Deputy and Acting Comptroller—Recommending Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$766.66, for Rent of Rooms in Temple Court Building Annex for Use of the Public Administrator of the County of New York.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York:

Gentlemen—On May 4, 1916, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted
a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay rent to the Temple Court Company,
Agents, Ruland & Whiting Company, No. 5 Beekman Street, Borough of Manhattan,
for use of Rooms 1025 to 1031 inclusive, in the Temple Court Building (Annex), 119
Nassau Street, Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Public Administrator of the

Deputy and Acting Comptroller—Recommending Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$900, for Rent of Rooms at No. 2 Rector Street for Use as Headquarters by the Naval Militia.

Gentlemen—On January 25, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to pay to Edward D. President of the Borough of Queens—Requesting Issue of Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,540, for the Purchase and Installation of an Automatic Blue Printing Machine.

Gentlemen—In accordance with the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, I hereby request your approval of the issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the extent of one thousand five hundred and forty dollars (\$1,540), to provide for the purchase and installation of an automatic blue printing machine.

There was installed several years ago such a machine in the Topographical Bureau of this department, but it has become in such condition of disrepair as to require almost a complete reconstruction in order to render it useful and it is my judgment that the purchase of a new machine of a modern type would be to the best interest of the City.

The request for such installation was made in the departmental estimate for 1917 but the provision therefore was not recommended at the time by the Budget Committee.

Commissioner of Accounts—Report Upon an Examination of the Chamberlain's Accounts for the Year Ending December 31, 1916.

City of New York, Office of the Commissioner of Accounts, Municipal Building, February 28, 1917.

Dear Sir—By direction of Commissioner Wallstein, I am forwarding herewith, pursuant to the provisions of section 195 of the Charter, the report of the Commissioner of Accounts on an examination of the receipts and disbursements of the office of the Chamberlain for the year ended December 31, 1916.

Subject: Report upon an Examination of the Chamberlain's Accounts for the year ending December 31, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and the Honorable Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—Section 195 of the Charter reads as follows:

"* * * The accounts of the chamberlain shall be annually closed on the last day of December, and shall be examined in the month of January in each year by the commissioner of accounts. Such commissioner shall examine the accounts and vouchers of all moneys received into and paid out of the city treasury during the year ending on the last day of December next preceding such examination, and shall certify and report to the mayor and board of aldermen in the following month of February the amount of moneys received into the treasury during such year, the amount of moneys paid out during the same period by virtue of warrants drawn on the treasury by the comptroller, the amounts of moneys received by the chamberlain, who shall be in office at the time of such examination, if he entered upon the execution of his duties since the last preceding report; the balance in the treasury on the last day of December preceding such examination, the amount of moneys borrowed for or on the credit of the city during such year and the amount of the bonds of the city issued during such year, with the purposes for which and the authority under which such bonds were issued. Such commissioner shall also compare the warrants drawn by the comptroller on the treasury during the year ending on the last day of December preceding such examination, with the several laws and ordinances under which the same shall purport to have been drawn, and shall in like manner certify and report whether the comptroller had power to draw such warrants; and if any shall be found which, in his opinion, he had no power to draw, he shall specify the same in his report, with his reasons for such opinion."

The great volume of detail comprehended in an examination and comparison of the vouchers and warrants issued and paid in the course of the calendar year, if sought to be completed in the month of January following, as prescribed, would require the concentration of a much larger force of assistants than could be spared for this work at one time, without seriously affecting other examinations and investigations. In practice, therefore, the examination provided for in the above quoted section of the Charter is continuous throughout the year, six accountants and seven clerks being assigned thereto. During the examination of the period under review, 148,240 warrants and approximately the same number of vouchers were inspected.

Certification.

I hereby certify that all warrants paid in the year 1916, together with the supporting vouchers thereof, have been examined; that it appears the Comptroller was duly authorized by the several laws and ordinances to draw the warrants examined and none was found which was improperly drawn. The accounts of the City Chamberlain for the year 1916 of the moneys received into and paid out of the City Treasury have also been examined.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen—A communication from the State Bureau of Municipal Information of the New York State Conference of Mayors and Other City Officials was presented at the meeting of your board of January 19th and referred to the Comptroller. It suggested the advisability of making financial arrangements for this city's contribution to the association for the year 1917.

The conferences of mayors have proved of much value and the Bureau of Municipal Information is meeting in many ways the demand for a general depository and clearing house of municipal information. It makes researches on a great variety of questions and saves much time and duplication of inquiries and replies on the part of the officials of the associated cities. It follows the progress of legislative bills, but refrains from advocacy of any particular course with reference to these or other matters, confining itself to the presentation of facts and figures. All the large cities of the state and very many of the smaller ones are affiliated. Chapter 215 of the laws of 1916 authorized any city of New York State to make appropriations for this specific purpose from the proceeds of taxation. The contribution for first class cities is five hundred dollars.

It is advised that this city's membership of the last two years be continued in 1917 and that steps be taken to provide funds by the adoption of the attached resolution. Respectfully submitted, WM. A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller.

Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Bureau of Personal Service, February 21, 1917.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On January 26, 1917, the BOROUGH PRESIDENT OF MANHATTAN requested increase in wages for Marble Setters' Helpers from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per diem. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"A copy of an agreement between the Marble Industry Employers' Association and the Compact Labor Club, consisting of Helpers, Riggers or Derrickmen and Crane Operators, associated with the Bricklayers' Union, is submitted. A joint committee of seven employers and eight workmen signed the agreement, which was approved December 20, 1916. Substantially all employers in the marble industry are members of the Association.

"A member of the committee of employers who signed the agreement stated that the rate of \$3.50 per diem has been paid to Marble Setters' Helpers in Greater New York since January 1, 1917.

"The annual cost to the City for the increase requested of 25 cents per diem would be \$75.75. The one Marble Setter's Helper in the City employ is in the Office of the President, Borough of Manhattan."

In view of the above facts, we recommend that the attached resolutions approving the \$3.50 per diem rate for Marble Setters' Helpers, and requesting the head of the City department to provide for the increase, be adopted. Respectfully,

An Ordinance to Amend Section 18 of Article 2 of Chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Traffic Regulations.

By Aldermen Colne and Friedlander—

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 18 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to traffic regulations.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph b of subdivision 1 of section 18 of article 2 of chapter 24 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to traffic regulations, is hereby amended to read as follows:

b. At all points where a "School Stop" sign is exhibited, between the hours of 8 a. m. and 9 a. m., 12 noon and 1 p. m., and 3 p. m. and 5 p. m., except on Saturdays, Sundays and legal holidays and during the period from July 1 to September 1, inclusive. Each borough president is hereby authorized to erect signs, bearing the words "School Stop," on each side of streets within his jurisdiction which intersect or meet the street on which a public school is located, within 500 feet from such intersecting or meeting street [...] and also, within his discretion, where the needs require the same, each borough president may erect such signs near private schools. Such signs may be placed on lamp posts, street sign posts, trolley poles, trolley span wires, or other available supports, or, in the absence of any such existing structure, on such new supports as he may find necessary.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Whereas, Section 522 of the Charter provides that "The gas manufactured, furnished or sold shall be tested with reference to illuminating power, pressure and purity, in a suitable manner and by proper apparatus, at least once a day," and

Whereas, The consumer is compelled to pay exorbitant bills due to these fast meters, and

Whereas, The Public Service Commission Law gives the Commission very broad powers with respect to the supervision of gas and electric companies, and

Whereas, There is a great deal of difference of opinion as to whether the Public Service Commission has not the right to state just what amount of damages must be returned to consumers when meters are shown to be fast; therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Board request the Public Service Commission to hold a public hearing on this matter, so that all the facts may be brought to their attention to determine whether the gas sold to the public conforms to the established standard of illuminating power and purity and to find out how much money should be returned to consumers in excess of the amount actually due the gas company.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 1, section 44, article 4, chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Dealers in Second-Hand Articles, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 44. Restrictions.

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license [nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired,] except that any dealer in old clothes shall have the right to purchase old clothes from house to house, and if he has no store, his home shall be designated as his place of business; but no such dealer shall purchase clothes from a person or persons on the streets, nor except as herein provided purchase and deal in second-hand clothing and other articles in public places not licensed as second-hand business places; and such dealer of old clothes while soliciting business from house to house shall wear a badge to be supplied by the Commissioner of Licenses in such form and design as the Commissioner of Licenses shall prescribe. No dealer in second-hand articles shall continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Article 9, Chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Junk Dealers.

By Alderman Williams—

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 9, chapter 14, of the Code of Ordinances relating to Junk Dealers.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Article 9 of chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE 9.

Junk dealers.

Section 120. Definitions.

- 121. License fee and bond; term.
- 122. Restrictions.
- 123. Record of purchases.
- 124. Reports to the police department.
- 125. Lost or stolen goods.
- 126. Violations.

Section 120. Definitions.

1. Junkman, junkshop, junk cartman, junk boatman. Any one dealing in the purchase or sale of junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, [or] lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, in large or small quantities, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall be deemed to be a junk dealer and his place of business a junk shop.

2. Junk cart, junk boat. Any vehicle in the streets, or any vessel in the waters of the city, used for the purpose of collecting or selling junk, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, tin, lead, rubber, paper, rags, bagging, slush or empty bottles, shall be deemed, respectively, a junk cart or junk boat, [and] every junk cart or junk boat shall show on each outside thereof the words "Junk Cart" or "Junk Boat" together with the figures of its official number, which] and the owner or owners thereof junk dealers. Any vehicle used for the purpose of collecting or selling any article or articles hereinbefore enumerated shall be furnished, by the Department of Licenses, with a plate, to be affixed to a conspicuous and indispensable part of the vehicle, on which plate shall be clearly set forth the official number of the junk cart with the words "Junk Cart" and the date of expiration of the license, and the design or color of this plate shall be changed at the beginning of each license year, and in the case of a junk boat, the words "Junk Boat" and the figures of the official number thereof shall be painted in white letters and figures respectively at least twelve inches high and two inches wide on a black background on the stern and also on both the port and starboard sides of the boat, at the forward end thereof; and no person shall do such collecting or selling in any other way or manner than as aforesaid. In the case of a junk boat there shall be but one person on the boat engaged in the collecting or selling of any article or articles hereinabove enumerated.

Section 121. License fee and bond; term.

Every junk dealer shall pay an annual license fee of \$20 and give a bond to the City, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the penal sum of \$250, conditioned for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers, excepting in the case of a junk dealer operating a junk boat, who shall furnish for each junk boat so operated, a bond, with sufficient surety approved by the commissioner of licenses, in the sum of \$1,000 conditioned for the due observance of all provisions of law and municipal ordinances relating to such dealers. Each [junk cart or junk boat] junk dealer operating one or more junk carts or junk boats, shall pay an annual license fee of \$5 for each horse-drawn or power vehicle or for each boat, and an annual license fee of \$2 for each push cart.

All junk dealers' licenses, including junk cartmen [carts] and junk boatmen [boats], shall be issued as of November 1, and shall expire on the 31st day of October next succeeding the date of issuance thereof.

Section 122. Restrictions.

1. Place. No junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall carry on business at any other place than the one designated in the license therefor, which place of business shall be within the limits of The City of New York, nor shall he continue to carry on business after such license has been suspended or revoked, or has expired.

2. Purchases. No junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall purchase any goods, article or thing whatsoever from any minor, apprentice or servant, knowing or having reason to believe the seller to be such, nor from any person between [the setting of the sun] the hours of 6 p. m. and 7 a. m. [o'clock in the morning.]

3. Sales by dealers. No article or articles hereinabove enumerated, except old iron purchased in lots of one thousand pounds or over, old paper and old rags, shall be sold or disposed of by a junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, until the expiration of 72 hours after such purchase or receipt.

4. Prohibition as to second hand dealers. No person, firm or corporation licensed as a second hand dealer shall deal in the purchase or sale of any article or articles enumerated in section 120 hereof, or employ or use a cart, wagon, boat or other vehicle for the purpose of collecting any such things or materials.

5. Other business. No one licensed as a junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall be licensed as a pawnbroker or dealer in second hand articles in the city.

6. No licensed junk dealer, including junk boatmen and junk cartmen, shall purchase or sell any new goods.

Section 123. Record of purchases.

Every junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, shall keep, at his place of business, which place shall be within the limits of The City of New York, a book in which shall be legibly written, in English, at the time of every purchase or sale, a description of every article so purchased or sold, the name, residence and

general description of the person or persons from whom such purchase was made or to whom such sale was made, the day and hour of such purchase or sale, and, when the purchase consists of articles from a scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, the name of such scow, coal-boat, lighter, tug or other vessel, and the name and residence of the owner thereof; and such book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of any police officer, or the mayor, the commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or person duly authorized in writing, for such purpose, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to the dealer.

Section 124. Reports to the police department.

Every junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, upon being served with a written notice so to do by a member of the police department, shall report to the police commissioner, on blank forms to be furnished by the police department, an accurate description of all goods, articles or things purchased or received in the course of business of the junk dealer during the days specified in such notice, stating the amount paid for, and the name, residence and general description of the person from whom such goods, articles or things were received.

Section 125. Lost or stolen goods.

If any goods, articles or thing whatsoever, shall be advertised in any newspaper printed in the city as having been lost or stolen, and if the same or any such answering to the description advertised or any part [or portion] thereof, shall be or come into the possession of any junk dealer, including junk cartmen and junk boatmen, [he] such dealer, upon receiving written, printed or oral notice so to do, shall give information thereof in writing to the police commissioner, [and state] stating from whom the same was received. Every junk dealer, as aforesaid, who shall have or receive any goods, article or thing lost or stolen, or alleged or supposed to have been lost or stolen, shall exhibit the same, on demand, to any police officer, or to the mayor, commissioner or any inspector of licenses, or any magistrate, or any person duly authorized in writing, by the commissioner or any magistrate, who shall exhibit such authorization to such dealer.

Section 126. Violations.

Any person who shall violate, or neglect, or refuse to comply with any of the provisions of this article, shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of not more than \$100, or by imprisonment not exceeding thirty days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

§2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Sirs—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health held February 27, 1917, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8 of section 188 of the amended Greater New York Charter, be and it is hereby respectfully petitioned to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to an amount not exceeding the sum of \$14,000, the proceeds whereof to be applied to provide personal service necessary to make sanitary inspections of all institutions in receipt of public funds, including the physical examination of inmates therein.

The reasons submitted to the Board of Health which resulted in this action, are the following:

There was recently inaugurated in the Department of Public Charities a Bureau of Institutional Inspection for the purpose of performing medical examinations and sanitary inspections in the institutions under its jurisdiction in addition to other duties such as, education, recreation and social needs of the inmates.

The original plan called for medical examinations and sanitary inspections by a medical staff under the immediate jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities. Inasmuch, however, as the Department of Health since 1916, has been making physical examinations once a year of the children in 84 private and public child-caring institutions, and further, as the functions of the Department of Health are clearly specified under the Public Health Law and the Sanitary Code, the necessity for the presence of physicians of the Department of Health at frequent intervals in these institutions, would, perhaps, indicate that the new institution service as contemplated by the Department of Public Charities, might be met by a similar or moderate increase in the staff of the Division of Institution Inspection of the Department of Health, and thus avoid conflict of medical authority and advice, and at the same time providing the Department of Public Charities with medical inspection of an amount and quality probably superior to what they could demand with their own medical service as proposed.

It was agreed, therefore, that the Department of Health should perform those phases of institution inspection work which referred to the medical examinations and sanitary inspections, leaving to the Department of Public Charities the service dealing with spiritual education, recreation, or social needs of the inmates in these institutions.

The number and character of the institutions which receive public monies, and therefore come under the service proposed, are the following:

A system of inspection to conform to the needs of the Department of Public Charities requires as a minimum 4 sanitary inspections of each institution yearly; 2 primary medical examinations of the inmates and 2 re-examinations of those individuals in whom physical defects have been discovered. This would require additional personal service to that allowed at present for the work as now performed by the Division of Institution Inspection in the Department of Health. The following force would be necessary:

7 Physicians at \$1,260 per annum (part time)..... \$8,820 00

2 Physicians at \$2,280 per annum (full time)..... 4,560 00

1 Clerk at \$600 per annum 600 00

\$13,980 00

For the technical character of the work, it would be impossible to secure medical inspectors for part time service for less than \$1,260 per annum; full time service is necessary for the inspections and examinations in the institutions outside the city limits, as the performance of this work precludes the possibility of undertaking any private practice. At the present time, the Department of Health has in its institution service 1 full time medical inspector at \$2,100, and it was difficult to secure this service even at this figure.

We request your consideration and attention for whatever action is necessary to make this resolution effective. Very truly yours,

In addition, every horse-drawn vehicle using the streets shall be provided with a suitable lock-brake or device whereby the wheels are properly locked when the vehicle is allowed to remain standing in any of the streets of the City.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on January 23, 1917 (Minutes, page 194), the annexed ordinance to amend section 6 of article 1 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to street fires, respectfully

REPORTS:

That this matter was submitted to the several Borough Presidents for their respective opinions, and it is generally conceded that the provisions as to fees is rather extreme.

The Committee feels that too great a tax burden is now upon the public and does not favor adding to that burden.

It, therefore, recommends the ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 6 of article 1 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to street fires.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 6 of article 1 of chapter 12 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

§6. Street fires; permits required.

No person shall kindle, build, maintain or use a fire upon or on any dock, pier or bulkhead; [n] or in or upon a street or vacant lot, without a permit from the fire commissioner. A permit, for a period not to exceed one year, to kindle, build, maintain and use a fire in or upon a [public] street for the purpose of conducting a trade or business may be issued by the fire commissioner upon an application giving such information as may be required by him, and upon receipt of a fee of \$2; except that no fee shall be required for permits issued for the kindling and maintaining of [such] fires for the sole purpose of destroying fallen leaves outside of the fire limits. A permit to kindle, build, maintain and use a fire within the fire limits for the burning of rubbish or fallen leaves may be issued upon the receipt of a fee of \$0.50 for each fire. Such a permit must be kept at all times at the location of the fire while the fire is burning. No permit shall be issued, however, to kindle, build, maintain or use a fire—

(a) Within 15 feet of a fire hydrant;

(b) Within 2 feet of the surface of any stone pavement;

(c) On, or within 2 feet of the surface of any asphalt pavement, except for the purpose of repairing, removing or constructing the same.

A fire kindled, built and maintained under a permit, issued in conformity with the provisions of this section, shall be continuously under the care and direction of a competent person from the time it is kindled until it is extinguished.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

That the Committee, being unable to agree as to the merits of this proposed ordinance, presents it to the Board without recommendation.

AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances relating to snow and ice.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 21 of article 3 of chapter 22 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

§21. Property owners' duties.

1. Must clear sidewalks.

Every owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground in the City, abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall, within 4 hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the deposit of any dirt or other material upon said sidewalk, remove the snow [and] ice, dirt or other material from the sidewalk and gutter, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in the above period of 4 hours; provided, however, that such removal shall in all cases be made before the removal of snow and ice from the roadway by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or by the Borough President of Queens or Richmond, or subject to the regulations of said Commissioner of Street Cleaning, or of said Borough President of Queens or Richmond, for the removal of snow, [and] or ice, dirt [and] or other material; except that in the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond any owner, lessee, tenant or occupant or other person who has charge of any ground abutting upon any paved street or public place, for a linear distance of 500 feet or more, shall be considered to have complied with this section, if such person shall have begun to remove the snow and ice from the sidewalk and gutter before the expiration of the said 4 hours, and shall continue and complete such removal within a reasonable time.

Whenever any owner, lessee, tenant, occupant or other person having charge of any building or lot of ground abutting upon any street or public place where the sidewalk is paved, shall fail to comply with the provisions of any ordinance of the City for the removal of snow [and] or ice, dirt, or other material from the sidewalk and gutter in the street, on the side of the street on which such building or lot abuts, the President of the Borough in which such building or vacant lot is located, may cause such removal to be made, meeting the expense thereof from any suitable street cleaning or highway fund, and thereafter the expense of such removal as to each particular lot of ground shall be ascertained and certified by the said Borough President to the Comptroller, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment may authorize such additional expenditures as may be required for the said removal of such ice [and] or snow, dirt or other material, to be repaid to the fund from which the payments were made, with proceeds from the issue and sale of revenue bonds which shall be sold by the Comptroller, as provided by law.

The said Borough President shall, as soon as possible, after the work is done, certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property.

The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of said expense, together with Three Dollars (\$3) penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain to be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the City of New York for the reduction of taxation.

Any person violating any provision or regulation hereof shall, upon conviction thereof by any City Magistrate, be fined for such offense not less than One Dollar (\$1) and not more than Three Dollars (\$3) or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare in Favor of Filing an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relating to Operators of Motion-Picture Machines.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on February 6, 1917 (Minutes, page 434), the annexed ordinance to amend Section 43 of Article 2

of Chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to operators of motion-picture machines, respectfully.

REPORTS:

That the committee believes that the present provision relating to operators of motion-picture machines are adequate and recommends the accompanying ordinance be placed on file.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 43 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to operators of motion-picture machines.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Section 43 of article 2 of chapter 3 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to "operators of motion-picture machines," is hereby amended to read as follows:

[§43. Operators of motion-picture machines.

1. Licenses required. No person shall operate any motion-picture apparatus or any connection thereof, unless he shall have been duly licensed as hereinafter provided. (Charter, § 529a.)

2. Application for license. Any person desiring to act as a motion-picture operator shall make application for a license as such to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, who shall furnish to each applicant blank forms of application which he shall fill out and file with the Commissioner. (Charter, § 529a.)

3. Examinations. The Commissioner shall make rules and regulations governing the examination of applicants and the issuance of licenses and certificates; provided that each applicant shall be given a practical examination, under the direction of the Commissioner. (Charter, § 529a.)

4. Issue of license and certificate. If, on such examination, the applicant is found to be competent to operate motion-picture apparatus and its connections, he shall receive the license for which he has applied, within six (6) days after his examination; which license shall continue in force for one (1) year from the date of issue, unless sooner revoked or suspended. With every license granted there shall be issued to the person obtaining such license a certificate, made by the Commissioner or such other officer as the Commissioner may designate, setting forth that the person named therein is duly authorized to operate motion-picture apparatus and its connections. (Charter, § 529a.)

5. Posting certificate. The certificate shall be displayed in a conspicuous place in the room in which the licensee operates a motion-picture apparatus and its connections. (Charter, § 529a.)

6. Discipline. The license and certificate may be revoked or suspended at any time by the Commissioner, in his discretion, for cause. (Charter, § 529a.)

7. Renewal of License. Every license, unless revoked or suspended, as herein provided, may, at the end of a year from the date of issue thereof, be renewed by the Commissioner in his discretion, upon application and with or without further examination, as he may direct, but every application for renewal of license must be made within thirty (30) days previous to the expiration of such license. (Charter, § 529a.)

8. Unlicensed Operators. No person, not licensed as provided in this section, shall be employed to operate or be permitted to operate any motion-picture apparatus, or any connections thereof in any motion-picture theatre, open-air motion-picture theatre or other place where motion-pictures are exhibited, to which the public is admitted, with or without charge for admission. (Charter, § 529a.)]

§ 43. Fees to be paid by applicants for a license to operate moving-picture apparatus.

1. Each applicant for a license to operate moving-picture apparatus and its connections shall at the time of his first application for an examination pay to the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity an examination fee of One Dollar (\$1.00), but no other or further examination fee shall be exacted. Upon the issuance of a license, there shall be paid an additional fee of Five Dollars (\$5.00), and upon each renewal of a license there shall be paid a further fee of One Dollar (\$1.00).

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to dealers in second-hand articles.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Paragraph 1, section 44, article 4, chapter 14 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to Dealers in Second-hand Articles, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§ 44. Restrictions.

1. Place, expired licenses. No dealer in second-hand articles shall carry on business without a license, or at any other place than the one designated in his license, [nor shall he continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired,] except that any dealer in old clothes shall have the right to purchase old clothes from house to house, and if he has no store, his home shall be designated as his place of business; but no such dealer shall purchase clothes from a person or persons on the streets, nor except as herein provided purchase and deal in second-hand clothing and other articles in public or other places not licensed as second-hand business places; and such dealer of old clothes while soliciting business from house to house shall wear a badge to be supplied by the Commissioner of Licenses in such form and design as the Commissioner of Licenses shall prescribe. No dealer in second-hand articles shall continue to carry on business after his license is suspended, revoked or shall have expired.

Report of the Committee on General Welfare Presenting Without Recommendation an Ordinance to Amend the Code of Ordinances Relating to Weights and Measures.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on February 6, 1917 (Minutes, page 455), the annexed ordinance to amend article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to weights and measures, respectfully,

REPORTS:

That, having considered this matter for some time and being unable to agree as to its merit, it presents the accompanying ordinance to the Board without recommendation.

AN ORDINANCE to amend article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to weights and measures.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 31 of article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to coal and coke, is hereby repealed in its entirety.

Sec. 2. Article 3 of chapter 26 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section 31, to read as follows:

§ 31. Coal.

1. To be sold by weight.

Coal shall be sold by avordupois weight, as hereinafter provided. A person, firm or corporation shall not attempt to sell or deliver less than two thousand pounds by weight to the ton of coal or a proper proportion thereof in quantities less than a ton and shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding \$50, provided that in all cases thirty pounds to a ton shall be allowed for the variation in scales and wastage.

2. Scales, designation of.

There shall be designated by the commissioner stationary scales, suitable for the purpose of weighing coal, the owners of which may tender the same for public use in different parts of the city in such number and locality as shall be deemed necessary, on which the coal, or the vehicle, with or without coal, may be weighed. The scales so designated shall be provided at the expense of the owners thereof, with test weights, and shall be subject at all times to the inspection and supervision of the commissioner or an inspector of weights and measures, who shall inspect such scales at least once in each month. Such scales shall also be provided by the owner thereof with a competent weighmaster. The owner of such scales shall be entitled to charge for weighing coal, and vehicles containing coal at such scales, a fee of not exceeding fifteen cents per ton; empty vehicles returning to such scale and after delivery of coal contained therein shall be reweighed without further charge.

3. Owner of scales to give bond.

The owner of such scales so designated shall enter into a bond with the city in which such scales are situated in the sum of five hundred dollars with two sufficient sureties, conditioned that such scales shall be kept in such condition as at all times to properly register the weight of coal and that the person weighing coal thereat shall perform his duties faithfully, and furnish like certificates to all persons having coal, or coal vehicles weighing at such scales. The amount of such bond shall be recoverable at the suit of the city on proof that any conditions thereof have not been complied with.

4. Delivery tickets.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation delivering coal to deliver, or cause to be delivered, any quantity or quantities of coal which shall have been sold by weight without each such delivery being accompanied by a delivery ticket and a duplicate thereof, on each of which shall be in ink, or other indelible substance, distinctly expressed in pounds, the quantity or quantities of coal contained in a car, wagon or other vehicle used in such delivery, with the name of the purchaser thereof and the name of the dealer from whom purchased. One of such tickets shall be delivered to the purchaser of the coal specified thereon and the other of such tickets shall be retained by the seller of the coal. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars.

5. Proviso as to delivery of entire cargo.

The preceding section shall not apply to coal delivered by the entire cargo direct from the vessel containing the same to one destination and accepted by the purchaser on the original bill of lading as proof of weight; but with every such delivery of an entire cargo of coal in the city there shall be delivered to the purchaser thereof one of the original bills of lading, issued by the person, firm or corporation by whom the coal was loaded into the vessel from which such coal is delivered to the purchaser of the entire cargo thereof, on each of which bills of lading there shall be in ink or other indelible substance distinctly expressed the date and place of loading such cargo and the number of pounds contained thereon. Any person, firm or corporation who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not exceeding fifty dollars.

6. Right of purchaser to have coal reweighed.

It shall be the right of every purchaser of coal before accepting delivery of same to have any of the delivery of such coal weighed at his expense at any of the scales designated under the provisions of the preceding sections, provided such scales are within one-half mile of the place of loading or the place of delivery of the coal, and for this purpose to require that any vehicle containing coal purchased by him shall be taken by the driver or other person in charge thereof to such scales for the purpose of having the same weighed, and after the delivery of the coal, to require that the vehicle from which such coal so purchased shall have been delivered shall be taken by the driver thereof, or any other person in charge thereof, to such scales to be weighed at the expense of the purchaser thereof and a certificate of the weight of such coal so weighed as aforesaid shall thereupon be furnished to the purchaser of such coal by the owners of scales by which such coal is so weighed.

7. Penalty for refusal to permit coal to be reweighed.

The refusal of any person, firm or corporation to permit coal purchased from him to be reweighed at the request of the purchaser thereof, as aforesaid, or an inspector of weights and measures, or any driver or other person in charge of a vehicle containing coal from which coal has been delivered, to take the same at the request of the purchaser or an inspector of weights and measures to such scales for the purpose of having the same weighed, and after the delivery of the coal, to require that the vehicle from which such coal so purchased shall have been delivered shall be taken by the driver thereof, or any other person in charge thereof, to such scales to be weighed at the expense of the purchaser thereof and a certificate of the weight of such coal so weighed as aforesaid shall thereupon be furnished to the purchaser of such coal by the owners of scales by which such coal is so weighed.

8. Penalty for fraudulent weighing.

Any owner of such scales or any agent or representative of his, or any weighmaster employed by him thereto who shall be concerned in any manner in any fraudulent weighing of coal at such scales, or false entry of such weighings, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of one hundred dollars.

9. Owner of scales to keep memorandum book.

Every owner of such scale shall keep a book in which shall be entered in ink a memorandum of every load of coal weighed at such scales showing the name of the person, firm or corporation delivering such coal, the net weight thereof, as shown by the delivery ticket thereof, of such person, firm or corporation, the name of the purchaser thereof, the gross and net weight of the coal so weighed and the date of weighing. Such book shall be the book of original entries and all certificates delivered by the owner of such scales shall be copies of the entries contained therein, and such book shall at all reasonable hours be open to the inspection of any citizen. Such book shall be furnished by the commissioner and when such book of entries is completed such book shall be delivered to the commissioner and filed as a public record.

10. Bills-of-lading; penalty for altering.

A person guilty of altering, with intent to defraud, any original bill of lading issued by the person, firm or corporation by whom the coal was loaded into the vessel in which such coal is transported or of uttering any such bill of lading so altered, or who is guilty of making, preparing or subscribing or uttering false or fraudulent manifest, invoice or bill of lading thereof, or removing any part of such cargo of coal without having the amount thereof certified to in writing on such original bill of lading, by the person, firm or corporation receiving the coal so removed, and by the captain of the vessel containing such cargo, shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of one hundred dollars.

11. Markings of bags and baskets.

All coal sold or offered for sale in baskets, bags or other receptacles used for the delivery of such coal must have the weight of the contents plainly marked on the outside thereof in solid roman capital letters at least one inch in height. Any person, firm or corporation delivering coal as aforesaid in violation of this section shall forfeit and pay for every such offense the sum of fifty dollars.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The movement in The City of New York for the reduction of the cost of living, called forth demands which you, as the Board of Aldermen, ought to take up.

The Mothers' Anti-High Price League through its committee, appeared before the Board of Estimate on February 23rd, and asked that the City appropriate the sum of \$1,000,000 or more for the purpose of establishing markets to sell food stuffs at cost. The Board of Estimate passed resolutions calling upon the State Legislature to amend the City Charter so that the City may be enabled to appropriate funds for the establishing of markets.

At the same time it appealed to Congress, and the President of these United States, that an appropriation be made by Congress to establish such stores which shall sell only to cities that will undertake to sell to its people at cost. A bill to that effect has been introduced. The Mothers' Anti-High Price League has also called upon Congress to direct by law the Interstate Commerce Commission to order freight carrying railroads of the country to give precedence to foods. A resolution to that effect has also been introduced in Congress.

We ask you to petition the bill to the Legislature, and immediately amend the Charter of The City of New York, and request the Governor to sign such bill forthwith, and also petition Congress to act favorably.

May we ask for furthermore to appoint a committee or committees to appear

before the State Legislature and the Congress of United States, urging the passage of these bills.






