placed with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be

freely discharged therefrom; that all wood flooring of the horse stalls throughout

the stable be removed and replaced by movable racks; that the floor of the stables

on the southwesterly part of the lot be cemented, and so graded as to discharge all

surface water and liquid matter into a properly trapped, sewer-connected valley drain;

that the stable yard be so graded as to discharge all surface water into a properly

trapped, sewer-connected drain.

premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to

life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued;

that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and re-

placed with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be

freely discharged therefrom; that a properly enclosed runway be provided for daily

exercising cows; that the walls and ceiling of stable be cleaned and whitewashed; that

all loose plaster be removed from ceiling of the milk house and kitchen; that a milk

house with cement floor be provided; that all offensive earth be removed beneath the

stable floor, and said stable be cemented and so graded and drained as to discharge all

liquid matter into a properly trapped valley drain with strainer, thence into a water-

tight cesspool; that the udders of cows and hands of milkman and milkmaid be cleaned

before milking; that manure boxes with tight-fitting covers be provided and manure

removed weekly.

Whereas, The premises, Barnum avenue, near Metropolitan, Middle Village, Bor-

ough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this

case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life

and health and a public nuisance and the Board having taken and filed among its records

the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and

what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and

business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health

and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a

nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health,

and in respect thereto, orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued;

that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and re-

placed with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be

freely discharged therefrom; that the stable and premises be cleaned and stable whitewashed;

the manure be removed from the premises at once; that a properly covered water-tight

manure box be built, and the same emptied at last twice a week; that a cesspool with

bottom and sides cemented by constructed and the stable be connected with the same

by an iron or earthen drain properly trapped; that a milk house having no connection

with stable or dwelling be constructed and the floor of same be cemented; that the

broken wooden floor of stable be removed, the earth beneath removed and filled with

fresh earth and disinfected and the floor of stable be made water-tight; that the

keeping of cows without a permit from this Department be discontinued.

in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that a properly constructed runway be provided, and each cow be exercised at least once in each day; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before each milking; that the ceiling of the stable be made dust proof; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, its site cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the defective wooden flooring be replaced by a cement floor provided with properly constructed valley drains, so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water-tight covered cesspool located on the premises, by and through a properly trapped earthenware or iron drain protected by strainers; that a properly constructed milk house be provided, having no connection with dwelling or stable, said milk house to have a cement floor so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water-tight cesspool by and through an earthenware or iron drain, and that no milk be handled except in said milk house; that a properly constructed covered manure box be provided, and that manure be removed at least twice a week; that city water be provided and the use of well or cistern water, for milk utensils, be discontinued.

Whereas, The premises, Webster avenue, Glendale, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursued specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursued in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the number of cows be reduced to twenty-three; that the manure bins and cesspools be properly covered and the cesspools be emptied and thoroughly cleaned and disinfected; that the wooden flooring of the milk house be replaced by a cement floor so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into cesspool thereat by and through earthenware or iron drains; that the well be sealed and water from same for use in washing milk cans and utensils be discontinued, and hereafter the well be located at least 100 feet from stable; that a properly constructed runway be provided and each cow be exercised at least once in each day; that the walls and ceiling of the stable be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the udders of the cows and the hands of the milkmen be thoroughly cleaned before each milking; that the ceiling of the stable be made dust proof; that all offensive earth be removed from beneath the stable floor, its site cleaned, disinfected and filled with fresh earth; that the defective wooden flooring be replaced by a cement floor provided with properly constructed valley drains so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water-tight covered cesspool located on the premises, by and through a properly trapped earthenware or iron drain protected by strainers.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or any officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.
