

The Committee on Law Department, to whom was referred the annexed petition of junk dealers for amendment of the ordinances relating to persons engaged in that business, respectfully REPORT:

That the present ordinances restrict keepers of junk shops from keeping more than four carts or wagons, or boats for collecting the materials used in their business, and exacts a license fee of ten dollars per annum for each vehicle so used. Your Committee are unable to see any necessity or utility in restricting the number of vehicles to four for each dealer, nor can they see the justice of compelling a license fee of ten dollars for each cart, wagon or boat, in view of the fact that other public vehicles, such as hackney coaches, public carts, etc., pay only from three to five dollars per annum for each license, and one half that sum for renewals.

Your Committee believe the prayer of the petitioners should be granted, and accordingly offer for your adoption the following ordinance:

for your adoption the following ordinance:

An Ordinance to amend sections 43 and 45 of article IV., chapter XLII. of the ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of pawnbrokers, dealers in second-hand articles, and keepers of junk shops." The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York, do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 43 of article IV. of the above entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

shall read as follows:

"Section 43. Every licensed keeper of a junk shop for the purchase and sale of rags, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, empty bottles, tin, slush or lead, shall be entitled to keep one or more carts, wagons or other vehicles, and one or more boats or other vessels for the purpose of collecting old junk, rags, old rope, old iron, brass, copper, empty bottles, tin, slush, or lead in the City of New York, provided he or she shall, before using such carts, wagons, boats or other vessels, or causing the same to be used, cause to be painted on the outside of such hand-carts, wheelbarrows, or other carts or vehicles, boats or vessels, his name at length, the street and number of his place of business, the number of his license, in plain letters and figures, put on with paint, of not less than two and a half inches in length; and no person or persons, except such as are regularly licensed for the purpose aforesaid, according to the provisions of this chapter, or persons in the employ of such licensed dealers, shall draw, or drive, or procure to be drawn or driven, or propelled, any such hand-carts, wheel-barrows, carts, wagons, or other vehicles, boats, or other vessels.

Sec. 2. Section 45 of article IV of the above entitled ordinance is hereby amended, and shall read as follows:

read as follows:

read as follows:

"Section 45. Every owner of a cart, wagon, or other vehicle, boat, or other vessel, on receiving his or her license, shall pay for each and every cart, wagon, or other vehicle, boat, or other vessel, to the Mayor of the City of New York, for the use of said city, the sum of five dollars, and upon the renewal of said license, annually, the sum of two and a half dollars."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Eureau for the week ending April 26, 1879:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,780, as follows, viz.: I public building, 815 tenement-houses, 151 private dwellings, 75 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 13 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, I market, 17 slaughter-houses, I stock-yard, I oil works, 10 fat-rendering establishments, I garbage dump, 21 manure dumps, I fertilizing works, 55 sunken and vacant lots, I lodging-house, 3 public sewers, I swamp, I soap factory, I dangerous building, I smoke-house, 71 yards, courts, and areas, 88 cellars and basements, 162 waste-pipes and drains, 139 privies and water-closets, 58 street, gutters, and side walks, 5 dangerous stairways, I cesspool, 2 smoky chimneys, 25 piggeries, 16 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 715.

During the past week 122 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant-Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 95 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

140 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 131 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 113 houses, 113 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 405 births, 34 still-births, 176 marriages, and 579 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this bureau during the week ending Saturday, April 26, 1879. This shows an increase of I birth, 9 marriages, and 61 deaths, and a decrease of 9 still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1878, there was a decrease of 97 births, and an increase of 6 marriages and 76 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week the deaths from small-pox decreased 1; measles, 2; scarlatina, 9; croup, 4; puerperal diseases, I; alcoholism, 3; aneurism, 2; apoplexy, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 7; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; drowning, 2; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 2: whooping cough, 5; erysipelas, I; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, I3; diarrhœal diseases, 2; inanition, I; cancers, I; phthisis pulmonalis, 20; bronchitis, 2; pneumonia, II; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, I; meningitis and encephalitis, 8; enteritis, peritonitis and gastritis, 3; Bright's disease and nephritis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, I. surgical operations, 1.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 102 were in institutions, 288 in tenement houses, 175 in houses containing 3 families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 6 were on the basement floor, 99 on the first, 161 on the second, 123 on the third, 67 on the fourth, 13 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 575 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 4 non-residents. 81 were stated to be single, 142 married, 74 widowed, and the condition of 282 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 579; still-births, 34; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 6 owere upon certificates received from the Coroners. 405 births, 176 marriages, 34 still-births, 579 deaths, 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 47 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 1 of marriage, and 34 of death were issued during the week.

SIR—There were 579 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, April 26, 1879, which is an increase of 67, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 76 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending April 19, 1879, was 531, which is .4 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.22 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,094,717.
