Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor, together with a statement showing the disposition of prisoners during the three months ended June 30, 1904, to wit:

Carpenter's Work.

At Fourth District Prison, by prison labor, laying of new floor in office, hanging new door on store-house, repairing door in yard, repairing sides of storm-house, put in three new sashes in cells on first and second tier, male prison; material used: 900 feet 1 inch by 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch yellow pine flooring, 25 pounds of wire nails (bung-heads), 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ rolls resin paper, 30 feet of round moulding, 4 only 12 inch by 16 feet shelving boards, 3 dozen 1 inch iron screws, 2 pairs "t" hinges.

At Fifth District Prison, by prison labor, putting in 4 windows of male prison, new sash tape; material used: 20 feet of flat sash tape; repairing lock on desk in office.

Plumbing and Tinsmith's Work.

At Second District Prison, by Boiler Inspection, Police Department, testing 2 boilers and registered as Boiler No. 2341, Certificate No. 2893.

Work done by staff: Overhauling and putting in good condition steam apparatus; material used: One 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch "Kennedy" gate valve, brass screwed; one 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch perpendicular check valve; two 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch short nipples; one piece 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch pipe; one length 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe; one piece of 1-inch pipe; one piece of 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch pipe; two pounds 5-16-inch flax packing; one pound asbestos packing.

By paid labor: Repair of waste pipe to wash-basin in the day house; repairing two (No. 13) prison locks and furnishing four (No. 90) keys for same; repairing

leak in Croton pipe, office; repairing two sink faucets, fourth floor; cleaning basin waste, fifth floor; material used: one-half pound of solder; time, 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours' plumber.

At Third District Prison by paid labor: Repairing and overhauling valves and faucets in Cells Nos. 4, 18, 17, 11, 10, 21, 22, 23, 48, 50, 52, 39, 41, 43, 44, 29, 33, 34 and 35; repairing hot water faucet to sink in laundry; clearing waste pipe in kitchen from tubs and sink and repairing water closet and faucet; material used: one pound solder, seven sets of faucet washers, four diaphragm washers, 4 seat-washers for valves, one spring; putting on new flange on hot water boiler; material used: one 2-inch by 1-inch bushing; repairing water-closet in cell of male prison; repairing faucets in kitchen, dining-room and office; material used: six compression cock washers.

At Fourth District Prison by paid labor: Repairing leak of Croton pipe to boiler and repairing stationary wash-trays; material used: one joint of solder, one 3 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch galvanized union, one washer, one boiler washer, one faucet washer, six hours plumber.

By prison labor: Put on one 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch faucet in female prison; put on one 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch faucet on sink in prison kitchen; put on two 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch faucet in second tier male prison; made two new No. 91 prison keys.

At Fifth District Prison by paid labor: Putting on new closet seat in toilet ten day house, material used: one "Mott's" new closet seat, 12 bolts, 6 screws, red lead; repairing flush pipe in male prison, material used: one 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch rubber connection, one 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch washer and one foot copper wire; putting on sink in ten-day house two new self-closing faucets and repairing two others on male tier, material used: two patent self-closing faucets, two pounds solder, gasoline, one faucet handle.

Seventh District Prison by paid labor: Overhauling and repairing the following plumbing work, to wit:

Basement—Repairing seven faucets; repairing cistern.

First Floor—Clearing floor drain and sink waste; repairing cistern and put in new basin cock.

Second Floor—Clearing bath waste and two toilets and three basin wastes; repairing two valves and two faucets.

Third Floor—Clearing two closet traps, two basin wastes; repairing two toilet cisterns and putting on new basin cocks.

Fourth Floor—Repairing leak in basin supply pipe; repairing two basin cocks and clearing two basin wastes.

Fifth Floor—Repairing two basin cocks and clearing two closet traps.

Sixth Floor—Repairing two closet cisterns; repairing three basin cocks; clearing one closet trap, material used: fifteen faucet washers, two nickel plated self-closing basin cocks, three faucet screws, one ball of lamp-wick, three pounds putty, two 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch by 2-inch bolts, one box cement, one pound solder; time, 22 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours' plumber; repairing broken hot water pipe in laundry and overhauling closets in female prison.

Miscellaneous Work.

At Fourth District Prison, by paid labor: Repairing and replastering the ceiling of office.

At Fifth District Prison: Repairing and adjusting "Remington" typewriter No. 2-92968, and furnishing two new rubber bands.

Painters' Work.

At Second District Prison: Painting and retouching all the necessary parts of the prison; material used: 200 pounds white lead, 20 pounds chrome green, 1 gallon liquid dryer, 10 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine.

At Third District Prison: Painting and retouching all the necessary parts of prison, to wit: 28 cell doors, male prison; 9 cells, male prison; 1 coat dado; 58 window casings and bars, prison kitchen; 12 wire screens; 9 cell doors, female prison; Keeper's dining-room; whitewashing sides of prison yard, also cellar; material used: 100 pounds white lead, 5 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds chrome green, 5 gallons raw oil, 3 gallons dryers, 5 gallons asphaltum varnish, 1 barrel finishing lime and 3 pounds ultramarine blue.

At Fourth District Prison, by prison labor: Painting prison kitchen; whitewashing ceilings of 31 cells; painting roof of coal shed; material used: 100 pounds white lead, 2 gallons turpentine, 2 gallons raw oil, $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon liquid dryer, 2 pounds chrome green, 1 pound raw sienna, $\frac{1}{2}$ barrel of finishing lime, 5 pounds ultramarine blue.

At Fifth District Prison, by prison labor: Painting and retouching all the necessary parts of prison; material used: 200 pounds white lead, 10 gallons raw oil, 5 gallons turpentine, 10 pounds chrome yellow, 2 pounds drop black in oil, 5 pounds of Indian red, 2 gallons liquid dryers.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, water-bugs, etc., by the services rendered of the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, cleaning, laundrying and other general work done in all the prisons by unpaid prison help.

Branch Workhouse, Hart's Island, June 30, 1904.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:
Sir—I herewith most respectfully submit the quarterly report of this institution for the months of April, May and June, and would summarize briefly the principal work performed, as follows:

The interior of the Roman Catholic Church has undergone extensive renovation, including plastering, painting and stenciling throughout, and at the present time the building has a very neat and becoming appearance.

The two new roads branching from Central avenue to the Charity dock have been completed in a thorough and workmanlike manner and represent one of the most important improvements ever made on the island.

About 200 feet of the subway for the conveyance of steam to the different buildings has been dug out, with a view to ascertaining the condition of the pipes and repairing same where required. A vault, 10 feet 6 inches by 7 feet 9 inches has been repaired, and a concrete floor put in for a tank and steam pump, to receive the return water from the steam pipes in the different buildings. Most of the pipes in these buildings have been repaired or replaced with new where necessary. The hot water tank in Pavilion No. 1 has also been repaired.

To facilitate approach of the boats to the south dock a bell tower has been erected, provided with a large bell, which will be rung in foggy weather.

Repairs and renovations have been in progress at the officers' cottages on the hill, and considerable necessary work has been done in and about the Branch Workhouse and City Cemetery office. A portion of the flooring has been renewed, an adjoining yard has been relined with cement, and the toilet room has been furnished with a complete set of toilet apparatus.

A brick building has been put up in the vicinity of the stone shed, intended to be used for fumigating the clothing of inmates upon their arrival.

The naphtha launch "Vim" has been repaired, reupholstered and newly painted.

The routine duties of the prisoners, such as burying the dead, work on the farm, road mending, keeping grounds in order, unloading coal and ice, etc., have been performed as heretofore. Such of the female prisoners as are capable of work have been employed in the laundry or in cleansing the different buildings, while the Reformatory boys, in the intervals between school hours, have been kept busy principally in hauling stone and freight.

Attached are tables relating to labor, the census, interments and work in the laundry.
