

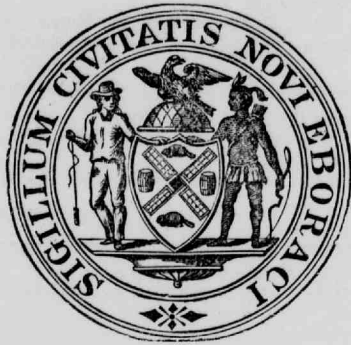

Alderman Strack moved that the Board do now adjourn.

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the negative by the following vote, on a division called by Alderman Keenan, viz. :

Negative—Aldermen Burns, Cavanagh, Finck, Foster, Hyatt, Jacobus, Keenan, Kiernan, Morris, Perley, Roberts, Sauer, Sheils, Slevin, and Strack—15.

##### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Alderman Jacobus, by unanimous consent, called up G. O. 137, being a preamble and resolution, as follows :

Whereas, It appears by the certificate of the Commandant of the Seventy-first Regiment of the National Guard, dated March 3, 1879, together with the certificate of the Adjutant-General, dated March 3, 1879, that each of the companies of the said regiment has reached the minimum number of non-commissioned officers, musicians, and privates established by section 12 of the act entitled "The Military Code," who regularly attend the drills and parades of such companies ; and the captain or commandant of each of such companies has made a demand, countersigned by the commandant of the said regiment to which such companies belong, for a suitable and convenient armory, drill-room, and place of deposit for the safe-keeping of the arms, uniforms, equipments, accoutrements, and camp equipage furnished under the provisions of the said act, for the use of each of such companies ; and

Whereas, The Commander of the First Division and the Inspector-General, as appears by their certificate dated March 3, 1879, deem expedient that a regimental armory be provided, to be used by all the companies of the said regiment, and have approved the premises hereinafter mentioned as suitable and convenient premises for a regimental armory to be used by all the said companies of the said regiment, and the said commandant of the said regiment has made a demand, dated March 3, 1879, that suitable and convenient premises, approved by the said Division Commander and Inspector-General, be provided for a regimental armory to be used by all the companies of such regiment, such accommodations not being provided in a State arsenal within the County of New York ; and

Whereas, The proper demands, countersigns, and certificate, prescribed by the Military Code have been made and provided by and on behalf of the said regiment and the companies thereof ;

Resolved, That the leasing of premises for an armory and drill-room for the use and occupation for military purposes of the Seventy-first Regiment of the National Guard in the City and County of New York, be and the same is hereby authorized, and that the Clerk of this Board be and he is hereby authorized and directed to execute a lease, in the name of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, and to affix the seal of the said Corporation thereto, of the entire premises on the second story of the building bounded by Broadway, Sixth avenue, Thirty-fifth and Thirty-sixth streets, in the City of New York, described in the leases thereof, dated February 16, 1869, executed in pursuance of resolutions of the Board of Supervisors of the County of New York, and heretofore used and occupied as an armory by the Seventy-first Regiment, for the term of three years from the first day of May, 1879, at the yearly rent of eight thousand dollars, payable quarterly, to be used and occupied by all the companies of the Seventy-first Regiment for a regimental armory ; that the said lease shall provide that no alterations of or additions to the said premises shall be made by the said Corporation or the said regiment without the previous written consent of the owners ; also that the superstructure shall be kept in good repair during the term of said lease by and at the expense of the owners of said property, and the usual fire clause in leases be inserted therein ; and that the Comptroller be and he is hereby directed to pay the said rent quarterly.

Alderman Jacobus moved to amend by striking out the "eight" before the word "thousand" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "ten."

Alderman Strack moved, as an amendment to the amendment, to insert the word "six" before the word "thousand."

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with the amendment of Alderman Strack.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, on a division called by Alderman Jacobus, viz. :

Affirmative—Aldermen Carroll, Cavanagh, Finck, Foster, R. Hall, Haughton, Hyatt, Kenney, Roberts, Sheils, and Strack—11.

Negative—Aldermen Burns, Jacobus, Kiernan, Morris, Perley, Sauer, and Stewart—7.

The President pro tem. then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution, as amended.

Alderman Sauer moved to amend by striking out the word "three" before the word "years" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "two."

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President pro tem. then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution, as amended.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz. :

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to William Munnie to retain sign across the walk and attached to the awning in front of his place of business, No. 743 Sixth avenue; said sign to be 12 feet clear of the sidewalk, about (10) ten feet long and (12) twelve inches wide; the permission hereby granted to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President pro tem. put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### REPORTS.

(G. O. 142.)

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the annexed petition of junk dealers for amendment of the ordinances relating to persons engaged in that business, respectfully

#### REPORT:

That the present ordinances restrict keepers of junk shops from keeping more than four carts or wagons, or boats for collecting the materials used in their business, and exacts a license fee of ten dollars per annum for each vehicle so used. Your Committee are unable to see any necessity or utility in restricting the number of vehicles to four for each dealer, nor can they see the justice of compelling a license fee of ten dollars for each cart, wagon or boat, in view of the fact that other public vehicles, such as hackney coaches, public carts, etc., pay only from three to five dollars per annum for each license, and one half that sum for renewals.

Your Committee believe the prayer of the petitioners should be granted, and accordingly offer for your adoption the following ordinance:

AN ORDINANCE to amend sections 43 and 45 of article IV., chapter XLII. of the ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of pawnbrokers, dealers in second-hand articles, and keepers of junk shops."

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 43 of article IV. of the above entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

"Section 43. Every licensed keeper of a junk shop for the purchase and sale of rags, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, empty bottles, tin, slush or lead, shall be entitled to keep one or more carts, wagons or other vehicles, and one or more boats or other vessels for the purpose of collecting old junk, rags, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, empty bottles, tin, slush, or lead in the City of New York, provided he or she shall, before using such carts, wagons, boats or other vessels, or causing the same to be used, cause to be painted on the outside of such hand-carts, wheelbarrows, or other carts or vehicles, boats or vessels, his name at length, the street and number of his place of business, the number of his license, in plain letters and figures, put on with paint, of not less than two and a half inches in length; and no person or persons, except such as are regularly licensed for the purpose aforesaid, according to the provisions of this chapter, or persons in the employ of such licensed dealers, shall draw, or drive, or procure to be drawn or driven, or propelled, any such hand-carts, wheelbarrows, carts, wagons, or other vehicles, boats, or other vessels.

Sec. 2. Section 45 of article IV. of the above entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

"Section 45. Every owner of a cart, wagon, or other vehicle, boat, or other vessel, on receiving his or her license, shall pay for each and every cart, wagon, or other vehicle, boat, or other vessel, to the Mayor of the City of New York, for the use of said city, the sum of five dollars, and upon the renewal of said license, annually, the sum of two and a half dollars."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending April 26, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,789, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 815 tenement-houses, 151 private dwellings, 75 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, 1 market, 21 slaughter-houses, 1 stock-yard, 1 oil works, 10 fat-rendering establishments, 1 garbage dump, 21 manure dumps, 1 fertilizing works, 55 sunken and vacant lots, 1 lodging-house, 3 public sewers, 1 swamp, 1 soap factory, 1 dangerous building, 1 smoke-house, 71 yards, courts, and areas, 88 cellars and basements, 162 waste-pipes and drains, 139 privies and water-closets, 58 street, gutters, and side walks, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 cesspool, 2 smoky chimneys, 25 piggeries, 16 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 715.

During the past week 122 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant-Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 95 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

140 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 131 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 113 houses, 113 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 405 births, 34 still-births, 176 marriages, and 579 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 26, 1879. This shows an increase of 1 birth, 9 marriages, and 61 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 97 births, and an increase of 6 marriages and 76 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; scarlatina, 9; croup, 4; puerperal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 3; aneurism, 2; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; drowning, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 2: whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, 1; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 13; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 1; cancers, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, 11; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; enteritis, peritonitis and gastritis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and pretermatural births, 4; surgical operations, 1.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 288 in tenement houses, 175 in houses containing 3 families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 99 on the first, 161 on the second, 123 on the third, 67 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 575 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 81 were stated to be single, 142 married, 74 widowed, and the condition of 282 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 579; still-births, 34; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 60 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 405 births, 176 marriages, 34 still-births, 579 deaths, 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 47 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 1 of marriage, and 34 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending April 26, 1879, was 56.3 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 30.060, the mean humidity was 55, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 753, and the total amount of rain-fall was .0 inches depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 555 deaths and still-births, or 90.54 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 8; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 239; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 66; Greenwood (undenominational), 45; Lutheran (undenominational), 74; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 40; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 8; Union (Methodist Protestant), 6; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 11; Machpelah, L. The actual mortality for the week ending April 19, 1879, was 531; this is 20 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1878, and 0.4 less than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,094,717.

Persons "enrolled" as liable must serve when called or pay their fines. No mere excuse will be allowed or interference permitted. The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable juries, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment.
