Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a report of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 2, 1884 :

The total number of inspections made during the week was 3,257; the total number of complaints returned was 1,001.

During the past week 157 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. 39 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the 39 permits were issued Health Officer of the Port.

47 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks. The Disinfecting Corps have visited 62 premises where contagious diseases were reported,

and have performed 60 disinfections and 18 fumigations.

10 patients sick with contagious diseases were removed to the hospital.

The Meat and Fish Inspectors have seized and condemned 4,540 pounds of meats and 1,600 pounds of fish.

The Milk Inspectors have examined 125 specimens of milk, made 4 analyses of same, and destroyed 10 quarts of adulterated milk.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

Bureau of Vital Statistics. The certificates of 570 births, 59 still-births, 240 marriages and 584 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 2, 1884. This shows an increase of 18 births 1 still-birth, and 40 marriages, and a decrease of 8 deaths when compared with the number received during the preceding week; but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1883, there was a decrease of 10 births, 21 marriages, and 5 deaths, and an increase of 8 still-births. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria, decreased 2; typhus fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 4; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; rheumatism and gout, 2; pneu-monia, 5; heart diseases, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 17; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cyanosis and atelectasis, 6; premature and preternatural births, 2; while the deaths from measles increased 6; scarlatina 4; croup, 3; erysipelas, 5; typhoid fever, 2; inanition, 7; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 5; phthisis pulmonalis, 4; bronchitis, 5; convulsions, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; gastritis, enteritis and peritonuts, 9; suicide, 2. The number of deaths from whooping cough, aneurism, surgical operation, and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks. successive weeks

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 123 were in institutions, 316 in tenement bouses, 135 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 3 in rivers streets, boats, etc.; 5 were on the basement floor, 112 on the first, 135 on the second, 116 on the third, 63 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 583 were stated to be residents of New York City and 1 non-residents; 73 were stated to be single, 171 married, 77 widowed, and the condition of 263 was not stated—these were children who had not attained a marriagcable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 584; still-births, 59; bodies in transitu, 17. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 60 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 570 births, 239 marriages, 59 still-births, 584 deaths, 17 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 115 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 8 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 63 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 2, 1884, was 28.4 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.005, the mean humidity was 84, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,273, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.27 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

A T 9.30 P. M. ON THURSDAY THE 15TH instant, the aqueduct had to be shut off to repar a large leak that could not be repaired in the usual manner from the exterior. This leak had suddenly devoloped in the section south of Yonkers, where smaller fissures had previously occurred. The examination showed fissures aggregating 2,000 feet in length. The repairs were finished and water was again turned on by 4 P. M., on Saturday, the 17th instant. While the flow through the aqueduct was interrupted the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five et.

the supply in the Central Park reservoir was drawn down five eet. This loss of supply in the city reservoirs, occurring now, as winter is approaching, makes it necessary to take extra precautions against waste of water. Being aware of the temptation to leave faucets open in cold weather to prevent freezing in the pipes, I specially protest against that practice, and appeal to all citizens to abstain from wasteful use of water in any manner whatever. The present condition of the supply and the possibility of a recorrence of similar leaks in the aquedact make it my duty to give this public notice that I shall hereinafter resort to the peremptory measure of shutting off the water in all places where persistent waste is discovered.
