

Appropriating the sum of thirty-three thousand dollars (\$33,000) from the proceeds of Corporate Stock, sections 47 and 169 of the Revised Charter (Code C-DE-9), application for the issue of which is hereby made, said sum to be applied to the purchase, for school purposes, of the following lands:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southerly line of Ridgewood avenue with the easterly line of Lincoln avenue, and running thence southerly along the easterly line of Lincoln avenue 186 feet, thence easterly 175 feet to the westerly line of Nichols avenue; thence northerly along the westerly line of Nichols avenue 210 feet to the southerly line of Ridgewood avenue; thence westerly along the southerly line of Ridgewood avenue 176 feet 8 inches to the easterly line of Nichols avenue, the point or place of beginning, to be the said several dimensions more or less, together with all the right, title and interests of the owners of said premises, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof.

The said sum to be paid by the Comptroller out of the proceeds of said Corporate Stock, for the said lots of lands and premises, upon presentation to him of the deed or deeds therefor, together with a certificate of the Corporation Counsel that the title thereto is satisfactory and fully free from all encumbrances and is vested in The City of New York.

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes the following-described lands and premises on Snufford avenue, Faile and Coster streets, in Local School Board District No. 24, Borough of The Bronx, the assessed valuation of which, with other property, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$35,500.

Requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises aforesaid.

Approving and ratifying the action of the Committee on Elementary Schools in finding Walter S. Handforth, a teacher of shopwork in Public School 19, Borough of Manhattan, guilty of violating subdivision 1 of section 48 of the By-Laws, prohibiting corporal punishment.

Fining said Walter S. Handforth a sum equivalent to the amount of his salary from the date of his suspension on April 2, 1909, to and including May 12, 1909, and that he be restored to duty immediately.

Approving the action of the Committee on Elementary Schools in finding George D. Lewis, a teacher in Public School 74, Boys, Borough of Manhattan, guilty of violating subdivision 1 of section 48 of the By-Laws, prohibiting corporal punishment, and in restoring him to duty as of May 5, 1909.

Fining said George D. Lewis a sum equivalent to the amount of his salary from the date of his suspension on April 22, 1909, to and including May 4, 1909.

Dismissing the charges of neglect of duty preferred by District Superintendent Davis against Emma E. Dennerlein, a teacher in Public School 30, Borough of The Bronx, and relieving Committee on Elementary Schools from further consideration of the matter, this teacher's resignation having been accepted by the City Superintendent.

Consolidating, in accordance with the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents, Public School 119, Girls, and Public School 119, Primary, Borough of Manhattan, and known as Public School 119, Borough of Manhattan, and placed in charge of one principal on September 1, 1909.

Approving the action of the Board of Superintendents in transferring Gertrude Goldstein from Public School 141, Borough of Brooklyn, to Public School 2, Borough of Manhattan, Schedule III, the same to be considered as in effect May 1, 1909.

Dismissing the charges of neglect of duty preferred by District Superintendent Richman against Margaret H. Richman, a teacher in Public School 2, Primary, Borough of Manhattan, that the suspension of Miss Richman be revoked, and that she be reinstated with full pay, subject to such deductions of salary on account of her absence as the Board of Superintendents may determine that she should suffer, under the By-Laws of the Board of Education.

Directing the Board of Superintendents to authorize the reoccupation of the rooms on the ground floor of the leased premises Nos. 309-317 East One Hundred and Twentieth street, known as Public School 163, Borough of Manhattan, for school purposes and for the offices of the principal and clerk on May 12, 1909, or as soon thereafter as may be feasible.

Jepson's services in the Department of Education on said date be considered as having been without fault or delinquency on her part.

Whereas, The Board of Education on October 10, 1906 (see Journal, page 169), selected a plot of land 100 feet by 195 feet on Amity street, beginning 130 feet west of Court street, adjoining the present site of Public School 78, as a site for a new school building to take the place of Public School 29, and to relieve Public School 78, Borough of Brooklyn, and requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as might be necessary and proper for the acquisition thereof; and

Whereas, The City Superintendent of Schools reports that the acquisition of this site and the erection of a building thereon are matters of the most urgent necessity; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be, and it is hereby, respectfully and urgently requested to take immediate action in the matter of authorizing the acquisition of said proposed school site.

Whereas, The Board of Education on October 24, 1906 (see Journal, pages 174-175), selected as a site for a new school building a plot of land 200 feet by 200 feet on Newport, Alabam and Georgia avenues, Borough of Brooklyn, and requested the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as might be necessary and proper for the acquisition thereof; and

Whereas, The City Superintendent reports that the acquisition of a site in this vicinity is of the utmost importance, in order to permit of the erection of a school building to relieve Public Schools 72, 109 and 149, in which there are 3,315 pupils on part time; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be, and it is hereby, respectfully and urgently requested to take immediate action in the matter of authorizing the acquisition of said proposed school site.

Whereas, The Board of Superintendents has recommended that the application of Mary E. Holberton, a teacher in Public School 12, Borough of Brooklyn, to be excused with pay for absence from October 23 to November 4, 1907, be approved; and

Whereas, It appears that said teacher was absent because of personal illness, but failed, through inadvertence, to submit her application for excuse of said absence with pay within the thirty days required by section 44 of the By-Laws; therefore be it

Resolved, That the above-mentioned provision of the By-Laws, requiring that application for excuse for absence shall be made within thirty days, be, and the same is hereby, suspended as respects the above-mentioned absence of Mary E. Holberton.

Whereas, Mary Shires, principal of Public School 132, Borough of Manhattan, was absent on account of serious personal illness from March 16 to April 30, 1909; and

Whereas, Said principal has had an exceptional record for attendance, and will be retired on September 1, 1909, and

Whereas, Under section 44 of the By-Laws, only a portion of this absence can be excused; therefore be it

Resolved, That so much of the absence (2½ days) of Mary Shires, principal of Public School 132, Borough of Manhattan, from March 16 to April 30, 1909 as is not excusable under section 44 of the By-Laws, be, and it hereby is, excused with pay, and that any provisions of the By-Laws inconsistent herewith be, and they hereby are suspended for the purpose of this resolution.

Whereas, The Board of Education on April 28, 1909 (see Journal, page 654), adopted a resolution dispensing with the services of sundry cleaners to take effect May 1, 1909;

Resolved, That so much of the above-named resolution as relates to dispensing with the services of Mary Arnold, cleaner in the Morris High School, Borough of The Bronx, be, and it is hereby, rescinded; and that she be restored to duty as cleaner in said school to take effect May 13, 1909.

On motion, all absent members were excused for non-attendance at this meeting.
