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## MAYOR'S COMMITTEE ON LIBERTY LOAN.

### SUBSCRIPTIONS BY CITY AND COUNTY OFFICIALS AND EMPLOYEES.

#### STANDING OF THE CITY AND COUNTY DEPARTMENTS.

The figures below are based upon subscriptions and accompanying payments received up to 2 o'clock P. M. yesterday at the Comptroller's office, Room 851, Municipal Building, having been in first instance turned in to the heads of the respective departments and by them transmitted to the Comptroller, as the Chairman of the Mayor's Committee. The Comptroller files a summary statement daily with the Commissioner of Accounts, a Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Mayor's Committee, and the latter calculates the departmental scores upon the basis of the percentage of one \$50 bond to the total payroll of each department, as provided in the 1917 budget, thereby fixing the base figure for each department. In the interest of fairness the smaller boards, commissions, etc., have been grouped together for scoring purposes. Similarly certain county offices of each county have likewise been combined.

**Protest in the Matter of the Special Franchise Tax of the Pennsylvania Tunnel & Terminal Company, Payable May 1st, 1917.**

To the State Board of Tax Commissioners, the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York and the Receiver of Taxes of the City of New York:

Sirs—The undersigned, who under protest and duress hereby pays the sum of \$62,675.56, as a tax levied upon its special franchise, which has been assessed at \$3,059,100, which said tax and assessment are computed as follows:

Because the said Board of Tax Commissioners has included in its valuation of the special franchise of the undersigned the sum or sums, representing in the opinion of the said Board, the valuation of the intangible property of the undersigned, that such assessment is illegal and erroneous, that the railroad of the undersigned was not completed or in operation on the date of assessment and that the said intangible property can have no value until the railroad is completed and in operation.

2. Because the said assessment and valuation of the special franchise of the undersigned exceeds its full and true value as follows:

1. Because under section 48 of the Tax Law the undersigned, a corporation, is entitled to a credit on the tax roll for all sums paid the City by way of rental during the preceding year, as evidenced by the certificate of the City Chamberlain.

2. Because the Receiver of Taxes of the City of New York refuses to allow a credit for the sums so paid and so evidenced for the period of the preceding year, but has only allowed a credit for the sums paid by the undersigned by way of rental for a period of the preceding six months, to wit, the sum of \$24,318.38.

3. Because under section 48 of the Tax Law the undersigned is entitled to and should have been allowed a credit on the tax roll for all rentals paid to the City during the preceding year, as evidenced by the certificate of the City Chamberlain, to wit, the sum of \$48,636.76.

4. Because the said tax of \$307,294.50 is therefore illegal and excessive in the sum of \$24,318.38.

**Commissioner of Correction—Request for Authority to Purchase Men's Oak Outsoles Without Public Letting.**

Department of Correction of The City of New York, Commissioner's Office, Municipal Building, Centre and Chambers Streets, New York May 23, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I hereby respectfully request approval by your Honorable Board of an open market expenditure, without the formality of advertising, in the sum of \$5,225, for the purchase of 9,500 pairs of men's oak outsoles at 55 cents per pair.

As the price of leather is very high and the market unsettled at the present time, it will effect great economy if this approval is granted, not only saving the difference between 55 cents and the current price, which is 75 cents, but also the cost of advertising.

Our manufacturing industries are greatly in need of these soles, and the time required to solicit competitive bids will work a hardship on this Department by reducing the daily output of shoes that are so urgently needed by the inmates.

**Board of Education—Request for Special Revenue Bonds, \$1,200, to Defray Cost of Moving a Portable School Building.**

Dear Sir—I beg to advise you that at a meeting of the Board of Education held on May 23, 1917, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen be, and it is hereby, respectfully requested to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$1,200 for the purpose of defraying the cost of moving a portable school building from Public School 12 and one from Public School 36, The Bronx, to the yard of Public School 34, The Bronx, to provide accommodations made necessary by the abandonment on July 1, 1917, of a leased building now used as an annex to the last mentioned school, and of constructing a new exit from said yard to Victor street. **Board of Education—Answer to Resolution Respecting Summer Evening Schools.**

Department of Education, City of New York, Board of Education, Park Avenue and 59th Street, New York, May 24, 1917.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—I beg to transmit herewith certified copy of report and resolution adopted by the Board of Education at its meeting held on the 23d inst. discharging the Committee on Special Schools from the further consideration of the matter of extending the evening school activities during the period between the closing of the regular sessions in March and the opening of the term in October, as recommended by the Board of Aldermen, except the opening of summer evening schools for teaching English to foreigners for ten weeks during the months of June, July and August.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Special Schools respectfully reports that it has had under consideration a copy of a preamble and resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on May 8, 1917, based upon a communication from the Commissioner of Naturalization, United States Department of Labor, calling attention to the "absolute necessity of maintaining summer night school classes during the entire period of the summer months, between the closing and opening of the regular night classes," and recommending that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Education appropriate sufficient funds to enable "the summer night school classes to be maintained from the time of closing of regular night school classes in March until the opening of these classes in October."

Your Committee desires to call attention to the fact that last year a similar demand was made for the opening of summer evening schools. Such schools were opened in localities where the demand was especially great, and yet the attendance was so low that the opening of fifty per cent. of the classes organized proved to be unwarranted. The Committee therefore does not feel justified in recommending any extension of these activities during the period between the closing of the regular sessions in March and the opening of the fall term in October, except the opening of summer evening schools for teaching English to foreigners for ten weeks during the months of June, July and August.

There is submitted for adoption the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Committee on Special Schools be, and it is hereby, discharged from the further consideration of the matter mentioned in the foregoing report, and that the Board of Aldermen be notified of this action.

Hon. FRANK DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen, City Hall, New York:

Sir—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals have the honor to request the Board of Aldermen to authorize an issue of special revenue bonds in the sum of \$360,750 to meet the anticipated deficits in the appropriations for 1917, as follows:

The deficit is due to the inadequate appropriations granted to this department, the increased cost of supplies, and also the increase in the census. As the appropriations in these funds will be exhausted before the summer months are over, the Trustees request your Board to authorize the issue of the required funds before that time. A detailed statement is in course of preparation by the General Medical Superintendent for presentation to your Board. This request supersedes the application for special revenue bonds made under date of April 18, 1917, which is therefore withdrawn.

**Commissioner of Street Cleaning—Request for Authority to Purchase Repair Parts for Dumpers Without Public Letting.**

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Pursuant to section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, I respectfully request permission to purchase in the open market, without public letting, repair parts for Watson dumpers, consisting of springs, hinges, pole chains, loops for spreader bar for pole chain, eveners plates, front and rear axles, axle nuts, axle boxes, malleable iron parts, etc., the whole amounting to twenty-five hundred and thirteen dollars and twenty-five cents (\$2,513.25).

Upon investigation I find that these articles cannot be purchased in the open market except at a greatly increased cost over the bid of the Watson Wagon Company, who are the manufacturers of the dumping wagons to which these parts belong. The prices obtained from them are, to the best of my belief, fair and reasonable.

As these parts are necessary for the proper performance of the work of this department, I respectfully request that the same be given immediate consideration.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On February 2, 1917, the Children's Court requested an issue of special revenue bonds. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"Purpose—To provide for an issue of \$1,600 in special revenue bonds for the payment of two Stenographers at the rate of \$960 per annum, from March 1 to December 31, 1917.

"Reason—The Presiding Justice of the Children's Court requested in his Budget estimate for 1917 the establishment of three positions of Stenographer and Typewriter at \$960 per annum. It was proposed to provide for a sufficient stenographic force to take care of the numerous Probation Officers' reports in the Children's Courts. One of these Stenographers was to be detailed to the Borough of Manhattan, one to the Borough of Brooklyn and one to the circuit part of the Court. The Bureau of Personal Service at that time recommended the establishment of these three positions. The sub-committee and main committee on tax budget allowed but one.

"Finding—There is necessity for the establishment of the two additional positions at this time, owing to the fact that during the month of January the ten new Probation Officers which were allowed in the 1917 Budget were appointed, and for the reason that the Children's Court staff of Probation Officers recently took over a large amount of probation work in connection with improper guardianship cases which heretofore had been performed by the Children's Society."

Recommendation—In view of the above report the Committee recommends the establishment of the two positions as requested, and further recommends the transfer of the necessary amount of \$1,120 from Account No. 3039, General Accrual Fund to Account No. 2895, Salaries Regular Employees, Children's Court, in order to avoid an issue of special revenue bonds, as requested, and that the attached resolution be adopted. Gentlemen—On January 19, 1917, Defender Union No. 1, American Brotherhood of Blacksmiths and Helpers, requested increases of wages from \$4.50 for Blacksmiths and from \$3 for Blacksmiths' Helpers, paid at present in City departments. The Bureau of Personal Service reports thereon as follows:

"The approximate annual cost for increase in wages from \$4.50 to \$5 per diem for Blacksmiths and from \$3 to \$3.50 per diem for Blacksmiths' Helpers, based upon the wage schedules as of January 1, 1917, would be as follows:

"Mr. H. C. Hunter, Secretary of the Metal Trades Association, exhibited reports from seventeen large shops, ten of which are marine concerns, showing rates paid to Blacksmiths and Blacksmiths' Helpers. A total of 116 Blacksmiths and 151 Helpers are employed in those shops. The rates paid the Blacksmiths range from \$3.25 to \$6.50 per diem and the Helpers \$2.25 to \$3.50. The majority are on marine work. The men are employed on an hourly basis. Overtime is paid at double the hourly rates. There is no overtime in City employ.

"Other employers of Blacksmiths stated as follows:

"Thomas Watson & Sons, Thirty-fifth street, Manhattan—

"We pay \$6 a day to a first fire Blacksmith; \$4.50 to two others. Helpers are paid \$3 and \$3.25. We employ three Blacksmiths and three Helpers."

"Glasgow Iron Works, West street, Manhattan—

"We employ three Blacksmiths and three Blacksmiths' Helpers. We pay the Blacksmiths \$5.75, \$4.75 and \$4.25, and the Helpers \$3.10, \$2.95 and \$2.75."

"William J. Brady, Watts street, Manhattan—

"I employ one Helper and pay him \$3.25 a day."

"W. S. Dorethy, West street, Manhattan—

"I pay Blacksmiths \$5.25, \$5 and \$4.75. Helpers receive \$3, \$2.90 and \$2.85 a day. I employ four or five Blacksmiths and the same number of Helpers."

"Terry & Tench, 129th street, Manhattan—

"We pay a first fire Blacksmith \$40 a week; second men, \$4.45 and \$4.05. Helpers are paid \$3.35, \$3 and \$2.75. We employ five Blacksmiths and the same number of Helpers."

"Simplex Automobile Company, East Eighty-third street, Manhattan—

"We pay two Blacksmiths \$4 and \$3.50. We have no Helpers."

"P. H. Gill & Son, Lorraine street, Brooklyn—

"We pay \$7.75, \$7.34, \$6 and two men \$4.65 a day to Blacksmiths; Heaters, \$3.55 and \$3.22; Helpers \$3. We have five Blacksmiths, two Heaters and 15 Helpers."

"Samuel Martin Company, Adams street, Brooklyn—

"I pay one Blacksmith \$6 a day; one man \$5.50; one man \$4.75; four men \$4.50 a day; Heater \$3.50; eight Helpers, \$3 a day."

"William Gaskell & Son, Freeman street, Brooklyn—

"We pay one Blacksmith \$5 a day and another \$4.25. One Helper is paid \$3 a day, one \$2.80 and one \$2.65."

"Alexander B. Martin, West Broadway, Manhattan—

"I employ one Blacksmith and pay him \$4.50 a day. I pay one Helper \$3 a day."

"Atlantic Basin Iron Works, Summit street, Brooklyn—

"We pay one Blacksmith, at first fire, \$6.50; two men \$6; two men \$5.50; 4 men \$5; two men \$4.90; four men \$4.50. Helpers are paid \$3.35, \$3.15, \$3.08 and \$3. We have 15 Blacksmiths and 25 Blacksmiths' Helpers."

"Of the 162 Blacksmiths 67 are paid a rate above the wage paid by the City. Of the 214 Blacksmiths' Helpers, 75 are paid a rate above that now generally paid in City departments.

"Blacksmiths' Helpers are now paid \$3.50 per diem in the Departments of Parks, Manhattan and Richmond; Parks, Brooklyn, and Parks, Queens.

"At a recent Civil Service examination held at the Fire Department repair shop, the men worked from a drawing in doing the forging. The three applicants failed to pass. The Examiner stated:

"A successful applicant would be regarded as an all around Blacksmith. Blacksmiths in the Street Cleaning Department are employed at repairing carts and wagons in connection with wheelwright work. Those in the Department of Plant and Structures repair structural iron. Those in the Fire Department the fire fighting apparatus, and so on through the departments the work varies.

"Men working at the first fire do the heavy forging and those at the other fires the lighter forging. First fire men are paid a higher rate because of the heavy work rather than on account of their proficiency as Blacksmiths."

"The wide range of rates paid Blacksmiths in private employ of from \$3.25 to \$7 a day, would indicate that there are many workmen at the lower rates who would fail to pass the examination required by the Civil Service Commission.

"The rate paid Blacksmiths in City Departments for several years has been \$4.50 per diem. It would appear that a majority of men in the trade competent to pass the Civil Service examination are paid more than \$4.50 per diem. A rate of \$5 per diem for Blacksmiths is therefore recommended.

"On July 25, 1913, the Blacksmiths' Helpers Union requested an increase in rate from \$3 to \$3.50 per diem, which was denied. A comparison between the rates then paid and now paid in private employ would show an increase of probably 25 per cent. in wages. The lower rates quoted in the above table are in many cases paid to Laborers, while the higher rates are paid to Blacksmiths' Helpers, who have qualified by experience for the work.

"As 75 of the 214 Helpers included in the above table are paid over \$3 per diem, the elimination in the computation of a small percentage of the low-priced Laborers would justify an increase for Blacksmiths' Helpers from \$3 to \$3.50 per diem."

In view of the above facts, while the \$5 rate does not appear to prevail in private employ, we recommend that the attached resolutions, approving as fair rates the \$5 per diem rate for Blacksmiths and the \$3.50 per diem rate for Blacksmiths' Helpers in City employ, and requesting the heads of City Departments to provide for the increase, be adopted. *To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City Hall, N. Y.:*

Gentlemen—Request is hereby made for the issuance of special revenue bond funds in the amount of \$55,000 to meet an anticipated deficiency in account, Code 1988-1917, "Donations to Grand Army Veterans."

The appropriation for this purpose for the year 1917 was \$55,000. The balance in the account to-day is \$6,636. The donations made amount to about \$9,000 per month. The amount expended in 1916 relieving Grand Army Veteran cases was \$102,074.50. The amount which we hereby request, together with the original appropriation, will make the total for the year 1917, \$110,000, or an increase of \$9,925.50, our experience of last year. This increase is accounted for in some measure by the increased cost of living which has made it necessary for the Department to grant larger allowances in many cases.

The balance in hand at the present time will not suffice to cover requests for relief for the period of one month. It is therefore desirable that funds be made available as soon as possible.

§ 145. Posts and Poles.

1. General provisions. No post or pole shall be erected or put up in any [street] public highway, unless under a permit of the President of the Borough having jurisdiction [ ], and such permit shall only be issued after the written consent shall have been obtained of the owner of the premises in front of which a post or pole is sought to be erected or put up.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Reasons for Moving Van Ordinance.

1. Real estate titles and Surrogates' Court—Finding lost heirs.
2. Finding missing relatives.
3. Charitable societies and associations—Keeping track of habitual applicants for aid.
4. Police, Federal and local District Attorneys—Keeping track of and locating criminals and witnesses.
5. Wholesale and retail dealers and creditors of all kinds—To follow up absconding debtors.
6. City hospitals—Keeping track of persons able to pay for services in public hospitals.
7. Board of Education—Keeping track of truant children.
8. Post Office—Delivering letters.
9. Immigration Bureau—Locating persons unlawfully admitted to the country.
10. Board of Health—Keeping track of persons suffering from contagious diseases.
11. Landlords—To locate tenants who move without paying rent.
12. The work in the Bureau of Licenses can be made self-supporting by the fees charged to inspect the records.

The City of Philadelphia has a law compelling moving van men to give information regarding the removal of goods.

The City of Baltimore has a law compelling cartmen and warehousemen to keep a record of all goods moved. This is for the Police Department only and not for public inspection.

Kansas City has a Moving Ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE, relating to public carts and cartmen.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. That a new section be added to the Code of Ordinances to be known as Section 145 of Article XI.

§145. Every public cartman shall keep a book of record of all transportations or removals made by him of such goods, household or office furniture or other bulky articles from any private dwelling, tenement, apartment house, office, boarding house, hotel or restaurant, which record shall contain: (1) the name and address of such public cartman; (2) the name or names of the person, firm, corporation or association owning or claiming to own such goods, household or office furniture or other bulky articles and employing such public cartmen for such transportation and removal, and the name or names of the person, firm, corporation or association to whom or to which such articles are delivered; (3) the street and house numbers of the respective premises from and to which such transportation or removal shall be made, and if such premises or either of them shall not be designated by a street number, such public cartman, in lieu thereof, shall otherwise clearly identify the same. Such book or record shall be upon a form approved by the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses. The entries therein of said removals or deliveries shall be made on the day or days of said removals and deliveries and shall not be obliterated.

A record of each of such transportations or removals so made by such public cartmen for the preceding week shall be filed at the end of each week in the Bureau of Licenses.

Such record shall be deemed a public document and open for public inspection between the hours of nine A. M. and four P. M., except on Sundays and Holidays.

Such record shall be indexed in the Bureau of Licenses both by the names of the persons, firms or corporations procuring such removals or receiving such articles and by the Block and Section of the premises from and to which such removals are made, according to the Land Map of the City of New York, or to the Land Map of the County of Kings, as the case may be. If the premises either from or to which such removal is made is in a part of the city not within the limits of the Land Map of the City of New York or the Land Map of the County of Kings, the record of such removal shall be indexed according to the name of the street, avenue or road to or from which such removal is made, in addition to the names of the persons, firms or corporations procuring such removal or receiving the articles so removed. If the premises either from or to which such removal is made is outside the limits of the City of New York, the record of such removal shall be indexed according to the Post office address of said premises in addition to the names of the persons, firms or corporations procuring such removal or receiving the articles so removed.

Upon the application of any party interested the Commissioner of Licenses, in his discretion, for good cause, may order the report of a removal sealed. Such report shall not be deemed a public document. Information of such removal shall not be divulged except upon an order of a City Magistrate or a Court of record.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation procuring the removal of any of the properties herein described, or receiving the same, to give to the owner or operator of any vehicle employed to remove such property a fictitious name or refuse to give the correct name of the owner or the party in possession of said property, or wilfully deceive him as to the same. Any public cartman upon conviction by the Commissioner of Licenses for a violation of this ordinance shall be punished by suspension or the revocation of his license or the imposition of a fine not to exceed \$10 for each offense.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

**An Ordinance to Repeal Section 155 of Article 11 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Oil Separators.**

AN ORDINANCE to repeal section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Section 155 of article 11 of chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to oil separators, is hereby repealed in its entirety, said section reading as follows:

§155. Oil separators.

1. *When required.* No garage permit authorizing the storage of volatile inflammable oil shall be issued for any premises, storing more than 4 motor vehicles, which are not provided with an oil separator, trap or other similar apparatus attached to the house drain, for the purpose of preventing volatile inflammable oils from flowing into the sewer; provided, however, that the fire commissioner may exempt from the requirements of this section a garage draining into a short sewer line. (O. R., §376.)

2. *Oil receptacle.* The oil-receptacle of an oil separator shall not exceed 50 gallons capacity, and shall be emptied as often as may be necessary to prevent the oil from overflowing; and such oils as are recovered from the separator shall be removed from the garage within 24 hours after being taken from the separator. (O. R., §397.)

3. *Sewer connection.* Each oil separator shall be connected to the house drain, and shall be so arranged as to separate all oils from the drainage of the garage. (O. R., §396.)

4. *Waste oil.* All oils spilled on the floor of a garage shall be removed by sponging or swabbing, and poured into the drain leading to the oil separator. (O. R., §398.)

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The budget for fuel for 1917, for the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, was based upon the use of mixed coal for ten months of the year and the use of egg coal until March 1, 1917, in the Bath Buildings and the use of egg coal in the Hall of Records and Borough Hall until May 1, 1917.

The tonnages and kind of coal were allowed in the belief that changes in the boiler plants under the jurisdiction of the Borough President, to permit mixed coal to be used, would be finished in the time allowed. All of the changes in the Bath Buildings, Hall of Records and Borough Hall have taken two months longer to complete than was anticipated, and the changes and new installation in the Court House will probably not be completed this year.

The budget allowance for coal in 1917 was \$67,380. Of this amount there has been expended to date \$34,763.22, leaving an unexpended balance of \$32,616.78, which is sufficient to purchase the necessary coal for the remainder of the year. The estimated cost of the coal required for the remainder of the year is \$63,215.13. The estimated deficit is, therefore, \$30,598.35. Sir—Pursuant to subdivision 8, section 188 of the Charter, I respectfully ask your honorable board to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of special revenue bonds in the amount of \$45,000, to provide for the deficiency in Code No. 2655—1917, Fuel Supplies, Department of Correction.

The budget allowance in the above code for the year 1917 amounts to \$85,000, but this total was based upon market conditions existing in October, 1916, when the budget was compiled. It was assumed at that time that the prevailing prices would hold until April of this year.

The purchase of coal by contract for the year 1917 totals to date \$57,511.68, and the open market charges amount to \$2,000, making a total of approximately \$59,500. To meet this expenditure the department will have a balance of not more than \$25,300, making an imperative need for additional funds to the amount of \$43,100.

In further substantiation of the foregoing I may state that I am in receipt of a communication from the Hon. Leonard M. Wallstein, Secretary of the Central Purchase Committee, in which he asks that an issue of special revenue bonds be requested of your honorable board to provide for contracts for city coal to be entered into for the account of this department within a few weeks.

The miscellaneous fuels mentioned above, amounting to \$3,000, bring the total up to \$43,100. Our request for 500 tons was based on the anticipated additional need for our enlarged building and greenhouses, for which we had no experience. From the above date it appears that this was an under-estimate. We shall probably need at least 400 tons between now and January 1, 1918, in addition to the small amount that may be purchased with the unexpended balance of \$178, more or less.

We have invited bids for furnishing our coal for the remainder of this year from six Brooklyn dealers. None of them were willing to submit bids, but would agree only to fill our orders, if possible, at prices current on the date of delivery.

Inasmuch as we have had as satisfactory service from J. Colyer & Son as from any other dealer, we have placed our orders with him, since his contract expired on April 1st.

I am authorized by the Governing Committee of our trustees to ask you to take such steps as may be necessary to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Special Revenue bonds for such an amount as in their judgment will be necessary to secure the Garden in the purchase of 400 tons of pea coal for the remainder of this year. Employers shall be responsible for the proper drill of all employees in such emergency duties.

4. Supervision. No refrigerating [machine] plant, of over 3-tons refrigerating capacity, using ammonia or carbon dioxide as a refrigerant, nor any refrigerating plant using over eight pounds of ethyl chloride or eight pounds of sulphur dioxide as refrigerants, shall be operated unless under the charge of a person holding a certificate of [fitness from] qualification issued by the [fire] police [commissioner] department. [., or who has been duly certified as competent to operate a refrigerating plant by any department of the city having jurisdiction to certify thereto.] Any person holding a certificate of fitness to operate a refrigerating plant issued by the fire commissioner prior to the time when this ordinance takes effect shall be exempt from its provisions until the expiration of such certificate.

5. Certificate of qualification. Upon the request of any person who makes application to the police department for a license or certificate as engineer of any class or grade, or as to such applicant's qualifications to operate such a refrigerating plant, he shall be examined by said department as to his qualifications to operate a refrigerating plant, and, if he is found to be so qualified, said department shall so certify; such certification to continue in force one year unless sooner revoked or suspended.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The Committee on General Welfare, to which was referred on May 1, 1917 (Minutes, page 239), the annexed request of the International Mercantile Marine Lines for amendment of the ordinance relating to the discharge of small-arms, respectfully

#### REPORTS:

That the Committee having heard from Mr. R. Jenkins, representing the International Mercantile Marine Lines in support of the ordinance, who stated that the Marine Rifle Company consisted of several clubs, who desired to utilize the extreme outer end of Pier 58, North River. The Committee, having obtained an opinion from the Corporation Counsel, hereto attached in support of the request, it, therefore, recommends the adoption of the accompanying ordinance.

**AN ORDINANCE** to amend subdivision 1 of section 2 of article 2 of chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the discharge of small-arms.

*Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:*  
Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 2 of article 2 of chapter 11 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the discharge of small-arms, as amended, is hereby further amended by adding at the end thereof the following words: *the bulkhead shed of Pier 58, North River, on the street level, occupied by the Mercantile Marine Rifle Club.*

Dear Sir—We have started an organization among our employees at New York, named the "Mercantile Marine Rifle Club," which is associated with the National Rifle Association, for the purpose of drilling our men and enabling them to acquire

as much military information as is possible, in the interest of national preparedness.

In order to make the training as practical as possible, we are obtaining from the U. S. Government the necessary service rifles, and are desirous of establishing a rifle range on our piers, where these men can practice. Our idea is to locate this range in the bulkhead shed of Pier 58, North River, on the street level, this being a portion of the property which is not used as a thoroughfare, and all proper steps will be taken to make the range safe. We have taken this matter up with the Dock Department, the Commissioner of Police and the Fire Underwriters, who cover the risk on the piers, all of whom advise us that, as far as they are concerned, there is no objection whatever to the scheme, but we understand that there is a City Ordinance which prohibits firing rifles within the City limits.

The position which we have indicated for this rifle range could not in any way be a nuisance to the public, as the firing of one of these rifles there could hardly be heard outside, and it is in a locality where there are no dwelling houses.

We, therefore, respectfully request permission to use this rifle range, having all due regard for safety, and shall greatly appreciate if you will kindly arrange for an amendment to the City Ordinance to be passed, if possible, at the next meeting.

Our request is entirely in the public interest and we trust that favorable action will be taken thereon. Yours truly,

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, President, Board of Aldermen:

Sir—I am in receipt of your letter, dated May 3, 1917, reading as follows:

"Enclosed please find copy of communication from the International Mercantile Marine Company asking the Board of Aldermen to exempt from the restrictions placed upon the discharge of firearms a range in the bulkhead shed of Pier 58, North River. Will you kindly advise me, at your earliest convenience, as to the power of the Board in this matter, and oblige."

Section 1906 of the Penal Law provides:

"A person who, otherwise than in self-defense, or in the discharge of official duty: 1. Wilfully discharges any species of fire-arms, air gun or other weapon, or throws any other deadly missile in a public place or in any place where there is any person to be endangered thereby, although no injury to any person ensues; \* \* \* is guilty of a misdemeanor \* \* \*"

The Charter in Section 49 reads as follows:

"The board of aldermen shall have power to make, amend and repeal ordinances, rules, regulations and by-laws not inconsistent with this act, or with the Constitution and laws of the United States or of this state, for the following purposes:

\* \* \* \* \*

"4. In relation to the use of guns, pistols, fire-arms, fire-crackers, fire-works and detonating works of all descriptions \* \* \*"

The Board of Aldermen passed the following ordinance, being Chapter 11, Article 1, Section 2, in part:

"No person shall fire or discharge any gun, pistol, rifle, fowling piece, or other fire-arms in the city; provided that the provisions of this section shall not apply to the following places:"

Then follows a long list of exceptions.

I note from the communication enclosed by you that permission is asked concerning premises described as "being a portion of the property which is not used as a thoroughfare, and all proper steps will be taken to make the range safe."

I am of the opinion that the portion of the pier thus to be used can be fairly held not to be a public place, certainly as readily as Harlem River Park, the dock at the foot of 155th Street, North River, and the territory within the areas of the three reservoirs in Central Park, including the embankments thereof, all of which at various times have been included in the exemptions of the ordinance.

I, therefore, advise you that an exception may be authorized in this case.

#### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

An adjourned regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Tuesday, April 10, 1917, at 4 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair; Messrs. Paulding, O'Keefe, Sachs, Robbins and Stern, Trustees. Excused—Mr. Farley and Mr. Kingsbury, Commissioner of Public Charities.

M. L. Fleming, the Acting General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Frances McCullough, graduate nurse, employed in the Social Service Department, was operated upon in K-3 last night for acute mastoiditis. Her condition is complicated by meningitis, and she is considered in very serious condition.

Measles and scarlet fever are both very prevalent in the city at the present time, and it has been impossible to keep these cases out of the wards. At present I-7, I-5, K-3 and B-5 are quarantined, all for measles.

Sophie Davis, being operated upon for frontal sinusitis, died under anaesthesia on March 24, 1917.

Antonio Cottini, being operated upon for bilateral tubercular cervical adenitis, by C. G. Burdick, died under anaesthesia on April 6.

It has been impossible for me to come to any determination in regard to the complaint of W. K. Draper concerning the X-ray service. The statements by the interne staff and nurses on the wards are an exact contradiction of those made by the employees of the X-ray Department, and the records of each department tend to bear out their own statements. Orders have been given in the X-ray Department that whenever an appointment is not kept when made that a written statement from the head nurse or physician on the ward must be obtained by the X-ray orderly or by the nurse on duty in charge of the X-ray, and the matter reported at once to the General Medical Superintendent.

I have investigated the statement made in reference to the food for the house staff. The variety is good. Routine menus are not used. The quality of the food is good and the preparation as satisfactory as can be made with the number of employees allowed in the kitchen. Meats, vegetables and pastries must be prepared in advance and kept hot on steam table for service. Tea and coffee is prepared in urns in the pantry. Cereal for breakfast is cooked in advance and kept hot on steam table. Eggs are cooked to order until 8.30, when the cook stops his breakfast work. The waitresses order eggs before 8.30 for men who are late; these eggs are cold and have been standing when served. In quantity, quality, service and preparation the food is better than would be obtained by members of the house staff in a first class boarding house.

The New York, Presbyterian, St. Luke's, Roosevelt, Flower, Mt. Sinai Hospitals have all received letters from the War Department requesting a statement in regard to allowing members of the regular Army Medical Corps to attend patients in the hospitals. I have been told unofficially, that in each of these hospitals it is expected that only members of their regular staff will be allowed to treat patients in their wards.

At Harlem Hospital two operating rooms are at present in use: (1) the new operating room, (2) the small septic operating room. The request is made for a third operating room to be equipped and made available. Instruments, operating table and instrument tables are needed for this room, at an approximate cost of \$750. These could be obtained from our general appropriation for medical and surgical equipment, although no such demand was anticipated in our Budget, and it would probably be necessary for us to ask for additional funds to replenish this account before the end of the year. To carry on the work in this operating room would require 2 additional pupil nurses at \$96 a year, and 1 additional orderly at \$240 per year. The urgent necessity for this additional room, it appears to me, does not rest with having a clean and septic operating room, as these are provided at present, but should be decided on the basis of the need for a third operating room. The capacity of the hospital has been increased, a double surgical service and a special gynaecological service arranged. In Bellevue 1 surgical and 1 special service is assigned to each operating room. No provision is made for special septic operating room. During March there were 234 op-

erations performed at Harlem Hospital. With this number of cases the opening of the additional operating room would appear to be desirable to me. In reference to the roof wards for septic cases, I would state, these wards were not planned for that purpose, but as a place to which convalescents from the other wards of the hospitals could go. No hospital, to my knowledge, provides special accommodations for septic cases. Clean and septic cases are treated in the same wards at Bellevue. Care in technique and methods is used to prevent cross infection. To open these roof wards would require one head nurse at \$600, 6 pupil nurses at \$96, and 2 maids at \$210 each. There are no funds available to pay these positions. There is no room in the Home or in the dining-room to house and feed these additional employees. Pupil nurses cannot be cared for by placing them on a salary without maintenance. This matter does not appear to me to be immediately urgent. To obtain additional funds for these employees would require our requesting a transfer of funds from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. Accrual funds to the account of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, and to care for these employees would require the leasing of outside accommodations to provide living quarters for the additional nurses.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the Acting General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The Acting General Medical Superintendent was requested to present a report on the findings of the Coroner in regard to the death of the patients Sophie Davis and Antonio Cottini.

The rule formulated by the General Medical Superintendent regarding reports to him whenever an appointment is not kept when made with the X-ray Department was approved, and it was resolved to ask for a report on the type of employees in the X-ray Department, and the requirements for candidates for the positions under the immediate supervision of Dr. Hirsch.

The report on the food served the House Staff was approved and the Trustees suggested to the General Medical Superintendent that a notice be placed in the dining-room informing the members of the interne staff that the men who come late to meals cannot expect the service accorded to those who are on time.

The Board authorized the opening and equipping of a third operating room at Harlem Hospital at an estimated cost of \$750, and the employment of the necessary employees. The opening of the roof ward for septic cases was authorized and the General Medical Superintendent was asked to see what could be done to obtain the required number of employees.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. Robbins, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, recommended the following appointments: J. Echeverria, H. C. Falk and S. Di Palma, Gynaecologists to Out Patients and Adjunct Assistant Visiting Gynaecologist.

On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and the appointments made accordingly.

The General Medical Superintendent presented a list of additional employees required to open the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital, for which no funds are provided in the budget for 1917. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried, to authorize a request to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the transfer of funds from Code 3039, Salary and Wage Accruals, to engage the required number of employees when the building is to be opened, the total amounting to \$10,936.

The General Medical Superintendent also presented a request from the Director of the X-ray Laboratory for additional employees required for the proper administration of the department at Bellevue. As this involves additional positions, it was moved, seconded and carried, to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer balances from Code 3039, City Funds for Salary and Wage Accruals for these places, the total amounting to \$4,720.

Dr. Brannan presented a communication from the Mayor, dated March 31, regarding his appointment to a committee to co-operate with Dr. Goldwater to outline a form of procedure to be followed in mobilizing the hospital facilities in New York City for the use of the National Government.

The communication, dated March 27th, from the War Department, presented at the last meeting, in regard to an inquiry of the Surgeon General concerning the granting of permission to medical officers of the Army to treat enlisted men in the hospitals of the department, was considered in connection with reports from private hospitals referred to in the General Medical Superintendent's report, and the recommendations of the Medical Boards of the hospitals of the department, set forth in the minutes of the



Executive Committee of Bellevue for April 7; Gouverneur for April 9; Harlem for April 7, and Fordham for April 7. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, to inform the War Department, that the hospitals of the department are municipal hospitals, belonging to the City of New York, and that no charges are made unless the patients are able to pay, and that a ruling was adopted many years ago that only physicians and surgeons duly appointed by the Trustees are entitled to treat patients in the hospitals, the only exception being made in individual cases upon the express approval of the Trustees. It was further decided to inform the War Department that the Trustees desire to co-operate with the United States authorities should any public crisis require the Government's intervention in this or any other matter pertaining to hospital administration, and that if the War Department desires to pursue the subject further the Trustees suggest that they arrange a conference at some convenient time.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for April 7 were presented, transmitting a copy of a communication from the Department of Military Relief, dated April 3, authorizing the formation of a hospital unit at Harlem, and requesting the Trustees to formally authorize the establishing of a hospital unit with Lewis K. Neff as Director. On motion duly seconded and carried, this request was approved.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for April 3 were presented. The recommendation that a hospital unit be established at Fordham Hospital with Dr. Nicoll as Director was approved.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

A communication was presented from the Chief of Staff of the Office of the Commissioner of Accounts, transmitting a copy of a report filed with the Mayor of an investigation regarding the collection of revenues in Bellevue and Allied Hospitals. This report was passed from one Trustee to another and referred to the General Medical Superintendent with a request that he present a report on the findings set forth therein to the Trustees.

It having been reported that the Sinking Fund Commission on March 29 authorized a lease of the building to be constructed by Mrs. William Church Osborn on E. 26th st. for the use of the nurses, it was moved, seconded and carried to extend a vote of sincere thanks to Mrs. Osborn for her notable public service in making it possible to erect the building.

A letter, dated March 27, was presented from Dr. Silver and Dr. Huber offering their services to the Trustees for active duty at Bellevue and Gouverneur to fill any vacancy caused by members of the visiting staff taking field service with the Army and Navy. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to extend the sincere thanks of the Trustees for the offer and to inform them that the Board will avail itself of their service should they be required.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for March 14 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the nominations to the House Staff on the First Division were approved as follows: Harry Bakowitz, 2 years' Medical, July 1, 1917; Samuel S. Fern, 2 years' Surgery, July 1, 1917; Harold J. Isaacs, 2 years' Surgery, Jan. 1, 1918; Morris Greenberg, 2 years' Medical, Jan. 1, 1918; Ira Wilens, 18 months mixed service, July 1, 1917; Julius Kaufman, 18 months mixed service, Jan. 1, 1918.

The resignation of Dr. Bertram Waters as Visiting Physician to the Tuberculosis Service on the First Division was accepted with regret. On the recommendation of the Conference Committee, the following nominations to the Neurological Service were approved: H. W. Frink, C. P. Oberndorf, J. W. Stephenson and W. M. Kraus, Adjunct Assistant Physicians.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board for March 28 were also presented. The resignation of P. J. Mackenzie as Resident Physician on the Tuberculosis Service was accepted. The report in regard to the unsatisfactory ether used in the department was considered, together with a report from the General Medical Superintendent that the department is no longer using ether from the chemical company that formerly supplied it, and the subject was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for immediate attention.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for March 6 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendation regarding the appointment of Nathan Schiff as interne on the Obstetrical Service was noted, but as the Trustees were advised informally that the nomination is withdrawn, no further action was taken by the Board. The nominations of Robert E. Walsh as Assistant Visiting Surgeon; George A. Wyeth as Adjunct Assistant Visiting Surgeon, and the promotion of

J. J. McGowan to the position of Visiting Physician, together with the nomination of William A. Randel as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Nose and Throat, and Joseph C. Josephson as Physician to Out Patients, Pediatric Clinic, were referred to the Conference Committee. The request for the appointment of a masseuse for the wards and the Out Patient Department was noted. The Trustees regret that no funds are available in the budget for such an employee, but have made provision in the departmental estimate for 1918 for this position. The Trustees regret very much that J. E. Welch has found it necessary to resign from the position of Visiting Physician to the hospital. The report from the Supervisory Committee suggesting changes in the Out Patient Department to improve the service in the various clinics was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for attention.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital for April 2 were presented. The nominations of W. H. Ordway as Assistant Physician, Cardiac Clinic; Leo Rubin, as Assistant Physician, Children's Clinic, and Woodhill L. Condict as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients were referred to the Conference Committee. The report of the inability to obtain a Laboratory Assistant and the recommendation that the position be filled from outside the Civil Service list was considered by the Trustees at their meeting on April 3, and referred to the President for conference with the Civil Service Commission. The report of the unsatisfactory work in the X-ray Department was considered and in view of the ruling made by the Trustees at their meeting last week that the hours of employment in the X-ray Department are definitely from 10 to 12 a. m. and from 2 to 4 p. m., it is believed that the service in this department will be improved. In the meantime the matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for attention.

A letter, dated April 5, was presented from the State Board of Charities, transmitting a report of an inspection of the Out Patient Department of Bellevue Hospital, placing the Plant in Class I and the Administration in Class II. As this report had been sent from one Trustee to another, it was moved, seconded and carried to instruct the General Medical Superintendent to meet the needs and remedy the defects so far as the budget appropriations will permit and make provision in the departmental estimate for 1918 to carry out the suggestions of the State Board of Charities for which no funds are available at the present time.

A letter, dated April 2, was presented from C. G. Coakley, asking for permission to allow W. R. Redden to examine the blood of patients in the nose and throat department for the purpose of investigating the relation between infections of the tonsils and rheumatism. This communication was referred to the Executive Committee of the Medical Board for recommendation.

A letter, dated April 2, was presented from the New York State League for Nursing Education in regard to the National Nurses' Convention and suggesting that the department permit the Superintendents of Training Schools to attend the conventions without depriving them of their vacation and at the expense of the hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this suggestion was approved.

A letter, dated March 10, was presented from the Department of Public Charities, stating that it could not issue orders for the payment of invoices for medical and surgical supplies purchased in 1916. A report was presented from the Chief Clerk and Auditor to the General Medical Superintendent, under date of March 28, recommending that this department apply for the transfer of \$5,020.15 from the Department of Public Charities to the appropriations of Bellevue in order to meet these bills. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was resolved to request the transfer of these funds.

A letter, dated March 30, was presented from McKim, Mead & White, stating that they will accept the contract for architectural services for Neponsit Beach Hospital on the 5 per cent. basis, as originally presented by the Department, and as approved by the Board of Estimate, and calling attention to the services rendered by their firm in the preparation of other plans for the department. This communication was referred to the Building Committee for their information.

A letter was presented from the Bronx Board of Trade, under date of April 2, stating that their Civic Bureau will recommend to their Board of Directors that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be petitioned to adopt resolutions authorizing an issue of corporate stock to enable the Trustees to construct an additional wing to Fordham Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this letter was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting until April 17th was seconded and carried.

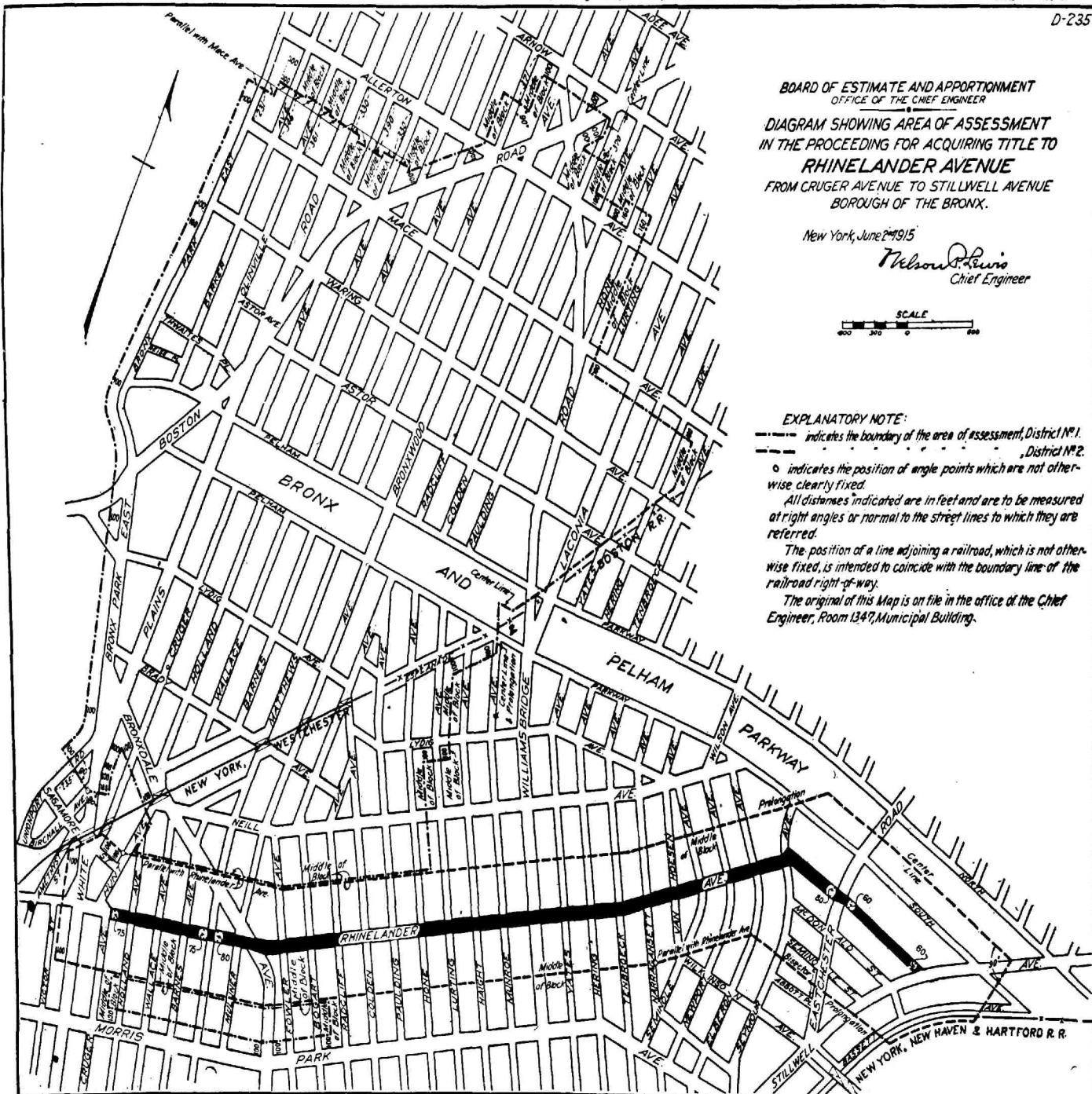

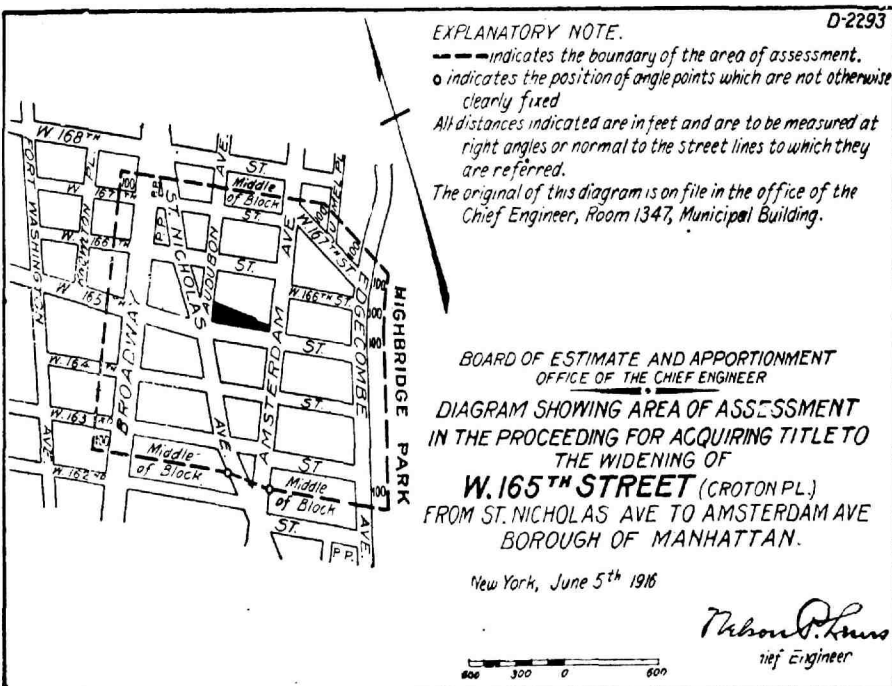

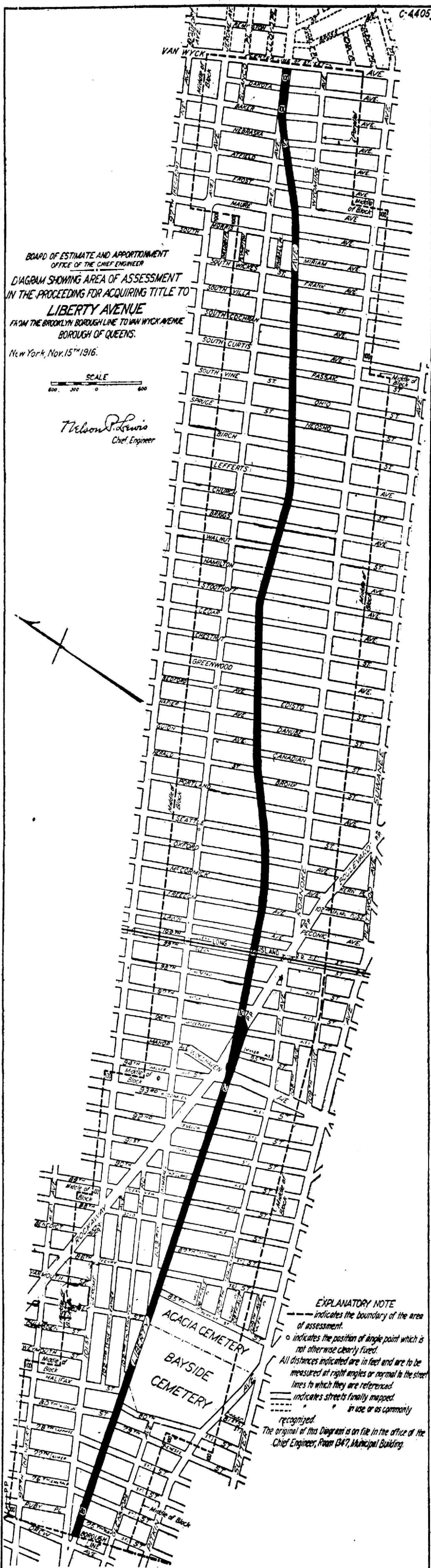

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances, between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidders assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate. The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures. Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished.
