Carpenters' Work.

At Third District Prison, repaired 12 benches, 1 dining-room table and 3 washbasin covers; material used, 1 pair hinges, 1 pound wire nails.

At Fourth District Prison, adjusted 2 new windows 15 inches by 10 inches in cells on second tier, repaired door to office entrance; material used, 4 hinges, 2 dozen 1-inch screws and 1 strap hinge.

At Fifth District Prison, finished the new cabinet for the storing of manuscripts and stationery material, used 940 feet of white, clear pine of various sizes, 13 pairs of cupboard hinges, 13 closet locks, 24 drawer pulls, 20 pounds 2-inch wire nails, 1 gross of 1½-inch screws, 9 drawer locks and keys; repaired door to prison entrance, made one tool chest for Seventh District Prison, repaired benches in chapel.

Plumbers, Steamfitters and Tinsmiths' Work.

At Second District Prison, by paid labor, repairs to steampump material, used 1 set of valve stems for 6-foot by 4-foot by 6-foot pump, 1 set of medium rubber valves, 1 set of valve springs, 1 set of valve covers, 1 set of brass valves, 1 set of springs and stems. Time: One day's labor. Repaired and placed in good condition the entire slate and tin roof of prison. Overhauled and repaired steam plant. Repaired leaks in tank coil, breaking out old exhaust connections to pump and vapor pipes to tank and receiver, inserted 2 ½-inch tees and valves in exhaust main for bypasses, made new high-pressure steam connections to pump, made new vapor pipe connections to blow off tank and to drip receiver; put tee connections in drip line, connected 2 new exhaust drips, put new automatic steam valve on drip receiver, made new connections to drip pump, changed lubricator connections and repaired leaks in steamlines in ten-day house. Material used: 1 automatic steam valve complete, 1 piece of 2½-inch steampipe 3 feet 3½ inches long with thread, 2 ½-inch steam tees, 2 ½-inch by 1-inch tees, 1 ½-inch by 2-inch by 2½-inch tee, 1 ½-inch by 2½-inch by 2½-inch tee, 1 ½-inch by 90-degree ell, 1 ½-inch by 45-degree ell, 1 ½-inch by 6-inch nipple, 1 ½-inch by 5-inch nipple, 3 ½-inch by 4-inch nipples, 3 ½-inch close nipples, 1 ½-inch flange union, 1 ½-inch by 1-inch by 1½-inch tee, 4 ½-inch ell, 2 ½-inch nipples, 1 2-inch by 1½-inch bushings, 2 ½-inch gate valves, 3 ½-inch by 45-degree ell, 14 feet of ½-inch pipe, 2 1-inch by ½-inch bushings, 6 ½-inch by 90-degree ell, 4 ½-inch by 45-degree ell, 6 ½-inch nipples. Time: 8½ days' labor of Steamfitter and Helper. Furnished and put in 2 new "Jenkin's" swinging check valves and repaired steam leaks. Material used: 2 ½-inch "Jenkin's" swinging check valves, 6 ½-inch close brass nipples, 1 day's labor for Steamfitter and Helper.

Furnished and put on gas brackets on stair landing to cell in male prison and in half between male and female prison, furnished brackets to replace eight stiff brackets for 2 capped outlets; furnished and put on gas brackets on top tier; cleaned out gas piping in male and female prison, removing same from wall and cleaning same, replacing and fastening same back to wall. Material used: 18 heavy gas brackets complete, 12 2-inch straps and screws, 15 ½-inch straps and screws, 24 ½-inch pipe hooks, 5 feet of ½-inch black pipe, 1 ½-inch union, 1 ½-inch drop elbow. Time: 5 days' labor, Plumber and Helper.

At Fourth District Prison, by paid labor, overhauled plumbing fixtures and repaired flushometer water closets in four cells, cleaned waste from washbasin, put on new stoppers and chains to basins. Material used: 2 nickel plated handles for flushometer, 14 washbasin stoppers and chains. Time: 1 day's labor, Plumber and Helper. Repairing main gate, repairing steel bar for hanging bed in cell on first tier. By unpaid labor. Put in 1 ½-inch brass faucet on sink in prison kitchen.

At Fifth District Prison, by paid labor, overhauled pumping engine and furnished the necessary repairs and labor in connection thereto. Material used: 1 set of pump links and pins, 1 crankpin, 1 set of piston packing, 1 set of valves, 2 springs, 2 side-rod bolts, 4 burners, 1 set screws, 1 pump piston rod, 1 pump piston gland, 1 pump piston follower, 1 bracket, 1 gallon of oil and can, 1 nipple and tube, 1 set of pump joints. Time: 2 days. Machinist and Helper. Repaired open seams and leaks and furnished

the necessary material to copper roof to prevent overflow from roof tank from dripping into prison. Time to make repairs: 1½ days, Plumber and Helper.

Miscellaneous Work.

At Fifth District Prison, by paid labor, 2 halters repaired, lines repaired, made 4 new clips on traces, made 3 new trace bearers with buckles, made 2 hame straps, put on piece on side strap, repaired 2 bridlees, 3 traces, saddle and bellyband.

Painters and Kalsominers.

At Second District Prison, painting and renovating the entire prison such as office rooms, cells, stairways, corridors and Keepers' and Matrons' rooms. Material used: 1,000 pounds white lead, 20 gallons raw oil, 20 gallons turpentine, 10 gallons liquid dryers, 5 gallons enamoline, 50 pounds umber, 30 pounds chrome green, 20 pounds Prussian blue, 10 pounds Indian red, 10 pounds drop black in oil, 10 pounds yellow ochre in oil, 2 flat wall brushes, 4 round pound brushes and 6 sash brushes.

At Third District Prison, painting and touching up all the necessary parts of prison and using the following material: 3 gallons enamoline, 25 pounds white lead, 3 gallons raw oil, 1 gallon liquid dryer and 3 gallons asphaltum.

At Fourth District Prison, painted kitchen and whitewashed ceiling in all cells of male prison. Material used: 50 pounds white lead, 2 gallons turpentine, ½ gallon raw oil, 1 pint liquid dryers, 1 pound brush, repaired brick wall in women dormitory, 100 bricks, ½ barrel Portland cement, 2 bags sand; whitewashing walls in yard, 1 barrel of finishing lime, 5 pounds calc. glue, 2 whitewash brushes and 5 pounds ult. mar. blue.

At Fifth District Prison, painting and touching up all the necessary parts of prison, also graining and varnishing all the office furniture and cabinets. Material used: 50 pounds white lead, 5 gallons raw oil, 3 gallons turpentine, 6 pounds burnt umber, 3 pounds burnt sienna, 5 gallons of Valentine inside varnish, 5 pounds aluminum paint, 1 varnish brushes, 4 sash tools, 1 flat wall brush, ½ gallon dryers and 5 pounds yellow ochre.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered of the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cooking, laundering and other utility work done in all the prisons by unpaid prison help.

Tinsmiths and Roofers.

Made 534 water cups, 206 coffee cups, 16 water cans, 100 medicine cups, 5 dust pans, 10 dippers, 2 wash basins, 16 cuspidors, 5 drip pans (assorted sizes), 10 hash ladles with handles, 10 paint cans, 1 medicine tray, 3 one-quart sauce pans, 2 coal

scuttles, 2 ash pens, 3 galvanized iron boxes, new leaders for west prison, south shop, new bakery, administration building and mess hall; smoke stack with hood for new kitchen, 1 forge for stone shed, 64 iron braces for summer house, 4 iron braces for flag pole, 1 water cooler for female prison, 2 stands and fittings for smoothing irons, 5 boilers for prisoners' kitchen, 3,300 square feet of new roofing for mess hall and bakery, ventilating pipe in prisoners' kitchen, smoke stack for stone shed.

Repairs to copper kettle, prisoners' kitchen; to roofs on old, west, south and new prisons, Keeper's kitchen, photo gallery, storehouse, and Warden's residence; cleaned gutters in old, west, south and new prisons; painted roofs on old, west, south and new prisons and Keeper's kitchen.

Plumbers and Iron Workers.

Put new pipes in broom shop; put new cistern toilet in Keeper's dining room; put new plumbing in Warden's residence; made new trap for Keeper's kitchen; covered trap doors over steam pipes at laundry.

Repaired plumbing in prisons, hospitals, laundry, administration building, Warden's residence, Head Keeper's apartments, Keeper's and Matron's quarters, and mess hall; water pipe at new bucket grounds; ventilators in prisons, hospitals and laundry; heater pipe, furnace and water mains at Warden's residence; railings at guard house, water pipes at quarry, sinks in Keeper's kitchen, lamps for steamboats, locks and levers in prisons, seats in mess hall, gas fixtures in Keeper's dining room and Warden's residence.

Stone Shed and Quarry.

Stone Shed—Cut 89 square feet base, 1,198 square feet ashlar, 227 square feet corner, 139 square feet lintels, 100 square feet sills, 173 square feet jambs; making a total of 1,926 square feet stone cut.

Quarry—Quarrying stone.

Carpenters and Builders.

Made 12 bucket covers, 14 boxes for boathouse, 5 dipper handles for prisoners' kitchen, 44 bread peals for bakery, 6 boxes for photo gallery, 1 spoon box for mess hall, 2 closets and 4 doors for Head Keeper's apartments, 10 tables for Keeper's dining room, 2 clothes poles for laundry, 1 table top for bakery, 1 box for engine room, 4 kneeling stools for chapel, 8 benches for bucket tubs, 3 tables for Warden's residence, 2 screens for hospital, 31 rule and regulation boards for prisons, all carpenter work in new storehouse and Keeper's kitchen completed.

Built new hen house on Warden's grounds, 2 steps (20 feet long) at new storehouse, 1 summer house on lawn in front of administration building, 180 feet new fence at Warden's residence.

Repaired chairs for Head Keeper's apartments, female prison and administration building; ice boxes at Warden's residence and mess hall; screens at Warden's residence; wash tubs and fence at laundry; benches on lawn; stands, chairs and seats in chapel; veranda at Warden's residence; flooring in Head Keeper's apartment and female prison; 24 boxes for bakery.

Bakery.

Baked 782,418 pounds of bread.

Painters and Glaziers.

Painted doors, windows, veranda and wood work at Warden's residence; ceilings, doors, wood work and front of bath house; railings around guard house; closets, walls, spoon box and benches in mess hall; interior of new storehouse and Keeper's dining room; screens in Keeper's dining room and hospital; fence, hen house, tables and flower pots at Warden's residence; new summer house on lawn; stools and chairs in chapel; smoke stack and all iron work at new bakery; storm doors, administration building and female prison; walls in old, west, south and female prisons; put new window glass in windows of Warden's residence, Head Keeper's apartments, administration building, mess hall, prisons and Keeper's quarters.

Masons.

Built 18 brick arches on new bakery ovens, size 16 feet by 4 feet 10 inches; 2 rings of brick; 18 brick arches on new bakery ovens, size 14 feet by 4 feet 10 inches; 2 rings of brick.

Plastered 18 arches on new storehouse, 22 feet by 4 feet 10 inches; room in new storehouse, size 12 feet by 10 feet by 11 feet; hallway (side walls and ceilings) in new storehouse, 9 by 12 feet.

Built new brick forge in stone shed, size 4 feet by 6 feet by 5 feet; stone retaining wall leading to industrial shops, size 18 inches by 31 feet by 3 feet; catch basin, 3 feet by 4 feet by 3 feet, on south side of new dining room.

Kalsomined side walls and ceilings in old, west, boys' and female prisons; also ceiling of north wing.

Disconnected sink in Warden's apartment.

Wheelwright Shop.

Made 2 lumber rollers and 2 poles for Workhouse dock, one 30-foot and one 40-foot ladder for New York Penitentiary, 1 top wagon for Rikers Island, 1 ox cart for Harts Island.

Repaired hand truck for steamer "Minnahannock," plow, coal cart, truck shaft, rung on lumber truck, wagon shaft, sprinkling truck, meat truck, water truck, Guard boat, stepladder, 13 axlebeds, 1 sprinkling wagon, 1 Gardener's wagon, 2 coal carts, 5 wheels, tailboard of coal cart.

Blacksmith Shop.

Made 3 fire hoses, 12 leader hooks, 24 "S" hooks, 86 hooks, 2 hooks and eyes for flagpole, 300 awning hooks, 61 hangers, 2 eye bolts, 121 bolts, 12 new chisels and drills, handle for coal cart, 8 legs for coal cart, 2 pins and rings for icebox, 4 plates 3 feet 2 inches by 5/8 inch for engine room, 1 sewer grate, 2 handles for butcher cart, 2 handles for coal cart, 1 axle, 54 flat and 90 round iron bars for tin shop windows, 2 sliding bolts, 3 plates for locks, 2 plates on ladder, 2 plates on meat hanger, 3 plates for kitchen range, 2 hinges, 18 staples, 13 bars, 2 band irons, 5 stays, 8 anchors, 22 strap irons, 6 holdfasts, 2 round bars for engine room, 6 angle irons.

Tin Shop.

Made cornice for tin shop, leader; for tin shop, 2 ventilators for tin shop, 2 ventilators for laundry, 300 mess pans, 300 mess cups, 300 dustpans, 6 water cans.

Tinned roof of new tin shop, windows of storehouse, roof of new boathouse.

RIKERS ISLAND.

Hon. JNO. V. COGGEY, Commissioner:

Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit to you the quarterly report of Rikers Island Branch Workhouse for the quarter ending June 30, 1908.

The census on March 31, 1908, was 253 male prisoners. During the quarter 163 prisoners received from the Workhouse, and 282 prisoners were sent down to the Workhouse, Blackwells Island, leaving on June 30, 1908, a census of 134 male prisoners.

The prisoners have been constantly employed during the quarter just ending and their health has been excellent.

By prisoners employed at out of door labor, 3 barges of ashes from the Penitentiary have been unloaded, 1,500 cubic yards of earth have been removed from bank and used to bank sea wall, now in course of construction; and in doing this made 1/6 acre of new ground, 22 yards of sea wall was made; the measurement of same being 14 feet at base, 12 feet across top and 6 feet in height. The road is 680 feet long, 25 feet wide and 4 inches deep of broken stone.

A large number of our men are employed on the farm, ploughing, spreading manure, sowing seeds, weeding, hoeing, cutting grass, mowing and raking the lawns, &c. Some large rock was removed from undersoil on farm by drilling holes in it, and a portion of it has been used in building sea wall.

Masons have built 55 brick piers in the cellar of the church, mess hall, carpenter shop and dormitories 1, 2 and 3. Used in building same, 11,320 brick and 9 barrels of Portland cement.

Shoemakers repaired 130 pairs of prisoners' shoes.

Blacksmiths repaired carts (5), repaired 12 iron forks, 1 shovel, made 1 hanger for launch, reel repaired for farm, made 18 iron wedges for stone driller's gang, butcher cleaver repaired, 1 chain repaired, 1 crowbar repaired, made 1 hasp and 2 staples, made crank handles for grindstone, 1 seed planter repaired, 17 iron cot frames repaired, tools cleaned for launch, 5 oak locks filed down and repaired, made 70 drills for sea wall gang, 2 dozen plugs and feathers, made 1 cold chisel, 1 covered wagon shaft, 1 pair of tongs, 4 dozen points for sea wall, 4 lawn mowers repaired, 4 garden hose repaired, cultivator repaired, repairs to davits to suspend row boats, made 10 sets of shoes for farm horses and shod them, removed and repaired 12 sets of shoes on farm horses, used in repairing cot frames and carts 90 pounds of iron, coal used by Blacksmiths, 2 tons.

Tinsmiths repaired roof of dark cells, repaired roof of Hospital building, Church building, Dormitories 1 and 3, repaired and soldered 62 kettles, repaired 1 galvanized boiler, repaired ventilator tops in Dormitories 1, 2 and 3, repaired 3 kitchen ranges and placed grates and firebrick in same, repaired sprinklers on spray in shower bath of Dormitories 1 and 2, repaired leak in trap in wash basin of Dormitory 1, made 8 new galvanized leaders and placed them on Prison buildings, using 12 sheets galvanized iron, 2 pounds galvanized rivets, 6 pounds of solder. For general use, 1 box tin, 10 pounds of solder, 10 bags of charcoal were used.

Carpenters repaired corner of stable and stalls using 120 feet of lumber and 3 pounds of nails; hanging 5 window shades in Keepers' dining room and repairing flooring, made 3 new door sashes, using 20 feet of lumber; made lamp-post 8 feet high; made new plough-beam 5 feet 6 inches, oak; repaired lattice work on porch of Keepers' quarters; made 4 pump handles and blocks for use in pumping water from ash scow; made six cuspidors for Dormitories 1 and 2; made six (6) oak handles for sledge hammers and 60 handles for hammers used in stone breaking; repaired 60 wheelbarrows; repaired ice box; repaired 6 toilet seats in dormitories; caned and repaired 45 chairs; repaired 16 window blinds in Keepers' quarters; made 11 screen doors and 79 screen frames for windows, using white pine lumber, 640 feet, and 700 feet of wire screening; made 27 window frames for church windows; used in mosquito netting, 21 yards, and 200 feet of lumber, 12 packages of carpet tacks and 6 pounds of wire nails.

Painters painted office and building connected on the outside including roof of same; also the inside of office of said building; painted Keepers' quarters inside and outside, also roof of same; painted hospital building outside and 14 rooms inside; painted Boatman's house inside and outside, also roof of same; painted mess hall inside, also the Keepers' dining room and kitchen; painted prisoners' kitchen inside and outside; painted Dormitory No. 1 inside including bath room; painted Dormitories Nos. 2 and 3 inside, also wash room; painted the 6 dark cells on outside. Used on the above as follows: White lead, 2,150 pounds; oil, 2 barrels; turpentine, 1 barrel; drop black, 30 pounds; emerald green, 5 pounds; vermilion red, 15 pounds; shellac, 1 gallon; Japan dryer, 3 gallons; metallic paint, 1 barrel.

Street Cleaning Department.

The extension of the wall at southerly end of the Island is 100 feet long, 6 feet wide at base, 3 feet at top and 5 feet high.

The extension of the wall at northwest end of the Island is 80 feet long, 6 feet wide, 5 feet high and 3 feet at top.

Owing to the extensive plumbing contract which is now under way in the male prison, and the awaiting of the awarding of contracts which provide for large alterations and improvements in this building, we have not been able to accomplish much other than to attend to the daily routine of cleaning and repairs.

Much the same is to be said of the female prison, as the new prison for this class has reached that point that we have been expecting the taking down of the old structure from week to week, and have only directed our efforts to the cleaning and daily repairs.

The female prisoners have been engaged daily in scrubbing in and about the administration building and washing and ironing in laundry of prison.

Work accomplished by Carpenter during past quarter: Erecting 4 stalls for horses at stable, making 10 benches for use in male prison, erecting in prison clothes room 15 boxes for prisoners' clothes, repairing and relaying floor of large platform scale, repairing window sashes, furniture, chairs, etc.

Painting done during past quarter, painting and regilding altar for Catholic and Protestant chapel, painting bridge connecting female prison and administration building, painting and repairing roof of kitchen and boiler house, whitewashing cellar of male prison and east wall of yard, cutting out joints and pointing up east wall of yard with Portland cement.

All of above work performed by unpaid prison labor.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, number received, discharged and disposed of, the amount of fines received from Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, which have been paid monthly to the City Chamberlain, as the law requires.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks
