, and make application to the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for your consent, leave and permission, to be granted to your petitioners, their heirs, executors, administrators, lessees and assigns, to construct and maintain four tracks, and operate cars thereon, across the Shore road (otherwise known as Richmond terrace), in the Third Ward, Borough of Richmond, New York City, the said tracks to be laid at places convenient to the said business of your petitioners, but to be within and between the points described in paragraph III, herein and approximately at the points indicated on the accompanying map, and, except where they cross the said Shore road, to be wholly on the land of your petitioners. The said tracks to be laid at grade and to cross the said Shore road and the tracks of the said Staten Island Electric Railroad Company at grade, the motive power to be used thereon to be steam or electricity, and your petitioners to repair and restore the highway after the said tracks have been laid.

In reply, I would inform you that all the necessary legal steps for the change of motive power have already been taken, and we fully expected to make the reconstruction of this line a part of our work this spring or summer, but the impossibility of getting the material from the steel and iron manufacturers made it necessary for us to postpone the work until next spring, in order that more important short lines, which form the connecting links between the present electric lines, could be finished this year. As it is, we have been seriously handicapped in the comparatively small amount of work we are doing by the condition of the iron market. We desire to equip the First avenue line for electric operation at the earliest possible opportunity, and it will undoubtedly be one of the first things done next year.

Dear Sir—On April last I submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a revised salary list, in accordance with recommendations theretofore received. I felt much hesitation in undertaking the task of revision, and am persuaded that an unintentional act of injustice was done to at least one of the stenographers of the Department, if not to others also.

On April 18, 1902, Miss Grace Brickwedel was appointed a Stenographer by General Collis while he was Commissioner of Public Works.

When I assumed office she undertook to do a considerable part of my stenographic work, and has exhibited capacity and industry. Her duties have required attention of the Department's work on many occasions long after hours, and I feel that I should bespeak the favorable consideration by the Board of my request that her salary be restored to the former amount. It was reduced on April 30 to \$1,050 per annum.

In presenting this request I have no desire to make any invidious distinctions, as I have been well served by all the stenographers and by the great majority of the clerks and employees of the department, but Miss Brickwedel's case commends itself especially, in view of the large reduction which has been made in her compensation.

Mr. Cohn has been a faithful employee of the Commission for more than a year and is easily worth the increased rate of compensation.

It is also the desire of the Commission to change the title of William J. Lyell, another employee of this office, from Telephone Operator to Clerk. Mr. Lyell is now receiving a salary of \$900 per annum, and it is proposed that he be given the same compensation under the new title. Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I am in receipt of a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 22 last, reciting that the individual members of the Board, occupied in their official duties and personal callings, have not had the leisure necessary for the careful preparation of the general legislation required by the Charter; and that the failure to enact general ordinances providing for certain licenses, was continually depriving the City of a large amount of revenue. The resolution requests and urges the Corporation Counsel "to assign one of his assistants to the preparation of the general ordinances above mentioned, and generally to advise this Board and its Committee regarding the form and effect of the proposed legislation."

I regret that this resolution should have been adopted without any notification to me of its introduction or proposed passage. By the terms of the Charter, I, in common with every head of Department, have a seat in the Board of Aldermen, and I should have been happy to attend there and point out my reasons for thinking this resolution ill-advised. Inasmuch, however, as I was not aware that this subject was to be brought up for discussion, and therefore did not express my views before the passage of the resolution, I must now state why I am constrained respectfully to decline to accede to the request of the Board.

By section 255 of the Charter, the Corporation Counsel is made attorney and counsel to the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen and other officers of the City. He has "charge and conduct of all the law business of the Corporation and its Departments and Boards, and of all law business in which The City of New York is interested." He is the legal adviser of the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen and other officers of the City, and "it shall be his duty to furnish to the Mayor, the Board of Aldermen, the Presidents of the Boroughs and to every Department, Board or Officer of the City all such advice and legal assistance as Counsel and Attorney in or out of court as may be required by them or either of them."

It will be observed that the duties of the Corporation Counsel are exclusively of a legal character. Whenever any definite legal question arises, it is made the duty of the Corporation Counsel to give advice to the Board of Aldermen or other boards seeking it; and I have always been ready to perform this duty to the best of my ability.

The questions as to which assistance is now desired are not, in reality, of a legal character; although no doubt a knowledge of law will be of considerable value to the gentlemen who may be called upon to frame the proposed ordinances. It is also apparent that it would be necessary to consider the probable effect of such proposed ordinances when brought to the test of actual litigation. The enforcement of ordinances is usually dealt with by the Bureau for the Collection of Penalties established in this Department, and I can see many advantages that will arise from frequent consultation between the Committee of your Board and the head of the Bureau referred to. In any specific instance, also, I shall be pleased myself to consult with your Committee as to the legal effect of any proposed ordinance. This, however, is very different from what your Board now requests, namely, the assignment of an assistant to prepare all the general ordinances which your Board may have under consideration.

I am aware that from 1898 until the present year an Assistant Corporation Coun-

sel was assigned to attend in the preparation of general ordinances. When I entered upon the duties of my present office I made careful inquiry as to the value of the services of such an assistant and satisfied myself, from all the information I could receive, that as a practical matter the salary paid could much better be employed in this Department in other directions, and that nothing of permanent value had been accomplished by detailing such an assistant. I have seen no reason to change my mind on this point.

The appropriations made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen for this Department are very properly kept within such limits that careful economy is necessary to enable the Department to discharge the primary duties that rest upon it, which consist in conducting the litigation to which this City is a party and in giving advice upon the multitude of strictly legal questions which daily arise in the conduct of the business of the City. Unless the appropriation made to this Department is increased it would be impossible for me to spare a competent assistant to take charge of the business referred to in the resolution of your Board.

It has always seemed to me that the proper course for the Board of Aldermen to pursue in reference to general ordinances, was to employ a competent lawyer as Clerk of their Committee having the matter in charge, and to pay him, out of their own appropriation, such a sum as might be required to secure the necessary ability and experience. Such a Clerk would be the employee of the Board in every sense of the word, and the result, I am sure, would be far more satisfactory to the Aldermen and to the City than if I adopted the course which I am requested and urged to adopt.

Should any question hereafter arise in the Board of Aldermen affecting this Department I shall be pleased to attend a meeting of the Board and debate the subject, and I need hardly call your attention to the fact that if any questions relating to the affairs of this Department occur to any member of the Board, I may be required to appear and answer such questions at any time on forty-eight hours' notice.

That Committee reported on April 26, 1897, in favor of the resolution, which was laid over and was at a meeting on November 4, 1897, adopted. Thereupon the old City of New York became a member in good standing of the League of American Municipalities. An examination of the proceedings of the various conventions of the League has convinced your committee that while The City of New York, because of its size and importance, is more likely to be a lesson for others than to obtain for itself lessons from others, it is a desirable thing that the City should be represented in the membership and take part in the conventions. They therefore recommend that the City pay up its arrears and become a member in good standing, and that the resolution hereto annexed be adopted and the resolution referring the matter to the Committee on Finance be placed on file, the matter having now been considered. It appears from the resolution by which the City became a member of the League that the dues varied according to the size of cities, beginning with \$20 for cities under 25,000 population, and ending with \$60 annual dues for cities having a population of over 200,000. The City paid \$60 for dues to December 29, 1898, thus four years' dues are unpaid. We recommend the expenditure of \$240. The next convention is to be held at Grand Rapids, Michigan, on August 27, 28 and 29. We understand that the League is then to be addressed by one of our own body, to wit, the Hon. Jacob A. Cantor, President of the Borough of Manhattan. Your committee also believe that the Board should take some formal action in regard to the matter, and they therefore recommend that the President appoint a committee to consider the matter of attendance at the convention. They recommend and report a resolution providing for such a committee, and also a resolution providing for the payment of back and this year's dues.

SPECIAL ORDERS RESUMED.

The hour of 2.35 o'clock having arrived and passed, President Cromwell of the Borough of Richmond called up Special Order No. 44, being a report and ordinance as follows:

No. 785.

The Committee on Streets, Highways and Sewers, to whom was referred on June 17, 1902 (Minutes, page 732), the annexed ordinance in relation to "the cleaning of streets and sidewalks and keeping them clean, and removing snow and ice, dirt and other materials therefrom in The City of New York," respectfully

REPORT:

That, having examined the subject, they believe the proposed ordinance to be desirable.

They therefore recommend that the said ordinance be adopted.

AN ORDINANCE regulating the cleaning of streets and sidewalks and keeping them clean, and removing snow and ice, dirt and other materials therefrom in The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen, as follows:

Section 1. No person or persons shall throw, cast or lay, or direct, suffer or permit any servant, agent or employee to throw, cast or lay any ashes, offal, vegetables, garbage, dross, cinders, shells, straw, shavings, paper, dirt, filth or rubbish of any kind whatsoever in any street in The City of New York, either upon the roadway or sidewalk thereof, except that in the morning before 8 o'clock or before the first sweeping of the roadway by the Department of Street Cleaning, in the boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, dust from the sidewalk may be swept into the gutter, if there piled, but not otherwise, and at no other time.

The wilful violation of any of the foregoing provisions of this section shall be and is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor and shall be punished by a fine of not less than one dollar nor more than ten dollars, or by imprisonment for a term of not less than one nor more than five days.

Sec. 2. No persons other than an authorized employee or agent of the Department of Street Cleaning, or the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Boroughs of Queens or Richmond, shall disturb or remove any ashes, garbage or light refuse or rubbish placed by householders, or their tenants, or by occupants or their servants, within the stoop or area line, or in front of houses or lots, for removal, unless requested by residents of house.

Sec. 3. It shall be the duty of all persons and corporations engaged in sprinkling the streets of The City of New York to use on asphalt pavement a quantity of water sufficient thoroughly to wash off and clean the same, and on all other pavements to use not more water than shall be sufficient to lay the dust thereon.

Every street railroad corporation in the boroughs of Richmond and Queens shall sprinkle the pavement between its tracks and rails when and as often as directed so to do by the Superintendent of Highways. Water shall be furnished for this purpose free of charge by The City of New York.

Sec. 4. No one being the owner, driver, manager or conductor of any cart or other vehicle, or of any receptacle, shall scatter, drop or spill, or permit to be scattered, dropped or spilled, any dirt, sand, gravel, clay, loam, stone or building rubbish, or hay, straw, oats, sawdust, shavings or other light materials of any sort, or manufacturing, trade or household waste, refuse, rubbish of any sort, or ashes or manure, garbage or other organic refuse or other offensive matter therefrom, or permit the same to be blown off therefrom by the wind, in or upon any street, avenue or public place.

Sec. 5. No person shall throw, cast or distribute in or upon any of the streets, avenues or public places, or in front yards or stoops, any hand bills, circulars, cards or other advertising matter whatsoever.

Sec. 6. Every owner, lessee, tenant or occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the city abutting upon any (paved) street, avenue or public place, where the sidewalk is paved, shall, before 10 o'clock in the forenoon, after any snowfall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow and ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk (or) and gutter; provided, however, that such removal shall in all such cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or by the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or of said Borough President of Queens or Richmond for the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material, except that, in the boroughs of Queens and Richmond, any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street, avenue or public place, for a linear distance of five hundred feet or more shall be considered to have complied with this ordinance, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before 10 o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue such removal, and shall complete it within a reasonable time.

Sec. 7. In case the snow and ice on the sidewalk shall be frozen so hard that it cannot be removed without injury to the pavement, the owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground as aforesaid, shall, within the time specified in the last preceding section, cause the sidewalk abutting on the said premises to be strewn with ashes, sand, sawdust, or some similar suitable material, and shall, as soon thereafter as the weather shall permit, thoroughly clean said sidewalk.

Sec. 8. Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant, or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any (paved) street or public place, where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provision of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material, from the sidewalk (or) and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which said building or lot abuts, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond may cause such removal to be made and thereupon the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond to the Comptroller of the City and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice and snow, dirt or other material to be paid out of any appropriation made for any purpose of the Department of Street Cleaning or the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the boroughs of Queens or Richmond; and the Comptroller shall raise the amount of such additional expenditure by the issue and sale of Revenue Bonds, as provided by law, and shall place the amount so raised to the credit of the Department of Street Cleaning or the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the boroughs of Queens or Richmond as the case may be, to supply the deficiency occasioned by such additional expenditure; the term "lot," as used in this section, shall intend and mean a space not to exceed 25 feet in width fronting on the street, avenue or public place upon which the violation is charged to have been permitted or committed.

Sec. 9. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning (or) and the Borough Presidents of Queens and Richmond, immediately after every snowfall or the formation of ice on the crosswalks or in the culverts or paved streets, avenues or public places, forthwith to cause the removal of said snow and ice from the said crosswalks and culverts, and to keep the crosswalks and culverts aforesaid clean and free from obstruction.

Sec. 10. Every street railroad corporation shall remove all the snow and ice from its tracks and the spaces between, and shall not throw the same on either side thereof, and shall immediately carry away and dispose of the same under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond under a fine of one hundred dollars for every city block in length in which the said corporation shall fail to so remove and dispose of the same, as aforesaid; provided, however, that for the more speedy and effective removal of snow and ice from the paved streets, avenues and public places of the city, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning (or) and the Borough Presidents of Queens (or) and Richmond shall have power and authority in their respective boroughs to enter into agreements for the entire winter season, or part thereof, with any street surface railroad or other railroad having tracks in the city for the removal of snow and ice for the entire width of the street, avenue or public place, from house-line to house-line, at any part of the route of the said railroad, provided that nothing in said agreements shall be inconsistent with any law of the State of New York or with any right of The City of New York.

Sec. 11 (a). It shall not be lawful for any surface railroad company or other company, or any corporation or person whatever, or the officers, agents or servants thereof, to cause or allow any snow plow, sweeping machine or other similar instrument to pass over the tracks or lines used by them within the limits of the city unless by the written permit of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond; any violation of this section shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars for each such offense.

(b) No such permit or renewal thereof shall be granted except upon the condition and agreement upon the part of the company applying for such permit or renewal that the party to whom the said permit has been granted shall and will, at his own expense, promptly remove and carry away the snow thrown up by such plow or machine, and that such snow plow, sweeping machine or other instrument shall be so constructed as not to throw any slush or snow upon the sidewalks or buildings, under a penalty of ten dollars for every house or sidewalk in front thereof upon which slush or snow shall be thrown.

No such permit or renewal shall be granted unless the party to whom granted shall expressly covenant, stipulate and agree that in case of its failure, neglect or omission to promptly remove and carry away the snow and ice thrown up by such snow plow or other instrument, then the same may be removed under the direction of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond, and the expense of removing the same shall be paid by the said party to the said Commissioner or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond, on demand, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize that the amount or amounts of money so paid shall be credited to the appropriation (of the Department of) for Street Cleaning, in the respective Boroughs, for the removal of snow and ice; but nothing herein contained shall be deemed to prohibit said Commissioner or Borough Presidents from demanding, before issuing said permit, and as a condition thereof, the deposit of such sum of money or other security as in their judgment may be necessary to pay the cost of properly performing the work above mentioned, together with the expense of the inspection thereof.

(d) In case of neglect or refusal or omission of the party to whom such permit may be granted promptly to remove and to carry away the snow and ice thrown up by such plow or other instrument, then the Commissioner of Street Cleaning or the Borough President(s) of Queens (and) or Richmond may forthwith cause the same to be removed at the public expense, and all expenditures made or incurred therefor shall be chargeable upon the party so neglecting, refusing or omitting to perform its agreement, and shall be recoverable by an action at law on behalf of The City of New York, and when so recovered shall be placed to the credit of the Department of Street Cleaning or the Bureau of Street Cleaning in the Boroughs of Queens or Richmond, as the case may be, to supply the deficiency occasioned by such additional expenditure.

Sec. 12. Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof by any magistrate, either upon confession of the party or competent testimony, may be fined for such offense any sum not less than one dollar and not exceeding three dollars, except as herein otherwise provided; and in default of payment of such fine may be committed to prison by such magistrate until the same be paid, but such imprisonment shall not exceed one day.

Sec. 13. All ordinances of the former municipal and public corporations consolidated in The City of New York, regulating the cleaning of streets and keeping them clean, and the removal of snow and ice, dirt or other material from the streets in The City of New York, and all other ordinances, or parts thereof, inconsistent herewith, are hereby repealed.

Sec. 14. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Railroad Committee of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to whom was referred the application of the Union Railway Company of New York City for the grant of a franchise or right to construct and operate a street surface railway as an extension of its existing railway in, upon and along the surface of certain streets, avenues and highways, and to and upon a bridge and viaduct adjacent to or within one-half mile of its railway in The City of New York for the purpose of reaching the depot, station and terminus of other railroads not more than one-half mile distant from such bridge or viaduct, in said city, do respectfully

REPORT:

That it has heard the parties in favor of said application (no one appearing in opposition to it) and herewith submit a proposed specific grant in the form of an ordinance, granting the petitioner's application and the annexed resolution for adoption.

It is resolved—

(1) That the said proposed grant be approved and have its first reading.

(2) That such ordinance be referred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the purpose of making inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or

right proposed to be paid therefor, in accordance with the provisions of section 74 of the Greater New York Charter.

AN ORDINANCE granting to the Union Railway Company of New York City the right of franchise to construct and operate a street surface railway as an extension of its existing railway in, upon and along the surface of certain streets, avenues and highways and to, upon and across a bridge and viaduct constructed in and owned and maintained by The City of New York.

Be It Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Whereas, The Union Railway Company of New York City has duly presented to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, its application, in writing, for a grant of the franchise or right to use the streets, avenues and highways, bridge and viaduct in and owned and maintained by The City of New York hereinafter mentioned, and for the construction, maintenance and operation of a double-track street surface railway, as an extension of its existing railway, in, upon and along the surface of the same; and

Whereas, The said Board of Aldermen, by resolution adopted on the 13th day of May, 1902, approved by the Mayor on the 16th day of May, 1902, gave public notice of such application, and that at the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen, in the City Hall, in the Borough of Manhattan, The City of New York, on the 15th day of June, 1902, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon such application of said railway company would be first considered and a public hearing had thereon, which notice was published daily, for more than fourteen (14) days successively prior to the hearing in two daily newspapers published in The City of New York, viz.: the "Bronx Borough Record" and the "Daily North Side News," which papers were first designated in writing by the Mayor of said city, on the said 16th day of May, 1902; and

Whereas, After public notice given as aforesaid and at a public hearing duly held in pursuance of such notice, whereat all persons so desiring were given an opportunity to be heard and were heard, such application was first considered by the Railroad Committee of the said Board of Aldermen; and

Whereas, It is apparent from the proofs submitted and from satisfactory evidence presented that there is a public demand and desire that said railway company extend its railway and construct and operate the same upon and along the streets, avenues and highways and across the bridge and viaduct hereinafter named, which said bridge and viaduct is adjacent to or within one-half mile of its existing railway, for the purpose of reaching the depot, station and terminus of other railroads, not more than one-half mile distant from such bridge and viaduct, and to establish by the construction of said extensions a new route for public travel, and the said applicant having consented to operate such extensions as a continuous route for one fare; and it further appearing that such extension cannot be operated as an independent railroad without inconvenience to the public, but that it is to the public advantage that the same should be operated as a continuous line or route of the existing railway of the applicant;

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen of The City of New York hereby grants to the Union Railway Company of New York City, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the franchise or right to extend its railway and to use the streets, avenues, highways, bridges and viaduct of the city, and to construct, maintain and operate a double-track street surface railway, as an extension of its existing railway for street railway purposes in the conveyance of persons and property, in, upon and along the following named streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct, viz.:

Commencing at the intersection of Jerome and Sedgwick avenues at the terminus of the tracks of this company's Jerome avenue line; thence upon and along the westerly approach, known as the Sedgwick avenue approach, formerly called Ogden avenue approach, to Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge; thence southerly upon and along said bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct and Macomb's Dam road to the terminus of the railway of the Eighth Avenue Railroad Company, between West One Hundred and Fifty-fourth and West One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets; also from the intersection of said Central or Macomb's Dam Bridge and the One Hundred and Fifty-fifth Street Viaduct; thence westerly upon and along said viaduct to the station, depot or terminus of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company, situated between said bridge and Bradhurst avenue, together with the necessary connections, switches, sidings, turnouts, turn-tables, cross-overs and suitable stands necessary for the accommodation and operation of said railroad by the overhead system of electricity or any other motive power which may be lawfully employed upon the same; all in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, City, County and State of New York.

Sec. 2. The grant of said franchise or right to use said streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct is made subject to the following conditions:

First—That the said right, privilege and franchise to construct and operate said extension shall be held and enjoyed by said railway company, its lessee or successors, for the term of twenty-five years, with the privilege of renewal of said grant for the further period of twenty-five years upon a fair revaluation of the right, such revaluation to be of the right, privilege and franchise to maintain and operate said extension by itself, and not to include any value derived from the ownership, control or operation of any other railroad, line or tracks of the grantee, its successors or assigns; provided, however, that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded on such streets, avenues, highway, bridge and viaduct shall be first obtained, or in lieu thereof the favorable determination of three commissioners, approved by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, that such extension should be constructed and operated.

Second—Upon the termination of said franchise or right, whether original or renewed, there shall be a fair valuation of the plant and property of the applicant in the streets, avenues, highways, and upon the bridge and viaduct aforesaid, with its appurtenances, and the said plant and property shall be and become the property of the City on the termination of the grant, on paying the grantee such valuation. Such payment shall be at a fair valuation of the said plant and property, as property, excluding any value derived from the franchise.

Third—The mode of determining the valuations and revaluations herein provided for shall be as follows: One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the railway company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder; the three so chosen shall act as appraisers, and shall make the valuations and revaluations aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least sixty days prior to the expiration of the grant, or of the renewal thereof, and their report shall be filed with the Comptroller of the City not more than thirty days thereafter. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators; they may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party; they shall have the right to examine the books of the railway company. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties.

Fourth—The said Union Railway Company of New York City shall pay into the Treasury of the City the percentages required to be paid by section 4 of chapter 340 of the Laws of 1892.

Fifth—The said railway may be operated by overhead electrical power substantially similar to the system of overhead electrical traction now in use on other portions of the existing road of said company and by any other motive power, except locomotive steam-power, which may be approved by the Board of Railroad Commissioners and consented to by the owners of property, in accordance with the provisions of the Railroad Law.

Sixth—The said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of The City of New York, who have jurisdiction in such matters under the charter of said City.

Sec. 3. The said grant is also upon the further conditions; namely:

First—The said extension shall be constructed and operated in the latest improved manner of street railway construction, and the railway and property on said extension shall be maintained in good condition throughout the full term of this grant.

Second—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said extension shall be five cents; and said company shall not charge any passenger more than said sum for one continuous ride from any point on said extension or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of The City of New York. The cars on said extension shall be run as often as the public convenience may require.

Third—The said railway company shall apply to each car run over said extension a proper fender and wheel-guard in conformity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities.

Fourth—All cars on said extension shall be heated during cold weather in con-

formity to such laws and ordinances as are now in force or may hereafter be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, and each car shall be well lighted either by the Pintsch gas system or by electricity, or by some system of lighting equally efficient.

Fifth—In case of any violation or breach of, or failure to comply with, any of the provisions of this section, this grant may be forfeited by suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten days to the said railway company.

Sec. 4. This grant is also upon the further and expressed condition that the provisions of Article IV. of the Railroad Law applicable thereto be complied with.

Sec. 5. The said company shall at all times keep the street between its tracks and for a distance of two feet beyond the rails upon either side of said extension free and clear from ice and snow.

Sec. 6. The said railway company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon said streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct, shall have and keep in permanent repair that portion of such streets, avenues, highways, bridge and viaduct between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and two feet in width outside of its tracks, under the supervision of the proper local authorities, and whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe.

Sec. 7. This grant is not exclusive, the right being hereby reserved to use the portion of said bridge and viaduct to which said grant relates for railroad purposes to any other corporation or corporations lawfully authorized to construct and operate a street railway thereon.

Sec. 8. The said railway company shall commence construction within ten days from the date when it has obtained complete legal authority to begin construction, including necessary permits from the city officials and departments, and shall complete construction within ninety days thereafter; otherwise this grant shall be forfeited. Provided that such time may be extended under and for causes specified in section 99 of the Railroad Law, and that the city officials or departments, who or which shall at the time of such construction have authority over the said bridge and viaduct, may extend said time for a period or periods not exceeding ninety days further if reasonable, in their judgment, by reason of requirements as to the manner of construction imposed by the city officials.

Sec. 9. This grant shall not become operative unless, within twenty days after the approval thereof by the Mayor of said city or the final passage thereof succeeding the return with the disapproval thereof, or subsequent to the taking effect of said grant by reason of the failure of said officer to return the same with his disapproval, the said railway company shall duly execute under its corporate seal an instrument in writing wherein said company shall promise, covenant, and agree on its part and behalf to pay the compensation, and to conform to, abide by and perform all the conditions and requirements in this ordinance fixed and contained, and within the said period file the said instrument in the office of the Comptroller of The City of New York.

Sec. 10. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

All dumbwaiter shafts, except those in private dwelling houses, not more than two stories and basement or three stories in height above the cellar, no portion of which is used for business purposes, shall be inclosed in suitable walls of brick, or with burnt clay blocks set in iron frames of proper strength, or fireproof blocks strengthened by metal dowels, or such other fireproof material and form of construction as may be approved by the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction. Said walls or construction shall extend at least three feet above the roof and be covered with a skylight at least three-quarters of the area of the shaft, made with metal frames and glazed.

Every dumbwaiter hereafter placed in any building shall be inclosed in the cellar within brick walls not less than eight inches thick. All openings in inclosure walls or construction shall be provided with self-closing fireproof doors. When the shaft does not extend to the floor level of the lower story or through the top story or stories, the bottom and top of the shaft shall be constructed of fireproof material.

Section 48 is hereby amended so as to read:

In every building hereafter erected or altered, all the walls or partitions forming interior light or vent shafts shall be built of brick or such other fireproof materials as may be approved by the Superintendent of Buildings having jurisdiction, except shafts in private dwellings used for lighting or ventilating rooms on not more than two floors may be built of wood, with inside of walls and bottoms covered with metal, metal lath and plaster or plaster boards.

The walls of all light or vent shafts, whether exterior or interior, hereafter erected, shall be carried up not less than three feet above the level of the roof. Where shaft is covered with skylight the walls need not be carried more than two feet above the roof, with ventilating skylight placed thereon.

Light and dumbwaiter shafts in frame buildings need not be fireproof, but built in the manner herein described.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk thereof, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
