

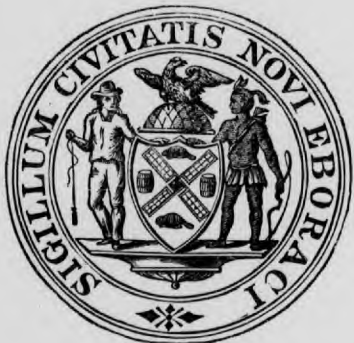

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 2, 1884:

The total number of inspections made during the week was 3,257; the total number of complaints returned was 1,001.

During the past week 157 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

39 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 62 premises where contagious diseases were reported, and have performed 60 disinfections and 18 fumigations.

10 patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to the hospital.

The Meat and Fish Inspectors have seized and condemned 4,540 pounds of meats and 1,600 pounds of fish.

The Milk Inspectors have examined 125 specimens of milk, made 4 analyses of same, and destroyed 10 quarts of adulterated milk.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 570 births, 59 still-births, 240 marriages and 584 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 2, 1884. This shows an increase of 18 births, 1 still-birth, and 40 marriages, and a decrease of 8 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was a decrease of 10 births, 21 marriages, and 5 deaths, and an increase of 8 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria, decreased 2; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; rheumatism and gout, 2; pneumonia, 5; heart diseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 17; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; premature and preterm births, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 6; scarlatina 4; croup, 3; erysipelas, 5; typhoid fever, 2; inanition, 7; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 5; convulsions, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 9; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from whooping cough, aneurism, surgical operation, and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 316 in tenement houses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 135 on the second, 116 on the third, 63 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 583 were stated to be residents of New York City and 1 non-resident; 73 were stated to be single, 171 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 263 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 584; still-births, 59; bodies in transitu, 17. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 60 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 570 burials, 239 marriages, 59 still-births, 584 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 115 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 63 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 2, 1884, was 28.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.05, the mean humidity was 84, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,273, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.27 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 560 deaths and still-births, or 87.09 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 17; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 225; City pauper burial ground (undenominational), 69; Greenwood (undenominational), 46; Lutheran (undenominational), 81; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 16; Evergreen (undenominational), 46; Woodlawn (undenominational), 23; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 14; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 3; Nachpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 1; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 9.

The actual mortality for the week ending January 26, 1884, was 607; this is 35 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1883, and 50.6 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.55 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,340,114.

§ 350. The Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents. * * * * *

Such rents shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings, respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water, said rents shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as provided by law.

It becomes my duty to state that on and after the first day of April, 1883, all extra charges, such as steam-engines, bakeries, barbers, bathing-tubs, boarding-houses, boarding-schools, building purposes, horses, horse-troughs, hotels, porter-houses, taverns, etc., printing offices, stone cutting or dressing, slaughter-houses, dyeing, water-closets and urinals, laundries, restaurants, soda fountains, extra families, oyster and coffee saloons, water by meter measurement, meters and meter setting, and all other purposes for which the use of Croton water is chargeable according to law, are liens, and unless paid on or before the 30th day of April next must be returned to the Clerk of Arrears, with the amount due on each lot.

TO THE PUBLIC.

AT 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repair a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly developed in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred.

The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant.

While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five feet.

This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recurrence of similar leaks in the aqueduct make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.

FOR THE INFORMATION OF THE PUBLIC, and especially of those using the Wharf Property of the City of New York, the following extracts from the rules and regulations established for the guidance of the Dock Masters appointed by the Board governing this Department, and to be observed by them in the performance of their duties, are hereby promulgated and published:

Resolved, For the proper supervision of the waterfront of the city, the care of the wharf property located thereon placed in the charge of this Department, the rendering of necessary facilities for the prompt berthing of vessels thereat, and the collection of the wharfage accruing therefrom, that the waterfront of the City of New York be and hereby is arranged and divided into nine districts, and that for each of the said districts there shall be appointed, designated, or assigned, from time to time, at the pleasure of the Board, a suitable and competent person to be known and entitled as "Dock Master," who shall perform such duties and render such services in relation to the supervision, regulation, and occupation of the wharf property and waterfront in their respective districts, as the laws of the United States and of the State of New York, the ordinances of the City of New York, and the by-laws of this Board, and its rules, or orders, shall or may require, prescribe, or direct.

The several districts so made and created, and the Dock Masters assigned thereto, are as follows, to wit:

District No. 1.—Embracing all that portion of the East river, extending from Castle Garden, on the Battery, to and including Pier 21, East river.

Charles H. Thompson, Dock Master; office, 33 Counties Slip.

District No. 2.—All that portion of the North river extending from Castle Garden, to and including Pier old 42, North river.

George W. Wannmaker, Dock Master; office, foot of Duane street, N. R.

District No. 3.—From east side Pier 21, East river, to and including Pier 35, East river.

Edward Abbed, Dock Master; office, 262 South street.

District No. 4.—From north side Pier, old 42, North river, to and including pier at foot of West Twenty-third street, North river.

John M. Smith, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 43, N. R.

District No. 5.—From north side Pier 55, East river, to north side of Thirty-fourth street, East river.

Bernard Kenney, Dock Master; office, foot of East Sixteenth street, E. R.

District No. 6.—From north side Pier at Twenty-third street, North river, to and including Pier at foot Fifty-ninth street, North river.

Edward Gilon, Dock Master; office, Pier, new 57, N. R.

District No. 7.—From north side of Thirty-fourth street, East river, to south side of Ninety-second street, East river.

Robert Hall, Dockmaster; office, 646 First avenue.

District No. 8.—From north side of Pier at Fifty-ninth street, North river, to Yonkers and Spuyten Duyvil Creek, from North river to Kingsbridge.

Theodore S. Croft, Dockmaster; office, foot of West Seventy-ninth street, N. R.

District No. 9.—From south side Ninety-second street, East river, to and including Bronx river, and also Harlem river, from East river to Kingsbridge.

John Callan, Dockmaster; office, foot of East One Hundred and Fourth street, Harlem river.

Resolved, That until otherwise ordered by this Board the following rules and instructions are issued for the guidance and observance of the several Dock Masters of the Department:

* * * * *

Each Dock Master shall promptly designate and assign in the order in which application is made, suitable and convenient berths, so far as practicable, within the limits of his district, for the use of such vessel and water craft as may require the same for the reception or discharge of passengers, merchandise, etc., therefrom or for the necessary repair or the safety of any vessel or water craft.

It shall be the duty of each Dock Master to require and enforce the due observance of and compliance with such of the national and State laws, city ordinances, and the rules, regulations and orders of the Department of Docks as appertain to the use, care, and custody of the wharf property of and about the City of New York, promptly reporting to the Board all violations and evasions of such laws, ordinances, rules, regulations and orders.

* * * * *

Each Dock Master is expressly prohibited, under penalty of immediate dismissal from his position, from receiving or demanding, directly or indirectly, any fee, gratuity, compensation, or article of value of any nature or kind, for the assignment of a berth to a vessel at any pier, slip, or wharf property whatsoever, or for the performance of or the omission to perform any of the duties required of or pertaining to the position of Dock Master of this Department.

Any person or persons having any cause of complaint against the Dock Masters for any failure or omission in the performance of the duties as required by the above rules, are requested to promptly communicate the same to this Board, at their offices, Nos. 117 and 119 Duane street.

BOARD OF STREET OPENING AND IMPROVEMENT.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, IN ACCORD-
ance with the provisions of section 105 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, entitled "An Act to reorganize the local government of the City of New York," passed April 30, 1873, and of Chapter 360 of the Laws of 1883, and of all other provisions of law that the Board of Street Opening and Improvement deem it to be for the public interest to alter the map or plan of the City of New York, by laying out, opening and extending certain new streets and avenues, described as follows, viz.:

That One Hundred and Thirty-first street be extended in an easterly direction, at a uniform width of sixty (60' 0") feet from its present terminus for a distance on the northerly line of two hundred and eighty-four feet two and one-eighth inches (284' 2 $\frac{1}{8}$ "), and on the southerly line for a distance of three hundred and nine feet five and three-eighths inches (309' 5 $\frac{3}{8}$ "), from the easterly line of Tenth avenue to meet the new avenue known as Convent avenue.

And that they propose to alter the map or plan of said city by laying out, opening and extending said streets and avenues.

IN ACCORDANCE WITH AN ORDINANCE OF THE Common Council, "In relation to the burial of strangers or unknown persons who may die in any of the public institutions of the City of New York," the Commissioners of Public Charities and Correction report as follows:
