It will be a great convenience if this form can be closely adhered to, as by uniformity in these reports, much time will be saved at this office in the examination of them, and the comparison with

reports, much time will be saved at this office in the examination of them, and the comparison with the reports of the commissioners. In some cases, heretofore, in reports, it has been said : "The supervisors have directed the com-missioners to take additioual security of A, B, etc., without any expression of opinion as to the mort-gages not mentioned ; whereas, the act requires the board to certify the state in which they find the moneys, and the result of their examinations, etc. It is hoped that the board will consider what it has to do under this act, as one of its principal duties, and not a mere incidental matter, which may be made subservient to other duties required by law. Should any circumstance occur or come to the notice of the board, which it is important hould be known to the Comptroller, it can be noted specially at the close of the report. During the preceding year, reports have not been made by some dozen counties, which manifests the low estimate in which the supervisors in those counties put on the important duties imposed upon them by law, to the manifest injury in many instances, to them and their immediate constituents. It is very desirable that reports from all the counties should be full and promptly made, without which there must necessarily be but an indifferent execution of the law. I beg that you will send to this office the name and residence of your chairman and clerk, with whom I can communicate after your session shall close. I fear the omission to report in some instances may have been caused by the neglect of your clerk. Please also add the name of the post-office whereat each usually receives his letters.
